The newly elected board of directors includes Freddie Riethmayer, Warren Haynie, Glen Swan, Johnnie Matus, Kenneth Halbert, Cates, Matthews and Carroll.

Grady Halbert, committee chairman, presented some 16 resolutions dealing with wheat, cotton, livestock, feed grain and other farm programs. After two additions, the resolutions were adopted.

The board of directors was authorized to secure local delegates to the FU state convention at Six Flags Inn, Arlington, December 7-9.

Typographical Error Changes Meaning of Story

Meaning Changed in Story Concerning Food Stamps

A typographical error in last week's edition completely changed the story about the eligibility requirements being different in the surplus commodity and food stamp programs.

In the story as it appeared, County Judge Leslie Thomas said it appears that Foard County will be phased into the food stamp program around October 1. Through a typographical error, "1973" was left out and the date should have read October 1, 1972.

School in Progress on "How to Start a Small Business"

There will be an adult school taught at the Foard County neighborhood center. The course to be taught is entitled "how to start a small business." The school began Tuesday, Sept. 19, at 7:30 p. m. until 9:30 p. m. and will continue on each Tuesday night for four more weeks.

Instructor of the classes will be Keith Vaughn of Austin, economic development specialist out of the governor's office who is with the State Technical Assistance Program.

Topics of discussion will be business plan, small business bank financing, questions to consider, pitfalls to avoid, management principles, and check point and development of business. Assisting Vaughn in instructing classes will be Oscar Dickerson, director of the Small Business Development Center of Asperment; and Ernie Larmer of Fort Worth, with the Four Winds Industrial Foundation.

Vaughn said, "This school will be of interest whether you have a small business now or not, or plan to have a business in the future. The school is open to all income brackets. There will be a small fee for those not in the low income level."

The release of the teams to be in District 7A for interscholastic league basketball this season shows that the perennial powerhouse, Petrolia, is not in the district this year.

Teams listed in district 7A basketball are Archer City, Crowell, Holliday, Knox City, Munday and Paducah.

Encouraging reports on several local projects were given at a meeting of the membership of the Foard County Development Corporation last Friday morning at the community center.

Guy Todd, Jr., president of the organization, said that the corporation's charter was approved on September 5. He added that several state authorities have told him that local authorities made a step in the right direction with the organization of the corporation. It is through this organization that much of the hoped-for Economic Development Administration funds will be directed, as the federal government attempts to help Foard County get moving on the swing to more jobs for more people.

There are at present 114 dues paying members in the corporation, and Ray Shirley, membership committee chairman, and others on the committee are trying to raise the membership list to at least 200.

Mr. Todd said that a 90-day option on a local building has been obtained as efforts continue to gain a new industry. He also said a Dallas firm had expressed interest in a plant here, and he said the local corporation will be glad to talk to anyone willing to (Continued on page 8)

CROWELL TAKES 39-6 WIN AT CHILLICOTHE

The Crowell Wildcats notched a second non-district victory this season last Friday night at Chillicothe as they won over the bunch of Eagles 39-6.

Certainly wasn't a runaway win as the first half of the Wildcats held to one touchdown in each of the first two quarters, but a big 25-point third quarter put the game on ice for Coach Scott Boyd's charges.

Johnny Urquiza, who had a big night for the Wildcats, scored Crowell's first touchdown as he took a pitchout from quarterback Rex Driver and then galloped for 44 yards. Rocky Bachman kicked the point-after. The remainder of the first quarter was penalty-infested with red flags on the grass on most plays, and with neither team making any kind of threat.

Then, with the half running out, quarterback Driver, who had been suffering a sore back all week, decided to do some running and made two nice gallops. Emmitt Newman, another Wildcat standout on offense, came through with a good run, but a 15-yard holding penalty nullified his run. Then Driver threw a 15-yard pass to Steve Graves and two plays later

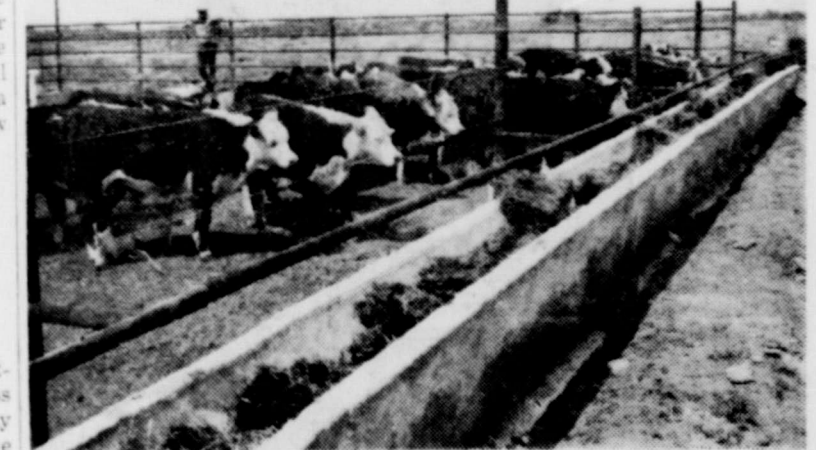
Crowell Receives .39 Inch Rain Last Thursday Afternoon

A cool front pushed through Foard County last Thursday afternoon and in the process, kicked off some rain in parts of the county.

Official measurement here was .39 inch; up to 1.6 inches fell a short distance south of town. In the Thalia community, .2 inch was reported and Felix Taylor said he got .1 inch at his home in the Rayland community.

The cool front help a little in relieving the intensely hot weather of early last week. The showers brought brief relief from the heat as high temperatures returned Saturday. As a brief change in the weather, a big dust storm struck about 5 p. m. Monday. A few scattered showers followed the duster.

M-B Cattle Co. Constructing Facilities for New Business West of Crowell

E. C. King Named Half Century Member of Fraternal Society

An order buying and stockyard operation—the M-B Cattle Co.—is now in operation 1 1/2 miles west of Crowell. Owners of the new business are David Moorhouse of Seymour and Dwayne Boren of Crowell.

Work on pens continues at the location with the firm receiving its first load of calves Tuesday of last week. When completed, Mr. Moorhouse said in addition to a large number of pens, the firm will have scales and working facilities for cattle, in addition to a dipping vat. The company's offices will also be built at the site of the pens on what is commonly known as the Bowley place.

When completed, Mr. Moorhouse said they will have facilities to yard and feed 1,000 head of cattle. The main business will be supplying stocker cattle in the fall (Continued on page 8)

ACT Test Oct. 21

Five Saturday mornings during the current academic year will probably be especially important to Crowell senior students who are planning to attend college. On any of those Saturdays—the first Oct. 21—the students will have the opportunity to take the ACT assessment. Those planning to take the examination on that first date must have registered no later than Oct. 2, it was announced by Mrs. Joe Drabek.

Mrs. Drabek also announced the complete schedule for the year. The five national dates (with corresponding registration periods in parenthesis) are Oct. 21, 1972 (Aug. 21-Oct. 2), Dec. 9, 1972 (Oct. 9-Nov. 13), Feb. 24, 1973 (Nov. 27-Jan. 29), April 28, 1973 (Feb. 12-April 2), July 21, 1973 (April 16-June 25).

Cost for the test which takes over 3 hours is \$6.50. Students uncertain whether or not to take the test should contact Mrs. Drabek.

Mrs. Drabek recommended that students write the ACT examination-questionnaire during the junior year or early in the senior year, in order to make use of the resulting ACT data in planning for college.

From the News... THIRTY YEARS AGO

News items below were taken from the Thursday, Sept. 17, 1942, issue of The Foard County News:

Two hundred and twenty-five tons of scrap iron have been bought in Crowell by the Texas Iron & Metal Co. since August 29, Charles Bernstein, manager, announced Wednesday. The company shipped four cars of iron last week and will ship three more this week.

L. G. Bragdon, postoffice inspector of Fort Worth, was in Crowell Wednesday in the interest of securing a building for the Crowell postoffice, which has been located in the Self building on the north side of the square for the past four and one-half months. The postoffice building and all the fixtures were destroyed by fire at the time the tornado struck Crowell on April 28. Four buildings are under consideration.

Officers and men of the United States Coast Guard were included in the American forces which attacked and seized Japanese strongholds in the Solomon Islands, it has been announced by Coast Guard Headquarters for the Eighth Naval District in New Orleans.

The Baruch Rubber Investigating Committee has recommended nationwide gasoline rationing as a means of saving tires, and President Roosevelt, in transmitting the report to Congress, stated its recommendations "will be put into effect as rapidly as arrangements can be made."

Merl Sandlin left Monday for Lubbock where he will enter the Air Corps branch of the U. S. Army.

Before an all-white altar, with an arrangement of tall baskets of white gladioli and graduated rows of white tapers, the marriage of Miss Billie Louise Brown to Lieut. Thomas Bennett Johnson was solemnized at the Methodist Church Thursday evening, Sept. 10, with Rev. W. B. Fitzgerald officiating with the double ring ceremony. Mrs. Johnson is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Hubert C. Brown of Crowell. Lieut. Johnson is the son of Major and Mrs. R. L. Johnson of West Point, N. Y.

Oma Floy McLain, daughter of Mrs. P. H. McLain of Crowell, became the bride of Aviation Cadet Andy Garrett, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. Garrett of Sterling City, in a service read at the Kirkland Field Chapel at Albuquerque, N. M., Saturday at noon.

Second Lieut. Robert M. Magee of Crowell is attending the Battery Officer Course in the Field Artillery at Fort Sill, Okla.

Kenneth Halbert left last Friday for Lubbock where he entered the fall term at Texas Technological College.

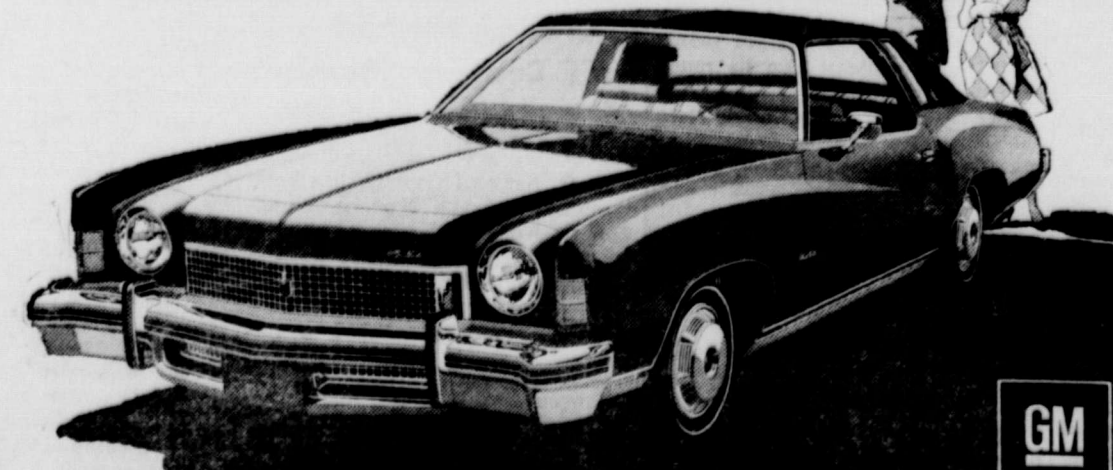

Highlights and Sidelights from The State Capitol

Austin, Tex.—Gov. Preston Smith, as had been long reported, summoned legislators back to Austin Monday to consider competitive insurance rates and strengthened budget controls for the governor.

He spelled out his recommendations in a joint session of the House and Senate.

While he has indicated he will battle to put his recommendations across, Smith said he has no plans to call more than one 30-day special session.

On the other hand, he is reluctant to open the session agenda to permit consideration of other matters until the competitive rating bill has been disposed of.

Smith said he considers as the most important step toward insurance reform and consumer protection replacement of the system of rate-setting by the State Board of Insurance with a competitive rate system.

Recent attorney general's opinions, complained Smith, have virtually stripped the governor of authority to insure adequate funding of state services. The opinions held he could not order transfer of funds from one state agency to another and that appropriations bill riders giving him effective power to pass on itemized spending are invalid.

Smith acknowledged that in calling a fourth special session of the 62nd Legislature (the 62nd is the first legislature since 1934 to have to meet so often) he had taken no easy course.

Insurance companies reportedly are pretty well divided on the competitive rate issue. They defeated a similar proposal last year.

Selection of new undergraduate members, conducted by former and continuing participants, is based on their keen interest in the university as shown through participation in campus academic and social activities. The CAB assists the Alumni Affairs Office with such activities as parents' week end, homecoming events, awards presentations throughout the year and at a dinner honoring the senior class in the spring.

Showing of Former Resident's Art to Begin Wednesday

Velox Ward Paintings Due in Wichita Falls

Primitive painting by a 71-year-old Longview artist, Velox Ward, who lived in the Foard County community of Foard County for a number of years, are now on exhibit in the art gallery at the Wichita Falls Museum and Art Center in Wichita Falls.

Though untrained in art, Ward paints a familiar nostalgic Texas with his scenes of the simple life of country folk in the early part of this century.

The exhibition is on loan from the Amon Carter Museum in Fort Worth and in Wichita Falls to open the exhibit Wednesday evening at a reception will be Peter Hassrick, curator of that museum.

A retrospective exhibit, the painting, which will remain at the museum through Nov. 1, include such recollections as "How High Is Aunt Fanny's Porch"—a painting showing a typical farm house with a water well; "No Meat Shortage," a winter scene depicting hog killing and smokehouse; "Mama Blows the Horn," "See You Next Sunday"—a typical country church on Sunday morning; and the popular early day social gathering, "Dinner on the Ground."

This exhibit should be a popular one with the "over 40" generation who will recall some scenes from their childhood, the older citizens who probably lived in such communities and even the younger art viewers who have heard their grandparents talk of the "old days."

Ward uses vivid colors to show the realism of his subjects. As a painter he has drawn from the varied experiences in his life from wrestling to the many odd jobs of furniture repair, farming and shoe repair. He even went into the ministry as a lay preacher.

He did not begin painting until in later life. In 1960 when he was in the shoe repair business his grown children suggested that he paint each of them a picture for a Christmas present. He went out and bought three brushes, five tubes of paint and four canvases.

He started spending his nights painting, later hanging the canvases on the walls of his shop. A salesman saw his work, and requested that he paint a picture for him from a photograph. This painting led to another and soon he gave up his shoe repair business to begin his painting career.

He was born on a farm near Mount Pleasant in East Texas. His parents moved to Foard City in 1910. After many moves, he returned to Crowell about 1925 and married the former Jessie Baines Howell of Childress.

Ward paints in a small studio behind his house in Longview. The studio is jammed with mementoes and devices he uses in his work. He still paints at night.

The Wildcats have been impressive in their first two wins and the Crowell-Memphis game should be a thriller.
