The Johnson County Democrat one of our most wide-awake exchanges, enters its third year today. Long life to it!

If a man should have an office in a National Bank building it is no sign he is a banker; or, in another light, because force of circumstances compels a man to rent, that is no sign that he is owned by his landlord.

The Mauch Chunk (Pa.) Democrat says that the workmen in the Lehigh ore mines get 60 cents a day and live on raw bacon and dry bread. Raise the duty on the necessities of life a trifle higher, and the poor fellows would starve.

The Democratic convention held in the Court-house, last Saturday afternoon, was the largest Democratic convention ever held in the county; and it passed off very harmoniously, as all the Democratic conventions ever held in this county have done; and the delegates chosen are representative men of the party; and had we been present and had the choosing of the delegates we could not have selected better men.

In a recent interview, Judge Hilton, the executor of the A. T. Stewart estate, said: "I have closed a dozen of our woolen mills, because we can buy goods cheaper than we can manufacture them. We can make woolen goods in this country as well as they can make them anywhere else, but there is no profit in it. The tariff on wool is too high. As to cotton-factories they are shutting down. I don't think we have begun to see the stoppage of mills and manufactures which is coming."

In speaking of a leader for the Democracy of this State, the Johnson County Democrat says: "For leader of the Kansas State Democracy, or the campaign of 1884, give us Gov. Glick! He is a courageous leader; he organized a dispirited Democracy, a dispirited people, and led it to an unexpected and astounding victory. The marked success of his administration and the deserved hold he has upon the people of the State, the people's demand upon him to continue to lead them, is irresistible."

"The Emporia Republican suggests to the protectionist Congressmen," says the State Journal, "that they put themselves into a logical straight line, by laying a prohibitory duty on imported laborers as well as fabrics. But how? Shall it be specific or ad valorem per capita? or by invoice! And if the latter, shall each infant be construed to be an adult? These little intricacies ought to be 'so adjusted' as to harmonize with the limping logic of the humbug system. The suggestion coming from a good Republican paper, ought to be accepted as an amendment to Kelly's speech."

**OKLAHOMA.**  
Mr. J. Ray Stearns, of Spring creek, returned from Oklahoma last Friday. In telling us about that country, he said:

"Traveling south, from Caldwell, Kansas, the first stream of any water is Salt Fork. The land along this stream is not very good; it is broken and sandy; no timber to speak of, and the water is not good. The next stream is the Cimmaron; here we found more timber and better land; also, between the Cimmaron and the North Fork of the Canadian the land is all good. Small streams running into these streams have more or less timber along them, and considerable bottom land. The bottoms along the Cimmaron are very good, but not so wide as along the Canadian, where we found very wide bottoms and plenty of timber, and a beautiful stream. The bottoms are from three to five miles wide, and the best land I ever saw; grass is from one month to six weeks in advance of that in this section. Between the North and South Canadian the up land is very fine—all tilable. The banks of the streams are all high and no overflowing at the bottoms.

"We found a great many people there, from all parts of the country, from Iowa, Ohio, Illinois and Missouri, but more from Kansas than from any other place. We found some trying to make im-

provements in the way of plowing, and building cabins; but the soldiers would not allow any improvements of any kind, and those who persisted in settling were taken out of the country.

"The cattle men have miles of country fenced; and the country is full of stock, but the Commanding Officer at Ft. Reno informed us that they were going to destroy all improvements made by them, and sent out a detachment of soldiers for that purpose.

"I would say to all who contemplate a trip to Oklahoma for the purpose of settlement, the shortest route there, is to stay at home until some action is taken by the Government in the matter. You will save time and money, as you can not locate. The country is full of soldiers and they will not permit it.

"On the whole, Oklahoma is all that has ever been said of it, in the way of its being a fine country, and a great many people can get desirable homes there should our Government conclude to permit settlement.

"There are no Indians in Oklahoma; and they do not claim the country.

"The soldiers put line men in the guard house at Ft. Reno, and we understood they were to be taken to Ft. Smith. They were old offenders; some of them having been taken out six times by the soldiers. There was no trouble between the soldiers and the 'boom-ers,' with the exception of two men who refused to go when ordered out, and they were tied behind the wagons and compelled to walk until they concluded to go."

**DEMOCRATIC COUNTY CONVENTION.**

The Democratic county convention met last Saturday, May 10, at 2 o'clock p. m., L. W. Coleman, chairman of the central committee, called the convention to order.

L. W. Coleman was made permanent chairman and J. A. Smith secretary. After the call had been read Dr. J. W. Stone and Hon. W. P. Martin were elected delegates to the state convention at Topeka. Dr. L. P. Ravenscroft and John R. Holmes were elected alternates.

An informal ballot was then taken as to the choice of the convention for President, resulting as follows: First choice, Tilden, 22; McDonald, 8; Hendricks, 3; Field, 1. Second choice, Payne, 2; Hendricks, 4; Field, 23; Tilden, 1; Hancock, 1.

The following resolutions were then acted upon:

Resolved—That the delegates just elected by this convention are hereby instructed to use all honorable means to secure the election of W. E. Timmons, of this county, as a delegate to the Democratic national convention to be held in Chicago, July 8, 1884. Lost.

Resolved—That the delegates from this convention are hereby instructed to vote for Tilden delegates first and Field delegates second, to the Chicago convention. Carried.

Resolved—That it is the sense of this convention that our present governor has made us an able and just officer and that he should be again made the standard bearer of the Democratic party in this fall's campaign. Carried.

Resolved, Further—That it is the sense of this convention that the Democratic party of Kansas is under everlasting obligations to Martin Van Buren Bennett for his untiring efforts to strengthen the backbone of resubmission, and that we urge him to keep on in his glorious work. Carried.

Convention adjourned.
