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Foard Area Students on Honor Roll

Foard County had a number of students on the various honor rolls for the spring semester of Vernon Regional Junior College. The President's List consists of students enrolled for fourteen or more semester hours, exclusive of one semester hour courses, and who achieve a grade point average of four for all work attempted. First Load Wheat Is Cut Saturday

\$19,311 Allocation Received for Conservation Practices

Foard County has received an allocation of \$19,311 to carry out conservation practices under the 1975 Agricultural Program, Mrs.

Thelma Borchardt, acting county executive director of the ASCS, said last week. She added that applications will not be approved on

"First come—first served basis" but on priority and need basis.

The following eight different practices are being offered under the new program:

- Establishment of a permanent vegetative cover.
 - Improvement of vegetative cover on rangeland, brush control and cross fencing.
 - Constructing reservoirs.
 - Constructing terrace systems.
 - Constructing diversion terraces.
 - Constructing and seeding waterways.
 - Re-organizing irrigation systems.
 - Installing pipelines for livestock water.
- The local office started receiving request for these practices on Monday June 2. Mrs. Borchardt added "If you plan to carry out one of the practices, remember that you must file an application for cost-shares before the work is started."

More Rain Received in County Last Week

Turbulent weather last week brought more rain to Foard County, and some hail damage to wheat. Last Tuesday night and early Wednesday, thunderstorms brought 2.18 inches of rain here. Another .45 fell Wednesday night and .22

inch fell late Thursday afternoon.

The Thursday afternoon rain was accompanied by hail which destroyed or heavily damaged several fields of wheat southeast of Crowell.

On Tuesday night, when the 2.18 inches of rain fell, lightning struck the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Printiss Gidney on North First Street.

The bolt of lightning tripped several circuits, cracked a living room wall and knocked the clock off the wall. It burned out the transformer in the attic for the heating and cooling unit as well as the 220 fuses. In the den, it burned out the TV and electrical plug and also the antenna wire plug and knocked the plate over the plug out into the floor. It smoked the wall under the eaves where the antenna wire came into the house. It knocked the telephone box off the back wall several feet out onto the patio and cut the phone wire.

It also burned out the clock and plug in the gas cook stove.

One of the latest starts in many years for wheat harvest in Foard County saw the first wheat from the 1975 crop cut on Saturday, May 31. In a number of years past, wheat harvest has been practically finished by the last of May.

Late cold weather caused the delay in ripening of the grain. The county's first load arrived at the Farmers Elevator in Crowell at 6 p.m. Saturday. Jeff Matysek cut the 213-bushel first load at his farm near the Wilbarger County line in east Foard County. The grain had a moisture content of 13.60 and tested 60 pounds per bushel. The 7-acre patch of wheat yielded 30 bushels per acre and market price paid was \$2.94 per bushel.

Hubert Brown of the Foard County Mill reported that he received his first load at 4 p.m. Sunday, June 1. Mr. Brown added that last year he received his first load on May 17.

Tom Russell cut the Mill's first load from his place west of Crowell. The load contained 189 bushels, tested 60 pounds, and had a moisture content of 13.50. Mr. Russell received \$3.00 per bushel for this load, and Mr. Brown paid him a premium of \$50.00. Mr. Russell made about 25 bushels per acre from the field of wheat.

Wayne Gamble on May 31 brought the first load of wheat to the Three Star Grain Co. in Thalia.

More than 40 trucks were lined up at the local elevators most of Monday afternoon and past midnight, with 41 trucks still lined up when the Farmers Elevator shut down for the night at 12:30.

With only about two days of harvest thus far, elevators reported about 159,000 bushels of wheat had already been received.

Market price of wheat Tuesday was reported as from \$2.82 to \$2.86 per bushel.

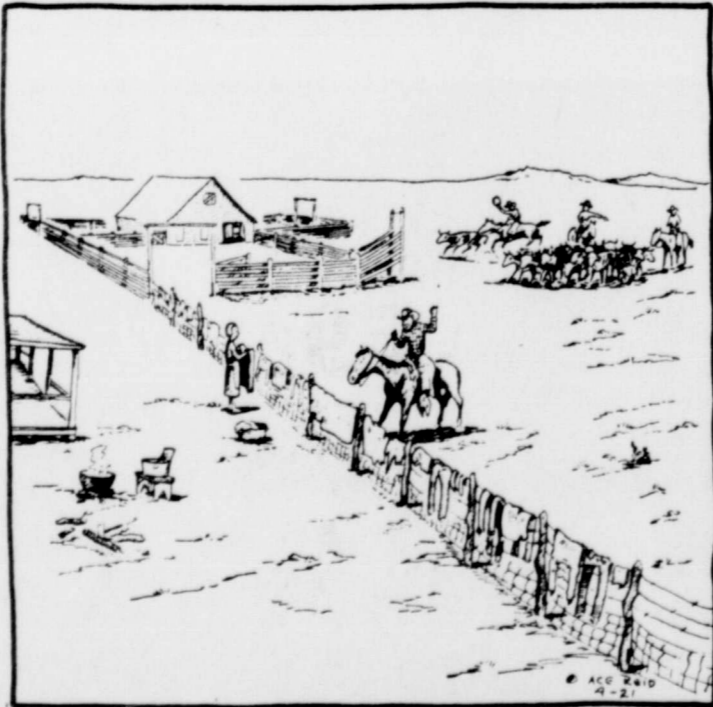
TEXAS POULTRY RECEIPTS DOWN

Texas poultry receipts dropped more than \$30 million last year compared to 1973 levels due mainly to decreased production of eggs and sharply lower turkey prices. Total cash receipts from poultry were at \$304 million in 1974, points out a poultry marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Cash receipts from eggs fell \$8.5 million, those from broilers dropped \$5.7 million, and receipts from turkeys declined almost \$16 million. Texas still ranks sixth in the nation in total poultry cash receipts.

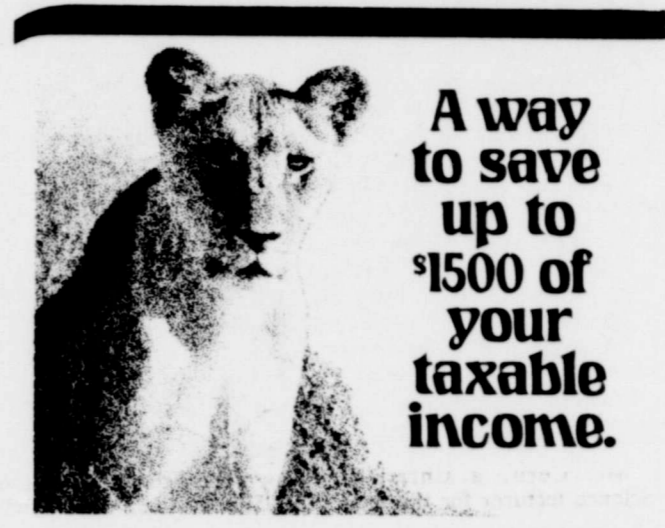

District Agent Reports

District Agent Ed Garnett has issued the following area crop report:

Rains from one inch to seven inches across the district provided adequate moisture for spring planting of cotton and grain sorghum. Grain sorghum planting is sixty percent complete where moisture is available. Cotton planting is forty percent complete in isolated counties. Heavy rains resulted in some replanting of cotton.

A large acreage of wheat has been sprayed for armyworms in the north-eastern counties. Wheat continues to mature, with large numbers of custom combine operators moving into the area. Oat and alfalfa hay harvest has slowed due to wet fields. Wheat harvest and cotton planting will get underway as soon as fields are dry enough. Livestock are in good condition. Most ranges have enough moisture to make excellent growth.

Bloom Drop in Tomatoes
Certain environmental conditions will cause tomato blooms to shed, resulting in a poor fruit set. Partial failure of flowers to develop into fruit will result in abnormal fruits which may be misshapen or catfaced.

Blossom drop is most common in tomatoes which bloom late. The usual cause for poor fruit set is high temperatures—either at night or day. Night-time temperatures above 72 degrees F. along with daytime temperatures above 90 degrees F. often result in heavy blossom drop. On the other hand, unseasonably cool weather may also cause blossoms to drop in addition to causing abnormalities in fruits.

Other factors causing lack of fruit set of abnormal fruit include unbalanced nutrition, extended periods of warm, windy weather with low humidity, extended periods of showery, cool, overcast weather in the early spring, and insects and diseases.

Therefore, providing a

balanced fertilizer and controlling insects and diseases will help in controlling blossom drop. Of course, little can be done about weather conditions.

Poor fruit set is most common in the large slicing types of tomatoes. However, such varieties as Early Giant, Spring Giant, Spring Set and Improved Summertime have the ability to set fruit during somewhat higher temperatures.

Smaller sized tomatoes



that normally do not have the fruit set problem include such varieties as Small Fry, Red Cherry, Roma and the new Texas Agricultural Experiment Station variety, Saladette.

In areas where blossom drop seems to be a common problem year after year, the best thing to do is to plant some of the smaller type tomatoes or those varieties that tend to be more tolerant to higher temperatures.

PLANTING FAILURES

By Thomas Shion
Planting failures are costly. Cost of seed, seedbed preparation, fertilizer and labor of re-planting all add to the cost. In addition, the use of the land is lost for at least a year when failure occurs. All this makes it necessary to cut failures to a minimum by doing the things that the percentage of the time will insure success.

Plan ahead. Here, thought should be given to the needs for a particular grass in the livestock operation, whether for winter or summer. Consider species which are adapted to the particular soils and climate, and choose the grass to fit a particular need.

Another important step is seedbed preparation. The seedbed should be well prepared and if seeding is to be done, be sure the seedbed is firm. If small seed are to be planted a dead litter may be needed or mulch added for protection.

Consider fertilizing the grass planting. It has been proven that grasses are greatly stimulated in growth by use of fertilizer.

Use good quality plant materials. In the case of a

sodding operation, roots should be planted soon after digging. After digging, keep the roots moist until they are planted. After planting, plan on controlling competition. This can be accomplished by shredding or spraying with chemicals. When using chemicals, follow manufacturer's recommendations.
