



Natural salt pollution originating in the upper part of the Red River Basin contributes about 4,000 tons of salt per day to the Red

River, causing the water in the river to be unsuitable for most uses. The Corps has looked at several ways to solve the problem. At present, the best way appears to be to control the natural pollution by collecting the brine and pumping it to nearby brine storage lakes or by damming the salt water flows immediately below the source area.

Before the first stamps are is present food assistance program. be eligible for food stamps also as well as others who might not receive commodity foods.

Certification for food stamp eligibility will begin at a later date. All persons who don't make much money or who are unemployed are encouraged to apply at that time. Welfare recipients aren't the only ones who can qualify for food stamps.

Local issuance office will sel the food stamps to all who are able to buy their stamps at the

Food stamps, which can be used for the purchase of most foods and food products, will be accepted by many of the local grocers. Payment is made by tearing the necessary amount of food stamps from the coupon book at the time of purchase. Tobacco, alcoholic beverages and imported items can not be purchased with food stamps.

Grocers can deposit food stamps ust as they do money. The local banker then sends the stamps to the U.S. Department of Agriculture for redemption.

More information is available at the local welfare office in the basement of the court house.

The petroleum industry Foard County played a significant role in 1972 in helping to satisfy the unprecedented demand for Texas' crude oil and natural gas.

Foard was one of 190 of Texas' 254 counties which produced oil and gas valued in excess of \$100,-000 in a record production year Muleshoe visited he mother, Mrs. for the state's No. 1 industry, according to figures compiled by the Texas Mid-Continent Oil &

The county ranked 167th in the state in the value of petroleum The Texas Criminal Justice and returned with Carlton Sun-The sale of crude oil brought \$1 million; natural gas, \$61,000.

This study by the Association also shows that production last year in Foard County resulted in the payment of \$135,000 to royalty owners.

The state of Texas received \$51,000 in production taxes from county wells; \$47,000 on crude oil output and \$4,000 from natural gas production.

Oil and gas producers and de velopers spent \$188,000 drilling 10 wells in the county last year, with \$101,000 of that figure lost in six dry holes.

Farmers can save on income tax during the summer by paying their children for farm work and combining vacation and business trips, says an economist for the extension service. Child wages can be deducted and the children still claimed as dependents if a farmer provides more than half their support. A child will not have to pay income tax if he earns less than \$2,050. Business-related expenses from a business-vacation trip are deductible as long as business is the primary purpose of the trip. Only the farmer's expenses, not those of the entire family, are deductible.




