## Texans Vote Tuesday on New Constitution

### Wildcats Go to Knox City Friday for District 7-A Contest

The Crowell Wildcats will be facing the No. 9 rated Class A football team in the State when they travel to Knox City Friday to take on

the defending district champion Greyhounds. Game time is 7:30 and a large delegation is expected to follow the Wildcats to Knox

City for this important 7-A contest.

Knox City has a 6-1 season record and 2-0 in district. Their only loss was to Quannah 21-0, when fumbles cost the Greyhounds numerous scoring opportunities. They defeated Munday 13-0 last Saturday night and also have defeated Haskell in district competition. Non-district wins were over Archer City, Rochester, Throckmorton and Windthorst.

Quarterback Jimmy Don Moore guides the potent KC offense. Speedy backs Charlie Flye and Jerry Stamps, in addition to carrying the ball, are often targets of Moore's passes and another favorite receiver is end Ricky Bishop.

The Wildcats and Greyhounds have identical records. Crowell lost its only game to Electra, while posting district wins over Paducah and Aspermont. Non-district wins were over Quannah, Seymour, Memphis and Chillicothe.



**E. C. King Serves as Deacon for Half Century**

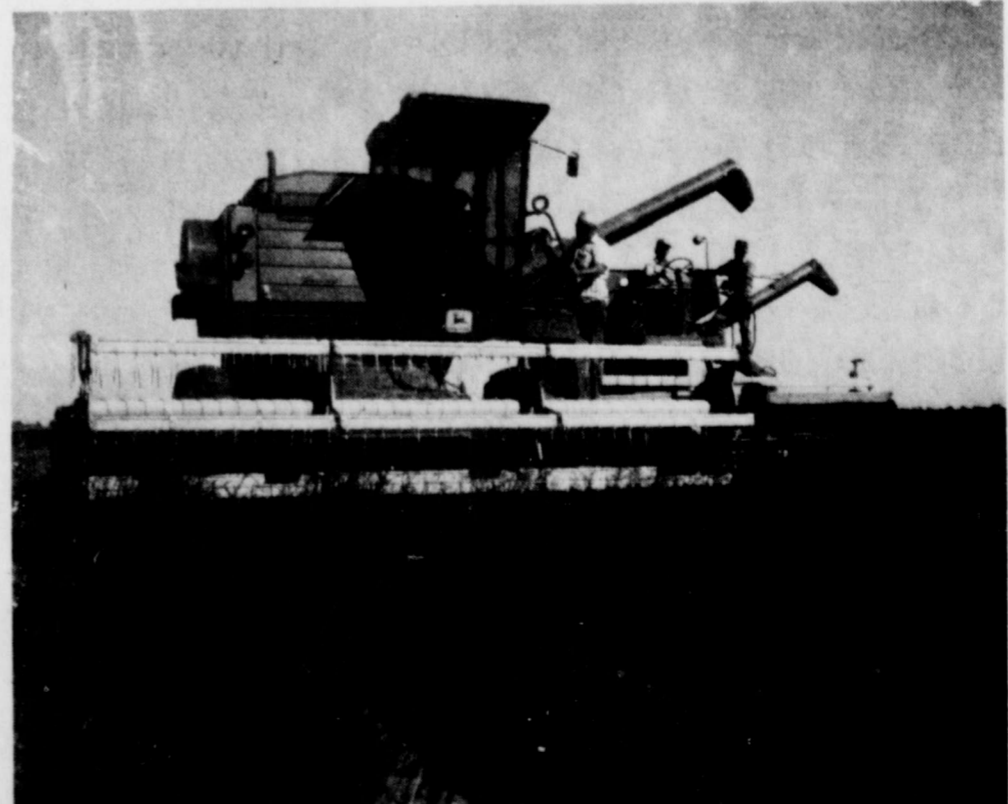

Delegates participated in sessions covering historical

research, museum exhibit planning, preservation and restoration, the legal responsibilities of historical groups, and the recent archeological testing program at Lake Nacogdoches.

At the Friday evening banquet, Foard County was one of 46 counties in Texas to receive the Distinguished Service Award. The county received an engraved plaque and each member of the committee received a certificate signed by Gov. Dolph Briscoe, Mrs. Wesley B. Blankenship, Chairman, Texas Historical Commission, and Floyd O. Schneider, President, Texas Historical Foundation.

### Smaller Rate Increases Are Requested by Phone Company

Crowell City Council rates.

At the September council meeting, Cornelius requested rate raises averaging 21.2 per cent. Tuesday night at the council meeting, he

lowered the company's requested rate hikes where they will average 10.1 per cent.

The company requested one-party business rates be raised from \$16.35 to \$18.55 per month. Previous request was for \$20.85.

Present request for one party residence is \$7.40. Original request was for \$8.35 and the present rate is \$6.65.

For a two-party residence phone, the company has lowered its request from \$7.50 to \$6.70. Present rate is \$5.55.

The council took no action on the proposed rate increases.

The city council expressed its appreciation to the county which furnished and hauled 189 loads of gravel for the streets approaching the new rest home.

A financial report furnished council members at the meeting showed that the city had purchased \$4,240.59 worth of water from the Greenbelt system during September.

Present for the meeting last week were Mayor Robert Kincaid, and Councilmen James H. Gillespie and Guy Todd Sr. and city secretary Wilma Cates.

The second quarter of the school year will begin Monday, November 10.

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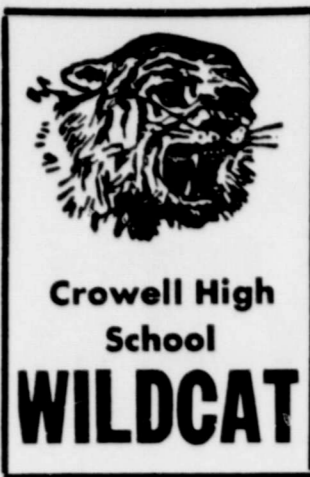

 Crowell has just been hit by a rash of T. V. I. (Television interference.) We can clear it up... but only if everyone co-operates. Hit hardest are areas around the homes of M. L. Hughston, Fred Youree, Jeff Bruce and Warren Everson.  
 Most usually this interference is caused by a TV booster. The input lead is too close to the output lead, thus making it oscillate and become virtually a small transmitter. On several occasions we have come close to finding the offending booster, only to have it clear up completely for several days.  
 About the only positive way we have of finding the "little transmitter" is in chopping-off electric services in houses...after we've determined (with a portable TV in our truck) where the herringbone pattern is strongest.  
 Do you have a booster in your home? Or does your CB unit bother channel 3 or 6 on your TV? If so, give us a call and we'll clear it up for you. (Usually it only means re-locating leads or using a little aluminum foil around a lead.) Can we turn off your current to determine whether or not you have something in your home that is radiating?

**Requirements Listed for Distinguished Service Awards**

Foard County had one of the county historical commissions which received Distinguished Service Awards for outstanding local preservation programs during the 1975 annual meeting of the Texas Historical Commission in Nacogdoches, October 24-25.  
 County historical programs had to qualify in 16 different areas over the last year to receive the state recognition.

To receive the commendation, county historical commissions must present a minimum of six programs on local history to other civic groups; sponsor or help plan at least three conducted historical tours; conduct at least one phase of an oral history program; and complete at least one phase of any one of several historic preservation projects such as a written county history, restoration of structures, or the establishment of county archives; among other requirements.

## Wildcats Defeat Paducah Dragons Here Friday Night

The Crowell Wildcats hosted the Paducah Dragons last Friday night in the second district game for both teams and the Cats continued their unblemished 7-A record by defeating the visitors 34-6.

Crowell's defense held the Dragon attack practically helpless with Paducah picking up only 22 yards on the ground. Duane Daniel, Melvin Westover, William Bachman, Norman Hopper and Rocky Glasscock were outstanding on defense and the Wildcats were able to contain Paducah all-starter Danny Garrett except one

time. Garrett took a Cat kickoff and galloped from his own 25 to Crowell's end zone for the only score of the night for Paducah.

Following Crowell's kickoff opening the game, Michael Woodley galloped through the Wildcat kickoff team for yardage before safety David Bell brought him down on the Dragon 35.

Three plays later, Myron Halencak intercepted a Paducah pass which had been tipped by Ronnie Swan, and Halencak brought it back to the Paducah 48. Six plays later on the Dragon 28, quarterback Tommy Tاملن fired a perfect pass to Ernie Myers who went on into the end zone for the TD. David Bell boomed it through the uprights for the extra point. Soon after that, Glasscock galloped 47 yards to give Crowell a first and goal on the 9. Bell carried it in and then added the point after. Garrett took the ensuing kickoff and made the Paducah TD.

With 7:04 left in the half, Glasscock took the ball over for a TD from the 1, following power running plays of both he and Bell. Bell added the point-after to make the half time score 21-6.

The second half had barely got underway when Duane Daniel intercepted a Dragon screen pass, but no scoring resulted. A little later, Garrett intercepted a Wildcat pass and on the very next

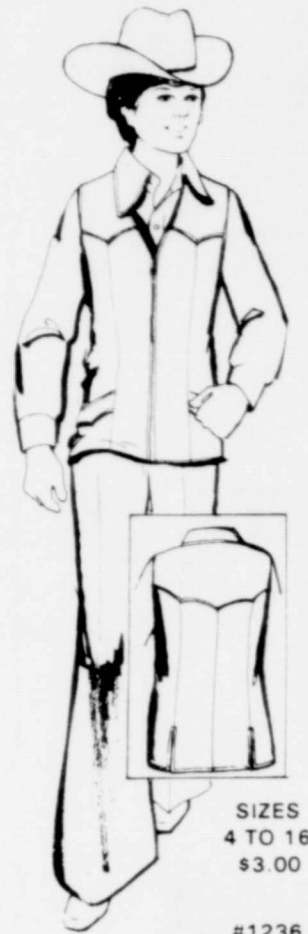
play Bachman intercepted a Dragon pass. Bell made a fine run, got hit late, and received more yards and it's first and goal at the 6. He then added the TD and extra point.

Ernie Myers also intercepted a Paducah pass. No score resulted from this possession and shortly afterwards, Garrett fumbled and Glasscock recovered on the Dragon 28. Two plays later, Bell rambled again into the end zone from 15 yards out. The try for extra point failed to leave the score at 34-6.

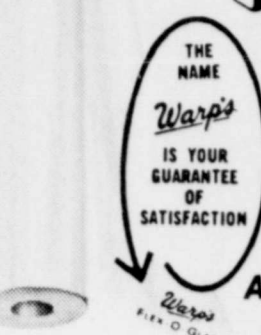

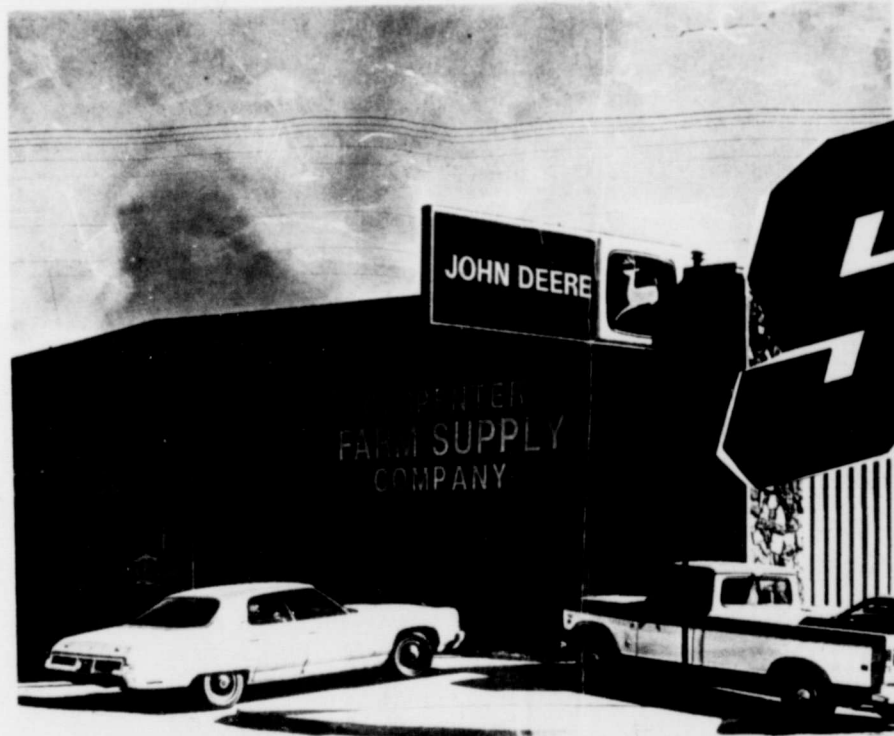

## Rep. Heatly Urges Constitution Defeat

State Representative W. S. "Bill" Heatly of Paducah said today the proposed new State Constitution would create more problems than it would solve and urged Texans to vote against all eight propositions on the Nov. 4th ballot.

"We do not need a full-time legislature," declared Heatly. "I think that would cost the taxpayers just about as much, on a proportionate basis, as our full-time Congress. And that really is what Proposition 1 on the ballot would mean."

"Proposition 2 would abolish our Court of Criminal Appeals and force the Supreme Court to hear appeals in both civil and criminal cases. That can only result in slowing down the judicial process."

"You can go down the list, and if you study each proposition carefully, you will discover that this entire rewrite of the Constitution is designed to reduce the people's control over their State Government."

"I always have had great faith in the legislature, but I don't have as much faith in any group of 181 people as I would have to have in order to vote for this proposed Constitution. And even if I did trust the present Legislature with all of the massive powers this Constitution would give to it, I would have to balk when I realized that the complexion of the legislature can be changed by the voters every two years."

"We have the best State Government in the Nation now, in my opinion. I do not think we could improve it by changing the Constitution to remove the ceiling on Welfare spending, to remove the ceiling on taxes required to finance the debts of Local Government, to remove the ceiling on the State's contributions to state employee and teacher retirement funds -- and, most of all, to remove the right of the people to set the ceiling on the salaries of Legislators."

"If we really do need to do some of the things this new Constitution would authorize, such as relaxing the present prohibition against lotteries, let's do them one at a time -- not in one fell swoop."

"I don't think the people of Texas are ready to turn over to the Legislature the power to set itself into Session and set the salaries of its own members and at the same time give it almost unlimited authority to regulate health care, environmental projects, land reclamation, navigation, recycling of wastes, energy resources, gambling, and state employee and teacher retirement funds."

"The present Constitution has been construed and interpreted by the Supreme Court of Texas and we know

what it means. If the new one should be adopted it would cost a tremendous amount of money and would be a half-century before we would know how the Supreme Court would construe and interpret the new Document."

"This is why I agree with Governor Briscoe that all eight propositions on the November 4th ballot should be defeated," said Mr. Heatly.

Since mums need short days to initiate flowering, they should be planted where they will not be affected at night by yard lamps or street lights. The plants should be thoroughly soaked every few days, with care used to avoid wetting the leaves.
