TEXAS TOPS IN CATTLE SLAUGHTER

In 1975 Texas became the top state in the number of cattle slaughtered, according to a livestock marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The information is based on cattle slaughter at the 82 federally inspected slaughtering plants in the state. Twenty-eight of these plants slaughtered more than 50,000 head each and accounted for 11 per cent of the total federally inspected cattle slaughter. Following Texas in the number of cattle slaughtered in federally inspected plants are Nebraska and Iowa.





The estimated \$3 million project will take approximately 45 days to six weeks before work can begin and the contractor will be given 300 days construction time.
