





## Only 55 Area **Drought Loans** OK'd by Cutoff

Acting quickly to take advantage of drought emergency loans up to \$5,000 through the Farmers Home Administration and obtaining loan approvals prior to Dec. 27 could leave 55 farm operators in Foard, Hardeman and Wilbarger counties the only farmers in the area to benefit from the federal drought relief program loans.

Huey R. Price of Vernon, FHA supervisor for the three counties, said last week that farmers who won approval before he was ordered to terminate applications under an Administration economy action, apparently will receive the loans. He said the 55 include seven or eight farm operators in Foard County with the remainder Hardeman counties.

## **Home Owners Insurance Rates Are Trimmed**

Homeowners in Crowell and this area may expect a reduction of up to 20 per cent in their home insurance policies next year, the State Insurance Board.

State Insurance Board spokesmen ordered cuts over most of the state and said reductions in homeowners policies in the northnorthwest region, including Crowell, will be "about 20 per cent."

Policies with extended coverage provisions will be cut by about 30 per cent. The fire insurance rates, a part of the homeowners' plan, will be cut by 7.5 to 10 per cent, according to the board. One source estimated that the

"average" home in this area will realize a 16 per cent cut. For the "average home," a \$12,000 to \$15,000 frame house with the most popular type of coverage, the reduction could be \$40 or, more over a three-year period.
