Crowell School to Benefit from Court Decision

Barnes Maintenance Co. Inc. was ordered Wednesday of last week to pay a total of \$9,673.19 to 21 area school districts and Region IX Education Service Center for

failure to deliver maintenance supplies in accordance with contracts.

Crowell School District will be receiving \$314.70 for its share of the total funds.

The ruling was made by 78th District Court Judge Stanley Kirk, who also ordered Barnes to pay 6 percent interest per annum to each district until the accounts are paid. Barnes also was assessed all court costs.

City to Make Application for Federal Funds for Projects

A portion of approximately \$10 million in Discretionary Funds through the Department of Housing and Urban Development may be available to Crowell and Four Winds counties under a

program explained to area officials last week.

Mrs. Wilma Cates, Crowell city secretary, joined representatives from Cottle, Hardeman and Childress counties along with Von

Kleibrink, Four Winds RC&D director, at a briefing on the program held last week in Wichita Falls.

Mrs. Cates said that the city government Tuesday night of this week approved two programs which will be filed. One is concerning a sanitary land fill disposal system, and sewer system in the south part of town.

The pre-application papers must be in the HUD district office by March 1, Mrs. Cates added.

Foard County to Seek Federal Grants

Foard County Judge Seth Halbert said Monday morning that the county is preparing to make application for some federal programs which have become available to the county. Foard County about two years ago was declared an "economically deprived area" by federal designation and thus became eligible for federal aid.

Judge Halbert said that since January 1 of this year, the county is eligible for 100 percent federal grants on certain projects. He gave as an example that under the program used government equipment such as fire trucks, back hoes, graders, dozers and other equipment may be made available to the

county. Also, federal grants of 100 percent may also be available for construction projects for the county.

He said that he plans to appoint a committee this week to work with the commissioners court in determining what projects are most needed so that applications for assistance may be made as soon as possible.

L. W. Curfman of Lubbock, economic development representative, met with the commissioners court last week and explained the program.

Local Chapter Observing National FFA Week

Members of the Crowell Chapter are joining with over 450,000 other FFA members in the United States in celebrating national FFA Week which started Saturday, February 15, and will continue through this week. Theme of this year's observance is "FFA a chance for Growth."

National FFA Week always includes George Washington's birthday in observance of his leadership in promoting scientific farming practices. Washington is considered the patron saint of the FFA and has come to symbolize the FFA treasurer. Organized in 1928, the FFA promotes leadership,

cooperation and citizenship among high school vocational agriculture students.

The local FFA chapter, organized in the early 1930's has a total of 73 members with Don Welch as advisor. Walker Todd of Quanah was the first FFA advisor and he and his students started the annual project show in 1938. Marvin Myers served from 1939 until his retirement last year. An interesting thing about that first show in 1938 was that James Welch, a cousin of the present FFA advisor, was one of the winners in that show. James is now a member of the high school faculty.

At the present time, the FFA boys, along with the 4-H

School Board Hires Coaching Staff

The entire coaching staff of the Crowell Schools were given new one-year contracts at a meeting of the local school board Monday night. Hired for the 1975-76 school year were athletic director Printiss Gidney at a salary of \$2100 over state schedule; Randall Ryan, head basketball coach and assistant football coach, \$1800 above state schedule; Marvin Field, junior high coach and assistant high school football coach, \$1700 above; and Carl Brock,

assistant coach, \$1000 above state schedule.

Also re-hired was James Streit, band director, at a salary of \$1700 above state schedule. Mr. Streit attended the meeting and showed board members one of the new uniforms being purchased for the band.

The board approved a one-day band trip for April 25 for the Wildcat band to enter the Greater Southwest Music Festival in Amarillo. Also okayed was the purchase of 9 manual and 1 electric typewriters for the school. The board voted to make some needed repairs to the boys rest room in high school.

Approved was the matching of \$383 in federal funds to buy a spirit duplicator and supplies for the science department. The federal money is from Title III under the National Defense Education Act, which was enacted back in the time of the Soviet Sputnik program. Also approved was the payment of some \$1560 in current bills. Supt. Larry Jones reports that the average daily attendance is presently above 460, and during the past six weeks, enrollment has exceeded 500. ADA last year was 466 average.

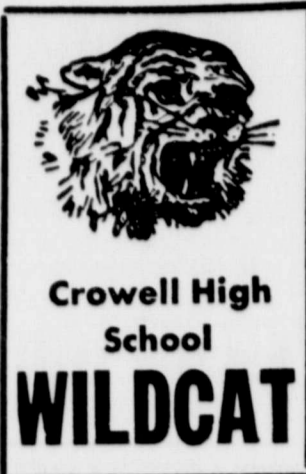

Beware of the school that:

1. Offers a discount on tuition for an immediate cash payment.
2. Insists on your immediate decision to enroll and make a substantial payment because the school has only a few openings left in the next class.
3. Does not have a fair refund policy clearly stated in the contract.
4. Is reluctant to let you take the contract to your school counselor.
5. Offers a fabulous career in a glamorous industry after only a few weeks of training.
6. Makes extravagant claims for placement and employment.
7. Overstresses terms such as "Registered," "Approved," and "Accredited."
8. Offers degrees and diplomas usually granted only by colleges and universities.
9. Calls at your home for an interview without having first checked in with your school principal or guidance counselor.

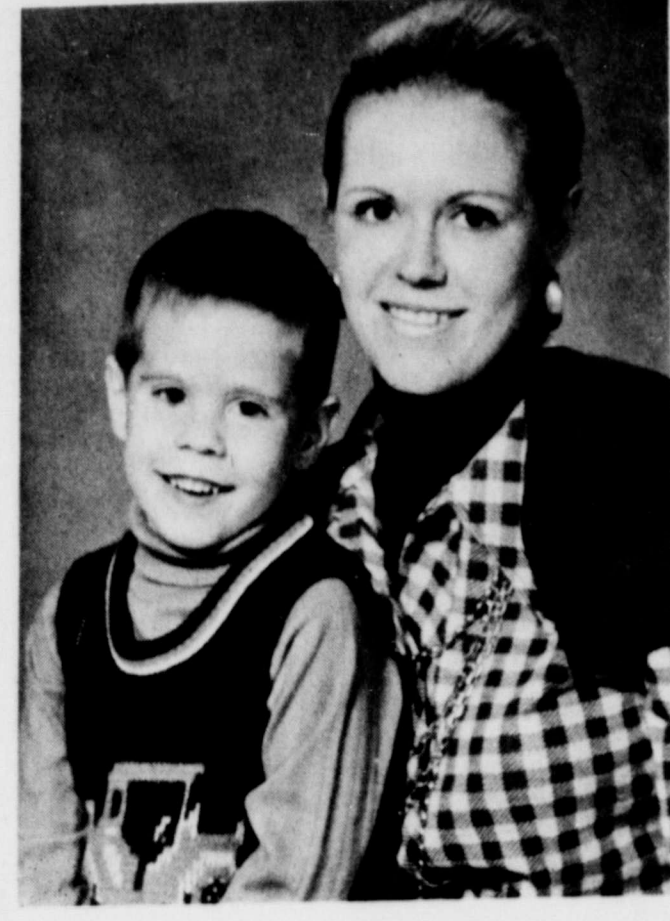
LICENSE PLATES SALES OFF TO SLOW START

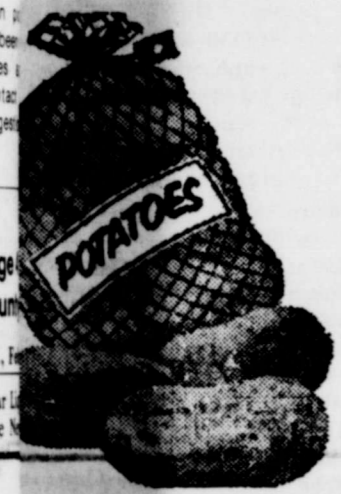

Home Gardening Program Planned

The interest in home vegetable gardens continues to increase in all areas of the state. Almost anyone, whether they live in town or country, have enough space to produce tasty, nutritious vegetables the year round. Here in Foard County, hardly a day goes by without someone mentioning their home garden.

To help Foard County gardeners a program has been scheduled for Wednesday, February 26. Dr. Roland Roberts, Area Vegetable Specialist, from Lubbock and Emory Boring, Area Entomologist, stationed in Vernon will present the program. The program will cover almost all aspects of

home gardening. Included will be soil preparation, planting, light requirements, insect control, new varieties and many others.

The program will begin at 5:00 p.m. and take place in the County Extension Office in the Foard County Courthouse. You will want to make special effort to attend and ask these specialists about any problems you may have in your home garden. I am certainly looking forward to meeting the home gardeners in Foard County.

Abundance of Moisture

After the rain and snow of the last couple of weeks, Foard County producers have an abundance of soil moisture for small grains production. I would like to include a reminder that cattle should be removed from wheat pastures as soon as

possible after March 1st. With grazing, the problem is normally not under-utilization of small grain forage but overgrazing. Moderate fall and winter grazing usually has little effect on grain yields and may even prevent lodging and increase tillering.

Normally after grazing the nitrogen content of plants has been reduced. If soil moisture conditions are favorable at the time livestock are removed, a topdressing with nitrogen fertilizer should be considered to maintain high grain yields.

Hopefully along with this abundance of soil moisture we will receive some sunny and warmer days to increase the wheat plant growth.

Contaminated Saddle Pads

I would like to pass on information that I received from the Texas State Department of Health concerning the contamination of certain saddle pads with anthrax. In September, 1974, an outbreak of anthrax at the Washington State Game Farm was traced back to a contaminated saddle pad recently purchased at a local retail outlet.

The saddle pad which contains imported goat hair, is manufactured by the Perforated Pad Co. in Woonsocket, Rhode Island. Pads which contain goat hair are called "Alaskan Hair" pads, and have one of the following styles numbers on the label: 238, 238R, 500, 500R, 832, or 832R.

The Consumer Product Safety Commission has asked that individuals who own such pads should place them in sealed, double-walled plastic bags and contact their local or state health department for disposal instructions. If anyone in Foard County has recently purchased a pad of this description, please contact the County Extension Office and we will proceed with the necessary steps.

In the last game Saturday night, it was the Roadrunners over the Hawks 54-21.



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Texas Talk

Q: What are some of the characteristics of a good breeding bull not necessarily required for good beef cattle?
A: Most notable characteristics for breeding bulls not necessary in beef cattle include: a masculine appearance, breed markings, constitution and a good weight-to-age ratio.
CONSTITUTION—Usually described as the positive tendency of an animal to perform well and survive during advanced age. Physical characteristics indicative of a good constitution are full development of the forequarters, wide-open and broad nostrils, a strong straight back and good body width and depth.
MASCULINITY—Evidenced by the appearance of the bull. General features to look for are a full neck, strong horns (when this is a breed characteristic), full forehead with good development of chest and shoulders.
