

Two Accidents Reported Here **During July**

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated two accidents on rural highways in Foard County during the month of July. according to Sgt. Jack Therwhanger, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area. These crashes resulted in no persons killed and one person injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first six months of 1973 shows a total of four accidents resulting in no deaths and six persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for July 1973 shows a total of 658 accidents resulting in 21 persons killed and 366 persons injured as compared to July 1972 with 713 accidents resulting in 34 persons killed and 388 persons injured. This was 55 less accidents, 13 less fatalities, and 22 less injured in 1973 at the same period of

The 21 traffic deaths for the month of July 1973 occurred in the following counties: Lubbock. Sherman, Wilbarger, three each; Palo Pinto, Parmer, two each; Hockley, Jack, Lamb Parker, Wise, Hutchinson, Potter and Oldham, one each.

Robert Cole, father of Grover Cole, was editor of the paper at that time.

Editor Cole said in the paper that week: "We publish this week two articles contributed by persons who are opposed to issuing bonds for the purpose of enlarging the Crowell school

Many New State Laws Go into Effect Monday

Foard County residents, along with millions of other Texas, will not be affected drastically as hundreds of new laws went into effect Monday, August 27, 90 days after the close of the 1973 Legislature, but the changes will be noticeable.

The biggest change will come about as a result of the bill which makes 18-year-olds adults in the eyes of the law. This means that they can purchase liquor, serve on juries, consent to abortions, enter into legal and binding contracts, borrow money and in general enjoy full legal rights of citizens 21 years old and over.

This law, along with hundreds of others, went into effect 90

Speaker of the House of Representatives Price Daniel, Jr., announced that he was appointing veteran representative W. S. "Bill" Heatly of Paducah to the Legislative Budget Board. This board. which makes recommendations to the Legislature for the funding of state government, is composed of four members of the House of Representative. four members of the Senate, plus the Lt. Governor and Speaker of the House who serve as chairman and vice-chairman.

Rep. Heatly is a long-time member of the Budget Board, having served first on the important agency in 1956. He has also served as chairman of the powerful House Appropriations Committee longer than any other man in history, serving a total of 12 years as chairman. He is also the only House member appointed by Daniel who has previously served on the Legislative Budget Board. During the next two years. Heatly will participate in drafting the proposed budget for the entire state government for the following biennium.

days after the close of the 1973 Legislature, a waiting period imposed by state law.

A statewide change in traffic patterns will take place as a result of the law allowing right turns on red lights after first stopping. The state law makes the turn legal in all cases except when a sign is posted prohibiting it.

Several unusual laws also went into effect, including a law which allows the sale of bread in Texas in quantities of less than a one-pound loaf.

Parents will be allowed to adopt a child of a different race as of August 27, although federal courts have authorized such adoptions

Possession of marijuana has been reduced to a misdemeanor for the first offense when less than four ounces of the substance is in possession. Possession of larger amounts still constitutes a felony as does the sale of marijuana.

Motorists must stop for church buses as well as school buses while taking on or discharging passengers provided red flashing lights are displayed.

Adults will be allowed to manufacture for their own consumption up to 200 gallons of wine per year. Until this bill was passed, only heads of households could make wine without a permit.

Working women may legally secure credit as provided by a bill which also became law

Ranchers in West Texas may legally hunt coyotes from aircraft provided they secure a license, in accordance with the state's new predator control

Auto insurance firms may apply to the state insurance board for permission to charge rates lower than state rates.

Although small grain planting time is just around the corner, there's still time to get a soil test on the land to be seeded, says County Extension Agent, Joe

Small grains cannot be expected to perform well when grown with inadequate amounts of plant nutrients.

Many producers apply nitrogen in the fall or as a topdressing in the spring but do not consider other nutrients that small grain crops may need, points out Burkett.

Small grains are very responsive to phosphorus and only a soil test can determine the amount to apply. Phosphorus stimulates rapid, early growth which is especially important if the crops are to be grazed. Phosphorus should be drilled at planting or broadcast and worked into the soil prior to

Some fields may also need potash which improves the standing ability of plants. However, this plant nutrient is generally not needed as often as nitrogen and phosphorus, notes Burkett.

A soil test is the best guide to a sound liming and fertilization program for small grains, contends the agent. Soil samples may be submitted to soil testing laboratories run by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at College Station. Lubbock and Seymour.

Information sheets and instructions for collecting and mailing soil samples are available at the county Extension office, adds Burkett.

The present grain situation ballgame" for wheat growers, who are being asked for production expansion by the consumer at home and abroad, and by provisions of the new farm bill with producer income protection in case of over-production and cost increases, says Dr. Roland D. Wheat producers are skeptical that prices will remain at profitable levels through the harvest of 1974. These growers vividly remember the mid-1960s when they were asked for maximum production which ultimately led to several years of depressed prices.

Some major reasons for apparent changes in the world wheat situation include the opening of markets in the USSR and China, the changing international money values favoring U. S. products, and the rapid economic growth allowing more of the world's people to upgrade

The new farm program, with the target price of \$2.05 per bushel for wheat, should help remove some of the risk of price declines similar to those occurring in earlier decades, he emphasized. Texas producers are currently

planning for next years crop. Some are considering shifting "set-aside" acreage back into production which may be relatively expensive. A thorough analysis of the alternatives is recommended by Smith before growers make their final crop plans.

WATCH FOR HORSE SLEEPING SICKNESS

Texas horse owners are urged to keep a close watch on their animals and to vaccinate unprotected horses for equine encephalomyelitis (horse sleeping sickness). The disease is of three strains--Eastern, Western and Venezuelan. A case of both the Eastern and Western type has been diagnosed recently, the Eastern in Hardin County and the Western in Fayette County. Horses vaccinated against the Venezuelan strain in 1971 need to be revaccinated, and annual booster shots are necessary to protect animals from the Eastern and Western
