


# To the Taxpayers of Foard County and Crowell Consolidated Independent School **District:**

Each person owning personal and/or real property within the County of Foard or Crowell Consolidated Independent School District, is respectfully requested by Emmett E. Howard and J. H. Gillespie to come by the respective offices at his earliest convenience and render such property for the purpose of taxation.

The law, in effect, provides that all property shall be listed or rendered by the owner thereof, if he is of full age and of sound mind, but when it becomes necessary for the respective tax assessors, their deputies or others who have to be hired for such purpose to seek out each property owner to secure the individual renditions, the expense involved is greatly increased, and this additional expense is borne by the TAXPAYERS.



White shelled eggs are in large demand at this time of year. Brown shelled eggs color just as well as white. Brown shelled eggs yield bright, vivid colors; while white shells are best for pastels. Here are a few suggestions to follow when preparing Easter eggs.

Place the eggs in a dish of lukewarm water to prevent cracked shells. Bring water in a pan to boil, using enough to come one inch above the eggs

Transfer eggs from the water to the boiling water; reduce heat to a simmering temperature. Let eggs simmer 18-20 minutes. Remove eggs from hot water, plunge into cold water.

Hot water dyes are faster. Prepare dyes according to manufacturer's direction. Should you eat dyed

cooked eggs? Look for a statement on the color package that the color is harmless. These are usually food dyes. Though the dyed eggs are hard-cooked, it's best to eat them within a day or two.

One Heritage'76 project is establishment of a calendar of events for the village of San Antonio in 1776. The city's famed Farmers Market is being restored for the Bicentennial as is La Villita, which will be a prime tourist attraction, example of Spanish colonial architecture and local recreational area

San Antonio will officially kick off its Bicentennial celebration on March 20 with a performance by the Bob Hope Show. The Hope Show, sponsored by a local savings and loan association, will be staged at HemisFair Arena as a salute to the Bicentennial. The Bicentennial Committee will receive the net proceeds of the show to help finance the city's observance of the nation's 200th birthday.

The Bicentennial celebration in San Marcos is focused on the scenic San Marcos River. The Horizons '76 project, "Beauty Along the River," features a lighted trail in a naturally landscaped parkland. The one and one quarter mile trail unites three areas of city parkland. The river walk has been funded by local citizens and busines-

Two Festival U.S.A. events in San Marcos, Rio Roundelay and the Music Along the River Festival, incorporate the town's scenic Hill Country location and Mexican heritage. The Music Along the River Festival is held every April 19. Rio Roundelay is staged on Flag Day, June 14, the date established by the city council in 1972 as the day to officially observe the Bicentennial in San Marcos. Other events in the city include the Chilympiad, Fiesta de San Juan and Cinco de Mayo.

Part of Temple's Bicentennial planning focuses on the city's railroading heritage. The Santa Fe depot formerly located in Moody was moved to Temple in March, 1973, and is being restored on city property to house over 7,000 artifacts of railroading life in Temple.

As a tribute to one of the founders of the 76-year-old Scott and White Memorial Hospital, a hospital museum is being created in the log cabin once belonging to Dr. A. C. Scott Sr. The cabin has been restored on the hospital grounds and houses a collection of Dr. Scott's instruments and medical papers.

Temple residents played an important role in the planning of the Bicentennial cultural exchange between Texas and Guatemala. Initiated in 1973, the exchange program has brought artists, dancers and musicians to Texas from the Central American country.

loans. The SBA said that

according to available data, the \$10 million size standard will include the vast majority of feedlots, and that feedlots with less than \$10 million receipts account for less than one half of the total

sales of the industry.

### **Legislative Spending Cuts Deeply into State Surplus**

Comptroller Bob Bullock ssued a revised revenue orecast Friday showing that egislative spending since January has cut deeply into the state's surplus and that the question of a tax bill may be here today and not gone tomorrow

"It's as close as bark on a tree." Bullock said of the likelihood of a tax bill. "It rests solely on the priorities the Legislature sets in the next 60 days."

Bullock's revised estimate shows a drop of \$312.2 million, leaving \$3.7 billion the state can expect to be available for the 1976-77 budget.

The new estimate shows the state's surplus will be \$750.6 million at the end of this budget year on Aug. 31, down \$248.8 million since January because of emergency spending bills passed by the Legislature. "The day of the billion

dollar surplus is gone and the day of the 'no-new-tax' talk is fading fast, especially if we are serious about school finance reform," Bullock

He pointed out that with the \$3.7 billion available, there would be a safety margin of only \$100 million if



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



# Reports of Child Abuse Increasing

Reports of suspected child high school and junior high abuse and neglect in Texas school athletes from over have increased 84 percent since a public awareness campaign was launched, State Welfare Commissioner Raymond W. Vowell said today.





Dead in the mishap were Russell Jack Harrell and his 9-year-old daughter, Roxanne. Roxanne's mother is the former Virginia Brown, daughter of Reu Brown of Fort Sumner, N.M. A Deaf Smith County

sheriff's department spokesman said the two apparently were installing a 40-foot section of aluminum irrigation pipe in the field when the pipe came into contact with a 4,000 volt service line. The spokesman said the bodies were found at the base of the pipe. Sheriff's department investigators speculated that the girl was first electrocuted and that the father attempted to save his daughter.

Harrell is survived by his wife, 2 sons, four daughters, his mother, two brothers and three sisters. Roxanne was born in Apple Valley, Ca., and was a student in the Hereford school system.

Funeral services for the pair were held at 4 p.m. Monday at the First United Methodist Church in Hereford, with burial in West Park Cemetery.

While the quality and analysis of some of these liquid products are similar to commercial fertilizers, we suggest that you compare them, primarily on the basis of analysis, price per pound of nutrient and amount of nutrients actually applied if you follow their recommended rates. Discount any claim that a pound of nutrient will go further or is more readily available to the crop.

Usually, liquid fertilizers weigh around 11 pounds per gallon, meaning that there are about 182 gallons per ton. Multiplying 182 gallons by the cost per gallon will give the cost per ton. For example, a product with an analysis of 3-18-18, selling for \$3.25 per gallon, would cost about \$591.50 per ton, while commercial dry or liquid fertilizer having a 6-24-24 analysis might cost around \$200 per ton.

Also, figure the nutrients supplied per gallon and compare the suggested rate to crop requirements. One gallon of a 3-18-18 product selling for \$3.25 per gallon will cost you 76c per pound of nutrient and will supply only 41/4 pounds of nutrient per gallon. Applied at a few gallons per acre, only a small fraction of total crop requirements will be met at a very high cost.




