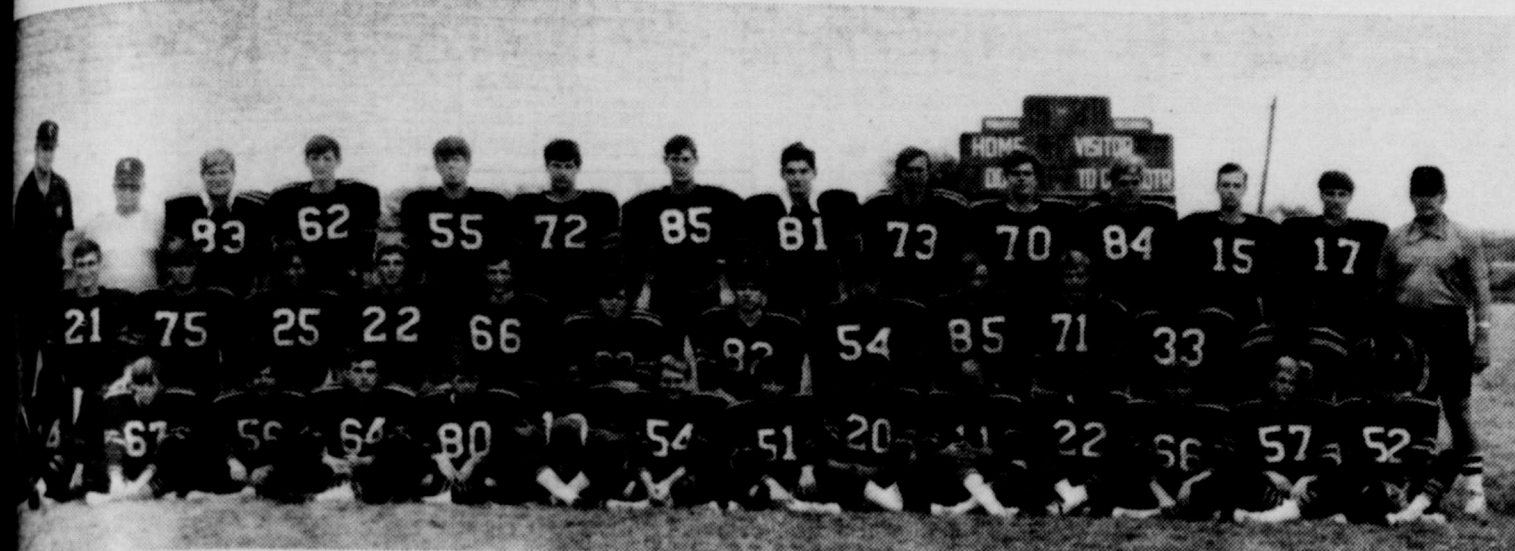

The Crowell Wildcats will be going to bounce back into the "C" column this week as they travel to Electra Friday night to face the Tigers in a game beginning at 8 o'clock.

Several talented offensive stars return this year, headed by ends Terry Bruce and Cary Klein, who Crowell's Coach Scott Boyd calls "class ends." ## Crowell Wildcats Drop Non-District Football Game to Memphis 27-13

The Crowell Wildcats, plagued by fumbles and untimely penalties, came out on the short end of a 27-13 score here last Friday night when they hosted the powerful Memphis Cyclones.

Most of the first half action was all Memphis as the Cyclones collected 19 points in that period. Memphis quarterback Mike Browning directed his teammates on a drive early in the game and Bobby Hall took a Browning pass to cross the double stripe. Larry Johnson booted for the extra point. In the second quarter, the Cyclones ripped off two more TDs on runs of 4 and 2 yards by the hard-running Johnson. Both conversion attempts failed.

The Wildcats' comeback was immediate in the second half. Quarterback Rex Driver caught the kickoff on first bounce, headed straight ahead, broke out into the open. Then it was a footrace between him and a long tall Cyclone. Rex and his defender crossed the goal line together, but Rex had himself a TD (83 yards) and Rocky Bachman boomed the ball through the uprights for another PAT. Then, the Wildcats' attempted on-side kick went only 3 yards to give the Memphis team the pigskin on Crowell's 48, and they soon had another TD (their only one in the last half).

Then—throwing on every down—Driver started moving the ball up and down the field. He teamed up with Steve Graves and Bachman for a TD, with Bachman catching a 43-yarder at midfield, and then a few plays later one for a 14-yard touchdown.

Making excellent use of a host of speedy backs, the Cyclones rolled up 258 yards rushing and then added 51 yards in the air. Joining big Larry Johnson in the ground gaining were Paul Fowler and Ronald Canida.

The Wildcats lost five fumbles, and Memphis used three of these for scoring opportunities.

Rocky Bachman, Freddy Matysek, Ernest Barrera, Allen Tapp, Phillip Bell, Billy Evenson and Doug Pharis all played some stout defense. Johnny Urquiza, Rex Driver, Bob Taylor and Emmitt Newman held the Cyclone passing game down to a minimum.

# DISEASE GRANT OKAYED

## Eradication of Cattle Diseases Is Goal of Grant

Congressman Graham Purcell has announced that a \$170,414 grant has been approved to help demonstrate methods of eradicating diseases which are threatening the production of cattle in Texas.

The funds from the Economic Development Administration will go to the State of Texas for a one year program. State officials reported that cases of screw-worms, tick fever and scabies have increased during 1972, resulting in a federal quarantine on cattle from several Texas counties and threatening the entire cattle production in the state.

Through the Texas State Animal Health Commission and the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation at Mission, the state plans to pinpoint the extent of the parasites within counties and to demonstrate on-the-spot eradication measures.

The funds will allow the state to hire additional animal health inspectors to conduct the program. The state will add \$131,742 in other funds to meet the \$252,156 total cost of the demonstration program.

## Coming Deadlines Are Important to Texas Voters

Under the continuing and permanent voter registration which is in effect in Texas for the first time this year, it is not too late to register to vote but the deadline is approaching. The minimum age too, has been lowered and the legal age for voting now begins at 18.

Friday, October 6, is the last day to register in order to be eligible to vote in the general election on Nov. 7.

Absentee voting by mail in person begins Wednesday, Oct. 18.

Nov. 2 is the last day for a voter who has moved from one election precinct to another within the same county to transfer his registration to his new precinct for voting in the general election.

Last day for absentee voting in person, and the last day for application to vote absentee by mail is Friday, Nov. 3.

**Program for Early Education of Children with Handicaps**

Project PEECH (Program, Early Education of Children with Handicaps) is conducting a search for children who are eligible to be in the program. Region IX Education Service Center in Wichita Falls is sponsoring the program which will provide education for the home for handicapped children between the ages of months and six years.

The program is designed to make the transition to school easier for children who have any of the following handicaps: physical handicaps, loss of hearing, of sight, speech impairments, serious emotional disturbance, mental retardation or any combination of these. Persons knowing of children with these problems may contact:

Mrs. Lois A. Cadman, Project Director, Region IX Education Service Center, P. O. Box 408, Wichita Falls, Texas 76307.  
 Supt. Larry Jones, box 21, Crowell, Texas 79227.

Referrals may be from any in the community including school administrators, physicians, social workers, and ministers, but a child will enter the program only if the parent or guardian gives consent. Parental consent will be necessary for the child to be evaluated to determine the extent of the handicap.

When a child is accepted in the program, a determination made of the kinds of activities that would be best for the child. A program is designed and a visiting teacher comes to the home weekly to work with both parent and child. The key to success with the children, according to Mrs. Cadman, is parents who are willing to learn how to help the child and willing to take the time to do so.

The program is made possible through a grant to the service center from the bureau of education for the handicapped of the U. S. Office of Education.

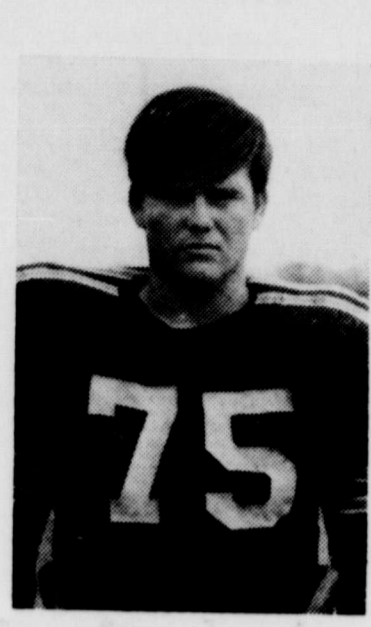

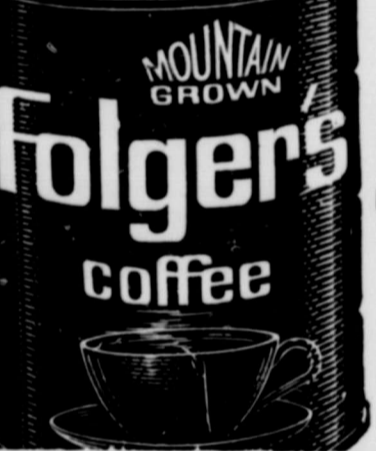

# Farmcast

A Weekly Report Of Agri-Business News

Compiled From Sources  
Of The Texas Department Of Agriculture  
John C. White, Commissioner

Cotton production increases again. . . Cattle on feed declines slightly. . . Pecan production expected to set record. . . Crop prospects good. . . Texas cotton production for this season is estimated to be more than one million bales above 1971. The Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service estimates Texas production this year now at 3,800,000 bales. This would be an increase of 1,221,000 bales over 1971 production.

Yield, based on Sept. 1 conditions, is expected to average 356 pounds per acre. Only 283 pounds per acre were produced in 1971.

Harvest is virtually complete in the Lower Rio Grande Valley. A ONE per cent decline in the number of cattle on feed compared to a month ago is reported for Texas. The state continues to be the number one cattle feeding state in the nation.

As of Sept. 1, there were 2,095,000 head of cattle and calves on feed for slaughter in Texas. Compared to a year ago, this is 32 per cent higher.

A RECORD pecan crop is in prospect for Texas. The Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service estimates a crop of 70,000,000 pounds, the highest ever. This is almost three times more than last year's crop of only 24,000,000 pounds. The Texas crop will account for 35 per cent of the total estimated U. S. production this year.

The 1972 crop estimate is one

million pounds above the previous record crop of 69,000,000 pounds in 1968.

CROP prospects continue at a high level over most of the state. Grain sorghum production is expected to top off at 60 bushels per acre, a record high yield. Harvest throughout the state is more than half complete.

Corn production is now estimated at 35,000,000 bushels. Per acre yield is expected to be 70 bushels, which is 8 bushels lower than 1971. Peanut yields this year are expected to be higher than in 1971. A yield of 1,430 pounds per acre is anticipated; this compared with 1,235 pounds per acre in 1971.

Wheat seeding is active from the Edwards Plateau to the northern High Plains. Seeding for the state is about 20 per cent complete.

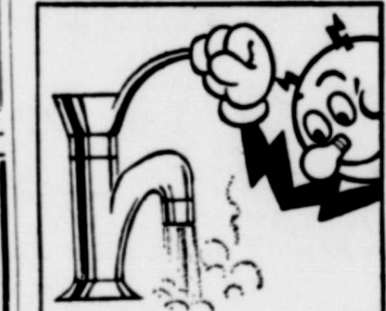

He also told about the new bumper which absorbs minor bumps and gives the owner a 10 per cent credit on auto insurance. He added that a 10 per cent insurance cost reduction is also available for successfully completing a driver training course and also a 10 per cent defensive driving credit is available in certain instances.

He said that last year the state of Michigan okayed the selling of alcoholic beverages in bars to 18-year-olds and in the past year automobile accidents among the 18-21-year age group has increased 63 per cent.

He spoke of the big sales of imported cars and added that if sales of imports increases one per cent, about 80,000 jobs are done away with in this country.

Goodwin praised the auto dealer and manufacture licensing law passed in Texas last year, and said it would go a long way in protecting the consumer.

### Red River Authority Manager Issues Statement Monday

Fred Parkey, general manager of the Red River Authority of Texas, has issued the following statement concerning rural water systems:

"The rural water systems are financed through the Farmers Home Administration, and they have certain restrictions that they put on the water users in order to make sure that the loan is repaid over a 40 year period. One of these restrictions being that once a meter has been installed, the user pays a monthly rate from that date on. These systems are made feasible by the number of meters available and sufficient revenue is received to pay back the loan."

"We are not permitted to furnish any customer with water without a charge. Normally, the meter is placed 5 feet inside the property line and the customers are required to tie on to install additional turnouts on the line other than those who have made their deposits for active meters. We do not plan to permit a person to install a meter to graze wheat three months out of a year and then not pay a water bill the remaining nine months. In other words, this will be run as a business; everyone will be treated the same, with no exceptions."
