# Mrs. Tom Vecera Died Sunday

Mrs. Tom Vecera, 91. resident of Foard County for 59 years, died in the Foard County Hospital Sunday, December 16.

Funeral services were held at the First United Methodist Church at 10 a. m. Wednesday, December 19, conducted by the pastor, Rev. W. O. Rucker, Jr., assisted by Rev. Wilson Holman, pastor of the Margaret-Thalia Methodist Churches. Interment was in the Crowell Cemetery under the direction of

Mrs. Vecera was born in Prague, Czechoslovakia, October 20, 1882. She and the late Tom Vecera were married in Czechoslovakia October 28. 1902. They moved to Foard County in 1914. Mr. Vecera died September 16, 1953.

Mrs. Vecera was a member of St. Joseph's Catholic Church in Crowell and was a 50-year member of the SPJST fraternal organization. She is survived by six sons,

Also surviving are 34 grandchildren and 31 great grandchilby Sec. of Agriculture Earl Butz of the funding of the Four Winds RC&D application, Rep. Bob Price said:

'This means the Department of Agriculture will be able to provide technical and financial assistance to this important program throught the Soil Conservation Service.

'The main goal of the program is to improve living, working and educational conditions and to reduce or reverse out-migration," the Congressman said.

"Acceleration of soil and water conservation work and watershed protection, with emphasis on multiple-purpose structures, are also primary goals, as well as recreational facilities development and historical site preservation.

"The proposal has had the support of virtually every unit of local government in the area,' Price noted, "including commissioners courts and soil and water conservation districts. am please that our efforts in behalf of the Four Winds proposal have been fruitful and I shall continue to monitor the project to insure the complete federal support necessary to success." he said.

The RC&D program, created by the Food and Agriculture Act of 1962, has the aim of speeding up resource programs in multiple-county areas as a base for town-and-country economic development and is only the second such program approved for the state of Texas.

The application was submitted five years ago by the Four Winds Industrial Foundation and was sponsored by the Commissioners Courts in Hardeman, Foard, Cottle and Childress counties, the Red River Authority of Texas, the area soil conservation districts and the Cities of Crowell, Quanah, Paducah and Chil-

# rush Fire Blackens Pasture Lands

Fire, fanned by high west and northwest winds, swept over several thousand acres of rangeland about ten miles southeast of Crowell Wednesday afternoon of last week.

The fire, which started on a truck containing about 55 bales of cotton, was reported at 12:45 p. m. Wednesday, according to the Foard County Sheriff's Department. It was under control later that afternoon, but continued to burn on toward the Wicita River the next day.

Glenn Halsell said early this week that he estimated that from 3,000 to 4,000 acres of pasture were burned on the Halsell ranch. He said that he had found one dead cow. He presumed that the cow was calving and was not able to escape the flames.

This area was not the only section to suffer fire damage during last Wednesday's high winds. According to the Clarendon Press, almost 400 bales of cotton were destroyed in a fire at the Paymaster Gin in Brice that same afternoon. Total loss was estimated at \$220,000 including over 90 trailers that were also destroyed in the fire.



# Investment Tax Credit Can Put **Dollars in Farmers Pockets**

Investment tax credit can put tax dollars into farmers' and ranchers' pockets.

According to Don L. Parks. economist with the extension service, "Investment tax credit reduces federal tax bills to the extent of 7 per cent of qualified investment for the year.

at least three years, and be placed in service by you during the tax year. It also must be tangible personal property or tangible real property which is an integral part of production," Parks points out.

He lists farm trucks, machinery, equipment and breeding livestock (except horses) as examples of qualifying tangible personal property while livestock fences, grain bins and silos are examples of qualifying tangible real property. Barns, poultry houses and farm shops do not qualify since a qualifying structure must be essentially an item of machinery or equipment.

'The amount of investment credit allowed depends on the asset's useful life. A useful life of seven years or more qualifies 100 per cent of the investment, five to seven years' useful life qualifies two-thirds, and three to five years' useful life qualifies for one-third of the investment. There is no credit under three

cent of the qualifying investment is the tax credit," explains the economist. If an asset is disposed of

before the end of its estimated useful life, you must recompute the investment credit to determine the credit refund.

Parks cites some limitations regarding the use of investment tax credit. "You cannot dispose of substantially similar livestock within six months before or six months after acquiring a qualifying investment and still

obtain full credit. Property acquired by a trade-in of used property limits the qualifying investment to the cash 'boot' or difference spent in the trade. Also, the credit cannot exceed your tax liability but can be carried back three preceding tax years or forward seven succeeding tax years.

# Is a Tragic Waste of Resources

"One of the most tragic wastes of our natural resources may occur this Christmas and New Year Holiday period," said Major C. W. Bell, regional commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety in Lubbock, Major Bell said he was not referring to the fuel shortage situation, but rather to the number of human lives that may be needlessly lost as a years of useful life. Texas during the holidays. It was noted by the commander that by not exceeding fifty miles per hour, motorists could aid in the goal of conserving fuel and possibly reducing the severity of accidents, thereby saving lives. The major made the statement in connection with the enforcement program of Department of Public Safety officers, aimed at reducing the death toll on Texas streets and highways through

the holiday period. Major Bell said, "the Department of Public Safety will have all available officers on the highways watching for traffic violations, especially those motorists driving too fast for conditions and those driving under the influence of alcoholic beverages." He went on to say that these two violations are contributing factors in the majority of fatal accidents noting that 39% of all fatal traffic accidents during this holiday period last year involved drinking driver while 27% of these accidents were the result of unsafe or excessive speed. One other suggestion

made by the major for avoiding holiday tragedy on the highway was for all motorists to use their seat belts. He cited statistics for this period last year pointing out that 97 per cent of all vehicle occupants killed in Christmas and New Year holiday traffic accidents were not wearing any type of restraining devices. 'There are no simple solutions to the traffic death problem," Major Bell said, "but if every motorist will obey all traffic laws

and regulations, practice defensive driving and drive friendly. they will be doing their part to insure a safe holiday season for all this year."





'Since pins and needles always seem to disappear quickly, an assortment of different size needles, dressmaker pins or ballpoint pins for knits-accompanied by a pincushion-makes a welcome gift for home sewers.

"Since good, sharp dressmaker shears are a 'must', if the home sewer doesn't have a pair of her own, consider purchasing some shears.

"Add a 'for sewing only' note so they won't disappear to another part of the house for other chores," the specialist

Another handy possibility is a small pair of shears for clipping and trimming, she continued.

To help organize the sewing area, consider making a wall organizer with a variety of pockets and hooks to hold sewing tools. Or, look in stores for a molded plastic wall organizer to serve the same






Mr. Streit announced that jackets or blankets have been presented to the five senior members of the band.

The proposed new constition also combines the Supreme Court with the Court of Criminal Appeals, and the judges would virtually be appointed for life as is done in the federal judiciary. This would also be true in the Courts of Civil Appeals. Our federal system has virtually taken government away from us except for our rural courts, and I feel that you join me in my

As in the past I will endeavor to cast my vote the way the citizens of our legislative district desire, and I wish you a Merry

fireplaces and radiators. "Don't rely on do-it-yourself flameproofing treatments for your tree," cautions the specialist. "The borax-boric acid solution sometimes recommended is not effective for flameproofing trees. And many aerosol sprays are only partially effective. In short, there is no satisfactory home treatment for flameproofing a Christmas

The engineer advises buying only lighting sets that have the Underwriters' Laboratories, Inc. (UL) label. Lighting strings with loose connections, broken sockets and frayed insulation should be replaced.

'And with the current energy crisis, limit the use of Christmas lights and other decorations using electricity," points out Keese.

Use noncombustible materials such as metal, glass and asbestos for tree decorations. and remove gift wrappings as soon as possible as they pose a definite fire hazard.

A final precaution for a safe holiday season is to keep your children under close supervision, adds Keese. And have a family escape plan just in case a fire does strike.







To further develop the use and management of our wildlife resources; to develop vocational training and secure a junior college to meet the needs for training and retraining manpower; to develop adequate modern housing in rural and city area; improve sewerage systems for towns and communities and establish sanitary garbage disposal systems and provide additional fire protection facilities; to improve rural water systems; to beautify, develop, and improve the general appearance of the area.

People now receiving welfare will not be required to file again. These benefits will continue after January 1 at approximately their present

Although administered by the Social Security Administration, the program differs from the retirement, survivors and disability insurance program in many ways, primarily because supplemental security income benefits are paid based upon a person's needs.

The new program allows people to receive benefits even if they own property, such as a house of reasonable value. People who believe they can receive the new benefit, and are not receiving public assistance at present, should get in touch with the Vernon social security






