has granted permission to local districts to cut 5 minutes off classes. Thus, the local school which operates seven periods a day, cut five minutes off each one for a total of 35 minutes per day. With this saving of 35 minutes, classes will continue to be dismissed each day at 3:30. Noon breaks for the students will be 20 minutes later than during the pre-DST era.

Teachers are expected to report to school by 8:30 a.m.

In other action, the board approved the payment of some \$5,200 in current bills and renewed the contract of Supt. Larry Jones for the 1975-76 year at salary set by the state schedule.

The board continued its discussion of the boiler situation at the local plant and Supt. Jones said it is still not functioning satisfactorily.

For some time in the past the school has been buying gasoline from three wholesalers. One wholesaler has dropped out total to 4,794 for the season, altogether in supplying the school, one wholesaler has cut the school 10 per cent from last year's purchases, and the remaining wholesaler is providing the school at the present time with all the rest of its gasoline needs, which amounts to about 100 gallons per day for bus routes. This does not include pickup operation or extracurricular activities of the school in which buses are used.

The Board accepted the resignation of Vince Hicks as bus driver and employed M. L. Crosby as his replacement. The resignation of Jimmy Quintero as bus driver and maintenance staff member was also accepted effective January 11. At that time, the board had not hired a replacement for Quintero.

The board agreed to sell some property and will be accepting bids for property at Foard City, Truscott, Riverside and South Ward with bids to be opened in March. Also the board will be accepting bids for salvage of the high school building at Thalia.

A discussion of school enrollment revealed that present enrollment is 507, compared to 506 at the end of school last May. Thus, even with the addition of kindergarten, the problem of a decreasing enrollment in the district continues to be a big concern.

#### Daylight Savings Time Went into **Effect Sunday** April came a little early

this year for Americans as Daylight Savings Time became effective at 2 a.m. Sunday morning, January 6. April has been the usual month for the annual time change.

Clocks were advanced an hour in the hope of reducing heating demands and lighting requirements throughout the country by as much as 3 per cent.

President Nixon signed the Daylight Savings Time bill into existence Dec. 15 which makes the action the first of its kind since World War II. The bill covers the next two years, during which time the nation will remain on DST the year

Thus far in this section, all it has accomplished is force most of the schools to revise their hours, cause most businesses to open an hour before daylight and add confusion to an already-confused situation.

When I started teaching at Thalia School, about eleven miles east of Crowell on Highway 70, I had married and was living in the Gambleville Community. 
secretary for Judge Thomas, and I shall always remember her as a friendly, gracious person.

### Brucellosis Regulation Change Starts Jan. 15th

The new brucellosis regulations (Proclamation of the Texas Animal Health Commission #AHC-1) were adopted unanmously by the Texas Animal Health Commission at an official Commission meeting in Laredo, Texas, on October 15, 1973. These new regulations will bring the Texas Brucellosis Program into compliance with the National Uniform Methods and Rules which are considered

minimum standards. In brief this regulation requires that all breeding cattle two (2) years of age and over that change ownership are required to be brucellosis tested. Breeding cattle may be tested on the farm or ranch or at an auction market. Slaughter type breeding cattle may be sold through livestock markets without test until sampled on the kill floor. The brucellosis test will be good for movement purposes for a thirty (30) day period provided animal is ear tagged and accompanied by test certificate.

Effective January 15, 1974, these regulations will be in full force and effect, Dan Reynolds of Vernon, inspector for the Texas Animal Health Commission said last week.



### W. S. Heatly Will Seek **Re-Election**

W. S. (Bill) Heatly of Paducah Tuesday announced as a candidate for re-election as Representative from the 101st legislative district subject to action of the Democratic primaries.

He was first elected to this office in 1954 and has served continuously since that time, although the district which comprised four counties, Cottle. Hardeman and Foard. Wilbarger, has been expanded to include 15 counties. Heatly has been Mr.

recognized by House leadership in an unusual way, beginning with his freshman term. Clyde Crisp of Vernon and Mr. Committee assignments include such important subjects as appropriations, taxation, judicial district, agriculture, mental health and welfare, and state affairs. He was chairman of the highly important Committee on Appropriations for an unprecedented six terms. His seniority rank, fourth in the House membership of 150, assures him membership on the Appropriations Committee as long as he remains in office.

> Equally important is membership on the Legislative Budget Board, which has responsibility of keeping in touch with financial operations of State agencies between sessions of the Legislature, in addition to preparing biennial budgets for submission to the lawmakers at the beginning of each regular session.

Mr. Heatly's major legislative activity includes sponsorship and support of legislation affecting agriculture, livestock, mental health and retardation, Texas Youth Council, and public education including support of every measure increasing teacher salaries and teacher retirement compensation during his service in the House.

He has introduced in three most recent sessions a bill providing for the State to assume outstanding bond issues of local school districts, modeled after the act which authorized the State to assume bonds issued by counties for construction of highways. This bill has not been passed, but Mr. Heatly plans to continue introducing it and ultimate passage can be expected. Such a law would do more to relieve local school districts of financial worries than anything ever proposed.

In the recent session of the Legislature Mr. Heatly authored and secured passage of a bill setting up a program by which the State would make grants to medical students in Texas medical schools who would agree to practice for at least five years in a county of no more than 25,000 population. Purpose of this measure is to encourage doctors to serve in small communities, especially in

sparsely settled rural areas. Mr. Heatly is a native Texan, attended Decatur Baptist College, Baylor University and Baylor Law School, receiving degrees from the last named institutions. He is engaged in the practice of law, owns an abstract business and has extensive farming and ranching interests in Cottle County.

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
