executive director of the Red River Water Authority. Bids were opened at the Gates City Electric Co-op building in Childress Tuesday afternoon. Parkey said the bids will become official when final tab-

ulations are completed. Second low bid was \$1,987,566.70 submitted by the Central Construction Co. of Pittsburg, Kansas. The project will be made possible with a loan and grant from the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) to the Red River Water Authority of Texas. The loan will be processed through the Childress County FmHA office.

In another bidding, the Strittmatter Irrigation Co. of Pilot Point, Texas submitted a bid of \$78,852 for drilling eight water wells. Parkey said that the total cost of the program will be some \$3 million and also will include the purchase of land and water rights and right-of-way. The program will consist of approximately 365 miles of rural water lines and will be constructed in 11 north central and west Texas Counties including the Four Winds counties of Hardeman, Foard, Cottle and Childress as well as Hall, Motley, Donnelly, Collingsworth, and Wheeler counties to the west and Knox, Wilbarger and Montague counties to the east. The estimated \$3 million project will take approximately 45 days to six weeks before work can begin and the contractor will be given 300 days construction time. Construction in Foard County will include new lines just south of the Pease River running east and west in the Margaret community and lines south of Crowell running east toward the Thalia community. In Knox County, an extension line will be run from the Truscott-Gilliland system near Truscott into King County. Phase Five of the Thirsty Water System is expected to be the last project of the system and will complete more than 1000 miles of water line at a cost in excess of \$6 million. In addition to the Thirsty System, Phase Five will provide more lines for the Lockett Water System in Wilbarger County and Sam Norwood Water System in Collingsworth County.

At the July meeting of the council, members went over the tax rendition sheets for the City. Mrs. Fern McKown, tax assessor, reported that the council made no changes in present valuations.

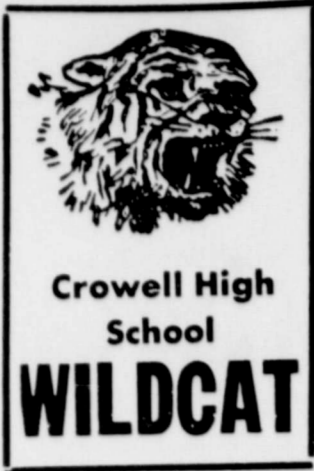
