WILDCATS HOST QUANAH FRIDAY OPENING GAME OF SEASON

The Quanah Indians, victims of the Crowell Wildcat football team last season, "will have blood in their eye" Friday night when they come to Dick Todd field to open the 1972 grid season for both teams.

The Indians have seven starters back from last year's squad, and are expected to be real contenders in their district race with Childress and Electra.

Heading the returning starters is Steve Barker, a fine ball carrier who was all-district last season and was the Indians' leading ground gainer.

The Indians tied the strong Memphis team 1-1 in a pre-season scrimmage and easily out-distanced the Munday Moguls in their other scrimmage of the pre-season. Crowell Coach Scott Boyd said Monday he was generally pleased with the Wildcats in their scrimmage with Throckmorton here last Saturday night, but he added there will be lots of work this week, especially on offense.

Defense has been the key word in the Wildcats' workouts this year, as Coach Boyd put it Monday, "When a team averages over 40 points per game and still fails to win district, there must be something lacking on defense."

Crowell Coach Scott Boyd said the 80 defense he has used both years in Crowell, he is adding another defense, the Oklahoma 5-4. This added defense has taken up some of the time ordinarily used on refining the offense. Boyd feels that the offense will come along fast and be ready for the Indians.

Starting Lineup

Offensive starters for the Cats will be Rocky Bachman and Ernest Barrera at ends; Billy Wade Eavenson and Allen Tapp at the tackle positions; Freddy Matysek and Terry Templen at guards; and Doug Pharis, center, Rex Driver, quarterback; with Emmitt Newman and John Urquiza at the halfback positions. Philip Bell will be playing fullback in the place of the injured Randy Dorsey.

Crowell Coach Boyd said offensive plays from the bench and Jackie Eavenson and Steve Graves will be the "Mike Ditka and Billy Truax" of the Wildcats as they are shuttled back and forth into the lineup carrying plays.

On defense, Pharis and Tapp will be at the end positions; at the tackle spots will be Bachman and Billy Eavenson. Linebackers will be Bell, Matysek and Barrera. The secondary will be composed of Bob Taylor, Driver, Urquiza and Newman.

Mrs. W. R. Ferguson, 84, longtime resident of Foard County, died in the Foard County Hospital Thursday, August 31, following a long illness.

Funeral services were held at 10 a. m., Saturday, September 2, at the First United Methodist Church with the pastor, Rev. J. B. Stewart, officiating.

Interment was in the Crowell Cemetery with Womack Funeral Home in charge of arrangements. Pall bearers were J. C. Autry, Jack Walker, Lawrence Glover, Jack Welch Buck Owensby, Marion Chowning, Jr.

The former Bertha Geneva Johnson was born in Denton County, Sept. 9, 1887, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Victor Key Johnson. She came by covered wagon with her parents to what is now Foard County in 1889. She had continued to make her home in Foard County since that time except for the past few years she spent in a Quanah rest home.

She was married to Mr. Ferguson on August 18, 1907. He preceded her in death in 1964. Mrs. Ferguson was a member of the Crowell Methodist Church.

Survivors include two sons, Floyd Ferguson and Howard Ferguson of Crowell; two daughters, Mrs. J. G. (Thelma) Adcock of Truscott and Mrs. John (Cora Belle) Rader of Crowell; two sisters, Mrs. Susie Beatty of Quanah and Mrs. Lena Morris of Corpus Christi; five grandchildren and 12 great grandchildren.

Rains Are General

HEAVY RAINS FALL IN FOARD COUNTY

Foard County during the past week has received additional moisture as cool fronts pushing into Texas kicked off some general rains over the entire area.

Heavy rains in parts of the Thalia area Thursday night did considerable damage to fields and crops, it was reported here Friday.

The rain was accompanied by high winds and an electrical storm and one field of feed grain was reported ruined by the driving rain and wind.

Also on Thursday night, the

rain blanketed the area east of Margaret. H. L. Ayers, Jr., reported he received two inches while farther east of the Ayers' place, Ward Kuehn received 2.8 inches.

On Wednesday night, a shower here in Crowell measured .17 inch and brought the total for the month of August up to 4.31 inches.

Skies were cloudy all day Saturday with only an intermittent light mist falling. Then Sunday afternoon, the rain began again and continued most of the night, measuring 2.2 inches here at 7:30 Monday morning. Additional rain Monday was .26 inch to bring the official total for the week end to 2.46 inches.

Tom Smith reported 3.9 inches at his home east of Margaret, and water was running across the Margaret highway in several spots Monday morning.

L. M. Glover, highway department maintenance foreman, said that water crossed US 70 several places Monday with a spot just east of Thalia on Paradise Creek still covered with water late Monday. Local personnel were flagging and slowing traffic through the water late Monday and Glover said he expected the water would be run down by midnight Monday. He also said that water crossed the highway in several places on FM 98, in the Margaret and Rayland areas.

Probably the heaviest of the rain fell in the Rayland section from the way fields in that area washed. Many fields looked like lakes and numerous patches of cotton were inundated.

States, were a "disservice to this nation."
He pointed that when President Nixon took office, there were 500,000 troops in Vietnam and during his term, that number has been reduced to 60,000.

In commenting on the cost of government, Price said that the \$80 billion defense budget is the largest single item of spending. Health, education and welfare is the second biggest cost item of federal government. Price blasted McGovern's suggested welfare program and said there are 11 million people on welfare now. Proposed legislation would bring that total up to 25 million.

He said the third largest cost of government is the \$22 billion spent on interest on the national debt.

Price added that although government was intended to serve the people, the federal government has grown to such huge size, that it is the people serving the government now.

In commenting on the moral decay so prevalent in America, Price suggested that a happy home life is essential, church attendance and participation is needed, and a return to the teaching of high moral principles in both school and home are needed if this country is to reverse its trend of declining morals.

Stating that young people have to go where the jobs are, Price urged Foard Countians to get busy and provide jobs here. He said this Economically Deprived Area designation for Foard and Cottle Counties should provide needed assistance in these counties.

Price says people are sick of the big cities, and many of them are anxious to return to smaller towns. He said rural America is the backbone of this nation.

Price expressed his opposition to the minimum wage law which prohibits many young people from working and leaves them idle to get into trouble.

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FOARD STOCKMEN OPPOSE "DIPPING OUT" OF ENTIRE COUNTY

About 70 Foard county residents attended a meeting in the district court room in Crowell on Tuesday night, August 29, and heard a Texas Animal Health Commission official say that he hoped to have the scabies quarantine lifted from Foard County by March, 1973. Foard County is one of 34 Texas counties which have been quarantined due to scabies outbreak last winter.

Ironically, no scabies has been found in Foard County, but the county was, nevertheless, placed under the quarantine.

Principal speaker was Dr. J. B. Young of Amarillo, area supervisor for the Texas Animal Health Commission's scabies eradication program.

Dr. Young spoke briefly on the scabies outbreak now in progress in Texas. He said a mild winter last year caused the screwworm fly to over-winter far north of normal. The eradication program was begun ten years ago and had, until this year, virtually eliminated the screwworm menace in Texas. The eradication program relies on the release of sterile male flies, and the 220 million being produced each week at the Mission laboratory are being released in the east part of the state in a desperate attempt to keep the screwworm pest from invading the states to the east of Texas.

He said the deer hunting industry will probably be dealt a severe blow this fall as the screwworm is a big killer of deer.

He advised no castration or de-horning until cold weather, and advised stockmen to keep a close watch on mother cows with calves.

Scabies Quarantine

Dr. Young told the group of the possibility of having the scabies quarantine lifted in the county with the dipping of every animal in the county. After telling those present that he hoped to have the quarantine lifted by next March, the stockmen present cast practically a unanimous vote against dipping every animal in the county.

Dr. Young said the biggest outbreak of scabies in three decades occurred last winter.

There are many rules and exceptions to the rules on moving cattle in the scabies quarantined area, and any one in doubt should contact either Mike Rasberry or Freddie Prather, both of whom are inspectors for the Texas Animal Health Commission.

Accompanying Dr. Young to Crowell were Boyce Hart of Matador, senior livestock inspector, Texas Animal Health Commission scabies program, and Gregg Wade, an inspector for the TAHC from Amarillo.

Sealed Bids Being Accepted for State Park Construction

The Copper Breaks State Park will soon undergo the first phase of improvements, it was announced last week by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Sealed bids for the work are now being accepted until September 19 by the state building commission in Austin and pending suitable bids, several improvements will be effected at the park.

Construction in this phase will include roads inside the park, electricity and water lines, a residence for the park superintendent, rest rooms and shower stalls, trailer camp spaces, dump stations, and recreation facilities.

McMurtry & Craig, Architects and Engineers of Lubbock, drew up the plans for the park improvements.

Coming up in the future, hopefully, will be the receiving of bids on the second phase of the park improvements which will include a headquarters and interpretative center, a dam and spillway on Devils' Creek, a swimming beach, a boat ramp, and bath houses.

The dam which is planned will create a lake for the recreation of park visitors.

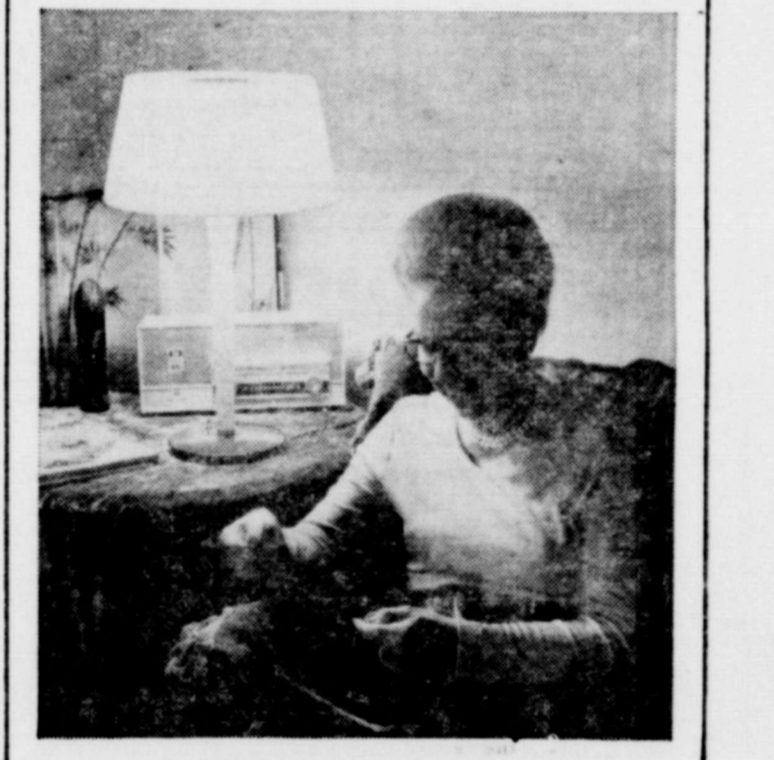

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

Austin, Tex. — Governor Preston Smith is convincing high state officials and legislators he is serious about calling a special legislative session on insurance reform after mid-September.

Smith himself revived speculation at a news conference last week when he said odds favor such a session sometime before the general election November 7.

The governor told newsmen legislative leaders had indicated they will cooperate with him. He included Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes among the latter.

"I believe he is giving real serious consideration to calling a session," said Barnes. "He really wants to have one."

Smith made clear there is nothing definite yet about his plans, and he would still want to make sure a session would be productive before he summons lawmakers.

Establishment of a competitive insurance rate system for all lines of insurance would be his top objective, Smith said.

He added he "probably" would seek Insurance Board reorganization but added: "If we established competitive rates, I don't know how much further you would need the board."

Smith earlier said an opinion by Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin that the governor cannot order funds transferred from one agency to another to meet emergencies may also bring on a special session.

Smith said recent opinions would place "drastic limitations" on the governor's powers and "threaten virtually every authority of the chief executive."

DEMOCRATIC CAMPAIGN LAUNCHED — Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong and Agriculture Commissioner John C.

White emerged as co-chairmen of the Texas campaign for George McGovern and Sargent Shriver. Both acknowledged the Democratic national nominees are starting from "away behind," but they predicted the outlook will improve within the next few weeks.

McGovern and Shriver and President Nixon will devote more time to wooing Texas voters than any other national candidates ever did before, said White.

White defended gubernatorial nominee Dolph Briscoe for not assuming a national campaign post. He said Briscoe has active opposition and is "doing what is right and proper" in concentrating on his own race.

STATE PAY RAISE GRANTED — A 6.8 per cent pay raise for about 67,000 state employees effective September 1 has approval of the Federal Pay Board.

The pay boost was authorized under a special "catch-up" provision of regulations permitting increases for employee groups where the average raises over the last three years was less than seven per cent. Pay Board approval is necessary where raises are higher than the five per cent limit established as a guideline to check inflation.

State employees received pay increases of 6.8 per cent in 1969, 3.4 per cent in 1970 and 6.8 per cent in 1971.

ACT TO BRING STATE \$60 MILLION — Texas would get about \$60 million in new federal money under the Rural Development Act of 1972.

The legislation authorizes more than \$980 million nationwide for physical and economic development of rural America. The program seeks to bring people and business to underpopulated areas and thus ease the congestion in urban centers.

Gubernatorial nominee Dolph Briscoe is pushing for total overhaul of the state budgeting system and creation of a Budget Commission.

Lt. Gov. Barnes is threatening a libel suit against the author of a new book on Texas politics for statements about his personal life.

The purpose of the public meeting is to receive new and additional material concerning the environmental impacts of the project.

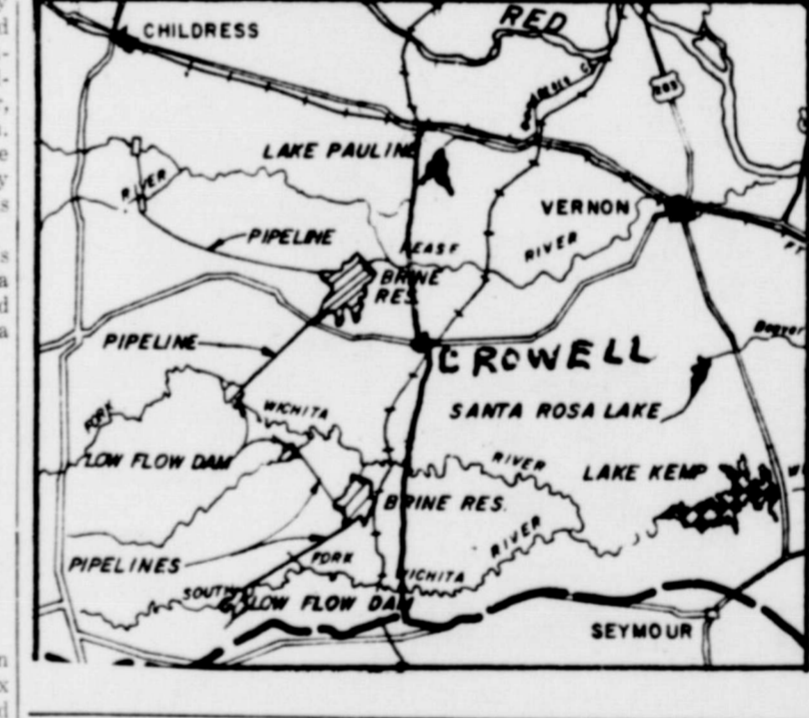
The project area is located in Foard, Cottle, King and Knox Counties, on the North, South and Middle Forks of the Wichita River.
