\$5,586.71. The city sales tax of 1 per cent is collected along with the 4 per cent state sales tax. It is an equitable form of taxation in which everyone who buys anything (and this catches most of us) pays his

fair share. City of Crowell officials have stressed the need for additional money to meet the effects of inflation and also for some much-needed improvements.




