Source Gets State O. K.

The source of Crowell's water supply, Greenbelt Lake, located north of Clarendon, has received a clean bill of health, according to a letter received by water officials from the Texas Department of Health Resourses.

The letter from the Division of Environmental Engineering, stated that a sanitary survey of the Greenbelt water system indicated that the water system presented an attractive appearance and that the requirements for the continuance of the present 'State Approved' status by the Texas Department of Health Resources are being complied with.

An anthrax outbreak in Western Foard County is 'under control", Dr. G. D. Lindsey, a veterinarian with the Texas Animal Health Commission, told a group of over 50 Foard County farmers and ranchers at a meeting held here last Thursday afternoon.

Dr. Lindsey said that livestock deaths apparently caused by anthrax had taken place on six different properties involving some 15 sections of land and quarantines and vaccinations involve some 10 to 20 additional sections of adjacent tracts.

Anthrax is caused by a spore rather than a germ, Dr. Lindsey said, and it is entirely possible that the spore which has caused the outbreak here could have been dormant in the soil from the time buffalo herds died in that area many years ago.

An estimated 40 head of cattle and three horses have been identified as anthrax victims, the veterinarian added. He also stated that there has not been an anthrax outbreak in this county since 1900.

In spite of assurances by the Animal Health Commission that the anthrax outbreak "is under control," at least one Foard County rancher is wondering if perhaps the outbreak is more serious than officials say. Otis Gafford said Monday afternoon that although as far as he knew no anthrax had been discovered south of US 70 in the west part of the county, more cases north of the highway are being diagnosed each day. NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 49)

Repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution. S.J.R. 49 amends Section 49-c of Article III of the Texas Constitution to provide for and authorize an additional \$400 million in Texas water development bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the members of each house of the Legislature for such water development purposes as the Legislature may prescribe.

The state education agency feels strongly that students should "begin satisfying their daily dietary needs at breakfast. Children who come to school hungry may find it difficult to stay alert and learn," Texas' education agency School Lunch Program Director Charles A. Cole says. "Breakfast is also important," he adds, "to improve the nutrition and dietary

practices of students." Because school breakfast program legislation is so new. Texas Education Agency and the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Food and Nutrition Service are trying to inform school administrators about the availability of the programproviding the morning meal to students of high school grade and under in public and private nonprofit

schools. Mr. Cole explains that the breakfast program is similar to the National School Lunch program and that 'with minor adjustments to existing scheduling of food service personnel, many schools find that they can easily manage to participate in the breakfast program without having to hire additional help or make special equipment purchases. As with school lunch, there are funds reimbursements from USDA's Food and Nutrition Service for serving these breakfasts, plus, schools get USDA-donated foods and other assistance. USDA and my office offer guidance about starting and operating the program.

Rates, under the proposal, would go up from \$9.20 to \$11.50 monthly in Houston, from \$8.20 to \$10 in Dallas, from \$8 to \$9.45 in Fort Worth and from \$7.35 to \$9.45 in San An-

Other proposed increases: Corpus Christi, \$6.90-\$8.50; McAllen, \$7.05-\$8.15; Amarillo, \$5.85-\$8.50: Lubbock. \$5.90-\$8.50;

Business telephone rates also would increase sharply. Five to six dollar a month hikes would be common. The increase for business lines in Lubbock and Amarillo would be about nine dollars.

Bell seeks another \$8.1 million in additional revenue from a 20-cents per call charge in pay telephones, where a dime now does the job.

The company also wants more money for key telephones, private branch exchanges, Centrex service, private lines, WATS service, miscellaneous equipment, touchtone phones and other items.

FALL PASTURES NEED FERTILIZER

Perennial grass pastures should be fertilized now for increased fall production and quality, points out a forage and turfgrass specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Most grasses have plenty of time to grow, and the forage can be utilized for grazing or hay or left standing and grazed after frost. Moisture must be available for grass growth, and the eastern two-thirds of the state has a 50 to 80 per cent chance of receiving at least two inches of rain during September and October. Use a mulch wherever possible to conserve moisture, prevent compaction, keep soil temperatures lower and reduce the weed population. Water thoroughly at 7-to-10-day intervals. Although nighttime watering increases the chance for plant disease, it does allow for more efficient use of water as evaporation is
