July '76 Much Drier Than July '75

July was dry in Foard County, but local residents with a reasonably good memory can remember that

the county received more rain than it did in July two years ago. July 1976 saw .80 inch recorded and two years ago, the month of July drew a complete blank with no moisture falling during the month. Also in July 1970 no moisture fell here.

It was a different story last year, however, for in July 1975 an official 7.60 inches of rain were recorded by the government gauge here.

Fort Sill, Ok. The Carrolls assisted a crew from a Fort Sill-based helicopter when their machine made an emergency landing near their home. The letter from Major Richtsmeier to Governor Dolph Briscoe follows:

On the evening of 27 April 1976, a UH-1H helicopter from Reconnaissance Helicopter Company, 14th Aviation Battalion, Fort Sill, Oklahoma made a precautionary landing in a rural area near Truscott, Texas as a result of an aircraft malfunction. The maintenance failure could not be corrected by the crew and it was necessary to place a phone call to the parent unit to request assistance.

As the pilots were making their landing they observed lights several miles away. After determining the problem, they started walking in the direction of the lights. Approximately thirty minutes later they arrived at the Charles Carroll home near Truscott, Texas. The Carroll family was most hospitable and provided the pilots with everything they needed. In addition, the Carrolls offered coffee, soda, and snacks which were greatly appreciated by the pilots. After the phone call was completed and maintenance personnel were on their way, the family transported the pilots back to the aircraft. The Carrolls remained at the site until approximately one fifteen in the morning when the two helicopters departed for Fort Sill.

It is most rewarding to find such a congenial, patriotic family in these days when so many people are more concerned with their own problems. The people of Texas should be proud of the Carroll family. The aviators of Fort Sill are happy to know that there are people like the Carrolls who are willing to get involved.

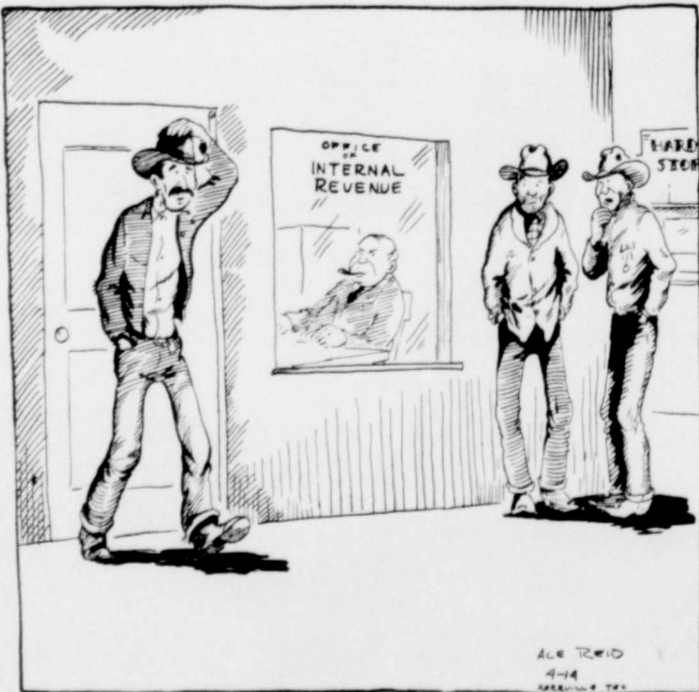

More Rural Water Lines to Be Built

In My Opinion...

IT'S TIME TO TURN BACK TO EXCELLENCE IN EDUCATION

D. Doris Fowler, a retired English teacher, taught in Texas schools for 37 years, including 17 in Odessa, Texas, where she now lives.

It has recently come to light that in the last seven or eight years, the cumulative scores of junior students in high school who took the Iowa Test on Educational Development (ITED) have declined alarmingly. In the high school where I formerly taught, the scores declined 33 per cent within a two-year period. In a nearby high school, the rate was 43 per cent. One can only conclude that something is wrong.

Throughout the country, it is generally felt that the schools have slipped in their teaching of fundamentals. Twenty years ago educational standards in my place of employment were gratifyingly high. Teachers and principals were proud of their students' records. Dress codes were taken for granted and never needed mentioning. Discipline and character education were emphasized right along with academic progress. Earned promotion was the order of the day instead of "social promotion," and extensive work was done in the basic skills, such as phonics in reading instruction and computational abilities in mathematics. Stu-

dents in English classes could write comprehensively and coherently, with fewer spelling and punctuation flaws that seem to abound in written work now.

Recently, too, it was brought to the public's attention that the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) scores and the American College Tests (ACT) entrance exams of college-bound students have declined steadily in verbal and mathematical areas, and especially in social studies.

One reason for this, I truly believe, is the proliferation of innocuous alternative courses that allow students to avoid the basic subjects, particularly in the secondary schools. Liberalism of curricula and the general trend toward "permissiveness" have resulted in a downgrading of educational achievement. "Open education," the new math travesty, the stressing of existentialism and humanism in literature courses, noncompetitive theories of grading — all these terms are dear to the hearts of many academicians, enthusiastically abetted by ivory-tower inhabitants of the Texas Education Agency. School boards and parents alike seem apathetic and fail even to question the trend, much less do something about it. Nearly everyone seems resigned to a doctrine of mediocrity, lest one group of students seems smarter or above the low-average level.

During the Soothing-Syrup Sixties, public school pupils were encouraged to "do your own thing." Now it is the Saddened Seventies, and suddenly those "things" are not good enough. At last, a few critics of public (and private) schools are beginning to gather like tumbleweeds on a West Texas prairie. When are the majority of parents going to become concerned about this trend toward acceptance of mediocrity? Preventing a widespread decline in educational standards is much more important than busing our kids hither and yon over the landscape!

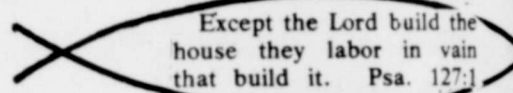

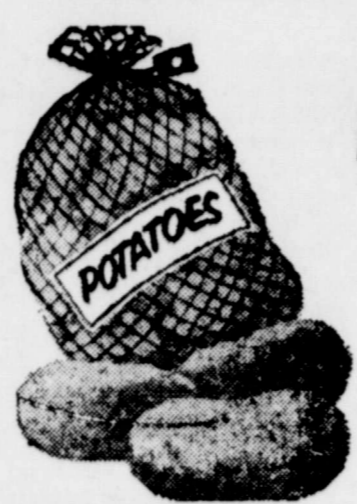
