Lawsuits pending in Texas courts list charges of "fraudulent advertising of assets resulting in an increase in stock prices," "conspiring to gain control," and "attempting to dissipate the assets of both the company and the holding company.'

One federal crime fighter recently noted "more and more racketeers are going into securities transactions."

In recent months, several Texas banks were defrauded in an illicit securities scheme that began in San Francisco and had ramifications in New Jersey.
