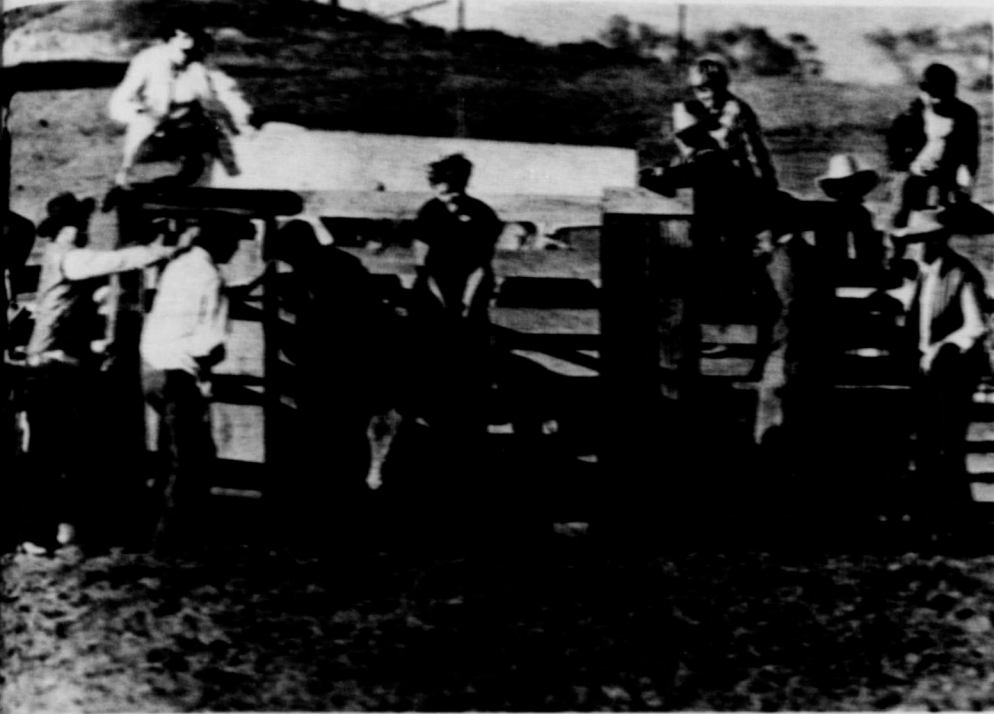

Wildcats Defeat Quanah

Crowell high school basketball teams won the two games played against Quanah at Wildcat gym Monday night.

In the varsity boys' game, Coach Randall Ryan's charges won 46 to 33 over the Indian quintet. It was Crowell's first game of the young basketball season and the second outing for Quanah. Randy Prince and David Bell shared top scoring honors for the Wildcats with 16 each. Nathan Frater had 8. Bell and Melvin Westover proved extremely strong on the boards as they each came up with 13 rebounds. Others seeing action for Crowell were Don Sparkman, Dee Finley, Rocky Glasscock, Steve Stapp and Jack Whitley.
 Leading scorer for Quanah was Jagers with 14 points.
 Coach Carl Brock's junior varsity, also in their first outing of the year, defeated the Quanah JV 48 to 30. Ricky Coleman was high pointer for Crowell with 12. Daniel Field had 10, Tim Christopher 6, Pat Norman, Steve Criss, C. B. Sparkman and David Westover, 4 each; and Mark Christopher and Randall Russell had 2 each. Also playing for Crowell were Paul Whitley, Tommy Tamplen, Daryl Miller, David Crafton, and Jay Wall.
 Crowell led by only two points, 20-18, at the half, but a strong third period saw the local boys scoring 18 points in 6 minutes. The freshmen members of the team played the last two minutes of the contest and maintained the lead already established by Crowell.
 Coach Brock said Crowell made 41 per cent of their shots from the floor in the first half and in the second half were making 50 per cent of their floor shots. Coleman had 6 rebounds to lead the Crowell boys in that department.
 Watson was high pointer for Quanah with 13.
