Burns Prove Fatal to Richard Vecera

Richard Vecera, 56-year-old retired Air Force Lieutenant Colonel, died Friday afternoon in Brook Air Force Hospital in San Antonio from burns he received in an explosion in Crowell Friday afternoon, June 7. Mr. Vecera, a veteran spray pilot in this section for several years, was handling the nozzle as an airplane fuel supply tank was being filled from an oil company truck when a flash fire and explosion burned him. Although the tank was adjacent to Vecera's hanger and his mobile home, the blaze failed to ignite any of the nearby buildings or gasoline truck.

He was rushed to Wichita Falls and then flown to the San Antonio military burns center.

Memorial services were held in Alamo Chapel, Monday, July 8, at 1:15 p.m. with Rev. Malcolm Grainger officiating. Concluding services followed in Fort Sam Houston National Cemetery with full military

honors.

Mr. Vecera was born March 2, 1918, in Foard County, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Tom Vecera. He was a graduate of Crowell High School and attended college prior to entering the Army Air Corps January 23, 1942. He was sent to the CBI theatre in May, 1944, and participated in the battles of China and Burma. He was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross with two clusters and the Air Medal with three clusters.

Following his retirement from the Air Force several years ago with the rank of lieutenant colonel, Mr. Vecera had operated a spraying service in Foard County.

Mr. Vecera was a member of the Down Town Bible Class in Crowell and the Castle Hills Baptist Church in San Antonio.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Gertrude G. Vecera; one daughter, Miss Kathryn Sue Vecera of San Antonio; three sons, Richard L. Vecera of Austin and Douglas and Thomas Vecera of San Antonio; sisters, Mrs. Frank (Marie) Land of New Hope, Ark., Mrs. Travis (Hattie) Box of Wichita Falls, Mrs. J. C. (Josephine) Harrison of Burnet, Mrs. Elizabeth Welch of Taylor, Mrs. Ed (Annie) Mechell of Margaret, Mrs. Gilbert (Elsie) Lankford of Wichita Falls; brothers, Venzy Vecera of Anchorage, Alaska, Fred Vecera of Crowell, Paul Vecera of Mokena, Ill., and Travis Vecera of Crowell; and three grandchildren.

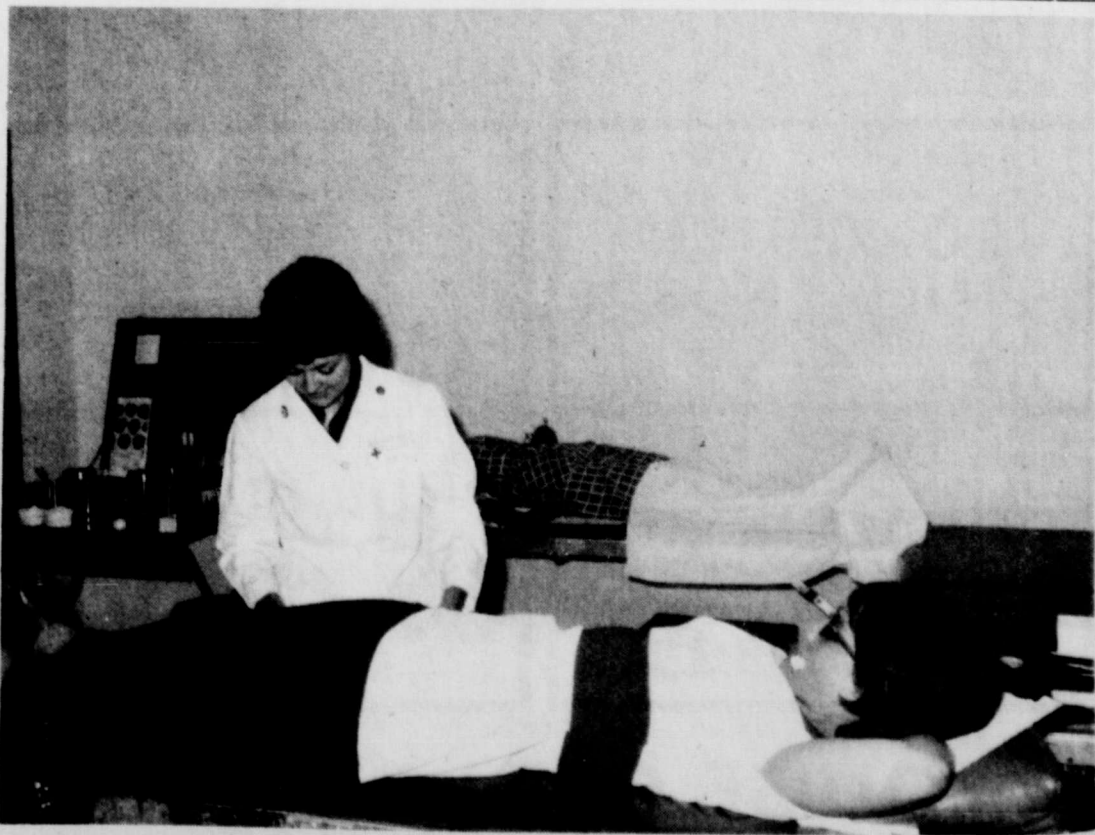
Churchill was named as director of the ESAA project last Tuesday. He is leaving a post as principal of the Graham Elementary School in the Mercedes district.

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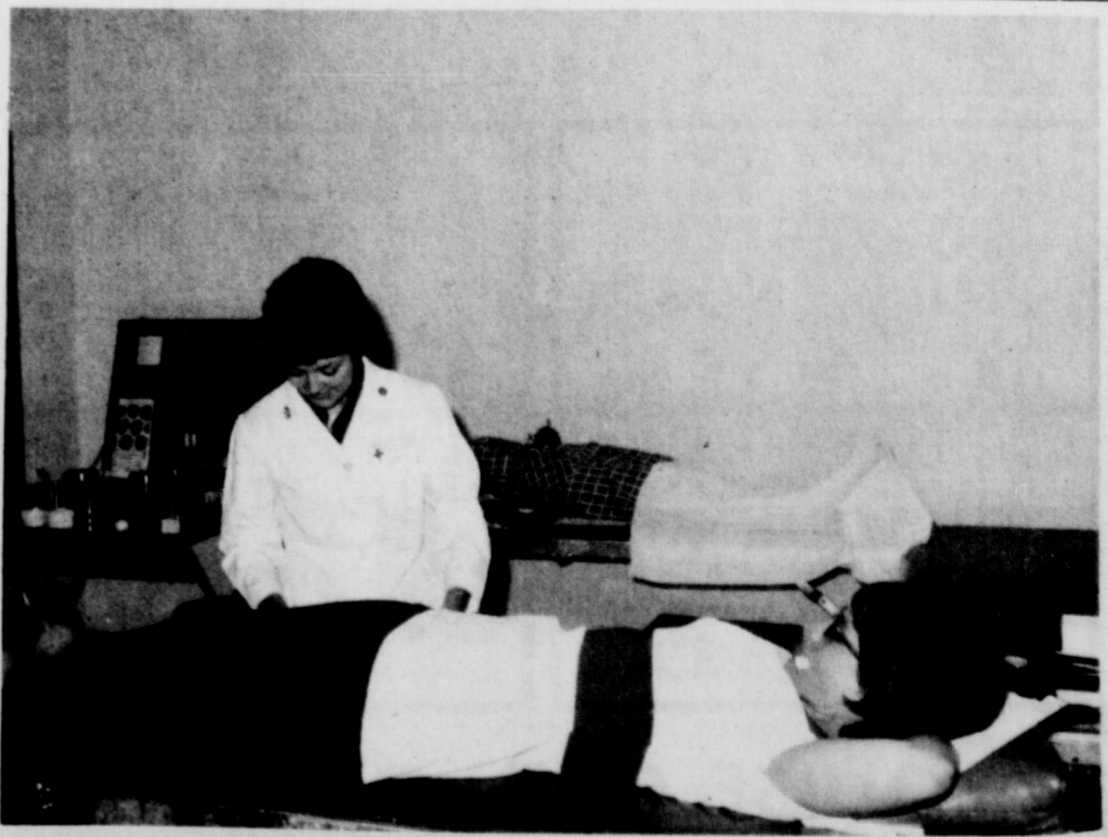

Look for a heavy for its size. 2. Aroma. Check for a strong, sweet, musky aroma. 3. Netting. Select well-shaped melons. Netting is a growth characteristic for cantaloupes. 4. Depression. Choose a melon with a depression at the stem end. This depression means it was left on the vine until practically half of an average melon's weight is gone. 5. Shape. Cantaloupe is an excellent

source of vitamin A, as well as vitamin C. Vitamin A is required for growth, normal skeleton development and tooth structure. Vitamin C is essential for the production of intercellular material which holds the cells in proper relation to each other. Vitamin C is important in wound healing and in the ability to withstand stresses of injury and infection.

For a different breakfast treat try cantaloupe and orange sauce. To prepare the orange sauce combine 1 cup of orange juice and 2 tablespoons of lemon juice. Pour over sections from one cantaloupe. Cantaloupe are tasty anytime of the day and nutritious too!

We moved early in June from Greenville, S. C. to this farming community northwest of Winston-Salem, N.C. Antone is employed at Hanes Knitwear in Winston-Salem.

This is beautiful country, good farming here. The main area industry is the huge R. J. Reynolds Tobacco Co. All the local farms seem to have a half acre planted in tobacco. Much corn is grown here. Oats and barley have just been harvested. In our immediate area there are a number of large dairy farms. While driving around the county, we've seen large herds of sheep.

We've been interested to learn about the history of this area. A Protestant Sect from Germany, the Moravians, came down from Pennsylvania and founded the town of Salem in 1766. A few years later they built the town of Winston a mile to the north for non-Moravians moving into the area. The two towns grew together eventually. The old Salem has been carefully restored and is a beautiful place to visit—much like Williamsburg, Va. The descendants of those original Moravians are still here. German surnames are predominant in this area, and there are many large, beautiful Moravian Churches here.

representing 38.6 percent of total U.S. production, according to statistics compiled by Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

In 84 years of recorded production, Texas oil fields have produced some 38 billion barrels of oil—approximately 36 percent of the U.S. total.

"The decline in production indicates the basic task of the state's oil men—the more extensive development of Texas fields," said the Association's president, Sherman Hunt, a Dallas independent producer. "But if Congress will adopt economic policies to encourage the search for new fields, we feel this trend can be changed."

Despite the drop in production, the oil that was produced last year in 203 of the state's 254 counties was valued at some \$5 billion, an increase of approximately \$500 million over the value of oil produced in 1972. This increase partially reflects the increased price paid for some Texas crude oil during the latter part of 1973.

In addition to larger payments to royalty owners, the higher prices also have been reflected in the state comptroller's reports of increased severance taxes paid by the oil men of Texas.

Foard County, which has had recorded production since 1929, last year produced 270,762 barrels of oil at the rate of 742 barrels a day. Production in 1973 boosted Foard County's production total through the end of the year to 15,108,971.

In 1973, some 33 counties produced more than 10-million barrels of crude oil.

30 Years Ago in The News

Deposits in the Crowell State Bank have made a gain of \$735,862.10 since the last statement was published on April 13, reaching a total of \$1,969,632.07 at the close of business on June 30, 1944.

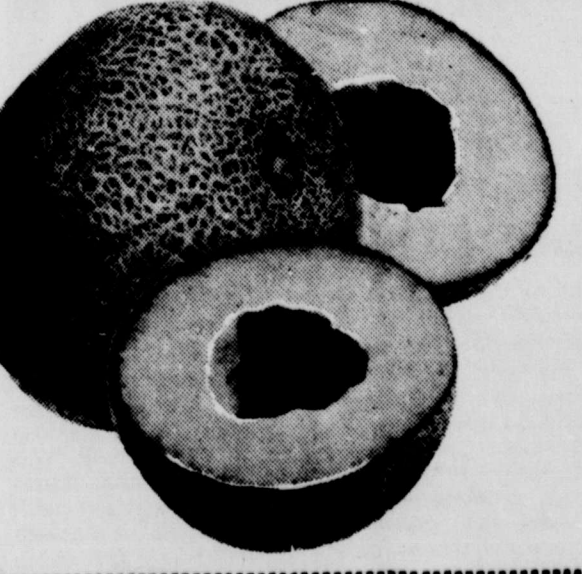

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REDDY'S VACATION TIPS

- REFRIGERATOR OR FREEZER: Change thermostat control to slightly warmer (or "Vacation") setting according to the manufacturer's recommendations.
- DISHWASHER: Make sure it's empty. Shut the door, but do not latch.
- DISPOSER: Run and flush with cold water.
- ELECTRIC RANGE: Make sure all switches are in the "Off" position.
- WASHERS: Turn off water supply at faucets.
- WATER HEATER (ELECTRIC): Turn off at circuit breaker panel. When you return, run a small amount of water from a hot water faucet to make sure there is water in the tank before you turn the circuit on.
- TRASH COMPACTOR: Remove any accumulated trash.
- TELEVISION SETS: Unplug from electric outlet and disconnect the antenna lead-in cable.
- CLOCK RADIOS, ETC.: Check these and all other items with automatic "On-Off" controls. Disconnect the ones that won't be needed.
- LIGHTING: Be sure that all lights are off except those needed for security, such as: 1) yard light and/or other exterior lighting with automatic controls — on at dusk, off at dawn; 2) portable lamp in living area with automatic control; 3) hall or bathroom light.
- AIR CONDITIONING: Normally, air conditioning should be turned off completely while on summer vacation. However, if there is anything in your home that might suffer heat damage, the thermostat setting could be raised 5 to 10 degrees above normal operation and the unit left on. For comfort, you might have a friend or neighbor turn on the unit the day of your return.
