## Cold Dry Weather Keeps Hold on Area

Foard County during the past two weeks has experienced some severe winter weather, although no appreciable amount of moisture accompanied the cold temperatures.

After temperatures in the teens most of the early part of last week, another front came through about mid-week and the

mercury dropped to 10 degrees last Friday morning. Saturday warmed considerably, with another icy front hitting early Sunday. Mercury readings were about 20 degrees early Monday of this week, with forecasters predicting another front about Wednesday.

The dry weather has permitted cotton stripping to continue when it was warm enough for the operators to work and the county's gins continue to be full and over flowing with unginced cotton.

Wheat in the county looks "pretty rough" right now with the continued dry weather and hard freezes. This is usually a period for the wheat to remain dormant and the current crop is not providing much grazing for livestock except in a few scattered fields.

A warming trend set in Monday night with the mercury staying above the freezing mark during the night. This is the first time that had happened in over a week. The weather bureau was forecasting showers Tuesday night.

## Result of Daylight Savings Time

## School Starts at 8:45 A. M.; Dismisses at 3:30 Each Day

Starting time in the Crowell Schools is now 8:45 a.m., following a meeting of the board last Thursday night and beginning on this past Monday morning as daylight savings time went into effect across the nation.

The Texas Education Agency has granted permission to local districts to cut 5 minutes off classes. Thus, the local school which operates seven periods a day, cut five minutes off each one for a total of 35 minutes per day. With this saving of 35 minutes, classes will continue to be dismissed each day at 3:30. Noon breaks for the students will be 20 minutes later than during the pre-DST era.

Teachers are expected to report to school by 8:30 a.m.

In other action, the board approved the payment of some \$5,200 in current bills and renewed the contract of Supt. Larry Jones for the 1975-76 year at salary set by the state schedule.

The board continued its discussion of the boiler situation at the local plant and Supt. Jones said it is still not functioning satisfactorily.

For some time in the past the school has been buying gasoline from three wholesalers. One wholesaler has dropped out altogether in supplying the school, one wholesaler has cut the school 10 per cent from last year's purchases, and the remaining wholesaler is providing the school at the present time with all the rest of its gasoline needs, which amounts to about 100 gallons per day for bus routes. This does not include pickup operation or extracurricular activities of the school in which buses are used.

The Board accepted the resignation of Vince Hicks as bus driver and employed M. L. Crosby as his replacement. The resignation of Jimmy Quintero as bus driver and maintenance staff member was also accepted effective January 11. At that time, the board had not hired a replacement for Quintero.

The board agreed to sell some property and will be accepting bids for property at Foard City, Truscott, Riverside and South Ward with bids to be opened in March. Also the board will be accepting bids for salvage of the high school building at Thalia.

A discussion of school enrollment revealed that present enrollment is 507, compared to 506 at the end of school last May. Thus, even with the addition of kindergarten, the problem of a decreasing enrollment in the district continues to be a big concern.

## Local Family Gives Items to Tech Museum

Two new items for the Museum of Texas Tech University in Lubbock have been presented by the children of a pioneer Foard County family.

The museum has accepted on a loan basis a spool rocking chair, circa 1900 and a baby

walker, circa 1895, from the children of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. Y. Welch of Crowell. Mr. and Mrs. Welch had the rocking chair all of their married life and the baby walker belonged to Mr. Welch's parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. M. E. Welch. It was used by the children of the M. E. Welches and also by the children of the J. Y. Welches. Mr. and Mrs. J. Y. Welch were married in 1909.

Their four children who donated the two items to the Tech museum are M. M. Welch and James Welch of Crowell, Mrs. Lucille Huffstutler of Dallas and Mrs. Francis Lee of Graham.

With the advent of daylight savings time starting last Sunday, Crowell businesses and offices have a multitude of opening and closing times, ranging from 7:30 to 9:00 for opening hour.

One service station reported changing opening from 6:30 to 7:30, while Brooks Auto Supply will be opening at 8 instead of seven. Borchardt Goodwin changed from 8 to 8:30 for opening time, while the EOAC office hours remain from 8:30 to 4:30. City offices open at 8 and Texas Natural Gas Co. opens as usual at 8:30. D&T Foodway is opening at 8 instead of 7:30 and

Crowell Food Mart has changed from 8 to 9 a.m. as opening hour. Gentry's Grocery opening hour is 7 a.m. instead of 6.

Womack's has changed from 8 to 9 a.m., while the drug store is still opening at 7:30. West Texas Utilities Co. hours are still 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Dry goods stores opening hours vary from 8 to 8:30. So, all in all, there is no uniformity in the opening or closing hours of local businesses and it would be extremely difficult to determine the amount of energy being saved by the daylight savings time.

### Daylight Savings Time Went into Effect Sunday

April came a little early this year for Americans as Daylight Savings Time became effective at 2 a.m. Sunday morning, January 6. April has been the usual month for the annual time change.

Clocks were advanced an hour in the hope of reducing heating demands and lighting requirements throughout the country by as much as 3 per cent.

President Nixon signed the Daylight Savings Time bill into existence Dec. 15 which makes the action the first of its kind since World War II. The bill covers the next two years, during which time the nation will remain on DST the year around.

Thus far in this section, all it has accomplished is force most of the schools to revise their hours, cause most businesses to open an hour before daylight and add confusion to an already-confused situation.

# Country School Teacher Reminiscences About Old Times

Part III  
My Last School  
Thalia School

When I started teaching at Thalia School, about eleven miles east of Crowell on Highway 70, I had married and was living in the Gambleville Community. World War II had started and teachers were scarce. I was asked to substitute in the 3rd and 4th grades, and I taught the entire year. Again the next year I was asked to substitute and once again taught the whole year. The teachers had gone to other places because of the war. We had some good ball games at this school. The boys went to other schools to play. These boys liked to play ball but had a hard time having a way to go. Gas and transportation was a problem. I loaned the boys my car for some of these out of town games. This was the last year to have a high school at Thalia. The high school was sent to Crowell.

were grades 5 and 6. I taught several years in these two grades. We were 4 teachers in this school. Thalia School was a nice brick building and is still there. At this school they had a cafeteria so didn't have to carry my lunch, which was so nice.

After teaching at Thalia, I came to know more of the people in the community. I started going to the Thalia Methodist Church.

In this school I followed about the same schedule I had followed in other schools. We had daily assignments in reading, arithmetic, English, history, spelling, science, art, and music.

The school had water fountains for the children—unlike the old five gallon cans in my earlier schools—and there was a lunch room where meals were served. The school custodian had our rooms ready for us each morning. I drove to school every morning.

Judge Leslie Thomas was judge at this time and I appreciated Leslie very much. Mrs. Crews Cooper was office

secretary for Judge Thomas, and I shall always remember her as a friendly, gracious person.

I enjoyed my pupils very much for they were eager to learn. We were so busy with our lessons most of the time that 4 o'clock came too soon. We had some good discussions in our classes. With two grades in one room, it sometimes involved both grades. In geography class one afternoon, we were studying fishing and industry.

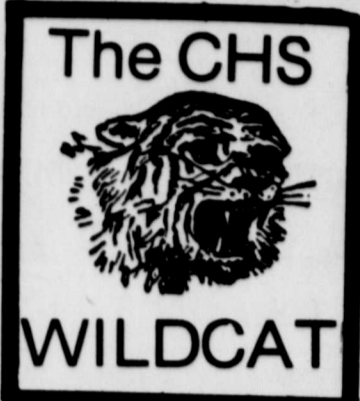
The different kinds of fish were discussed. The merrymaid (mermaid) fish was brought out, and one little boy said, "Oh! I don't see how they could eat them, or do they eat them?" A funny discussion centered on that mermaid fish.

In spring I let the science class plant tomato seeds. And they raised some real nice tomato plants. The children received some plants to take home and put in their home gardens. These children liked to do things.

At recess baseball was again the favorite game. Here we had enough children to have two teams, and they really took their playing in earnest.

In teaching the children about government, we decided to elect officers in the class. Each office was filled by a pupil. We elected a little boy secretary of the class and told him that his duties were writing the class minutes. "No, I don't want it—cause I can't tell time."

He was so sincere about his job. This child's statement appeared later in a national magazine. I feel that I was called every minute in the school room. I could hardly wait to get to school each morning, and I always enjoyed the other teachers I taught with.

# Brucellosis Regulation Change Starts Jan. 15

The new brucellosis regulations (Proclamation of the Texas Animal Health Commission #AHC-1) were adopted unanimously by the Texas Animal Health Commission at an official Commission meeting in Laredo, Texas, on October 15, 1973. These new regulations will bring the Texas Brucellosis Program into compliance with the National Uniform Methods and Rules which are considered minimum standards.

In brief this regulation requires that all breeding cattle two (2) years of age and over that change ownership are required to be brucellosis tested. Breeding cattle may be tested on the farm or ranch or at an auction market. Slaughter type breeding cattle may be sold through livestock markets without test until sampled on the kill floor. The brucellosis test will be good for movement purposes for a thirty (30) day period provided animal is ear tagged and accompanied by test certificate.

Effective January 15, 1974, these regulations will be in full force and effect. Dan Reynolds of Vernon, inspector for the Texas Animal Health Commission said last week.

# USDA to Step Up Aid to Lunch Program

The U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) has retroactively increased its payment rates to state educational agencies to help schools pay for school lunches and school breakfasts they have served during the past six months. The increased rates cover meals served under the national school lunch and school breakfast programs between July 1 and Dec. 31, 1973. They were announced by USDA's Food and Nutrition Service (FNS) as another step in implementing the new child nutrition law passed last month.

The national average payment to help defray food costs of each lunch served to participating school children was increased from 8 to 10 cents. Within that average, states were authorized to vary the rate of reimbursement to individual schools up to a maximum 16 cents a lunch. Previously the ceiling was 14 cents.

For the first time, states will receive a guaranteed additional payment to assist in the service of lunches to needy children of 35 cents for each reduced-price lunch and 45 cents for each free lunch. Any state where payments averaged higher than this rate last year will be paid at that higher level through Dec. 31, 1973. In cases of severe need, the federal per lunch reimbursement to individual schools can range as high as 70 cents for each lunch served free, 10 cents above the previous maximum. Payment rates for each reduced-price lunch in these circumstances may vary up to a high of 60 cents, the same level previously allowed. The new regulations also give the states the responsibility for determining relative need among schools and for setting variable rates of cash reimbursement within federally-allowed maximums.

The national average payment for each paid breakfast served to eligible children, which has been 5 cents, will be increased to 8 cents. The payment for each reduced-price breakfast, which has been 15 cents, will be increased to 23 cents. And the payment for each free breakfast, which has been 20 cents, will be increased to 28 cents.

For cases of severe need, maximum rates of reimbursement for especially needy

schools have also been increased. The maximum amount for free breakfasts, which has been 30 cents, has been increased to 45 cents. A child is considered especially needy if it serves a high percentage of free and reduced-price breakfasts to children who meet school's eligibility standards. Unusually high costs of providing breakfast, or other unusual factors indicating special financial need. The regulations formerly provided that for schools other than those deemed especially needy, the assistance payment would be limited to the cost of obtaining food. That limit is now being expanded to include labor and other costs. Full details of the revised national school lunch and breakfast program regulations were scheduled for publication in the Federal Register December 15, 1973. The Department will announce its rates of payment for both programs for a six-month period, Jan. 1 to June 30, 1974.

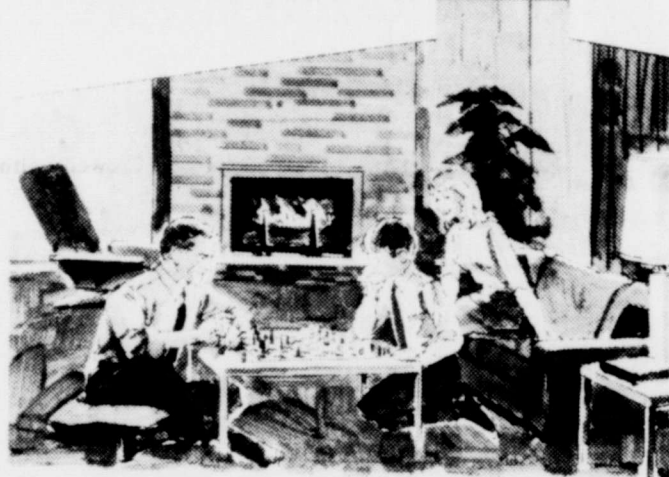
