The plant has been in operation for a relatively short time by its new owners-six Crowell men.

Mr. Setliff emphasized that everyone is urged to visit the factory during open house. He added that visitors at any other time are disruptive to production; consequently, this will be the only time that visitors will be permitted to watch the manufacture.

"If you are interested in seeing how the caps are manufactured, this will be your only opportunity," he conclud-






