Ray Shirley Elected Vice President of Four Winds Group

Ray Shirley of Crowell has been elected vice president of the Four-Winds Industrial Foundation for the coming year. Shirley was elected to the office at a meeting of the

directors last week at the Gate City Electric Co-operative in Childress.

Jim Tapp of Quanah was elected as the new president; Jack Powell of Paducah was elected treasurer and R. A. Yarbrough of Childress was named executive secretary.

Foard County directors of Four Winds include Shirley, Frank Cooper, Henry Black and Robert Kincaid.

Kincaid and Black attended the Childress meeting last week. Mr. Black reported that at the meeting a discussion was held regarding the possibility of establishing a rabbit tanning and sewing plant within the Four Winds area. A group from Four Winds was scheduled to visit a rabbit slaughter plant at Anton within the next few days.

Reports Busy Week End

Sheriff Emmitt Howard reported Tuesday that his department was busy over the weekend with arrests. He said two driving while intoxicated charges were filed.

State Says School Cannot Donate Thalia Property

"No authority exists in the board to dispose thereof by gift or grant no matter how meritorious may be the proposed project," was the answer received by the Crowell school board from the Texas Education Agency following an inquiry by the local board as to whether state law would permit the board to donate the gym at Thalia to residents of the

Thalia community. A complete copy of the letter received from Chester E. Ollison, legal counselor for the Texas Education Agency follows: Mr. Larry H. Jones, Supt. Crowell Independent School District, P. O. Box 217, Crowell, Texas 79227. Dear Mr. Jones: Your letter of March 18, 1975, came to the attention of

this writer on March 21. In 1966 when, as you state, the former Thalia school district was consolidated to Crowell Independent School District, the school facilities and property of Thalia automatically became property of and subject to the control and disposition of the resulting consolidated Crowell Independent School District. Pursuant to the provisions of Article 5421c-12, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes (see H. B. 87 on page 229 of your Laws and Resolutions, T. E. A. Bulletin for 1969) and the provision of Section 23.30, authority is reposed in the Crowell school board to dispose of by sale for valid consideration any school real property held in trust whenever it may determine the same is no longer needed for school purposes. No authority exists in the board to dispose thereof by gift or grant no matter how meritorious may be the proposed project. Very truly yours, Chester E. Ollison, Legal Counselor.

School Trustee Election to Be Held Saturday in Crowell

Voters within the Crowell Consolidated Independent School District will go to the polls Saturday to elect two trustees to serve three-year terms. There are three candidates seeking the two vacancies. Incumbents Jack W. Brown and Roy M. Whitley are both asking re-election and Ward Kuehn is the third candidate. Whitley is seeking his

fourth term on the board having first been elected in 1966. Brown, who was appointed to the board to serve the un-expired term of a member who resigned, is seeking his third elective term. He ran for his first full term in 1969. In the county trustee election, Ronnie Denton is unopposed as a candidate for trustee-at-large, and Herbert

Fish has filed as a candidate for Precinct 4. Balloting will take place in the school secretary's office in the court house. Voting hours are from 8 a.m. until 7 p.m. L. A. Andrews will be election judge, and he will be assisted by Mattie Carroll, Mrs. H. M. Black and Mrs. Clarence Garrett as clerks.

Jacquelyn Brown Named Texas Family Leader of Tomorrow



Miss Jacquelyn Lee Brown, 17-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jack W.

Brown of Truscott, is Texas' Betty Crocker Family Leader of Tomorrow for 1975. Her award is announced by General Mills, sponsor of the annual educational-scholarship program.

Jacquelyn won the title and \$1,500 scholarship by competing with 22,491 seniors in 880 Texas high schools on a written knowledge and attitude test administered nationally last December. She is also eligible to win a \$5,000 scholarship in the spring national competition.

As state winner, Jacquelyn has also won for her school, Crowell High School, a 20-volume reference work, "The Annals of America" from Encyclopaedia Britan-

nica Educational Corp.

An honor student and senior class president, Jacquelyn will be the valedictorian or salutatorian of her graduating class. A National Merit commended student and saxophone player in the school band, she is also editor of the school paper. The Wildcat, a Student Council member and a 4-H junior leader, Jacquelyn will attend Lubbock Christian College with a home economics major.

This year, Jacquelyn has been named to Who's Who Among American High School Students, the Society of Outstanding American High School Students, the Society of Distinguished American High School Students and Outstanding Teenagers of America.

She is the granddaughter of Mrs. J. R. Brown and Mr. and Mrs. Edgar Jones, all of Truscott.

From April 20-25, the 51 Family Leaders of Tomorrow—representing the 50 states and the District of Columbia—will, with their faculty advisors, be guests of General Mills on an educational tour of Washington, D. C., and Williamsburg, Va. Accompanying Jacquelyn will be her homemaking instructor, Mrs. Mary Brown.

Highlighting the tour will be the announcement of the 1975 Betty Crocker All-American Family Leader of Tomorrow and three national runners-up. Chosen on a basis of personal observation and interviews during the tour, plus state-level judging results, nation winners' scholarships will be increased to \$5,000, \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000.

Mayor, Three Aldermen to Be Elected in Balloting Saturday

Qualified voters in the City of Crowell will on Saturday, April 5, elect a mayor and three members of the city council to serve for two-year

terms. Robert Kincaid is unopposed in his bid for re-election as mayor. However, the three aldermen whose terms are expiring

have all filed for re-election and that race has drawn a fourth candidate, W. N. Chatfield.

The three aldermen seeking re-election are L. N. Tole, Charles Branch and Glyndon Johnson.

Voting will be held in the city hall on the south side of the square. Mrs. L. A. Andrews will be election judge and she will appoint two clerks to assist in holding the election. Voting hours are from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Persons at least 18 years of age, residents within the city limits for at least 6 months, and qualified under state laws are entitled to vote in the election.

Preliminary Work Begins for New Rest Home in Crowell

rest home for Foard County will be built. Location is the lot west of the present city park.

A public announcement will be made as soon as an agreement between the Foard County Industrial Foundation and the persons who are planning to build the rest home is signed by representatives of both parties. This is expected to take place later this month.

Two Long-Time Texaco Employees Retire This Year

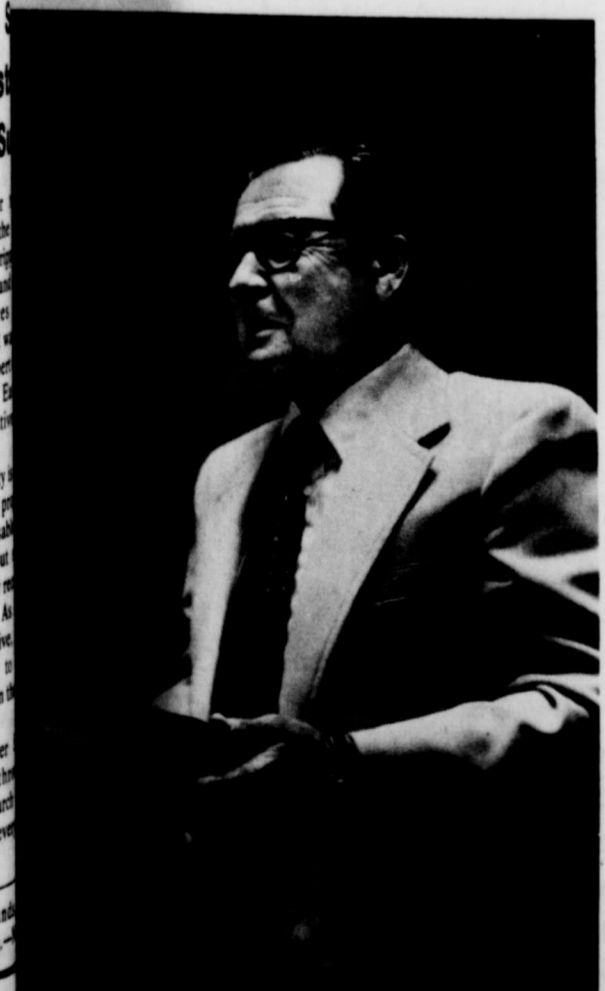
Two long-time employees of the Texaco Inc., have retired on Monday, the first of the year. J. B. Fairchild of Crowell and Virgil Dockins of Crowell, who started his career with Texaco in Foard

gas. Lake Pauline, in turn, generated electricity for Crowell and other area cities.

The gasoline plant was closed in 1943 and by 1955 all but one well was closed down. However, the Raspberry Field was developed and a new pay zone was discovered on the L. K. Johnson lease. Mr. Fairchild has been employed there all these years. Mr. and Mrs. Fairchild (the former Mablee Eddy) are the parents of three daughters.

Virgil Dockins, who was born and reared in Foard County, is the other Texaco employee who has retired recently. Mr. Dockins retired on March 1.

He began working at the Texas Company Field in Foard County February 6, 1940. After working in this county for eight years, he

Little Dribblers Win Regional Tourney at Ralls Last Week

Crowell's Little Dribblers all-stars, coached by Bill Bell and Rusty Russell copped the first place trophy in the regional tournament held at Ralls last weekend. As a winner of Region 4, Crowell will be participating this weekend in the state Little Dribblers tournament to be held at Idalou.

Crowell started the road to the championship by defeating Crosbyton last Thursday afternoon 25-20. For Crowell, John Henry McGee scored 10 points, Dan Klepper had 9, Robert Newman 4 and Carl Field 2. Then on Thursday night, Crowell defeated Seymour 41-20. McGee had 16 points, Newman 12, Klepper 9, Guy Todd 3 and John Halsell 1.

Crowell's third game was Friday afternoon with

Haskell and Crowell won this one 44-18. McGee scored 20 in this one, Klepper 12, Newman 7, Halsell and Jeff Christopher 2 each and Ronnie Wasia 1.

While Crowell had Saturday morning off, Seymour was busy in the loser's bracket, won those games and qualified to meet Crowell again, this time in the finals Saturday night. They brought their guns loaded for

bear, and almost pulled off a big win over Crowell, losing finally 25-24 in a hard-fought contest. McGee had 9 points, Klepper 7, Halsell 5 and Newman 4.

Jim Tom Smith Outstanding Farm Editor in State of Texas

Jim Tom Smith, a Foard County native and presently farm editor of the Abilene Reporter-News, has been named Outstanding Farm Editor in the 1975 Texas Conservation Awards Program and he, along with his paper, will be recognized May 2 in Fort Worth at the annual state awards program.

Smith had a few weeks earlier been selected as the outstanding Farm Editor of the Middle Clear Fork Soil and Water Conservation District headquartered in Abilene. That district had entered Smith in the state competition.

The farm editor and the Reporter-News had received recognition for the farm page on the state level in February when Smith was named winner of the Texas Veterinary Medical Associa-

tion's annual Mark Francis Award for outstanding writing in communication of veterinary medicine and in the summer of 1974 when he received the Distinguished Service Award from the Texas Vocational Agriculture Teachers Association, which is given each year at their state convention.

Smith went to the Reporter-News in August 1973 as farm editor after having been graduated from Texas A&M University with a B.S. degree in agricultural journalism. Smith will receive a Texas Plaque at the banquet in Fort Worth.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Smith of Crowell and a grandson of Mrs. J. S. Smith of Vernon.

Absentee Voting Underway for Constitutional Amendments

Absentee balloting for the special state-wide constitutional amendment election coming up on April 22 got underway in Foard County

and across the state on Wednesday, April 2, and will continue through April 18. The absentee voting will be in the office of Mrs. Cornelia

McDaniel, county and district clerk.

One of the amendments would revise and consolidate provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and would provide for a maximum state contribution to state systems of 10 per cent of the aggregate compensation paid to individuals.

Amendment No. 2 would set the salaries of members of the legislature at \$600 per month and set a per diem of \$30 during legislative sessions and a mileage allowance at the same rate provided by law for state employees.

State legislators had their last pay raise in 1960, and voters have rejected pay raises five times since then, as well as rejecting in 1970 a proposal to let a commission set legislative compensation.

An outstanding member of the high school junior class, Keith will spend the week in Sacramento with over 600 other student leaders from throughout California.

The purpose of Boys' State is to educate youth in the duties and responsibilities of American citizenship. It is a program of education: a course in practical civics, the purpose of which is to teach the youth of high school age that American form of government has many assets, that it has not outworn its usefulness.

Keith, who spent several years here before the family moved to California, transferred from Santa Maria High School to Carpinteria in his sophomore year. He was a member of the varsity baseball team which won the C.I.F. Championship last year. He played tight end on the JV football team and also on the sophomore basketball team. In 1974 Keith played several positions in football including quarterback. This past season Keith played JV basketball.

Boys State requires that the appointee be a good academic student, involved in sports or extra-curricular activities, and a good citizen.

Since the announcement of Keith's selection for Boys State, he received the following letter from his high school principal, Martin Koobation:

Don Crafton Is Speaker at Rotary Club Meeting

Rotarian Don Crafton, Minister of the Eastside Church of Christ in Crowell, was the speaker at the Wednesday, March 26, meeting of the local Rotary Club.

In reporting on his vocation, Mr. Crafton asked "what does the preacher do all week? After all, he preaches only on Sunday. How does he spend the rest of his time?"

He humorously related that if the preacher spends most of his time in his office, people think he doesn't get out and mix enough. If he gets out a great deal, people think he should spend more time in his office so they can find him when they want him. In a nutshell, "he is always gone when I want to see him."

Mr. Crafton described an evangelist as one who declares the glad tidings of salvation and a minister as a servant of God, the Church and his people.

He described the most essential attributes of a preacher as "he must preach the Bible, with devotion, zeal and fidelity."

In telling how a preacher spends his time, Mr. Crafton said a preacher must spend about eight hours studying for every hour he spends in the pulpit. He visits the physically sick, the spiritually ill, church prospects and faithful members.

Mr. Crafton is an active

member of the Rotary Club and is also editor of the weekly club bulletin, The Roteller.

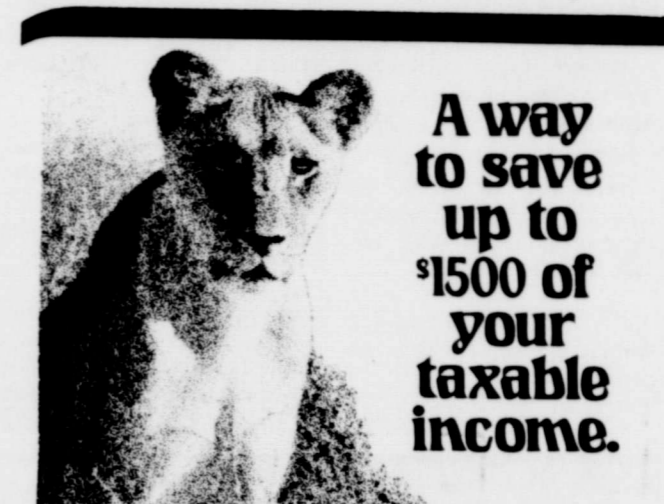

Urges New Legislation

H. L. Ayers, Jr. of Crowell, president of the Foard County Farm Bureau, has requested Congressman Jack Hightower to introduce legislation in the U.S. Congress to increase federal estate tax exemptions.

H. R. 1793, a bill which would accomplish this, has been introduced by Texas Congressman Omar Burleson of Anson. A number of other Congressmen have introduced bills similar to, or identical to, the Burleson bill.

Mr. Ayers said in a letter to the Congressman that the federal estate tax has now become an unreasonable burden on those who wish to keep the family farm or ranch in the family.

He noted that back in 1942, when the \$60,000 estate tax exemption was adopted, farm and ranch values were so low that not many people had to worry about the tax problem. Today, because of inflation and assessments based on subdivision or other development potential, even an average-size farm or ranch may have an assessed value of several hundred thousand dollars, he said.

The county FB leader said H.R. 1793 would: (1) Increase the present \$60,000 primary exemption to \$200,000. (2) Raise the marital deduction from 50 percent of the adjusted gross estate to \$100,000 plus 50 percent of the total value of the adjusted gross estate. (3) Establish a procedure whereby farm estates could elect to be assessed at their value for farming purposes rather than at fair market value.

Story Tells About Election
