## Steven Setliff Member of LCC Play Cast

Steven Setliff, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Ray Setliff of Crowell, will play the role of Archie Beaton in the musical "Brigadoon" to be presented by the Lubbock Christian College Drama Department, Nov. 12 and 13, 19 and 20.

A classic from the writing team of Alan J. Lerner and Frederick Loewe, "Brigadoon" is a tale of romance set in Scotland, where the magical village of Brigadoon appears only once each 100 years. The story unfolds as two young American soldiers of fortune discover this strange place where life and love are eternal.

Setliff and the cast of 40 have been in rehearsals since the initial week of the fall semester, Aug. 28. This will all lead to four performances in the LCC Moody Auditorium, including a special performance for an anticipated 600 high school students expected for the school's biennial High School Day on Nov. 13.

A sophomore liberal arts major, Setliff brings a wealth of experience to Brigadoon. He has appeared in "Music Man" at LCC last fall as well as being in the A Cappella chorus and the Royal Blue Band.

The Crowell Wildcats, with a 2 win, 1 tie record in district, travel to Paducah Friday night to take on the Dragons, who are 1-2 in district 7-A play.

Crowell has wins over Rotan and Knox City and played the Munday Moguls to a 0-0 tie. Paducah

defeated the Aspermont Hornets and have lost games with Haskell and Hamlin. In non-district action, Paducah lost to Childress, Motley County, and Spur. The Wildcats finished the pre-district games 1-1-1.

The Wildcats were impressive in their come-from-behind win at Knox City last Friday night, and will be wanting to continue their winning ways. The Dragons will be trying to even their district record up, as they try for a win over Crowell.

Coach Printiss Gidney said Monday that all his players should be ready for action at Paducah. Starting time is 7:30 p. m. and a large delegation of Wildcat supporters is expected to make the trip to Paducah.

Coach Gidney said Paducah has a well rounded ball team this year, and their losses have been to some of the stronger teams in this area.

## Curbing Project at School Starts

The construction of 1582 feet of concrete curbing began this week on the local school campus. The curbing is being paid for by the Soil Conservation Service through the R. C. & D. program. The purpose of the curbing is to protect grass and trees, which will be planted next year. The completion of the curbing, which is being installed by M&M Redi Mix of Vernon will be the first expenditure of R. C. & D. funds in the Four Winds R. C. & D. area.

Future plans for R. C. & D. work on the school campus are to plant grass and trees to prevent wind erosion. Other work being planned in the Four Winds R. C. & D. area is the treatment of county road sections to stop erosion and reduce annual maintenance needs of county roads in Foard, Cottle, Hardeman and Childress counties.

Some planning has been done toward selection of sites for roadside erosion treatment in all four counties.

Investigations are under way in Cottle County along four county road sections prior to RC&D construction. A core drill unit of the Soil Conservation Service is testing foundation materials for dams to be constructed. This was determined necessary to insure adequate structures in the eroded areas of dam locations.

One of the dams is located on the upper end of a gully that has eroded an abandoned wooden bridge and county road away during the past five years. The gully is presently about 80 feet wide and 2,600 feet long. The proposed dam will catch and release the water at a rate to reduce erosion. The gully will be shaped and seeded to grass.

The other three structures will have county roads across the dams. These dams will also catch and release water at a safe rate to reduce erosion.

All four of these structures will be built and paid for with RC&D funds during the next year.

## Crowell Gin Gets First Bale for 1976

The first bale of 1976 cotton for the Farmers Co-Op. Gin in Crowell was brought in Tuesday afternoon of last week, October 12, by A. L. McGinnis Jr., according to information furnished the News by gin manager Ben K. Barker.

The bale, ginned free, weighed 454 pounds and yielded 850 pounds of cotton seed. The gross weight of the seed cotton was 2,150 pounds. Barker said cotton seed is selling for \$95 per ton.

The Crowell gin's first bale was dry land cotton from a field owned by Mrs. Myrtle Murphy in the Margaret community.

## Northers and Rain Top Weather Story

Foard County has received additional moisture during the past week as northers continue to blow through the area every few days. Last Friday, a norther kicked off scattered rain over the county with an official 1.81 inches being recorded by the

government gauge. The remainder of the county did not record as much as here in town. About an inch was reported northwest of town, and most other sections received about half an inch. The front dropped the temperature to the upper 30's Sunday morning.

Farmers who have not yet sowed their wheat are having a hard time getting their grain in the ground due to the wet weather, and the wheat which is up, in scattered parts of the county, has been severely hit by army worms.

Emory Boring, area entomologist, said Monday that a hard freeze would stop the army worm infestation.

Another blast of cold air blew through on Monday, dropping the mercury to 39 degrees early Tuesday. This front brought only a light shower here in Crowell.

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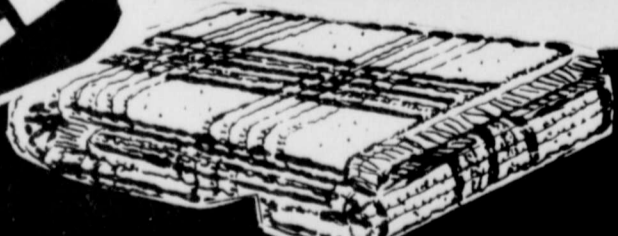

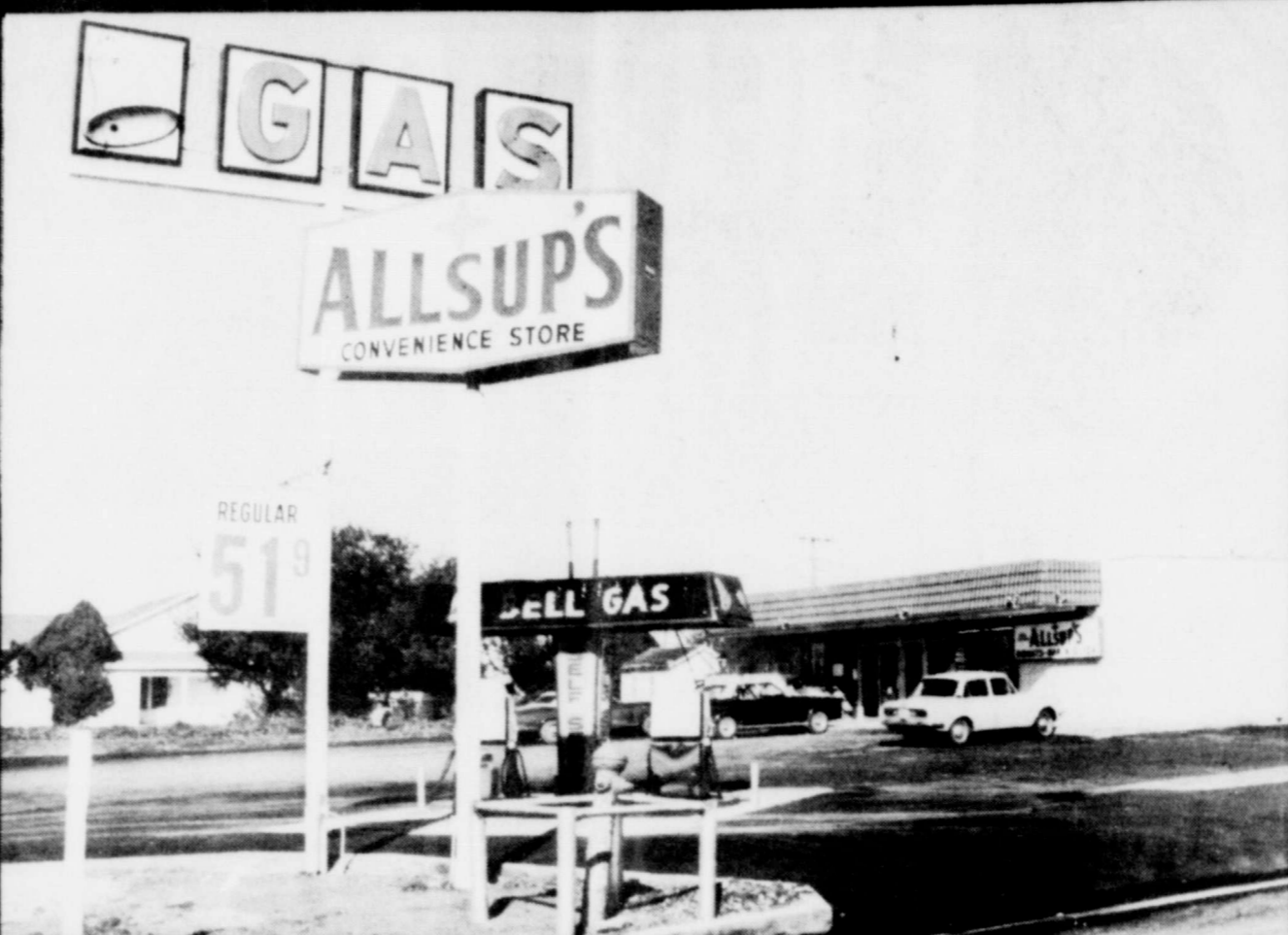

Foard County families will hear current information on home care and maintenance at a one day Fix-It-Festival starting 11 a. m. to 2:30 p. m. on Friday, October 29, 1976.

Sponsored by the County Extension Service and Family Living Committee, the series will be held in Crowell's Agricultural Pavilion.

"Demonstrations will include valuable information on simple faucet repair, toilet tuneup, electrical repairs, wall, door and window repairs," according to Loretta Hardin, County Extension Agent. The purpose of this program is to equip families with skills to

care for and maintain housing in which they live.

During the day you will learn about low-cost home improvements, maintenance ideas—such as replacing window glass, doing minor plumbing repairs, and doing electrical repairs and other simple home care and maintenance repairs.

This information will be particularly valuable to families who find skilled labor for home care too costly.

Each session will focus on ways to make caring for and maintaining the home a pleasure rather than a burden.

The public is invited free of charge.

The Crowell Wildcats won their second District 7-A football game of the season last Friday night at Knox City when they defeated the Greyhounds by a 28 to 15 score.

Crowell took an early lead in the contest when defensive halfback Jay Wall intercepted a KC pass and raced 35 yards for the touchdown. Oran Carroll Jr. added the first of his four extra points of the night following the TD.

But Knox City came back as Tommy Mangis caught a David Anderson pass from 14 yards out. The Hounds added a two point conversion to take a 8-7 lead in the third period. Crowell bounced right back and C. B. Sparkman capped a Cat drive by going the final four yards for the touchdown. Knox City rebounded with another touchdown with Mangis going in from 1 yard out. The Greyhounds led 15-14 going into the final quarter.

Then Crowell fullback Willie Bachman scored the first of his two touchdowns with 6 minutes left on the clock. His second TD came with only 20 seconds remaining to be played.

Crowell backs ground out 220 yards on the ground while the stout Wildcat defense held Knox City to 30 yards rushing. Crowell gained 43 yards in the air while Knox City picked up 81 yards.

## Candidate Is Speaker at Meeting Here

Bob Price of Pampa, former Congressman from the 13th District who is a candidate for the office in the general election coming up on November 2, was honored at an informal get-together and reception Tuesday night of last week at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Bob Parris. Mrs. Parris is chairman of the Foard County Price-for-Congress Committee. The Parrises were assisted in host duties by Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Fox.

Mr. Price, accompanied by Crowell by his wife, Marty, covered a multitude of topics in his remarks to the 35 persons attending the get-together.

He stressed that he is a farmer and rancher and is well acquainted with the problems of agriculture. Price was on the agriculture committee the entire eight years he served in Congress.

In urging those present to take an active part in politics and all facets of community life, he asked how many had volunteered to serve on the school board, how many have volunteered to do gratis work in bettering the community, and how many had taken an active role in church activities.

Price cited voter apathy as one of the reasons for the current problems of the nation. He said there are 466,000 persons residing in this congressional district. Two years ago, 92,000 were registered to vote and only 19 per cent of those registered did vote in the general election. He says there is less and less voter participation each year.

Price said government agencies have grown through the years and dominate this nation's life at the present time. He cited education as an example of government inefficiency. Of every dollar sent to Washington for education, the national government keeps 60 cents and then sends 40 cents back to be used on education on the local level. In addition to losing some 60 cents out of every dollar, the schools also are losing their right to run the school. As the federal government doles out our money to us, they also tell us how to run the schools. Price said the same situation applies to the nation's hospitals which are also burdened down by federal

regulation and bureaucracy. Price also discussed the current wheat price situation. He said the 900 million bushel carryover, the 2.2 billion bushel crop for 1976 and a big corn crop have provided the nation with a surplus of grain which is holding the price down. He added that the nation has a surplus of cattle which is causing the depressed price for beef.

Three years ago, Price said the nation was importing 8 per cent of its oil, while last month the country imported 47 per cent. An embargo by the Arab nations would completely paralyze the country, Price said, and added that this nation's producers must be given tax incentives and other opportunity to seek new oil supplies in this country.

Price concluded by saying that Russia is currently spending 45 per cent of its entire budget on armaments, while the U. S. spends less and less. He said the current situation reminds him of pre-World War II Munich as Hitler rose to power and the other nations of the world stood by and watched him build a military might which almost devastated the European continent.
