Grant Received for Day Care Program

A day care program for approximately 155 preschool children will be continued through an Office of Economic Opportunity grant that Dolph Briscoe announced last week.

The \$25,506 grant to Economic Opportunities Advancement Corporation (EOAC) of Cottle, Foard, Hardeman and Wilbarger Counties in Crowell includes \$9,131 for administration and \$16,375 for General Community Programming. Funding under Title II of the Economic Opportunity Act, the grant will be effective from March 1 through May 31, 1974.

Felix Taylor, executive director of EOAC, says a day care program patterned after Head Start provides classes for approximately 80 children in the Vernon Neighborhood Center, and 25 in the centers in Crowell, Quanah and Paducah.

Through the grant, EOAC will continue to operate the four neighborhood centers and its activities in the centers such as educational classes for the high school equivalency program. The Vernon center is providing typing, shorthand and speed-writing classes in coordination with the Texas State Technical Institute at Amarillo.

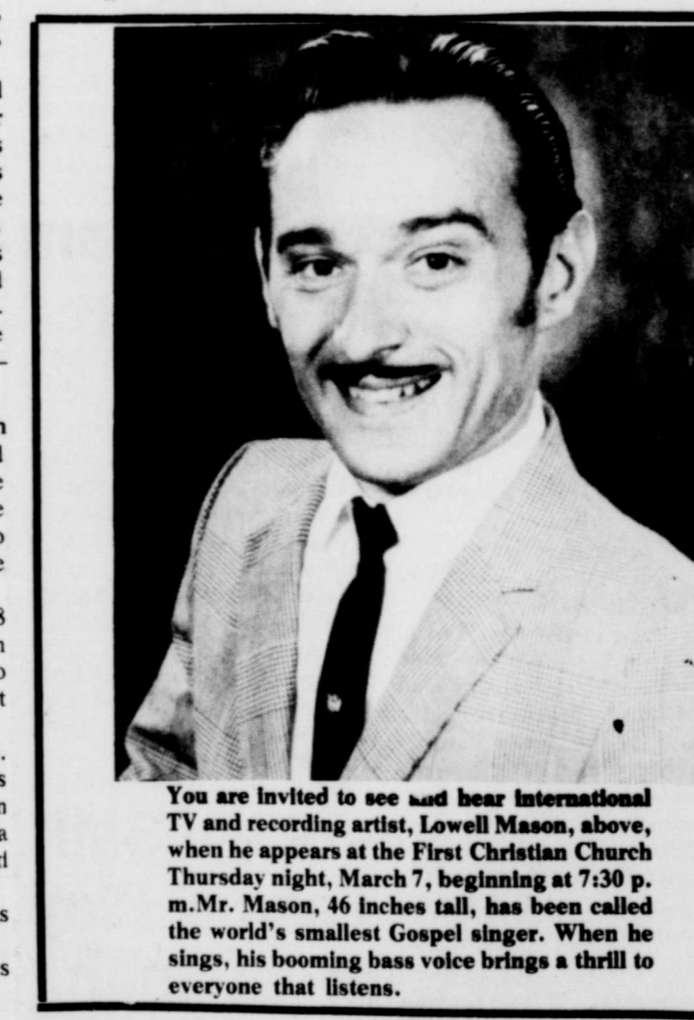
AMONETT ON DEAN'S LIST

VOTER GUIDELINES

1. Register to vote at least 30 days prior to the Democratic Primary, which is May 4, 1974.
2. All registered voters, 18 years and older are eligible to vote in all Democratic Party elections.
3. Present registrations are valid if you have been in a Democratic primary or a general election within the last three years.
4. Register to vote at your county tax assessor-collector's office or with a properly authorized person allowed to register voters.
5. Notify your county tax assessor-collector of change of address 5 days prior to election so that you are registered in the proper precinct, if you have moved within the county.
6. On moving from one county to another, you must re-register 30 days prior to the election, if you wish to vote in your new place of residence.
7. On April 14, 1974, the absentee voting for the first primary by personal appearance at the county clerk's office begins and goes through the fourth day preceding the election.
8. Applications for absentee voting for the first primary must be received by the county clerk not later than the close of business on April 30, 1974.
9. Marked absentee ballots for the first primary must be mailed back to the county clerk and postmarked not later than midnight on May 3, 1974.

George W. Robinson, 73, a retired wholesale parts salesman and brother of Mrs. Pearl Rader of Crowell, died Monday, February 18, at his home in Vernon after suffering an apparent heart attack.

Funeral services were held at 2 p.m. Wednesday, February 20 in Sullivan Funeral Home Chapel with Rev. A. B. Cockrell, pastor of the First Methodist Church in Vernon, officiating. Interment was in the Crowell Cemetery.

Mr. Robinson was born February 17, 1901, in Fayette, Mo. He married Amie Hall in July 1923 in El Reno, Ok. He moved to Vernon in 1965 from Clinton, Ok. Mr. Robinson was a member of the Methodist Church.

He is survived by two sons, Gorwen Robinson of Clinton, Ok. and Delmar Robinson of Pe Ell, Wash.; three sisters, Mrs. Jennie Walton of Kansas City, Mo., Mrs. Rader of Crowell and Mrs. Guy Garrett of Vernon. Also surviving are five grandchildren.

Clarification Due on Fuel Allocations

Clarification of procedures for farmers and ranchers to use fuel forms for fuel allocations were issued today by M. Fowler of Dallas, Regional Administrator for the West Region of the Federal Energy Office (FEO).

"First of all I want to make it clear that the farmer should make every effort to solve his problem through his regular supplier," Fowler said.

"If a farmer or rancher is unable to obtain fuel at 100 percent of his requirements, and his supplier should see to it that this is delivered," Fowler said.

"I also want to emphasize that we do not exempt the farmer from using conservation measures like everyone else," Fowler noted, adding that "this status can be changed just as easily as it can be given if the privilege is desired."

There are two instances when a person involved in agricultural production would apply directly to the state allocation office, using FEO Form 17. If he qualifies as a

wholesale purchaser (he buys 20,000 gallons or more annually), and none of the suppliers he has contacted are willing to accept him as a new customer as they are obligated to do under the regulations, he has the desired supplier fill out block 12 on the FEO Form 17 and sends the Form 17 application to the Dallas or other appropriate regional FEO office for resolution.

2. If he qualifies as a wholesale purchaser, and he and his supplier cannot agree on the base period allocation volumes to be provided, he has his supplier indicate the disagreement in block 12 on the Form 17 and sends the Form 17 application to the Dallas or other appropriate regional FEO office for resolution.

There are two instances when a person involved in agricultural production would apply directly to his state allocation office. If he encounters either of the two situations described above, but is an end-user who does not qualify as a wholesale purchaser, he would apply to the state office on FEO Form 20 for assignment or adjustment,

rather than to the regional office.

All of these situations relate to longer term actions. If in the short term the farmer or rancher is out of fuel and is a hardship case, he contacts his state allocation office and makes application on FEO Form 20.

It is not necessary for the farmer or rancher who does not qualify as a wholesale purchaser to submit any form unless he finds himself in one of the situations described above. If his retailer or supplier asks for certification of this requirement, an ordinary letter should suffice.

School Board Re-Hires Band Director Streit

The Crowell school board approved \$6,887.27 in bills when the regular monthly meeting was held Monday night. Of this amount \$2,900 was cafeteria expenses and Title I used \$70.

At the meeting Monday, three Thalia residents, T. R. Cates, Clyde Self and Oliver Holland, met with the board concerning the Thalia gym. On Tuesday, the board requested Thalia authorities to suspend activities at the gym until problems can be worked out, Supt. Larry Jones reported.

The board hired James Streit for another year as band director at state schedule salary plus \$1700. Action on employing the three coaches for next year was delayed until the board will meet again in a called meeting March 18.

After opening bids on some property the board had advertised for sale, the South Ward property, composed of several lots, was sold to John Wheeler for \$226. There were three bids received. Jack Welch, with a bid of \$1010 weighed the approximate 10 acres of land where the old Foard City school was located, and Calvin L. Robinson with a bid of \$1,000.10 was successful in buying the old Truscott school property. There were five bids received for the Foard City land and 3 for the Truscott property. Bids on the Riverside school location and the Thalia high school were rejected.

The board tabled for the time a request by the local teachers association for 2 days per year absence for teachers for personal reasons without question and without loss of contract time, the teacher to be charged \$15 per day. Jim Mack Gafford presented the request as a representative of the local teachers.

The board voted to replace the double oven and two cook stoves in the cafeteria with the price of the new equipment to be about \$2300 and to be

purchased from Wichita Restaurant Supply.

Forty seats and two heating stoves in the Thalia high school building were given by the board to the Templo Roca De Salvacion Church in Crowell.

The board was informed by Supt. Jones that R. C. Williams, who does not have a bachelor's degree, has been and is currently being used as a substitute teacher in Crowell High School.

No action was taken by the board concerning the surfacing of the track area. One surface would cost about \$22,000, and it was determined that cinders place on the course will cost about \$5,000.

The local school has been notified that the local fund assignment—that is, the amount of money the local district sends to Austin to operate their share of the foundation school program—has been increased for 1974-75 some \$2,808, and will be \$53,442.00.

The purchase of two push type power lawn mowers from Brooks Auto Supply was approved.

Supt. Jones told the board that the last six weeks, enrollment in the local system was 505, with 450 being the average daily attendance.

He added that up to Tuesday morning, Jeff Bell was the only board member to announce for re-election.

Preceding the meeting, the home economics girls served dinner to board members and their wives at the home ec cottage.

Bobcats, Coyotes Can Be Trapped All Year

January 31 was the last date on which most fur-bearing animals could be taken but two species not protected by law are open to trapping year-round—bobcats and coyotes.

Under Texas law, both of the animals are classified as "predators" instead of "fur-

bearers" and therefore may be harvested without restrictions.

Parks and Wildlife Department wildlife technician Dan Boone reports that pelts from the two predators are drawing top prices these days.

"A bobcat pelt sells for \$20," said Boone, "and a coyote fur goes for \$12 to \$15."

"This must be near an all-time high value for both of the species. Last year, a coyote pelt was worth \$8 and a bobcat only \$5."

According to Boone, it was also a banner year for the sale of pelts from furbearers which are regulated by trapping laws.

A red fox pelt usually sold for \$20, gray foxes drew as much as \$14 a skin as opposed to \$8 last year. Top prices for raccoons were \$8, male mink pelts for \$8 and female pelts for \$5, ringtails \$4, skunks and even possums and nutria sold for \$1 a pelt.

Total value from the sale of all pelts last year, including coyotes and bobcats, amounted to \$483,698.

Man Jailed on Forgery Charge

A man picked up in Nebraska has been returned to Foard County and is in the local jail charged with forgery. William Ralph Purrington is charged with passing a forged instrument at a local store on December 13, 1973.

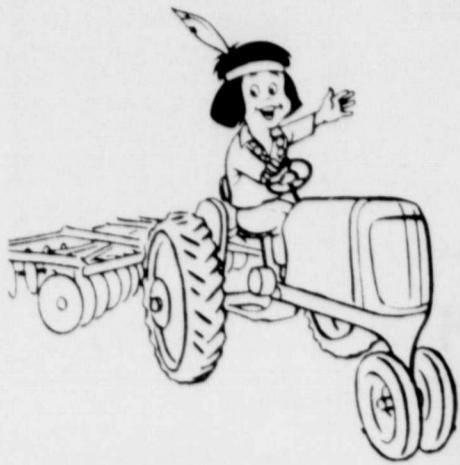

WINTER WHEAT: Most of the 1974 winter wheat crop is in what is described as "good to excellent" condition except in an area extending from Southeast Colorado and Southwest Kansas, through much of the Oklahoma and Texas Panhandles, Eastern New Mexico, Southwest Oklahoma and the Texas Rolling Plains where many reporting stations have recorded less than half of normal precipitation since early October of 1973. Also in parts of this portion of the Southern High Plains many fields have been hit by infestations of greenbugs and some areas are reporting infestations of rust and Hessian fly.

In several parts of the Texas High Plains reports continue to be received of farmers plowing up non-irrigated wheat acreage and getting the land ready to plant to sorghums this spring.

In North Central Oklahoma and through much of the Eastern half of Kansas excessively heavy rains delayed planting or forced replanting much of the wheat acreage resulting in the wheat showing little growth, but much of this acreage appears to be coming

out of winter dormancy in good condition. There has been some concern expressed the wheat starting spring growth early in February since there is the possibility the plants may lose their resistance to cold and be damaged by cold weather which may occur during March and April.

While much of the crop now has adequate moisture, supplies of fertilizers appear to be running considerably less than the amount that could be used to a good advantage, with the cost per ton being much more than in previous years. In view of the possibility of much of the Texas High Plains non-irrigated wheat acreage not being harvested, together with late emergence on much of the North-central Oklahoma and Eastern Kansas acreage, coupled with an apparent shortage of available fertilizers the prospects for the five states of Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas, Colorado and New Mexico do not presently indicate a total 1974 hard red winter wheat crop of over 625 million bushels, unless the weather does an abrupt turnaround from the unfavorable conditions (too wet in the East and too dry in the Southwest) prevailing the last few months.

TIGHT PORK SUPPLIES

Pork supplies should remain tight through 1974, with generally steady prices for producers, says a livestock marketing specialist for the extension service. Despite current high prices, pork producers aren't expanding due to the high price of grain sorghum for feed. Hog prices may soften during the second half of the year if beef supplies increase.

Grandson of Local Couple Is Glider Pilot

When Vick Barker was 12, he made up his mind to do something he couldn't do legally until he was 14.

And on his 14th birthday, Feb. 17, he did it. He made his first solo flight in a glider.

Since he started taking glider pilot lessons at 13 (the minimum age), Vick always had had an instructor with him in the long-winged, lightweight plane. But not this time.

"It felt funny at first," he said, "It was lighter without the extra weight. But except for the takeoff, I wasn't nervous a bit."

"The instructor had really been there to keep me from doing something stupid. I knew what I had to do this time, though, because I'd been over it in my mind."

Vick explained that, as with the other 30 flights he's made, the glider was taken up to an altitude of about 2000 feet by a towplane.

A 200-foot towrope connected the two planes, Vick said and when he was ready, he just pulled the release knob, the towplane dived out of his way and he was on his own.

"It's so quiet up there," he said. "That's one thing I like about soaring. You don't have to yell to talk to somebody and all you can hear is the wind going past."

"A glider is pretty easy to handle," he said. "In a power plane, you have to be looking at so many controls all the time that you can't look at the scenery. But a glider is

different."

The fledgling pilot said the lightweight ships have only three controls to watch—an altimeter, an airspeed indicator and a turn and bank indicator.

"The ship flies just like a bird," he said. "It does just what a bird does, flying thermals and air currents."

A thermal, the rather serious young man explained, is a column of rising air that will take the ship higher.

With a series of spirals and glides, the pilot can use a thermal to gain altitude. Vick said the highest he's been is 3,800 feet.

"But you can't go into the clouds," he said. "Glider pilots usually have radios and if another plane is flying on instruments, he wouldn't see you in the clouds."

Vick explained the gliders have the right-of-way over the planes with engines and that the other pilots will look out for him and get out of his way.

An eighth grader at Greco Junior High, Vick is an only child who comes by his love of flying naturally.

Both Corine and Jay Barker, his parents, are licensed pilots; and Jay has an instructor's license.

The family owns a one-engine, four-seater Piper Cherokee; and Corine said the family flies almost anywhere it goes more than 50 miles away.

Vick's grandparents are Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Barker of Crowell.

Band Program Friday Termed "Big Success"

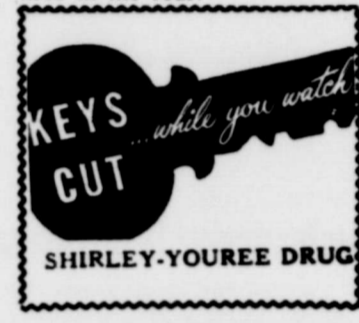

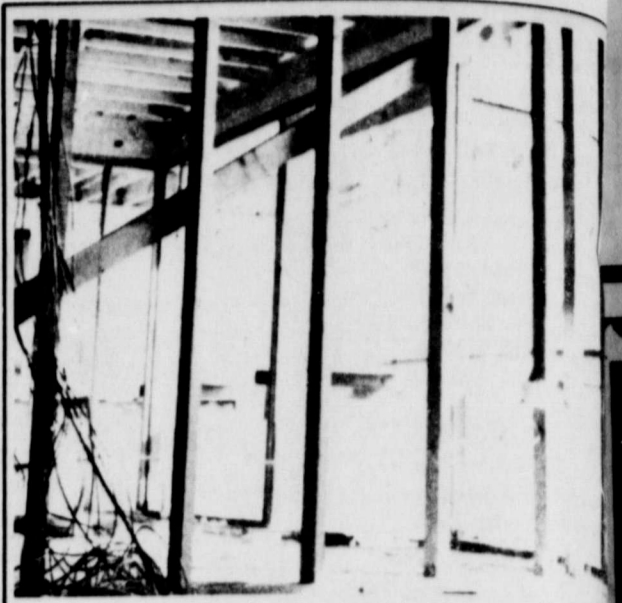
WEST SIDE H.D. CLUB

RETIREMENT PLANNING SAVES TAXES

Farmers and ranchers can enroll in a self-employed retirement plan to reduce their income tax dollars, says an economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Up to 10 per cent of earned income of \$2,500, whichever is less, can be set aside in a tax-sheltered investment plan each year. Earnings on the money are not taxable until retirement, and then the money is taxed as a capital gain or ordinary income, depending on the withdrawal method. Before a retirement plan is started, a proposal should be filed with the Internal Revenue Service.
