Native pastures are still holding up, but are in bad need of a good rain.

Sorghum planting is sixtyfive percent complete in the southern counties and making good growth where moisture is adequate. Small acreage of early cotton is up to a weak stand in isolated areas of the district.

Pecans are setting nutlets; a moderate crop is expected. Borers are causing some damage.



Delegates Elected to State Cattlemen's Meeting in Austin

Seven delegates were named to attend the state convention of the Independent Cattlemen's Association when the Foard County ICA held a meeting Tuesday night of last week. The seven delegates named to the convention in Austin June 20-21 are J. A. Marr, Jack Welch, A. V. McCombs. John Glenn Halsell, John Cogdell, C. V. Barker and Eldon Whitman.

At last week's meeting of the local group, Duane Johnson, chairman, told local members some of the significant events concerning landowners which have happened recently, the most important of which was information that the controversial land use bill will not come before the Congress at least until next year. He told of some of the

contacts made by T. A. Cunningham and R. B. Masterson who represented the ICA during a recent week's visit to Washington D. C. Mr. Cunningham testified before the Senate and both men met with Senator John Tower to discuss the livestock industry. They also met with president Gerald Ford at a reception in Washington, and discussed livestock issues with 12 key Congressmen. Imports are the cattleman's chief concern. Johnson said information he has received is that 538,460 tons of beef will be imported from Australia this year, and this is expected to be cut to

375,000 tons next year. He said Australia has 34 million head of cattle now and this total is expected to grow to some 39 million head by next

The Foard County ICA voted at the meeting to sponsor a new program on validating entries into beef shows in Texas. Under this program, as explained to the group by Don Welch, local agriculture vocational teacher, steers which will be entered in shows will be tagged and a picture taken of the animal. Tag numbers will be sent to all the major shows in the state, so the fact that the animals are valid entries in the show can be made. Cost will be about

Welch told about some of the tricks used in entering livestock in some of the major shows. He said that certain individuals can go to a northern feed lot which has thousands of head of cattle, pick out a fine looking specimen, buy it and load it up and bring it to Texas to enter a show. He termed this as very detrimental to the livestock shows in the state.

Agriculture Commissioner John C. White praised the special efforts of six Texas legislators who are responsible for the bill to prohibit purchases of foreign beef by state and local government institutions and

Rep. George L. Preston of Paris introduced HB 318, co-sponsored by Rep. W. S. (Bill) Heatly of Paducah, John Wilson of La Grange, Susan Gurley McBeath of Del Rio, and others. It was carried in the Senate by Senators William T. Moore of Bryan and A. M. Aikin of

'The impact of this law will mean that the millions of dollars that were going to Australia, New Zealand and other foreign countries will stay in Texas," White said.

'In addition, the law assures mothers and fathers that meat now served in school cafeterias will be inspected under rigid state health requirements. Foreign meats previously imported for these programs were exempted from state health safety standards," White pointed out.

Governor Dolph Briscoe has signed the bill, which becomes law immediately. The State Department of Health is responsible for developing regulations and handling violations of the legislation.

All state institutions such as colleges, prisons, and hospitals are covered by the law. Also included are institutions supported by county and city governments, including public schools.

Dr. Stapp Is Speaker on Malpractice Insurance

Dr. Walter H. Stapp. Foard County's only medical doctor, was speaker at the Wednesday, May 14, meeting of the Rotary Club of Crowell, and used as his topic the ever-increasing cost of malpractice insurance for the medical profession.

Introduced by Rotarian Ray Brown, Dr. Stapp pointed out that malpractice insurance which only a few years ago cost about \$110 a year has now risen to from \$6,000 to \$6,500 a year.

He stated that during recent years as medicine has improved techniques for treating the sick and injured, so much more has the public come to expect from the medical profession. He cited television medical shows in which everyone is always cured as one of the contributing factors to the public's attitude.

In commenting on malpractice suits, the doctor said the average person who wins a malpractice suit receives only 16 cents out of each dollar of judgement. Some attorney's fees range up to 50 per cent of the settlement. He added that the medical profession is of the opinion that if mistakes are made and a patient wins a malpractice suit, he is justly entitled to more than 16 cents of each dollar judgment.

Dr. Stapp commented on a bill introduced into the legislature by Senator Ray Farabee which the medical profession believes is a fair bill concerning malpractice suits, and he urged those present to contact their

30 Years Ago in The News

News items below were taken from the Thursday. May 17, 1945, issue of The Foard County News:

A fire of undetermined origin destroyed the Truscott School building last Sat urday, May 12. No one was in the building at the time the fire broke out and it was discovered by Ozzie Turner who resides across the

S-Sgt. Fred Vecera, son of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Vecera, was discharged from the Army at Fort Sam Houston last Saturday and was among 150 of 2,500 veterans to be discharged on the new point system. Sgt. Vecera was the first Foard County man to receive his discharge under the Army point system for World War II veterans who have served overseas.

Quartermaster William E. Russell. 22. grandson of Mr. and Mrs W. S. J. Russell, was a member of the crew of the U.S. submarine Swordfish, which was declared lost on May 4th.

A letter from S-Sgt. Joe Eddy Jr. received by his wife here Wednesday morning stated that he had been released from a German prison camp by the British Army on April 28 and was in Belgium on his way home.

Mulching Your Garden

Gardens in Foard County are progressing quite well at the present time. One thing you may want to consider this year is that of mulching your garden.

Mulching is one of the real keys to successful vegetable gardening in Texas. It is one of the oldest gardening techinques and when properly done, can go a long way toward insuring high yields of quality vegetables. Mulching can be simply

defined as "any material spread on the garden ground to protect the roots of plants from heat, cold or drought, reduce problems with weeds and to keep fruit clean."

The types of mulches used included clear plastic, black plastic, paper, and organic mulches. Organic mulches are by far the most common. The benefits of organic

mulches occur primarily in the summer-reducing soil temperature and saving soil moisture. After the soil warms, apply organic mulches at a depth of 1 to 2 inches thick around growing plants. At the end of the season, the organic mulches should be turned under to help improve the physical conditions of garden soil.



Social Security Information

A part of the tax reduction act of 1975 provided for a special \$50.00 payment to be made to most social security and supplemental security income recipients. This will be a special one time payment paid separately from regular social security checks, and it will come directly from the Treasury Department. Persons eligible are those who had already applied for social security or supplemental security income before April, 1975 and who were due a check for March 1975. People who get both a social security and an SSI check will receive a \$50.00 special payment under only one program, not both, but if more than one member of the household is a beneficiary, each will get

Checks are being mailed out over a period of several weeks and are expected to all be out by June 25. Persons who think they are eligible should contact Social Security to report they did not get a special payment if they have not received one by June 25.

can produce top quality forage if managed properly. says a forage specialist for the Texas Agricultura Extension Service. The important factor is to use adequate amounts of fertilizer. Although it is best to follow soil test recommendations, at least 60 pounds of nitrogen should be used at each fertilizer application. Proper use of the forage is importatn when it is growing rapidly. Part of the pasture can be fenced to permit harvesting of hay. Following grazing of most leaves, stalks should be shredded and nitrogen fertilizer applied to
