County Historical Marker Erected

A man who "baptized the altar of Texas with life blood at the Alamo" was immortalized here Saturday as a Lynn County pioneer unveiled a Texas Historical Marker in the courthouse lawn.

The war hero - G.W. Lynn, for whom the county is named. The pioneer - Mrs. Ben Moore of O'Donnell, whose father carried a petition around the sparsely-settled territory to see if there were enough settlers to organize a county.

The historical marker, unveiled as a climax to the annual Lynn County pioneer reunion, honors not only Lynn but offers a capsule history of the county's settlement.

"It is dedicated to all those hearty pioneers who came to Lynn County at the turn of the century...to hew out homes for their families in this sea of grass," said Frank Hill, member of the county's historical society.

Rice P. Lynn, a retired San Angelo attorney and great-nephew of G.W. Lynn, spoke briefly at the dedicatory ceremonies.

Post Office To Close Saturdays

Effective with this coming Saturday, June 27, 1970, the Tahoka Post Office will begin closing on Saturdays. This change will affect window service only - incoming mail will be put up in the lockboxes, and rural route mail will be delivered as usual.

The closing of the post offices in the Dallas Postal Region (comprised of Texas and Louisiana) will save millions of dollars annually with only minimum inconvenience to the Region's postal patrons. Postal business on Saturdays has been reduced drastically in recent years as a result of the closing on Saturday of so many other business concerns and offices, such as banks, court-houses, utilities, city offices, all other Federal agencies, etc.

Outgoing mail will not be affected nor delayed by this change as has been the custom for the past several years, mail for out of town delivery should be deposited in the mail box on the corner in front of the post office on Saturdays, Sundays and holidays. Mail for local delivery (including Tahoka rural routes) should be dropped in the mail slot inside the post office.

Drowning Victim Services Sunday

Services for Anastacio Hernandez, 36, who drowned Thursday when the small boat he was in overturned in Birdwell Lake about five miles southeast of Tahoka, were held at 2 p.m. Sunday, June 21, in St. Jude's Catholic Church with the Rev. John Dillon officiating. Burial was in the Tahoka Cemetery under direction of White Funeral Home.

A companion of Hernandez, Teko Flores of Tahoka swam to shore after the boat overturned. Firemen and volunteers dragged the small lake for almost three hours before recovering Hernandez' body from 10 feet of water some 200 yards from shore.

Justice of the Peace E.A. Hargrave ruled death by drowning.

Hernandez, a farm laborer on the Albert Curry farm, and former resident of Menard, had lived in Tahoka about eight months.

Survivors include his wife, Elena; a daughter, Norma, and two sons, Anastacio Jr. and Lupe, all of the home; six sisters and four brothers.

Community Members Concerned About The Youth Center

Recently there has been quite a bit of concern expressed on both sides of the community, youth and adult alike, regarding the new youth center. Some of the adults have expressed the opinion that we are doomed to failure since we are only kids and we will soon become bored with our new toy and desert it. At the same time some of the youthful community have said the center will flop because the parents are going to make all the rules and dictate everything concerning the center.

We, the youth who have been involved in the planning thus far on the youth center, would like to make the reasons why we support and are working so strongly in favor of a youth center in Tahoka public.

It has been said that this is an ideal way to get the kids off the streets, and this is true, but we do not feel it is the main reason. We want the youth center to be a place where you can go and relax. A place for youth. But also we realize supervision is necessary and Rhett and Gayle Patterson will be there (the youth center) at all times for this purpose. You can also rest assured that there will be great "Peer group pressure" to behave at the center. A person isn't likely to want to tear down or get closed up something he has worked very hard for. So we want to assure you that youth center will not be unsupervised but we also want to assure certain members of the youthful community that it will not be a place solely and exclusively controlled by the parents. If these people had been attending our meetings they would know that the adults who have been supporting us have been doing just that supporting us. They haven't tried to push us into anything but rather have been pulling for us. They have given the main responsibility for planning and getting the youth center into operation to us because they do not have the time to build one for us and they realize that we want the responsibility for the center. So they are supporting us with money and good faith and advising us in financial and organizational matters. We want to thank them for the time and money they have invested in us and the support and faith they have given us. We, the youth, have been doing and making plans to do our share in raising money. We have decided on a membership fee of five dollars three times a year, once at the beginning of school, mid-term, and the beginning of summer. There have also been other ideas put forward as to things we could sell at the center to raise money to keep it in operation.

So you see there have been many plans made for starting, supervising, and strengthening the youth center. And these plans have been made by the youth with the support and advice of the adult community. There is still a "long and winding road" ahead of us and it will not be easy. It will mean a lot of work, by a lot of youth and the support of the entire adult community. But the youth center is a lot closer now than it was even a week ago. Much progress has been made and we believe the youth center can be made a reality. We believe it can be a place where youth can have fun and adults can take pride in, but not without your help and support now.

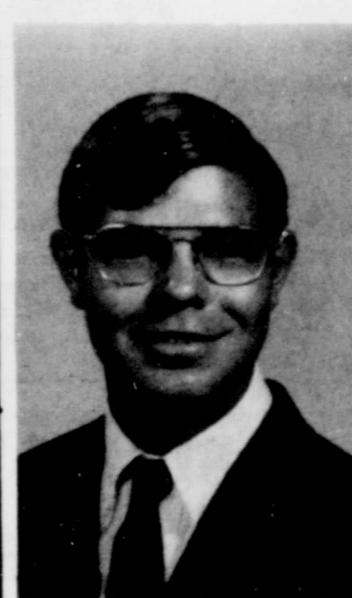

Today, the surest means of a book becoming a best seller is for the author to highlight and denounce bitterly the faults of this country. The same can be said of television and the movies, which prefer in these modern days to depict the seamier side of life in America.

But there's hope. As I have moved across this state, I have sensed that our people are growing weary of gloom. It's becoming easier to strike up a conversation on what's right about America.

I always suggest that there are a lot more level heads in this country than we are sometimes led to believe. There are a lot more decent, law-abiding citizens than there are criminals and cheats and sharks. There are a lot more young people in the "now" generation who want to improve America than the handful of radicals who want to burn it to ashes and start all over.

I can understand why the "majority" has broken its "silence." There's a growing impatience with agitation and controversy. But I feel we should continue to approach our nation's problems with a cool head and an open mind. I've listened to the voices of dissent. I think I know what they're asking of their government.

One thing they want is confidence. They want the assurance that their public officials have the courage to meet the issues of the 1970's with imagination and integrity, and not with some form of "old politics" that thrashes around with problems but never quite locates the workable solutions.

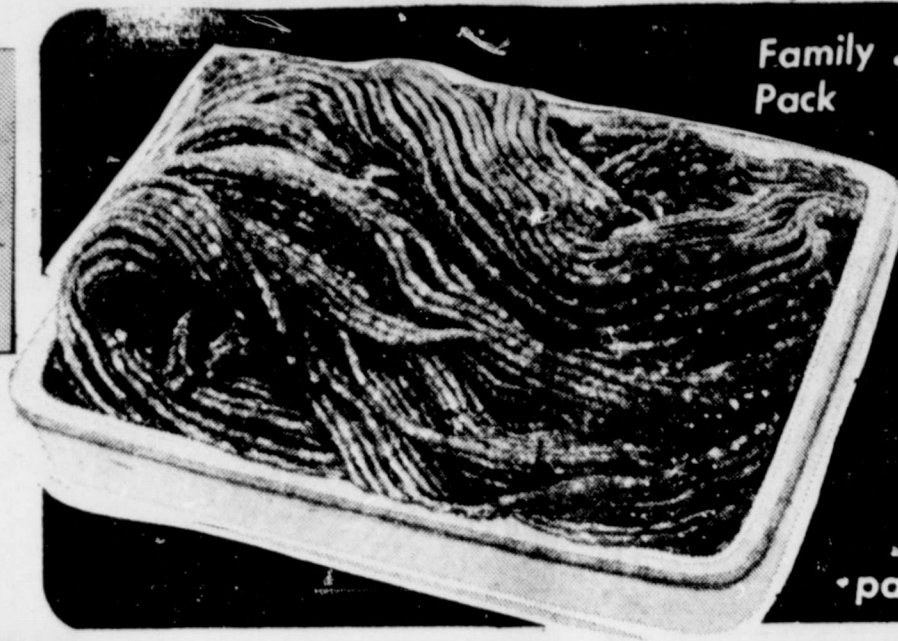
