CONSTRUCTION UNDERWAY

Plans Announced for New Dairy

machines will be located and back of them will be the milkroom where the milk is stored until picked up. Back in the other direction, the building will extend some 100 feet and will be the holding area for the cows before they are milked.

Plans have been announced and construction is well underway for a new dairy just north of Crowell. Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Parker and son, Johnny Mack, 5, have moved to Crowell to make their home and are the owners of the new enterprise which is located just north of Crowell on what is known as the Hodge farm. The Parkers, who moved here from Azle, are residing in a mobile home near Highway 283 on the 72 acre dairy tract.

Parker said last week that he is planning on a 100-cow Holstein dairy operation, and he is presently constructing a new building for the milking operation. The milking parlor and milk room are in a building 20 by 70 feet in size. The milking parlor is where the cows are milked with milking machines capable of handling six cows on each side of the milking machine. The milk room will contain large stainless steel refrigerated vats which will hold the milk until it is picked up every other day by a truck from the Associated Milk Producers.

The building will also have a section 20 by 100 feet known as the holding area where the cows will be kept until they are milked. Concrete for this section was poured last Friday afternoon.

Parker said that his father is retiring from the dairy business at Alvord, and he is buying the milking equipment from his father. He will move the equipment to Crowell as soon as the building, being made of concrete blocks, is completed.

He said he hopes to get a 40 pounds of milk per day per cow average from his herd. This is nearly 7 gallons per day per cow.

Fuel Regulations Are Explained by ASCS

Numerous requests are being received by area ASCS offices concerning the fuel needs of farmers for harvesting. In many cases, this year's harvest and other critical operations will occur in a different month from last year's and some suppliers have misinterpreted the mandatory allocation program for middle distillate fuels and are refusing to adjust monthly allocations to meet this year's exception requirements. Mrs. Thelma Borchardt, head of the local ASCS office, said Tuesday.

In this regard, Mrs. Borchardt points out that section 4e of the program applies: "Suppliers and purchasers may agree among themselves to either borrow on future allocations or defer current allocations within the level of the total allocation for the year as long as such arrangements do not result in an involuntary reduction in allocations to other purchasers. Similarly, suppliers may borrow or swap products among themselves."

Another directive received by the ASCS office states that for the next 60 days, farmers will be given preference in the allocation of diesel fuels, butane and propane for the purpose of planting or harvesting of crops.

Forms for additional allocations are available at the local ASCS office.

Local law enforcement officers Monday were investigating a break-in at Bond's Garage on the east side some time over the weekend.

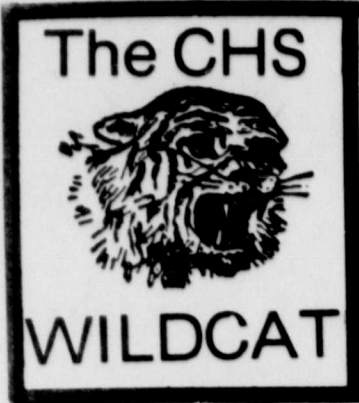
A hasp was broken on the front door to gain admission to the building. The gasoline tank on a vehicle parked in the garage was partially filled with sugar the officers said.

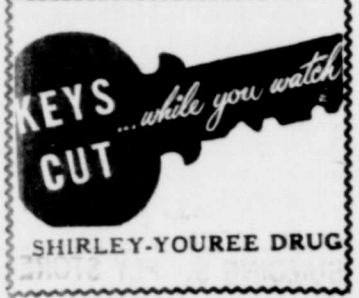

Altus Cotton Classing Office Gives Report

The USDA Cotton Division Classing Office at Altus issued its first classing report of the season, showing 15,200 samples graded for the week ending November 23, and a season total of 31,400 samples classed. These totals indicated the cotton harvest is about one month later than last year, according to C. E. Cox, officers in charge at Altus. Last year at this date 82,200 samples had been graded.
Total classed from North Texas counties this year stood at 2,400 samples, compared with 9,700 at this date last year.
Grades on North Texas cotton classed during the week were 29 per cent White and 66 per cent Light Spotted. Predominant grade was 42, accounting for 36 per cent. Seventeen per cent was reduced in grade because of Bark or Grass.
Staples ranged from 28 through 35, but were predominately 31 and 32. Twenty-four per cent was 31, 49 per cent 32, and the overall average was 31.8. Micronaire readings were in the 3.5 to 4.9 range on 86 per cent of the samples. Seven per cent was low mike and seven per cent high mike.
Pressley readings showed fiber strength mostly in the range 75,000 to 89,000 pounds per square inch, with the average being 82 thousand pounds.

Another Fine Texas Recipe
PORK ROAST WITH ORANGE GLAZE
1 1/2 tsp. salt
1/4 tsp. MSG
1/2 tsp. ground thyme
1 tsp. Bon Appetit
1 1/2 tsp. dry mustard
1/2 tsp. ginger
1 1/2-lb. pork loin roast
1/2 cup Texas orange juice
1/4 cup Texas honey
Orange sections
Combine first six ingredients and rub over roast. Place on rack in roasting pan and bake at 325 degrees for 2 1/2 hours (30 minutes per pound) or until meat thermometer registers 185 degrees F. After 45 minutes baste 2-4 times with 1/4 cup orange juice. During last 15 minutes combine remainder of juice and honey. Baste roast several times with this mixture. Remove glazed roast to warm serving platter and garnish with orange sections.

CREDIT CARDS FOR TEN-YEAR-OLDS?

"There are parental strings attached to those credit cards Montgomery Ward is now issuing to 10-year-olds, but are we really ready for the cashless society at the grade school level? Hints for Homemaker

Hints for the Homemaker

CONVENIENCE FOODS

To buy intelligently, today's shopper must understand the numerous terms relating to grocery items. Many foodstuffs now come in several different forms—often with quite a difference in costs.

One example is oatmeal—a dehydrated cereal that comes "regular," "minute," and

"instant". It takes 5 minutes to prepare regular oatmeal, 60 seconds to cook minute oatmeal and only the time needed to heat water to prepare instant oatmeal. "Regular" and "minute" varieties in the familiar round box cost the same. The savings in cooking time is about 4 minutes. "Instant" oatmeal, however, is packaged individually with eight servings to a box and costs several cents more than the medium-sized round box which contains some 20 servings.

Consumers "buy time" when purchasing convenience foods. If the difference is great between the amount of time it takes to prepare the regular item and the convenience item, we may be making a wise choice. If the two items are close together in preparation time, we need to take another look at our purchase.

Many convenience items are worth their cost in certain situations. Some—such as instant coffee—costs less per serving than the regular variety.

But, remember that we often pay far more for convenience than our time is worth.

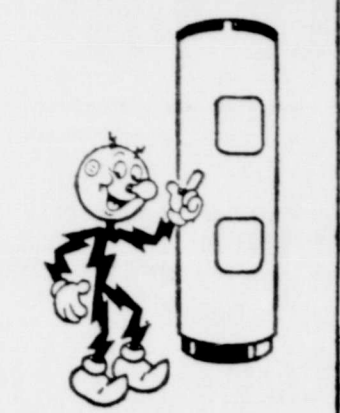

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN, Tex.—Dolph Briscoe released an eight-volume Texas land use study which he said will serve as a starting point for discussion of a major modern problem.

He first made clear that it does not necessarily present his own policies.

The bulky, five-pound report was ordered by former Gov. Preston Smith in 1972 at a cost of \$99,500. A lawsuit was filed to force Briscoe to release it (the report was completed eight months ago), but the governor made clear at the time he would make it public when his office had reviewed it thoroughly.

Three alternative approaches are suggested:

Delegation to local governments of responsibility for land resource management.

Recognition that the state must play an active role in managing its resources, but making the role limited and well defined.

Placing the state in the central position of regulating land use through statewide controls of all lands rather than specific areas or types of development. This alternative, conceded the report authors, would scarcely be "politically palatable," since it would put the state in position of issuing permits for land use rather than simply taking the lead in planning.

The report states federal regulations will be imposed in the land use field if states fail to
