County Agent Joe Burkett Sets Retirement for January 31st

Joe Burkett, Foard County agricultural extension agent for the past 28 years, will be retiring effective January 31, 1975, according to a joint statement from the Foard County commissioners court and J. G. Simmons, district agricultural extension agent of Vernon.

In announcing the forthcoming retirement of Mr. Burkett, Simmons said:

"During his years as county extension agent (agricultural,) Mr. Burkett has been a very effective, imaginative, and creative agent. He has conducted outstanding programs in 4-H and agriculture which have been very instrumental in developing youth leadership and improving agricultural interest and economy. Mr. Burkett has worked with thousands of 4-H club members during his 28 years in Foard County and many of these 4-H club members have gone on to achieve success in life. Mr. Burkett was a dedicated, loyal, cooperative and outstanding agent for the agricultural extension service."

WILDCATS HOST POWERFUL KNOX CITY FRIDAY NIGHT

Two of the powerhouse teams of District 7-A this year, Crowell and Knox City, will battle it out in the second district football game of the season for both teams, at Dick Todd Field Friday night. Game time is 7:30

p.m. and a large turnout of football fans is expected to be on hand.

Knox City crushed Munday last Friday night 58-0 for its only district game. The Greyhounds are 6-0 for the season and will

be trying desperately to keep their string of victories alive. Meanwhile, the Wildcats, who have lost one game, a rain-soaked battle to powerhouse Memphis, will be doing their best to chalk up another District 7-A win.

Both teams will also be keeping in mind that Aspermont, another undefeated team in this district, crushed Haskell 26-6 last Friday night. Both Crowell and Knox City have to contend with Aspermont and Haskell later in the season.

The Wildcats suffered no disabling injuries in the Paducah game last week, Coach Printiss Gidney said Monday, and he expects the Cats will be in good physical condition for Friday night's game.

In looking over the Knox City lineup, Al Bateman was the big gun in KC's game last week as he rushed for 195 yards, scored three touchdowns and passed 2 times for a total of 84 yards, one of which was for a TD. Also scoring for the Greyhounds last week were Dale Bloxham, Jerry Stamps, Joe Huff and Joey Swain.

All in all, it looks like a fine game coming up for Friday night and probably a record crowd for the season will show up if the weather cooperates.

City Council Seeks Information from Middle Income Families

At a regular monthly meeting of the Crowell City Council Tuesday night of last week, it was voted to employ Johnson & King of Vernon to make the annual audit of the City.

In other action, the board agreed to grant permission to the Foard County Historical Survey Committee to lease the old City Hall on North Main Street as the site for a museum for Foard County. Another resolution passed by the Council set the price for the City land in the Margaret community which is presently being sold by the

City to an individual.

An ordinance was also passed which will prohibit solicitors from working in Crowell without first having obtained a permit from the City.

Joe Bill Pierce of Midland, architect who drew up the plans for the Housing Authority units built south east of the square, met with the council and explained a new program presently available to provide housing for "Moderate income" families. Differing from the low rent units, these units must be rented for enough to repay the

loan which can be obtained from the Farmers Home Administration at a low interest rate. They will be one- and two-bedroom units. The Council is having printed in this week's paper a rental housing survey. All area residents who would be interested in new housing are urged to fill out this form and either take it or mail it to the City of Crowell. If enough interested persons respond, the council can proceed further but if insufficient response is noted the study of the program will be dropped.



Federal law and regulation prohibit the payment of a time deposit prior to maturity unless three months of the interest thereon is forfeited and interest on the amount withdrawn is reduced to the passbook rate.

"A survey will be made to determine if there is sufficient interest in Foard County for a moderate income housing project," Mrs. Wilma Cates stated at last Thursday's meeting of the Women's Service League.

She pointed out that Joe Billy Pierce of Midland, architect for the low-income housing undertaking, had recently met with the City Council and Housing Authority. Farm Bureau Has Annual Meeting

About 100 persons attended the annual membership meeting of the Foard County Farm Bureau Saturday night at the school cafeteria. Preceding the program, a chili and stew supper was prepared and served by Mrs. G. F. Pierce, Jr.

H. L. Ayers, Jr., president of the local organization, presided and introduced the program, which consisted of a talk by Miss Barbie Scott, who told of her experiences while attending the Farm Bureau Citizenship Seminar held during the summer in Waco. Miss Scott represented Foard County at the seminar.

On behalf of the local FB, Mr. Ayers presented a gift to Glen Jones, who resigned last year after having served 25 years as president of the organization. In the business meeting, Jack Welch, secretary, reported membership is now 338, which is up 13 over the preceding year and the largest membership ever recorded by this county's Farm Bureau. Ayers and David Scott were re-elected as directors, while Melvin Moore was elected to the board replacing Grover M. Moore.

The following ten resolutions were adopted to be sent to the state convention which will be held Dec. 2-4 in Dallas:

1. Opposition to federal land use planning.
2. Opposition to limiting or controlling U.S. agricultural commodity exports.
3. Recommending the increasing of the federal and state exemptions on inheritance taxes.
4. Allowing the increasing of the net income for persons on social security so they can earn more without being penalized on their social security checks.
5. The escalator clause should be moved up to start in 1975 instead of 1976.
6. All meat used in school cafeterias and in the military should be U.S.-produced beef.
7. Recommend that the President use his authority to stop beef imports.
8. Recommend inspection of all imported canned meats coming into this country.
9. Recommend halting of exports of U.S. farm machinery and fertilizer.
10. Reaffirm the FB stand asking for a return of the bracero program.


