Over Million Bushels Wheat Harvested

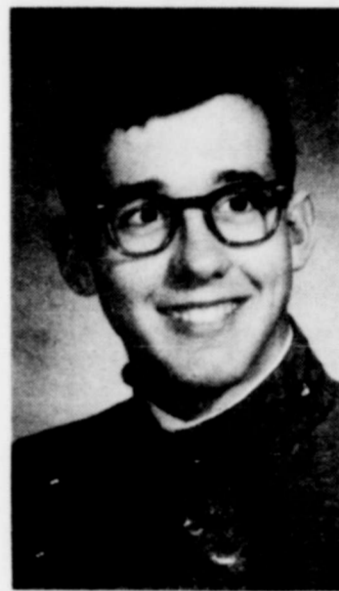
43,000 Acres Foard Wheat Damaged by Hail

A total of 43,000 acres of Foard County wheat had been reported up to Monday to have been hailed out or have a "low yield" which is

less than two-thirds of normal yield, according to information released Monday by Joe Sabbe, executive director of the Foard

County ASCS office. Sabbe said that Foard producers who harvested any of the hail damaged wheat should bring to the local ASCS office a statement from the elevator giving the number of bushels harvested for determining low yield eligibility.

Sabbe says his office has still received no authorization from the state office to make payments, but they will be made as soon as authorization is received. He said that on the hailed out and low yield wheat, the ASCS will pay 76 cents per bushel on what the farmer didn't make. Figures on the average yield for every farm in the county are on file at the ASCS office and these figures are used in determining low yield and hailed out payments.

COMMISSIONERS MEET

At the first meeting of the month of the Commissioners Court Monday morning, the court approved accounts and paid current bills.

In spite of a hail three weeks ago that completely obliterated thousands of acres of wheat across the southern part of Foard County, harvest of the 1976 crop yielded over one million bushels of the new grain.

A check with the county's three elevators Monday morning showed that up to that time, 1,111,180 bushels of wheat had been delivered. There are only a few scattered patches of grain yet to be cut.

Practically all of the combine crews and their equipment have moved on north to continue the grain harvest, and Foard County farmers are busy plowing their fields.

With the ASCS office announcing that some 43,000 acres of Foard wheat were hail damaged or destroyed, that gives the remaining 57,000 acres harvested about a 19-bushel-per-acre average.

Market price of the wheat has ranged in the \$3.50 per bushel area most of the harvest season, and \$3.47 was the quoted price Monday.

Test weight of the 1976 crop has been good, but some of the wheat was bleached from its usual red color to yellow, and this grain was docked because the importing nations had contracted for hard red winter wheat.

Showers Fall in County Sunday

About a week of 100-degree-plus temperature readings each afternoon was brought to an end late Sunday as a cool front pushing through from the northwest brought the milder temperature along with some rain to different parts of the county.

The government gauge in Crowell registered .57 inch. In the Margaret community, from one-half to one inch was reported. Felix Taylor reported 1/2 inch at his place west of Rayland, and about a half inch was reported in the west part of the county. Only about .3 inch was reported south of Crowell.

With the wheat practically all cut, the rain was a welcome relief from the heat of the past week.

Vernon College to Take Over Operation of Local LVN School

Vernon Regional Junior College has announced that it will assume operation of the Greenbelt School of Vocational Nursing in Crowell, Texas, beginning with a fifteen student August 30, 1976 class.

The transfer of the program from the Crowell Independent School District was accomplished through the cooperative efforts of the Crowell ISD, VRJC, the Texas Education Agency, and the Texas Board of Vocational Nurse Examiners, with the endorsement of the county officials in Wilbarger, Foard, Hardeman, Cottle and Childress counties.

Classroom and office facilities in Crowell, plus hospital facilities in each of the counties except Childress, will be utilized in the training program. Quotas assuring student representation from all five counties have been established.

Applications for the August 30 class are now being accepted by VRJC, with July 10, 1976, being the application deadline. All individuals 17 years of age or older, with a high school diploma or G.E.D. equivalency, are eligible for consideration for admission to the class.

Applications may be secured from the Registrar's office at VRJC, Texas Employment Commission offices in Vernon, Paducah and Childress, or the Manpower Coordinator's office in the Wilbarger County courthouse.

In the past, only economically disadvantaged applicants have been considered for the Greenbelt school. Since it is anticipated that there will be Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (CETA) funds available for less than half of the fifteen students in the August 30 class, applicants will not need to be CETA

eligible to apply for the class.

Class members with a financial need, and who are not funded through CETA, will be encouraged to apply for financial aid through VRJC's several financial aid programs.

Horse Club Members to Enter Show

A number of Foard County 4-H Horse Club members will participate in the upcoming District 4-H Horse Show to be held at the Santa Rosa Arena June 25 and 26. This is the first time 4-H members from Foard County will participate in the District Show. Members earned the right to go to the District 4-H Horse Show by competing in several county qualifying shows.

Those who will represent Foard County include Terry Boren, Frederick Henry, Brian Whitman, Jay Wall, Mollye Wisdom, Lesley Johnson, Elizabeth Kincaid, Dan Wall, Brenda Taylor, Tommy Russell and Sandra Bachman. Jan Reeder will be an alternate.

The show will begin at 9:00 a. m. on Friday 25. All performance events with the exception of showmanship will be held on Friday. Halter and showmanship will be conducted on Saturday, June 26.

Trailer House Burned on Highway 6

A trailer house belonging to custom harvesters from Munday, caught fire and burned on State Highway 6 five and one-half miles north of Crowell Saturday afternoon.

The trailer, containing possessions of the harvest crew moving north, was 10x50 feet in size and was completely destroyed in the blaze. The fire was first reported about 2 p.m., Deputy Sheriff Jackie Walker said. He added that it was about 6 that afternoon before the trailer remains were removed from the highway.

School Board Hears Report on Hail Damage to Local School

The Crowell school board heard a number of reports on Monday night following the reading and

approving of minutes of the past four meetings—March 8, April 5, May 17 and May 24—the board voted to pay \$1.00 per the school's

average daily attendance to Region IX which provides film and other supplies to the school during the year.

The board accepted resignations of two staff members: Mrs. Anita Phillips, an elementary school teacher, and Mrs. Idah Pearl Crowell, a secretary in the superintendent's office.

The board decided to put new linoleum in the high school principal's office and also agreed to sell a 1964 Chevrolet 4-door car owned by the school to Ray Quintero for the sum of \$26.00.

Also, the board voted that when the school's student accident insurance contract ends in about a year, that the school will then contract with Ora Mae Fox of Crowell for the insurance coverage.

Supt. Larry Jones told board members that thus far some \$11,200 in damage to school property by the hail three weeks ago has been reported. Insurance adjusters have not as yet surveyed the entire school property, Jones reported.

James Condon Roofing Co. of Vernon was selected as the firm to re-roof the grade school, high school and cafeteria.

One of the four Crowell coaches will be in college at the time, and the board voted to give each of the three who are going to coaching school in Houston in August \$175 each for expenses.

After hearing that the athletic department ended the year in the red, the

school board is going to study the possibility of adopting a budget for that department. In past years, the athletic department has not operated under any kind of budget. Supt. Jones will obtain copies of budgets of athletic departments in various neighboring schools for study by the local board.

Supt. Jones told the board that enrollment in the local school at the end of the past year was 478, which is the lowest since the 1969-70 year when enrollment dropped to 460. Jones gave the enrollment figures for the end of the term for the past eight years:

The year of 1970-71 when enrollment took a big jump was the year that Crowell school received numerous transfer students from this area.

The board approved the payment of some \$9,000 in current bills including \$6,552 for the new remedial reading material published by Hoffman Information Systems.

The board received a total of five applications for the job of bus foreman of the system replacing Allen Taylor who has retired and set a meeting for 6:30 p. m. Friday to interview two of these applicants.

As summer arrives, most
of us are thinking about
having fun...enjoying all the
many kinds of recreation
available to us. That's just
great for us! But, do all
these "fun" activities in-
clude all the individuals who
need and enjoy fun and
recreation?

Those of us residing in the
Foard-Hardeman County
areas are most fortunate to
have available to us a
delightful residential camp-
ing program known as
"CAMP NEW DAWN."
Held at Ceta Canyon United
Methodist Camp near Happy,
Texas for four days each
summer, Camp New Dawn
promises a new and
enriching experience for
mentally handicapped per-
sons of all faiths and races.
Mentally retarded persons
who are ambulatory (can
walk), capable of self-care
(for the most part) and are 21
years of age and older may
attend each session, de-
signed for 60 persons.

June 28-July 2 is the
selected date for Camp New
Dawn this year. Campers
will arrive at the camp site
between 2:30 and 3:30 p. m.
on Monday, June 28 and will
leave the camp site Friday,
July 2nd at 1 p. m.

Experiences provided the
campers during the week
include Christian group
living and new relationships;
the enjoyment of out-of-
doors fun such as swimming,
hiking on nature trails,
recreation and singing and
creating with arts and crafts.
Campers will be housed in
brick, air-conditioned dor-
mitories with 3 campers and a
counselor to each room.
Bathrooms with a shower or
tub are adjoining.

Meals will be served in the
dining hall except at times
when groups have planned
cook-outs.

A nurse will be in
residence at the camp and
will dispense all medication
and administer aid. A doctor
is on call at all times. A
certified life guard will be on
duty at all swimming times.

Campers are covered by
insurance while in camp, and
while enroute to and from
camp by the most direct
route. Transportation of
campers to and from camp is
the responsibility of the
parents or guardians of the
camper, and assistance with
transportation can be ar-
ranged by contacting the
director.

Directors of the various
activities are experienced in
planning for the mentally
retarded persons. Coun-
selors and volunteers are
chosen because of their
special interests in working
with the mentally handi-
capped. Any resources used
will be interdenominational.

A registration fee of \$5.00
is paid by each camper. The
additional cost for each
camper is \$25.00. A
campership is often provided
by interested individuals
groups or churches. The
donations are not limited to
that amount, if the desire is
to contribute more or less.

Colors: carrot is paprika or poppy or orange; salmon is peach or an apricot or coral; green is forest, spruce or jade or even ginger; gray is a puff of smoke or a piece of silver; wine is burgundy, berry or maroon, blue is powder, cadet, duberry, teal or navy; taupe is mocha or chamois; rust is copper, terracotta or russet; aubergine is eggplant or grape; camel like vicuna is brown as a raisin or tobacco.

Colors are similar in all lines as companies buy fabric from the same people. If a good line has strict quality control, foreign is just as good and cheaper. In one case, down-filled coats seem better. Import regulations on the amount of down is more than the U. S. requires. If you find a line that requires a dozen of a style on an order, it will be less expensive, but you meet yourself on the street. In Crowell two to a color to a style works better, but costs more, Mrs. Forister says.

The blazer is back, sweaters galore in every style, stripes up and down or around, everyone is showing them. Denim is dressier, trimmed with leather. Fabrics are cotton and linen or double knit woven to fool you. Coats are soft and yummy looking, feel like cashmere but are 100% polyester. They sell for an affordable 50 to 60 dollars. Fake leather trench coats looking real with much style sell for under forty dollars.

Other chic styles to notice are suede cloth fabrics in basic shirt type dresses; vests, vests, vests with pant suits or dresses, long skirts, many with tunics, turtle-necks under everything, wedges and sandals go everywhere (16 hours a day shoes), scarves worn any way that suits your fancy.

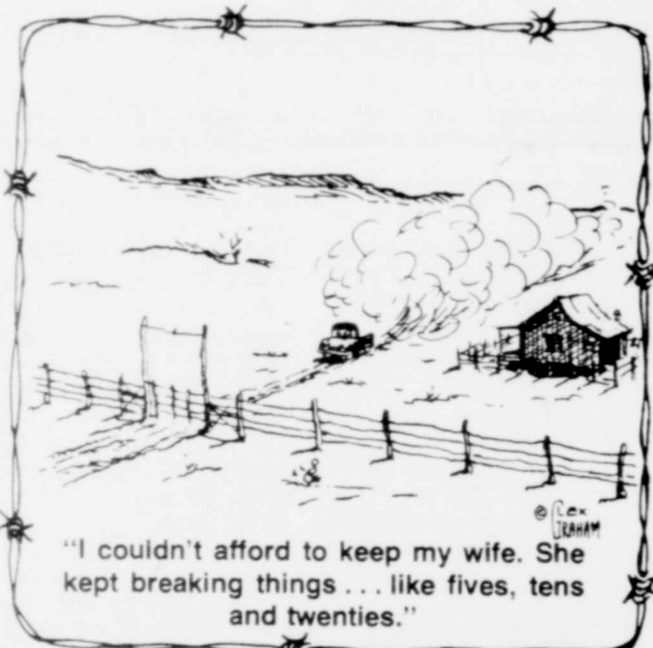

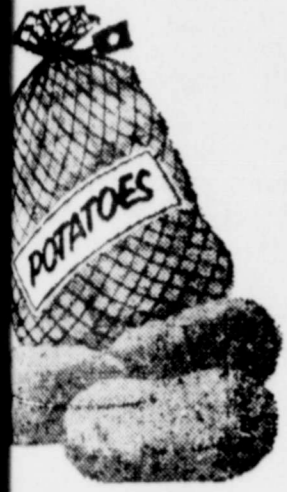

District extension agent Ed Garnett issued the following crop report for the past week:

Adequate moisture was reported in half the counties in Extension District 3, while the remainder need more rain. Showers to three inches of rain was received in most of the district.

Wet ground delayed wheat harvest in a few counties. Harvest has begun in most of the district, with four counties over 50 per cent completed. Yields vary from 5 to 30 bushels per acre.

Some cotton is being replanted in a few counties. Most is up to a good stand. Two counties have just started planting. Grasshopper damage was reported in two counties.

Home gardens, pecan and peach trees have suffered from weather damage in a few counties. Insects are becoming a problem in some gardens. Pecan trees are being sprayed in six counties for pecan nut casebearer.

Ranges and pasture grass are providing good grazing. Livestock are in good condition.
