Mrs. W. M. Cox, 70, died in the Foard County Hospital early Tuesday, October 8, following an illness of several months.

Funeral arrangements were incomplete at press time Tuesday. Womack Funeral Home is in charge.

The former Edna Pearl Dunn, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Dunn, was born in Joplin, Mo., March 13, 1904. She was married to W. M. Cox Sept. 18, 1921, in Crowell. They lived in the Good Creek community until 1967 when they moved to Crowell. Mr. Cox died Oct. 14, 1971. She was a member of the First Baptist Church.

Survivors include two sons, Bill J. Cox of Houston and Boyce Cox of Olney; one daughter, Mrs. Doris Burel-smith of Crowell; three brothers, V. W. Dunn of Dallas, Howard Dunn of Paris and Bill Dunn of Dumas; four sisters, Mrs. J. T. Vessell of Amarillo, Mrs. Edith Daniel of Knox City, Mrs. Roy Daniel of Truscott and Mrs. Cotton Owens of Wichita Falls; and four grandchildren. Mrs. Cox was preceded in death, in addition to her husband, by two sons, Johnnie in 1935 and Albert in 1944.

Farabee Visits in Foard County Tuesday

Ray Farabee, Democrat nominee for the Texas Senate in the 30th district, visited and campaigned in Crowell this week.

The businessman and attorney talked with citizens in the downtown area and talked with county officials about local issues and the need to encourage maximum voter participation in the November 5 general election.

Farabee came to Crowell from Benjamin. At noon he was in Haskell to speak to the Lions Club on Industrial Development.

On Tuesday night, Farabee indicated the pace of the campaign would pick up in this last month. He plans to visit every county in the 29 county district several times before election day.

Farabee stressed his belief in person to person contact with voters. He carried out a grass roots campaign throughout the primary and has 55 local coordinators in the cities and counties in the district. Henry Black serves as the candidates coordinator in Foard County.

Seth Halbert Named New Foard County Judge

Seth Halbert, 27-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Halbert, last Friday night was named as the Democratic nominee for county judge on the November 5 general election ballot. Halbert's name will appear in the ballot place of that of Leslie Thomas, who resigned the county judgeship to accept an appointment by Gov. Dolph Briscoe as interim judge of the 26th judicial district and to seek the district office in the November election. Thomas was selected as the Democratic nominee following the death last month of District Judge Rex Sullivan of Quanah.

The Foard County commissioners court has named Halbert to be interim county judge until the end of the current fiscal year.

Halbert received the Democratic bid for judge at a meeting of the Foard County Democratic executive committee Friday night at the home of chairman Ray Shirley. Other applicants for the nomination were Charlie Bell, H. L. Ayers Jr. and Henry Black. All were interviewed by the committee in an open session prior to the executive session. Shirley said almost 30 interested persons attended the meeting.

The precinct chairmen of the

county, all of whom were present for the meeting, are: Walter Ramsey, precinct 1; Cecil D. Carroll, 2; Kenneth Halbert, 3; James Sandlin, 4; H. L. Ayers, Jr., 5; Mrs. Sim V. Gamble, 6; Eldon Whitman 7; and Mrs. Billie Cleveland, 11.

Mr. Ayers, as one of the applicants, was not permitted to vote on the basis of ground rules set at the meeting, although he was a precinct chairman. Kenneth Halbert, precinct chairman and father of the successful applicant, was given the right to vote, however, according to the ground rules set up. Shirley said four ballots were necessary before Halbert received a clear majority.

Seth Halbert's name will go on the ballot, but he could face the prospect of opposition in a write-in campaign if other of the applicants or any other qualified candidate should decide to make the race.

Halbert is a graduate of Crowell High School, received a BS degree in psychology from the University of Texas at Austin and a master of business administration degree from Southwest Texas State University at San Marcos in 1972. A paratrooper with the U.S. Army reserve and National Guard from 1969 to 1973, he was honorably discharged as a second lieutenant after being stricken with multiple sclerosis. He is presently employed part-time as an instructor at Vernon junior college.

He and his wife, the former Laura Wright of Houston, have one son, Konrad, 16 months. The family belongs to the First Baptist Church of Crowell.

Mrs. T. M. Haney of Vernon and a long-time resident of Foard County, observed her 100th birthday Thursday of last week at the Monterey Villa nursing home in Vernon. A reception was held at the home and four of Mrs. Haney's children were present: T. S. (Hid) Haney of Crowell, Mrs. John Rasor of Lawton, Ok., Mrs. W. H. Rowand of Phoenix, Az., and Mrs. H. W. Boykin of Pampa.

Mrs. Haney, born as Sallie Anne Drake and daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. P. M. Drake, was born October 3, 1874 in Tennessee. The family moved to West Texas when she was a child. She married the late T. M. Haney of Plainview in August, 1892, at the home of her parents in the old Haney community, located on the Foard-Wilbarger county line southwest of the Five-in-One community. Mrs. Haney recalls difficulties with Indians even in the years after her marriage and after she and her husband began living east of Thalia.

Mr. and Mrs. Haney moved to Vernon in 1938 and Mr. Haney died in 1940. E. M. (Epp) Haney lived with his mother for many years until his death in 1972 when his mother was 98. At this time, she moved into the local rest home. She attended Sunday school and church until she was 94 years old, and has been a member of the First Baptist Church of Vernon for 36

County To Elect ASCS Committee

Foard County farmers are asked to nominate candidates of their choice to be on the ASCS committee ballot, says Mrs. Thelma Borchardt, acting executive director of the Foard County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) office. The ASCS committee election will be conducted from November 22 to December 2, by mail ballot. Petition forms were mailed out to all known eligible voters on September 30. The forms can be returned to the local ASCS office anytime between now and October 29.

A few basic considerations should be kept in mind when circulating petitions, Mrs. Borchardt said. In order to be valid, petitions must be limited to one nominee each, must include written certification that the nominee is willing to serve if elected, must be signed by three eligible voters, and received in the ASCS office no later than Oct. 29. A farmer may circulate or sign nominating petitions for as many candidates as he chooses.

Mrs. Borchardt believes that farmer nominations of candidates for the upcoming election are very important. She said, "Farmers should petition for and elect these individuals they feel would do a good job as ASCS committee members. The election of concerned farmers is necessary for good administration of farm programs."

Presently serving on the Foard County ASCS committee are Bill Cates, whose term expires this year, James Sandlin and R. J. Owens. Mr. Cates is eligible for another three-year term on the committee.

Mrs. Borchardt further

explained that the county ASCS office welcomes all valid petitions. The opportunity to nominate, vote, and be elected to office is guaranteed to all farmers regardless of race, religion, sex, color, or national origin.

WSL Hears Economist

"The Season is the Reason" was the topic chosen by Ms. Helen Gribble when she spoke to the Women's Service League last Thursday. She was introduced by Mrs. Effie Johnson, program leader.

Ms. Gribble, home economist with West Texas Utilities Co., discussed conserving energy and fighting inflation. She noted that the supply does not meet the demand. It was pointed out that both the customer and the utilities company must cooperate in order to obtain results. She stated that 40 percent of household energy was used for air-conditioning.

The speaker noted a number of energy saving measures including storm windows, correct temperature, oven meals and the use of small appliances when possible. Sudden stops and starts in automobiles should be avoided. Mr. Gribble emphasized wastefulness must be eliminated; WTU is doing the best they can.

FERTILIZER SUPPLIES UNCERTAIN

A soil chemist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service describes fertilizer supplies as "uncertain". Consequently, farmers will need to plan carefully their fertilizer needs for this fall and next spring. Nitrogen is expected to remain short while phosphorus supplies are increasing. Natural gas supplies are limiting nitrogen production in the U.S. and expansion by U.S. companies abroad is slow due to political instability and lack of marketing agreements.

TEXAS TEACHERS SEEKING BETTER PAY

With the start of the 1975 Texas Legislative session just three months away, Texas teachers are getting ready to ask for a full-scale revision of the state school system, better pay for teachers, and a number of other changes in school laws.

The legislative committee of the Texas State Teachers Association will hold an open hearing on the association's tentative 1975 legislative program at 1 p.m. October 27, in Austin.

Meeting here this week, the committee was told by visitors from across the state that the No. 1 sore spot among Texas teachers is low pay.

Despite TSTA efforts in 1969 which helped to secure passage of a law raising the starting annual pay for a bachelor's degree this year to \$6,600 with 5 percent annual raises, Texas still ranks 37th among the 50 states in average teacher pay. Many young people are saying it's not worth it to go to college four years and then start work at \$6,600 per year, TSTA leaders report.

Because of "enrichment funds" supplied by some local school boards, some districts are able to pay their teachers above the state minimum scale, but not much.

The Houston school district, for instance, starts a bachelor's degree teacher with no experience at \$7,900, or \$1,300 above the state minimum scale.

But the city of Houston pays first-year patrolmen \$10,512; first-year fire fighters \$10,067; and refuse collectors at an

annual rate of \$7,313 to start and \$8,088 after 18 months on the job, the Houston Post reported on September 27.

The TSTA 1975 legislative program will give top priority to passage of a new state law to overhaul the "minimum foundation school program" which has been in use—with minor changes—since 1949.

Part of the proposed law—now in tentative draft form—will be a new salary schedule aimed at moving Texas to a position above the U.S. average teacher pay of \$10,673, with a built-in cost-of-living factor to keep pace with inflation.

Other proposals TSTA will make to the 1975 legislature include:

A teacher contract law, to provide in all school districts, except those now operating under a permissive contract law, probationary or professional contracts for teachers.

A professional consultation law that would require local boards of education—upon request from a majority of the school district faculty or their local teacher association—to enter into a consultation

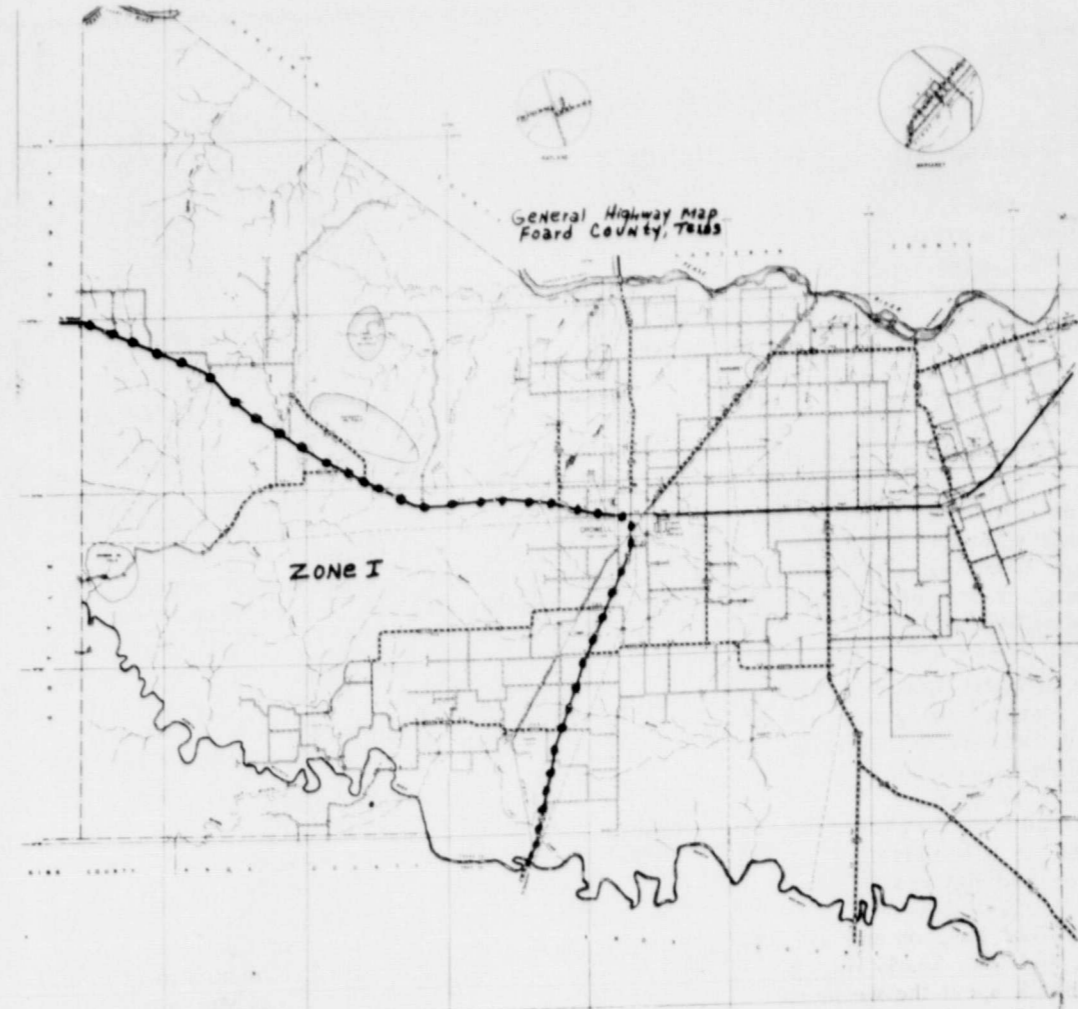

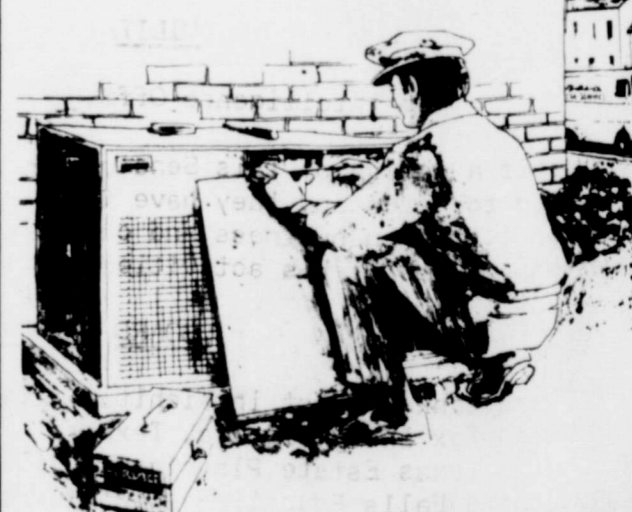

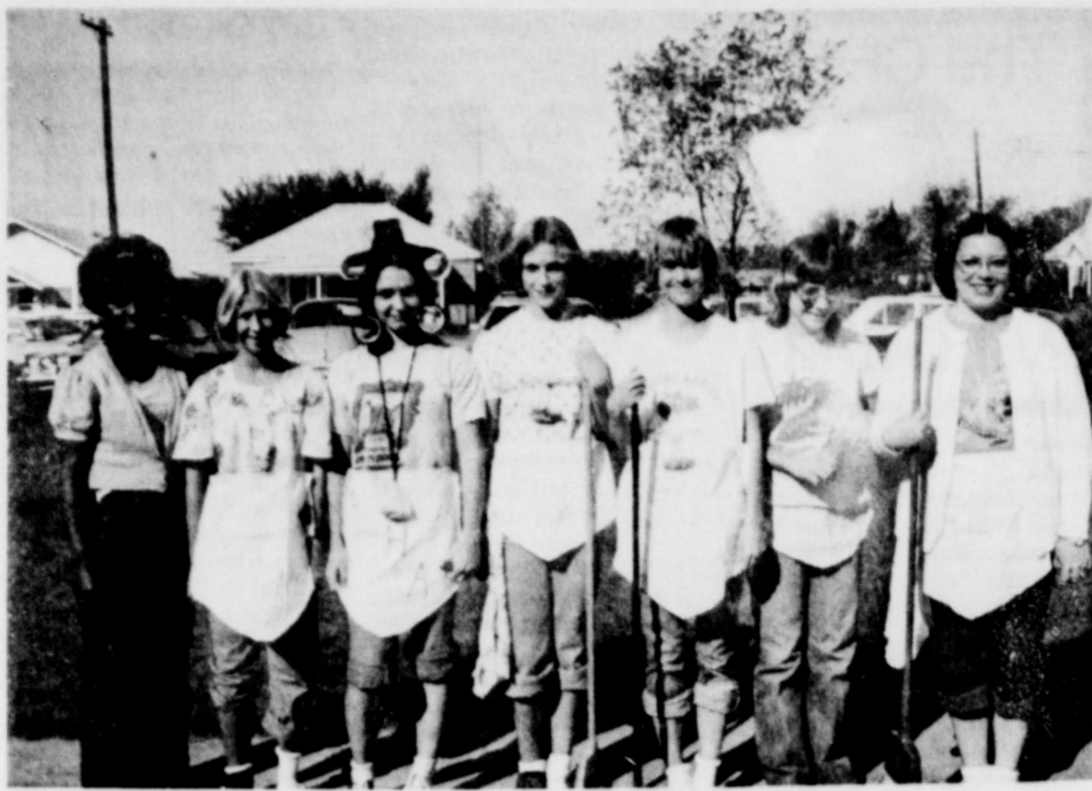

Absentee Voting Starts October 16

Secretary of State Mark W. White, Jr. this week announced that all voters wishing to cast an absentee ballot for the November 5th General Election may do so beginning October 16th. According to Secretary White, the proper absentee voting procedure will depend upon each individual voter's situation.

Those persons who expect to be absent from their county of residence only on the day of the election may vote by personal appearance during regular office hours at the county clerk's office.

Those persons who expect to be absent from their county of residence both during the time for voting by personal appearance and on the election day can make application to their county clerk requesting that an absentee ballot be mailed to them at an address outside the county.

In addition, those persons residing within the county but unable to vote on election day due to sickness, physical disability, religious belief, or incarceration for less than a felony, can also make application to their county clerk requesting an absentee ballot by mail.

White noted that the absentee voting period for the November 5th General Election will continue through Friday, November 1st.
