





As industry "breeds" industry some other firms got started in Fulton, while others moved in to create the industrial boom.

In 1954, there were 200 telephones in the Fulton Telephone Company, a private company and at the present time, the company services 5000 customers. The articles paid special tribute to the work of Fulton Mayor H. D. Ma-

Another article of interest in the magizine concerned the "Sweet Adelines" a group of Fulton housewives renowned for their acappela singing. The group is in demand over a wide area.

New Wheel Chair

The Elks Magazine reports the development of a wheel chair that would provide mobility for 100,-000 handicapped Americans who have no use of their arms and legs. It is being tested in hospitals and rehabilitation centers. The \$1500 vehicle is powered by an electric motor and is controlled by a sight switch which is activated by movements of the occupant's eyes. The technology was developed under direction of NASA at a time when it was thought our astronauts might have to operate their spacecraft by eye movements. It never proved necessary since they were able to move their arms despite the pull of "G" forces.

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

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
