



Richard Armstrong Director of the Christophers **AUSTIN McGARRY DURST** SCHOOL TEACHER

When Austin Durst of Junction, Texas, graduated from high school in 1907, the students were asked to write out their life goals and put them in a box. "Ten years later," she remembered, "they picked me to open the box. I had written, 'I want to be a successful teacher.' That remained my goal until the last day I taught.

That "last day" was only a few years ago. Austin Durst retired at the age of 80, after 63 years teaching the first grade. The principal of the school and members of the school board had all been taught to read by her. So had well over 3,000 other people-four generations of children-in Junction (pop. 1.500).

"I think I learned more than I taught all those years," she said. "But I have no special wisdom. I was just a first grade teacher, nothing more.

Her words, however, have the ring of wisdom:

"I taught simply because I loved to teach and loved the people I taught." 'Success in life doesn't

involve cleverness or money or station, but simply involving yourself with others. "I tried to teach the three R's

and also something about truth and honesty and respect for others. A successful teacher does both-at least that's my definition.

'So many children came into my classrooom from homes where there was no love. I did my best to let them know there was such a thing as love. There were times when all a child wanted or needed was to sit in my lap a while. I've taught an entire day with a child in my lap.

Other times I would wake up at night worrying how to reach this one or that one. But it was worth the worry.' Her reward? "I will go to

Heaven and all the pupils I ever taught will be there, all the thousands of them. I will walk through the gates and they will all stand up and say 'Good morning, Miss Aussie.' And I will know them, every one." For a free copy of the

NEW GRASSES

There's a lot more beef in your favorite grocery store because of improved grasses planted by Texas conservation

farmers and ranchers. In fact, an extra 335 million pounds of beef is produced in Texas every year from grasses released by the USDA Soil Conservation Service.

Edward E. Thomas of Temple, state conservationist for SCS, said the figures came from a recent study conducted by his office.

'Our survey revealed that in the last 20 years, 5.9 million acres of land has been planted to new grasses released by SCS,"Thomas said."Statewide, increased beef production is averaging 56 pounds per acre per year from these grasses. And the average climbs every

Thomas admitted that he didn't know how much this affected the price of beef for the housewife.

"But take away that 335 one way to go-up," he to know. stresses.

In the past 25 years, annual beef consumption has jumped from about 64 pounds per person to 113 pounds. Meanwhile, our state's population has increased by more than 50 per cent. That adds to a gigantic increase in the demand for beef.

Without improved grassses and better conservation treatment of grassland, this demand would outstrip available supplies.

Thomas said 23 grasses released by SCS are being grown in Texas. Each has its own area of adaptability and is used to fill a specific conservation need.

Two grasses account for major share of the acreage planted. Buffelgrass, released by SCS in 1949, has been planted on 1.8 million acres of land in Texas; increased beef production from this grass averages 74 million pounds annually.

King Ranch bluestem, released in 1941, is growing on about one million acres. Other widely planted grasses include Pensacola bahiagrass, El Reno sideoats grama, and weeping goats. lovegrass.

'We released this grass to commercial seed growers, in cooperation with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, in 1969." Thomas said. "In spite of the fact that seed are expensive and scarce. 132,000 acres have already been established.

The Constitution Revision Commission went into overtime at a recent three-day meeting near here, but still failed to complete its agenda and slated another August 10-11 cleanup meeting.

Meanwhile, legislative planners for the 1974 Constitutional Convention, at which lawmakers will actually propose a revised constitution, disagreed on routine stage-setting.

House members suggested a new voting machine (which was later ordered) and new desks for delegates. Senate planning committee spokesmen indicated they would be satisfied to bring their own desks over from across the capital rotunda and set them up in the House middle aisle.

The revision panel agreed: To keep the provision for real property taxation in the constitution for state purposes, but leave it to the legislature to write separate laws governing personal property taxation.

To retain the state highway users gasoline tax, with three-fourths of the revenue earmarked for highway building and one-fourth for public schools. A provision was made for abolishing the highway fund levy on statewide referendum with support of two-thirds of the legislature.

present and future branches of the University of Texas and Texas A&M University.

To add to the constitution a guarantee of financial support for all schools and districts rich and poor.

Grain Stocks Down . . . Egg Production Down . . . Texas Lamb Crop Down . . . Wool Production

Down . . . Sheep and Lambs on Feed Increases. Phase Three and Phase Three and a Half can't be blamed for all of it, but nevertheless production of a number of Texas agricultural products shows declines. One of the exceptions is sheep and lamb feeding which shows an increase from a year ago but still a decline from a few

months ago. As for grains on hand, only stocks of oats are above levels of a year ago. Texas' stocks as of July 1 for the four feed grains--corn, oats, barley and sorghum--are estimated at 95,000,000 bushels, down 50,000,000 bushels from a year

Grain sorghum was responsible for most of the decrease. Stocks of wheat, rye and soybeans are also below Old crop carryover of wheat is estimated at

20,200,000 bushels compared to 42,100,000 bushels a year Sorghum stocks stored in all positions are estimated at 79,000,000 bushels compared with 129,000,000 bushels

a yēar ago. Corn stocks are about the same as a year ago. Old crop oat stocks are 700,000 bushels higher than a year ago. Soybean stocks are estimated at 2,700,000 bushels compared to 3,600,000 bushels a year ago.

Nationwide, stocks of all grains are estimated 67,900,000 tons, which is 17 per cent less than a year ago. April-June grain disappearance totaled a record high of

51,300,000 tons, 14 per cent more than the same quarter in All of the above figures relate to grains produced in 1972 and earlier. The 1973 crops are not a part of this

EGG production in Texas during June is four per cent below a year ago and five per cent below last month. Texas' layers totaled 11,100,000 during June, which is seven per cent below a year ago and two per cent under May's total. The number of layers throughout the nation totaled

285,000,000; this is five per cent below last year and two

per cent under last month. LAMB crop in Texas (lambs born during the period Oct. 1, 1972 through June 30, 1973) is estimated at 1,964,000 head; this is down 15 per cent from the 2,302,000 head last year.

Nationwide, the 1973 lamb crop is estimated at 11,400,000 head. This is down nine per cent from the 1972 crop of 12,500,000 head.

The January 1,1973 number of breeding ewes one year old and older totaled 12,100,000. This is a decrease of six per cent from a year earlier while ewe lambs under one year were down four per cent.

SHEEP and lambs on feed in Texas as of July 1 is up 13 per cent from a year ago. This, however, is 28 per cent below March. Sheep and lambs on feed are those intended for slaughter being fed a ration of grain or other concentrates or on pastures and expected within the next three months to go to market.

Marketings of fed sheep during March through June at 229,000 head were 3,000 head below the same period a year ago.







Generally harvest conditions were more favorable for getting the crop out of the fields than usual with what appears to be less than normal losses from adverse weather during the harvest period. Yields were above average with the five states producing a record volume of wheat this year. Preliminary reports indicate test weight per bushel is above average and that of last year with protein content being moderately less than average and that of last year. Indicating the generally favorable weather for harvest of the crop the moisture content of samples tested showed considerable

Farmers have been busy getting their intended acreage ready for planting of the 1974 wheat crop, but in some areas from the Texas High Plains and Eastern New Mexico through the Oklahoma Panhandle into eastern Colorado and Western Kansas lack of moisture since mid-May is causing concern that preparation of fields may be delayed because of dry surface

Where effective rains have fallen, or on irrigated fields, some acreage will likely be planted in late August. especially where farmers plan to use the growing crop for grazing of livestock during the 1973-74 fall and winter.

Improving Law Enforcement in Area

AUSTIN .- Governor Dolph Briscoe awarded four grants, totaling \$81,203, for improving law enforcement and crime prevention in the region served Nortex Regional Planning Commission, Wichita Falls.

The money will come from the Criminal Justice Council, which administers the state's block grant from the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration under the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act.

Nortex RPC was awarded \$19.052 to continue operation of the regional law enforcement teletype network, presently serving 13 agencies in seven of the region's 12 counties.

Wilbarger County will receive \$15,870 to consolidate probation services in the 46th Judicial District, comprising Foard, Hardeman and Wilbarger counties. The project will enable services for misdemeanor probationers in addition to carrying on the adult probation program established for the 46th District with CJC funding in 1971.

The Nortex applications were among 52 for a total of more than four million dollars considered by the CJC Executive committee July 13.
