by those who formed the proposed tour was that business loans, seed money for corporations, expansion of local industries and industries and businesses can probably be brought about by some of the federal resources and new methods of formulating inty's road-maintaining equipment dustrial parks, getting task forces ready for new economic development can be brought about by private resources such as utility, transportation, and consultant firms. This coupled with the local and state input should for the first time make a "complete package" to entice large industries to expand into this area as well as providing local establishments a new way to expand.




