Frank Meason Died

Frank Meason, 92, who moved to what is now Foard County in 1887, died in the Chillicothe hospital Friday, Sept. 19. He had been a resident in a Chillicothe nursing home for about six years.

Funeral services for the pioneer resident were held at 2:30 p. m. Sunday, Sept. 21, at the First Christian Church conducted by Tom Posey, Christian Church Minister from Memphis, and Rev. Warren Everson, pastor of Bethel Church. Pianist was Mrs. Thelma Lemons and vocalists were Mrs. Lemons and Mrs. Vernon Whatley.

Interment was in the Crowell Cemetery with Womack Funeral Home in charge of arrangements. Bearers were Floyd Borchart, James Sandlin, Marion Crowell, Bill Klepper, Crews Cooper and Harold Fish.

Frank Jackson Meason was born January 10, 1883, in Plano, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Meason. He moved to Foard County with his parents when he was four years old.

Mr. Meason was a butcher by trade and had worked in the market of several different grocery stores in Crowell. He was a member of the First Christian Church of Crowell and the Crowell Masonic Lodge.

He married Katie Lee Greening in Crowell September 14, 1903, and she died Sept. 11, 1935.

Survivors include three sons, Beadie Meason of Hamlin, Goodloe Meason of Quannah and Que Meason of Burlington, Iowa; one daughter, Mrs. Mary Eva Lyons of Graham; one brother, Roy Meason of Big Sandy; and two sisters, Mrs. Maude Dial of Big Sandy and Mrs. Nellie Hazel of Gilmer.

He was preceded in death by two sons, Albert and Everett.

Council Okays Budget

Phone Company Seeks Rate Increase

The City of Crowell adopted a \$187,900 budget for the 1975-76 fiscal year when the Council held a regular meeting Tuesday night of last week. The budget calls for expenditures of \$178,494 which should give the city a small surplus at the end of next year. During the fiscal year ending last June 30, the City government failed by about \$7,000 to balance its budget.

The proposed income for the coming year will come from an anticipated sale of \$95,000 in water, \$28,000 in ad valorem taxes, \$16,000 in sewer charges, \$12,500 in garbage collection charges and other miscellaneous sources of income.

Major expenses for the city are salaries and wages, purchase of water from the Greenbelt system, along with supplies, maintenance and repair expenses.

The City Council, in other business, heard a representative from General Telephone Company of the Southwest file a proposal to raise telephone rates in Crowell by 21.2 per cent.

Proposed new rates would bring a one-party business phone up from \$16.35 per month to \$20.85, a 27 per cent increase. One-party residence phones would be raised 25 per cent up to \$8.35 from the present \$6.65. Two-party residence phones would get a 35 per cent boost up to \$7.50 from the present \$5.55. Coin phones would be raised from 10 cents to 25 cents.

The spokesman said his company wants a 8.71 per cent return on its investment and he said that it presently is receiving 5.76 per cent.

Mayor Robert Kincaid informed the phone company representative that the council will take the matter into consideration.

The council heard a brief report from a representative of a cable TV firm which wants to secure a franchise to install cable television in Crowell.

In other business, the council voted to pay current bills. Present were Mayor Kincaid, councilmen L. N. Tole, Charles Branch and Glyndon Johnson, and city secretary Wilma Cates.

Rain Falls Here

Foard County received some more moisture Sunday, and fields are literally standing in water in many parts of the county. The rains were reported to be general over the county. Accompanying the rain was a cool front which dropped the temperature to the low 50's by early Monday.

Commissioners Discuss Leasing State School Land

The Foard County commissioners court discussed the leasing of 531 acres of school land near Muleshoe at the meeting of the court held Monday morning in the court house. This land was given to the county school system many years ago by the state at which time all school districts in the state were given parcels of land. Leasing is for farming purposes and the land is leased for a three-year period, Judge Seth Halbert said.

The court also discussed hiring a Title 6 employee, but did not hire anyone Monday. Recently, the court had hired a janitor for the court house under the Title 6 program, but has no one employed

under that program at the present time. The court also authorized the publishing of an ad asking for bids to be submitted on a used farm type diesel powered tractor.



Varieties in the demonstration are Brooks, Hall, Kinman and Esser. Kinman and Esser are new high-yielding, disease-tolerant guar varieties. Kinman and Esser were both developed from the controlled natural-cross of Brooks and Mills. Both Kinman and Esser have glabrous leaves, stems and pods. Kinman is slightly taller and coarser-stemmed than Brooks but not as coarse or as tall as Hall. Esser has stronger main stems and fewer lateral branches than Brooks. Both varieties possess a high degree of tolerance to the major guar diseases, bacterial blight and alternaria leaf spot. This demonstration is located north of H. L. Ayers' home. Wildcats Defeat Memphis Cyclone

The Crowell Wildcats continued their winning ways last Friday at Memphis as they up-ended the highly-regarded Cyclone and handed the state-ranked Memphis 11 their second loss of the season. The score was 14-7 in favor of the Wildcats. Memphis had previously lost

to Childress. Two weeks ago, the Cyclone was ranked No. 4 in the state in class A Football.

Memphis came out passing early in the game behind the strong arm of quarterback Ricky Miller. The Cyclone gained three first downs before being

stopped on their first drive on the Crowell 29. The few running plays Memphis mixed in with passes failed to gain many yards against the superb Wildcat defense. Memphis' scoring drive started in the second quarter from their 12. A long pass moved Memphis out to

midfield, where Miller, mainly on short quick passes guided the Cyclone to the Crowell one, where on the third attempt he scooted across for the TD. The try for point-after was successful, with 1:54 left in the half.

The Wildcats took the kickoff following the half and behind the power running of Rocky Glasscock and David Bell, moved the ball to the Memphis 4 from which point Ronnie Swan drove into the end zone. Bell kicked the point-after.

After the Wildcat kickoff following the TD, Memphis moved the ball out to midfield before a fumble by a Cyclone back was recovered by Ernie Myers. Then, Glasscock ran for 11 yards, a pass interference call moved the ball to the Memphis 32; Bell ran for seven to the 24. From that point Glasscock took a handoff from quarterback Tommy Tampelen, ran to his right, broke several tackles and rambled into the end zone for the TD. Bell again converted the extra point.

The remaining 3:31 minutes was mostly pass defense for the Wildcats as the Cyclone tried desperately to get back in the game. Melvin Westover, Glasscock, Richard Naylor, William Bachman and Duane Daniel were again outstanding on defense and the Memphis quarterback was sacked several times in addition to being hurried in his passing.

The Foard County Agent Says...

Farmers and ranchers whose employees operate tractors are now required to train these employees on the safe operation of tractors, especially regarding the prevention of rollovers. This training shall be provided at the time of initial assignment and at least annually thereafter.

The required training became effective June 1 and is a part of the Occupational Safety and Health Act (OSHA), which also requires all agricultural tractors (except the "low profile types") to be manufactured with rollover protective structures (ROPS) and seat belts after Oct. 25, 1976. "Low profile" tractors may be operated without ROPS while being used in orchards or vineyards where vertical clearance requirements of the protective structures would interfere with normal operations.

However, even exempted tractors must have ROPS attached when operating under conditions not covered by the exemption.

The required tractor safety training includes the following operating instructions:

1. Securely fasten the seat belt if the tractor has a ROPS.
2. Where possible, avoid operating the tractor near ditches, embankments and holes.
3. Reduce speed when turning, crossing slopes, and on rough, slick or muddy surfaces.
4. Stay off slopes too steep for safe operation.
5. Watch the direction, especially at row ends, on roads and around trees.
6. Do not permit others to ride.
7. Operate the tractor smoothly—no jerky turns, starts or stops.
8. Hitch only to the drawbar and hitch points recommended by the tractor manufacturer.

9. When the tractor is stopped, set the brakes securely and use the park lock if available.

Operators of tractors equipped with ROPS are required to wear seat belts to keep them inside the protective structure in case of a turnover. Operators of tractors without ROPS should not wear seat belts.

LIVESTOCK FEED BEING STUDIED

Texas Agricultural Experiment Station researchers are studying how ruminant livestock can use feed protein more efficiently. Not all protein eaten will benefit an animal directly. Some protein is consumed by bacteria in a ruminant's stomach, and work is under way to divert more of this protein to the animal's benefit. Different types of protein are affected differently by the bacteria so that the protein breakdown varies.

Classes in New LVN School Set to Start October 20th

The North Texas State Planning Region Consortium funded the Crowell ISD's Greenbelt School of Nursing on July 25, 1975, to train twenty-one CETA-eligible LVN students. Classes are

expected to begin on Monday October 20, 1975. The Texas Employment Commission will continue to interview applicants until September 30, 1975, for this equal opportunity employment and training program.

Funding for instructional costs and allowances was provided via special revenue sharing monies distributed under the auspices of the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act of 1973. Applicants must be CETA-eligible, i.e., men and women interested in a year's LVN training must be economically disadvantaged

or unemployed, with at least a tenth grade education or GED Certificate. The training will involve about 2,000 hours of class work combined with clinical experience, and all people involved in the training will receive a basic allowance based on the minimum wage for every hour in training. The minimum wage is now \$2.10 and will rise to \$2.30 on January 1, 1976. Optional allowances may also be paid to defray some of the costs of childcare and transportation while in training.

The Texas Joint English Committee for School and College is the professional English organization for college English teachers and English and Language Arts teachers in the public and private schools.



Environmental Hearing Oct. 15 In Vernon on Brine Control Plan

Another in a series of public meetings which have been conducted over a period of several years on the Red River Chloride Control Project will be conducted at 9:30 a. m. Wednesday, Oct. 15, in the empire room of Wilbarger auditorium in Vernon, Col. Anthony A. Smith, district engineer for the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers at Tulsa, Ok., has announced.

Similar meetings are also scheduled at 9:30 a.m. Thursday, Oct. 16, in Denison, and at 9:30 a.m. on Friday Oct. 17, in Shreveport, La.

"An environmental statement is being prepared for the Red River Chloride Control Project in compliance with the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969," the Colonel said. "The project objective is to improve water quality in the

Red River by reducing natural chloride emissions in the upper reaches of the basin.

"The purpose of the public meetings is to discuss the plan of improvement and to receive new and additional material concerning the environmental impacts of the project."

The project includes a brine control dam near Copper Breaks Park just south of the Pease River near Crowell, and a brine control dam near Truscott, as well as collection areas, pumping stations and pipelines on forks of the Pease and Wichita Rivers, and pump stations and collection areas on the Red River near Esteline.

Col. Smith said that interested persons and organizations will be given an opportunity to speak relative to the environmental plan, which will be given

widespread distribution prior to the meeting and will be available at locations to be announced.

The Colonel listed as the order in which individuals will be called:

Governor of State or his personal representative, U. S. Senators and Congressmen or their representatives, individuals who have indicated on their attendance cards that they wish to make a statement, organizations, Federal, State or local agencies.

The meeting will be opened for presentation of anyone's views and will be followed by a question and answer period.

He said that if it appears that the public meeting will last all day, or well into the afternoon, a recess for lunch will begin at 12:30 p.m.

Case of Polio Reported in Texas

The last confirmed Texas case of polio was reported from Amarillo, Texas on November 27, 1972.

On July 5, 1975, a one-year old female from El Paso, Texas with flaccid paralysis of both lower extremities, left upper arm, and some weakness of the neck muscles was diagnosed by her private physician as having paralytic polio. She was hospitalized immediately for emergency care. Stool and serum tests reported by the Texas Department of Health Resources Laboratory confirmed the diagnosis of polio, type 1. The child had never received immunizations. This ends two years and eight months without a case of paralytic polio in Texas.

Parents are advised to review their children's immunization records and have them updated if necessary. Polio immunizations are started at two months of age.

Cost-Share Rate Is Increased by RC&D

Four Winds RC&D Coordinator Von Kleibrink was notified by Ed Thomas, State Conservationist, that RC&D cost-share rate for critical area treatment has been increased from 75 to 80 percent. This change was effective September 15, 1975.

This means that the treatment of areas adjacent to county roads will cost the counties 20 rather than 25 percent of the construction

cost. Critical area treatment being planned on the Crowell School Campus will also be affected by this change.

Planning is in progress on the Cottle County Measure Plan. Eroded areas along and adjacent to county roads will be shaped, smoothed, and vegetated. Three major erosion areas are planned for critical area treatment. Several smaller problem areas are being considered by Cottle County to include

in the plan. This project is scheduled to be the first to obligate Four Winds RC&D cost-share funds. Work on this project should begin early in 1976.

Work is being done in the counties of Childress, Foard, and Hardeman to develop measure plans similar to that of Cottle County. Completion of these measure plans will follow closely after that of Cottle County.

RESEARCH LEADS TO COTTON VARIETIES



REPORTING HOUSE PLANTS
Reporting house plants prepares them for the winter months as well as improves their overall performance. And now is a good time to take care of this task, says a landscape horticulturist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Use a good soil mix of two parts each of garden loam and peat moss and one part of sand. Heat the mix in a preheated oven at 200 degrees F. for 30 minutes to kill disease organisms, insects and weed seeds. Use clean tools and pots when reporting plants. Clay pots can be sterilized the same as the soil mix.

Cattlemen have several alternatives to consider in the next few months in dealing with the abundant supply of calves on hand, points out a livestock marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. 1. Sell calves now. 2. Winter pasture the calves and sell them in the spring. 3. Rough winter the calves and sell them in the spring. 4. Feed the calves to slaughter weight. There are advantages and disadvantages to each of these alternatives, and the cattleman's decision must be based on his own particular set of circumstances. Much will hinge on market prices and the cost of feedgrains.
