Yield Data Announced on Wheat Result Demonstration

Yield data on the past year's result demonstrations have been completed, according to county agent Garland Wiemers. The test plots were planted by Billy Johnson in a field between Thalia and Crowell.

Following are the results with the variety of wheat listed first and the figure following is the bushels harvested from that variety.

Sage 29.0, Osage 27.5, Tam 101 27.0, Imp. Triumph 27.0, Nicoma 27.0, Tam 103 25.5, Scout 66 25.1, Bacca 25.1, Agout 24.5, Caddo 24.0, HPRF-1 24.0, Tascosa 24.0, Centurk 22.0, Lancota 21.6, Eagle 20.5, Colorado 725055 19.5, Trison 19.0, Danne 18.0, Sturdy 18.0, DeKalb 571 17.5, Caprock 17.0, DeKalb 581 14.0.

Additional data including plant height, leaf rust and other disease ratings, maturity, forage production and variety parentage will be included in a wheat result demonstration handbook to be printed in the near future.

Foard Oil Production Is Becoming More Significant

As an era of cheap energy and energy independence faded for America, Foard County's 1975 crude oil and natural gas production became more significant to Texas and the United States than at any time since production began in 1929.

With its production marketed for a record \$2.2-million, petroleum continued as a factor in the economic health of the county, according to a study by the Dallas-based Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association.

Jack S. Blanton, Houston independent oil company executive and president of the Association, said increased prices, caused by the growing shortage of domestic oil and gas, has given a multi-billion dollar boost to the economy of Texas and the state's treasury.

"Increased prices help offset the economic effects of the downward trend in volume of Texas pro-

duction," Blanton said, pointing out that increased revenues for producers are being soaked up by zooming drilling costs.

"The average cost of drilling a well in Texas has jumped from \$55,000 in 1962 to \$137,000 last year, a 150-percent increase and one of the reasons why 29-cent gasoline and low utility bills are relics of the past," Blanton said.

The total value of production statewide increased from more than \$11-billion in 1974 to over \$13-billion last year, a jump of nearly 19-percent.

Foard was one of 200 Texas counties which produced oil and gas with a market value in excess of \$100,000 last year, an increase of three over the 1974 total and seven more than in 1973. The county ranked 170th in the state in the total value of petroleum produced, realizing \$2.1-million from the sale of 269,

975 barrels of crude oil; \$107,019 from the sale of 217,962 MCF of natural gas. The county's royalty owners last year received \$277,953.

In addition to paying local school and county property taxes, county producers also contributed to the support of state government with production tax payments totaling \$105,390—\$97,364 paid on oil output; \$8026 on gas production.

The industry's search for oil and gas continued in Foard County, with oil and gas developers last year spending \$162,094 drilling three wells in the county. Some \$70,200 of that was lost in two dry holes, but the drilling effort yielded one gas well. The exploratory effort in the county last year saw the drilling of two wildcat wells.

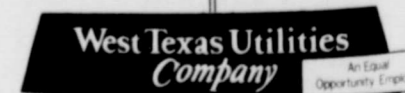
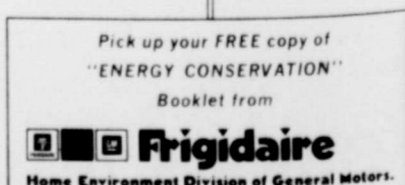

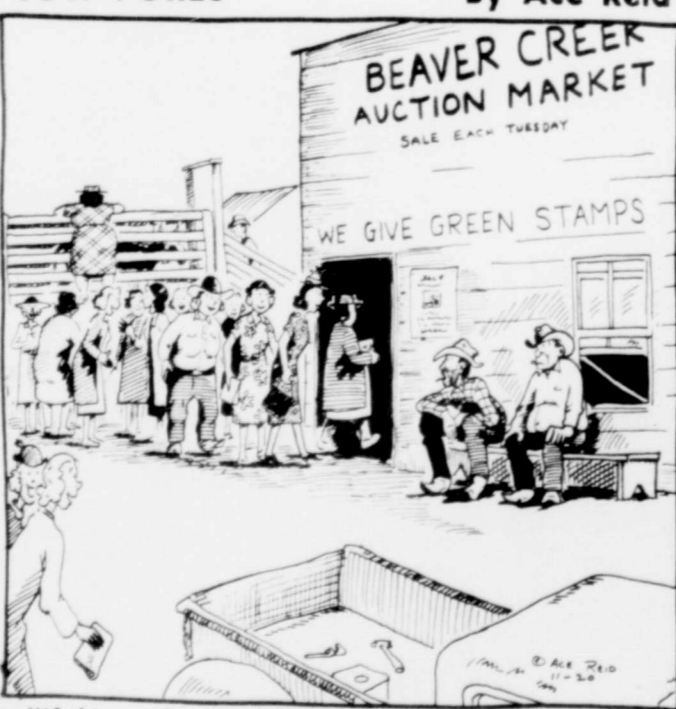
LABEL PACKAGES:

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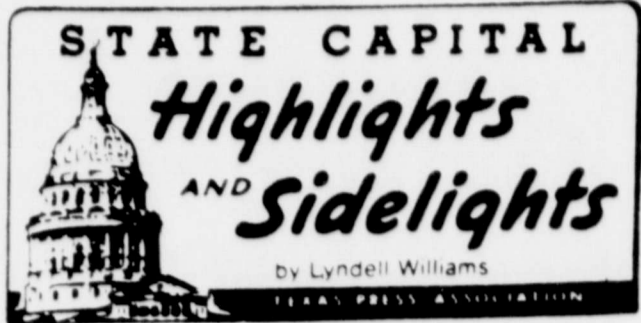
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AUSTIN — Hard news at the Texas statehouse last week was about as difficult to find as a 10-cent cup of coffee. The reason, of course, was that almost every Democratic state official was in New York attending the Democratic National Convention.

The convention, packaged by National Chairman Robert Strauss, a Texan, offered few surprises and little suspense as former Georgia Gov. Jimmy Carter won the nomination by acclamation.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe, the state delegation chairman, and a majority of the 130-member Texas delegation expressed support for Carter's choice of a running mate, Sen. Walter Mondale of Minnesota. Gov. Briscoe, prior to leaving for the convention, said his choice for the vice presidential nomination was Sen. John Glenn of Ohio.

The Texas delegation cast 124 votes for Carter, four for California Gov. Edmund G. Brown Jr., one for Alabama Gov. George Wallace and one for Leon Jaworski, Houston attorney and Watergate prosecutor.

Car Insurance Hike
 Blaming spiraling inflation, insurance industry representatives have asked the State Insurance Board to grant a 27.9 per cent increase for the typical automobile insurance policy.

Staff recommendations will be made public Aug. 4, according to board chairman Joe Christie. Any rate increase, if granted, would take effect Oct. 1.

Statewide, industry spokesman asked for the following average increases:

- 30.3 per cent on combined bodily injury and property damage liability.
- 15.5 per cent for full comprehensive coverage for a private automobile.
- 36.2 per cent for \$100 deductible collision coverage.

The only reduction proposed was 4.2 per cent for uninsured motorist protection.

Bullock Picks Robinson
 Comptroller Bob Bullock has appointed former alcoholic beverage commissioner Luke E. Robinson as assistant director of the Sales Tax Division.

Robinson, 54, quit as ABC administrator three weeks ago under fire from his governing board. A state employee since 1950, Robinson previously worked for the State Employees Retirement System. A 1949 graduate of the University of Texas law school, he is a former president of the Texas Employees Association.

Bullock said Robinson had done an outstanding job in the ABC post and other positions, adding that "if I had an appointed board over me I'd have been fired a long time ago."

TDC Budget Hiked
 Department of Corrections Director James Estelle says the TDC will be presenting a \$200 million budget request to its board, including funds to construct a 225-bed prison in West Texas.

Estelle termed the current \$54 million budget "terrible" and said something will have to be done soon to relieve overcrowding in the entire prison system, which had a 12 per cent increase in

population last year.

Bank Sues Yarbrough

East End State Bank of Houston has filed a suit against Supreme Court nominee Don Yarbrough alleging Yarbrough failed to repay a \$10,000 bank loan.

The bank claimed in the suit that Yarbrough signed a promissory note for \$10,000 in September 1975. The petition states Yarbrough has "failed and refused to pay" the debt.

It was the 16th suit filed against the Houston attorney.

Meanwhile, organizers of the "Texas Independent Party" are trying to field a candidate against Yarbrough. Elections chief Robert Lemons says the effort is a waste of time.

UT Budget Unveiled

University of Texas regents have approved a budget of more than \$634 million for operating the UT system and its far-flung component institutions during 1976-77 fiscal year.

The budget, representing an overall increase of 6.6 per cent over the previous fiscal year, was kept secret until regents approved it in executive session.

An Austin daily newspaper requested, but failed to receive, a copy of the proposed budget prior to the regents meeting under the Texas Open Meetings Act. Attorney General John Hill has been asked for an opinion as to whether the regents were within their rights to withhold the budget.

The total budget for the system was set at \$634,756,153 and includes funds for educational and general expenses, sponsored research and other projects.

Regents voted 9-0 to reassign nursing faculty and staff to the six component institutions which previously were affiliated with nursing schools. The vote was designed to assure that their March 26 dissolution of the UT System School of Nursing will not be overturned.

The Texas Nurses Association has filed against regents, contending they overstepped their authority and failed to meet requirements of the open meetings law.

Short Snorts

Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby has set Aug. 14 as the date for a special election to fill the vacated seat of State Rep. Kay Bailey of Houston. Rep. Bailey resigned to become vice-chairman of the Federal National Transportation Board.

The trial of two former State Senate print shop employees was delayed because of the absence of a witness for the state. Alex Martinez and Penni Stoner, charged with theft of paper from the print shop, will go on trial Aug. 2.

Former Democratic National Committeeman Hall Timanus of Houston, the only Wallace delegate on the Texas delegation to the Democratic National Convention, was mugged and robbed of \$500 while strolling along Fifth Avenue in the heart of New York City.

University of Texas regents will no longer pursue probate of Howard Hughes' so-called Mormon will after two handwriting experts, one hired by the university, determined the highly publicized document was a forgery.

State Chairman Bill Skees of the American Party of Texas says the party has submitted enough signatures to Secretary of State Mark White to get on the November general election ballot. Tom Anderson, the party's national chairman, is the candidate for president.

Ambassador Anne Armstrong and GOP Chairman Ray Hutchison are being touted as possible gubernatorial candidates in 1978.

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New MSU veep sees bright future

Midwestern State University is a "sleeping giant" in the opinion of Dr. Thomas A. Bond, who becomes vice president for academic affairs July 1.

Bond, 37, and a native of St. Louis, Mo., will replace Dr. Kenneth Hendrickson Jr., interim vice president for academic affairs, who is returning to his position as chairman of the history department.

The former dean of liberal arts at Idaho State University was named to the No. 2 position at Midwestern in February following an extensive search. Bond, who holds a bachelor's in geology from the University of Missouri and a master's and doctorate in geology from the University of Oklahoma, also will be responsible for the library and registrar's office.

"My main responsibility is to attract and keep the best qualified faculty available," Bond said this week in an interview. "From people I've talked with, we have an excellent teaching faculty, but there is more to being a professional academician than just teaching in the classroom."

"My job is to motivate the faculty so

they will become more involved in professional activities, such as attending meetings and presenting papers," he added.

Bond believes by revitalizing the faculty and creating an attitude of enthusiasm and freshness in approach, the "kids will be turned on."

"The average faculty member is really not aware of how perceptive students are," he said. "Students are the best recruiters we have — no question about it."

How is he going to generate this contagious enthusiasm?

"I'm going to set guidelines and the deans and department chairmen will make it happen," he answered.

"Every school has a dean and the deans will be given absolute and total responsibility of running the fiscal and academic aspects of their schools. I expect deans to be deans and things to happen."

Recently established policies concerning merit raises, tenure and promotions "need to be looked at, solidified and worked out," he said.

Bond will work toward keeping the "level of enthusiasm of faculty high and at the same time working toward getting

them more professionally involved in their disciplines.

"In terms of most of our academic programs, we are just as strong as any state school in the system, excluding the University of Texas at Austin and Texas A&M, who have all those specialized programs. In some areas, we have stronger programs right here in Wichita Falls than they do elsewhere."

Bond has a "realistic outlook" for higher education which he defines as "academic strength and fiscal responsibility." He feels there is "far too much bureaucracy in higher education in general."

Although Bond has a 12-month contract as an administrator and does not have an academic appointment in his discipline, he still considers himself "an academic" and wants to obtain the "biggest portion of the budget for academic affairs."

Bond favors the associate degree programs Midwestern is seeking because there is a "substantial need for

such programs in a city this size. Associate degree programs will draw a great number of people here. We are here to serve the people and if we don't, they will just go elsewhere."

"I am very much looking forward to working with Dr. Barker (MSU President Dr. John G. Barker) as we share much the same philosophies and vision for this institution. Under his direction, the only place Midwestern can go is up," Bond affirmed, adding, "If I didn't think there was a great future here, I wouldn't have come."

EMPLOYEE RETIREMENT SEMINARS

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service in cooperation with the Internal Revenue Service is planning a series of one-day seminars to aid employers in filing annual information returns under the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1976. Four Winds RC&D Project Now Assisting Area Counties

The Four Winds RC&D Project Plan was completed, printed and mailed to the Washington office on November 24, 1975. The RC&D Project Plan was approved on January 26, 1976. The plan contained 84 project proposals eligible for technical and financial assistance, 4 accelerated service proposals and 61 associated measures. A sedimentation control proposal from Cottle County, and a critical area treatment proposal on Paducah ISD campus have both been approved by the RC&D Council for assistance since approval for operation.

A measure plan for critical area treatment on the Crowell Independent School District campus was signed on 5/17/76. Planned treatment on the campus consists of establishing windbreaks, adding topsoil, establishing grass, installing irrigation pipeline to water grass and installing barrier to protect vegetation from vehicular traffic. Total installation cost is \$25,720.00.

shaping, smoothing, vegetation and installing erosion and sediment control structures on 42 road sections along about 60 miles of county roads in Cottle County. Estimated installation cost is \$4000,000.00.

Childress, Foard and Hardeman Counties are being assisted in preparing erosion plans for roadside erosion control. These are in various stages of planning.

Planning is in process on a sedimentation control measure plan of an area through the central portion of Cottle County to reduce sediment damages to agriculture land.

Cities of Crowell and Quanah have been provided technical assistance in acquiring a \$2,500.00 grant each from the American Revolution Bicentennial Commission to restore structures and establish museums. Grants have been received and the Crowell museum completed.

Cities of Childress, Chillicothe, Crowell, Paducah and Quanah have been provided technical assistance in making preapplications to HUD for Community Development Grant funds.

These were for improvements of water and sewer facilities in Chillicothe, disposal of solid waste in Crowell, water facilities in Paducah and street paving in Quanah. Approval from HUD to make full application for \$100,000.00 at Childress and \$50,000.00 at Chillicothe has been received.

Technical assistance has been provided the libraries of Paducah and Quanah for library improvement plans.

FISH, WATERFOWL STUDY

An extensive two-year study of fish and waterfowl in Texas floodwater retarding structure reservoirs has been launched by the 4-H Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Soil Conservation Service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Fish in some 60 lakes in the Corsicana area will be studied to determine what types are best suited for the lakes and what lake conditions are best for game fish. Ducks and geese will also be studied as well as management techniques to enhance fish production and increase waterfowl use of the reservoirs.
