Wildcats Cinch Play-Off Berth with Win over Haskell Last Friday

Crowell and Rotan to Meet in Bi-District

Crowell and Rotan will meet Saturday morning with Rotan officials to set the time and place for the upcoming bi-district football clash between the two school's football teams. The game will be played at Stamford beginning at 7:30 p. m. on Friday night, November 21. Crowell Wildcats won District 7-A while the Rotan Yellowhammers came through as winner of District 8-A. Ironically, the two teams will both be in District 7-A next school year.

This is the first time for Crowell to win a district football championship since 1966 when Thayne Amonett was CHS coach. That year, the bi-district game was played with the Keller Indians at Jacksboro.

Incidentally, Rotan also won its last district title in 1966.

Powder Puff Football Set for Monday

Girls from the Crowell High School Wildcat Band will make up the teams for a Powder Puff football game to be played at Dick Todd Field Monday night, Nov. 17, beginning at 7:30 p. m. Sponsored by the Band Boosters, the game will be a flag football contest with Roy Whitley and Bill Bell coaching the opposing teams. Admission of 50c and \$1.00 will be charged. The concession stand will be operated by the band boosters.

Officiating will be Sue Field and Billye Gidney.

Proceeds will go to the band booster fund to help with the expense of the Honor Band's trip to San Antonio next February.

The Crowell High School Wildcat football team, coached by Printiss Gidney and Randall Ryan, earned the right to represent District 7-A in the play-offs by defeating the Haskell Indians here last Friday night and should the Wildcats win over the Munday Moguls Friday night, will become the district champions. Final score of the hard-fought contest with Haskell was 14-6.

Haskell committed seven turnovers... "and therein lies the tale," Marion Crowell said in his newsletter. Four times Haskell lost the ball to Crowell on fumbles and three times the Wildcats intercepted their passes.

The Indians fumbled the first Wildcat punt, and it was Crowell's ball on their 26. A Wildcat try for a field goal followed from the Haskell 13, but it was wide of the mark. Soon thereafter, the Wildcats recovered a Haskell fumble on the Indian 13 yard line from which point it took Crowell five plays to score. David Bell went in from the 2

yard line for the TD and then kicked the point-after. This score came with only 57 seconds left in the first stanza.

In the second quarter, Bell intercepted an Indian pass on about his own 25 yard line, and he returned it to the Haskell 40. But a clipping penalty nullified the run and pushed Crowell back to its own 10.

Just before the half was ending, Crowell had the ball on the 50, first down and 10. On the first play, Ronnie Swan, who was a "demon" on offense all night, ran to his right, picked up two enthusiastic blocks, and he was off for the races. Bell kicked the point-after and it was 14-0 with 41 seconds left in the half.

Haskell played tough defense in the second half and got their offense rolling for their touchdown. Rocky Glasscock, Wildcat punter, kicked out of bounds on the Haskell 3 to put the Indians in what looked like a bad predicament. Haskell's quarterback, on the first play, dropped back and threw the ball out almost to mid field where Rex Pittman gathered in the pignide and went on down to the Crowell 30 before he was wrestled down. Halfback Chris Love got the Indian touchdown on an 11 yard gallop. Try for two points failed.

The Wildcats were held without a first down in the final quarter. Haskell moved the ball to midfield where Swan intercepted a pass. Later, with 7 seconds left, they passed from their own 20 and Swan again intercepted to halt any further Haskell drive. Swan carried for 75 yards in this game, his best offensive effort of the season. Bell continued his hard running, as did Glasscock, the other Wildcat back.

In fact the entire Wildcat squad turned in good offensive and defensive efforts in this important contest.

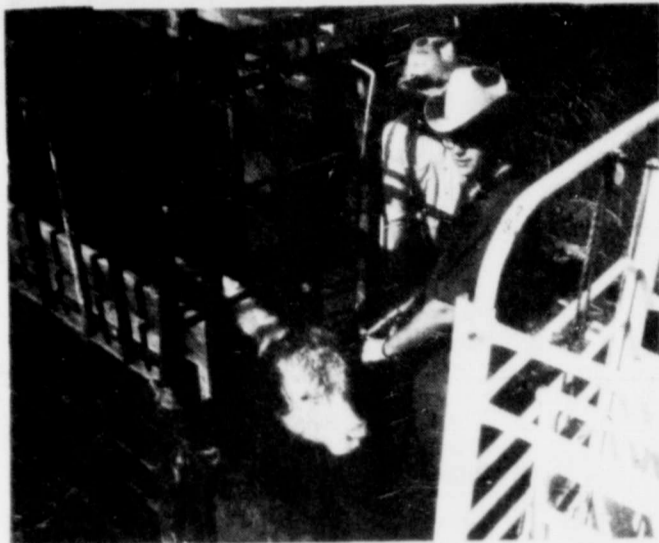

The Foard County Agent Says...

The peach tree borer, one of the most destructive enemies of peach and apricot trees, feeds primarily in the trunk near the ground line



GROWTH STIMULATOR—Pictured above are Whitney Rounds, area extension livestock specialist, Don Bill Statser and W. F. Statser. Forty-nine out of fifty-six stocker steers with an average weight of 398 lbs. were implanted with a growth stimulator to increase gain. This is part of the result demonstration program being carried out in Foard county. The cost of the implant is approximately 80 cents a head. Calves which are implanted in the past have gained 15-20 lbs. more than those which do not receive the implant. The calves will be weighed during early February to determine the economic benefits from the implant program and possibly implanted again at that time. FAITHFUL MEN

and during its feeding activity the tree may be girdled resulting in its death. Infested trees will have large masses of gum around the base of the trunk mixed with a brownish frass. The gum and frass exudes from the

wounds that are caused by peach tree borers.

The yellowish-white peach tree borer larvae varies in size up to 1 1/4 inches in length. There is only one generation of peach tree borers each year. However, adult emergence and egg laying activity extends from the middle of May to early October.

Control of peach tree borers can be obtained by placing paradichlorobenzene (PDB) crystals around the base of the tree. These crystals should be applied during the period of October 20 to November 15 or before soil temperatures drop below 55 F. The crystals should be applied when the soil is dry. Weeds should be removed from around the base of the tree and the soil leveled 1 foot from the tree trunk. Place the PDB crystals in a narrow groove encircling the tree about 2 inches from the tree trunk. Care should be taken to keep any of the crystals from coming in direct contact with the tree. Clean soil should be placed over the crystals so as to form a 6 to 8 inch high, cone-shaped pile around the base of the tree. This soil should be removed in late March or early April.

For effective control of peach tree borers use 1/2 ounce of PDB crystals for 2-3 year old trees; 3/4 ounce for trees 4-5 years old; and 1 ounce for mature trees. PDB crystals can be used in the home garden or in the commercial orchard to effectively control the peach tree borer.

School Board Seeks Bids on New Agriculture Pavilion

At the November meeting of the school board Monday night, a committee turned over more than \$14,000 to be spent in constructing a 70x100 foot building on the school campus to house the annual project show along with other events during the year. This money was raised by donations from local and area residents and businesses.

The board is advertising for bids in this weeks paper for construction of the structure with the bid opening set for November 21.

Members of the committee which met with the board Monday night were George Self, Glen Swan, W. F. Staiser, Don Daniel, Eldon Whitman and Don Welch.

After a meeting with David Seitz, head of the local Soil Conservation Service, and Von Klibrink, RC&D director from Quanah, the board voted to make a pre-application and sign a letter of intent with Nortex Regional Planning Commission for a \$20,150 program of wind and water erosion control on the local campus. The program will involve the planting of trees, shrubs and grass and will probably include a considerable amount of curbing. Of the total involved, Klibrink said RC&D would pay \$16,120 with the school cost being \$4,030.

In other action, the board approved the payment of current bills, and voted to buy a motor for one of the school buses.

The board voted to leave unchanged its sick leave policy of five days per year with no limit on accumulation, and discussed business absences for faculty members.

Finally, the board discussed the purchase of a water softener for the school boiler.

Adelphian Club Has Guest Evening

The Walter Ramsey home was the scene of the annual Guest Evening for the Adelphian Club on Thursday, November 6.

After a delicious turkey dinner, Dr. Arthur F. Beyer, professor of Biology at Midwestern University since 1950, told of the 1975 Summer International Botanical Congress which was held in the Soviet Union at Leningrad. Dr. Beyer was introduced by Walter Ramsey.

Accompanied by his wife, Ruth, they visited his ancestral home, Norway, and many other places of interest before attending the week-long congress for Botanists from around the world.

The Russians were glad for the opportunity to host the congress as it was the first that they had been allowed to attend, and may very well be the last. While they encourage visitors to their country, they, themselves, cannot leave as they are not allowed to take from their country more than three rubles which would be about \$1.44. Outsiders go in only with tour groups. The visiting scientists were a special group and enjoyed special privileges. Only fourteen roads lead in to all the Soviet Union and each entrance is jealously guarded.

Dr. Beyer showed slides which showed the vastness of the Soviet Union. It was drab with little or no beauty. There is no wealth, no poverty; everyone is the same. There was no gaiety and laughter on the lonely streets. Dr. Beyer said that he was sure he did not see one person driving his own automobile. In all the city, there are four service stations. There are no homes as we know them, in Leningrad, a heavily industrial city of 4,000,000 rebuilt by American generosity following World War II. It is the Hero-City, the gateway to all of Russia, a fact which makes its citizenry very proud.

Dr. and Mrs. Beyer saw no old men as the men were killed in German attacks during World War II. Neither did they see any children as they were all in summer camp to be indoctrinated politically.

Since the people drove out their tyrannical czar in 1917, Communists seized control of the government taking over every phase of national life. With no regard to individual rights, they embarked on a ruthless attempt to catch up with the rest of the world. A student has no choice in the

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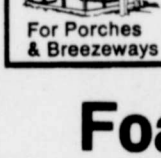

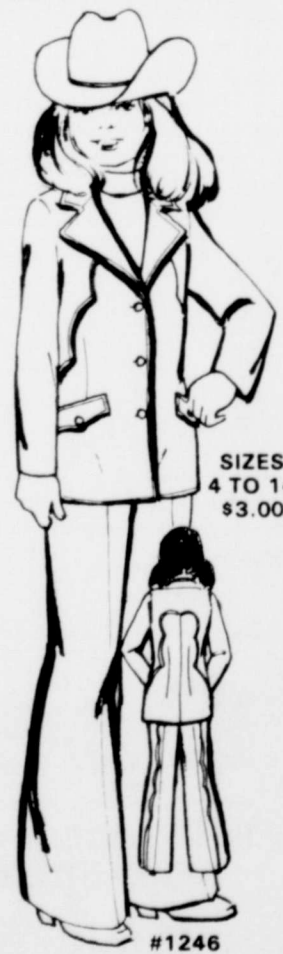

Truscott Receives Bi-Centennial Flag

The City of Truscott became the fifth unincorporated town in Texas to receive a bi-centennial flag and certificate Sunday night. In appropriate ceremonies at the Truscott community center, Knox County Judge Sam Clonts presented the bi-centennial certificate to Mrs. Curtis Casey, Truscott bi-centennial chairman, and State Rep. W. S. Heatly of Paducah presented the bi-centennial flag to the community.
Mrs. Casey was master of ceremonies for the program which included a style show narrated by Mrs. Newell Looney. Modeling clothes of by-gone days were Misses Gail Bullion, Brenda Greening, Bernadette Greening and Tracy Shaw and Mmes. Don Daniel, J.R. Brown and Steve Gray.
Mrs. Jack W. Brown gave a history of that area and said that Coronado may have passed through the Truscott area hundreds of years ago. Home for Apache and Wichita Indians for many years, the last Indians were seen in the area in 1877. Mrs. Brown said the area was surveyed in 1870, and Truscott was first named China Lake, and was located about where the present Truscott cemetery is. When the railroad came, the town was moved to be near the tracks. Truscott was at one time in Baylor County, and in the 1880 census, George Truscott, 24, his wife and son and his father were listed as the town's inhabitants. It was also that same year that the Moodys, Jim and Pete moved to the area, to be followed by many others in years to come. The last graduating class at Truscott

High School was the class of 1941-42 and in 1949, the Truscott school consolidated with Crowell.
Rep. Heatly, in his remarks, praised the residents of Truscott and all of Texas for defeating the proposed new constitution last week, and he also gave some historical information about the Truscott area. He was introduced by Knox County Judge Sam Clonts of Knox City.
Following the program, a sandwich supper was served to those attending the program.
