He attended Bob Jones University and Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary. McGinlay is married and has two children.

The singer for the services is Steve Taylor. This talented and experienced man is a full-time itinerant music-evangelist. He has had twenty-two years experience in music-evangelism and participated in over seven hundred revival crusades four hundred and fifty Sacred Concerts, one hundred and thirty-four Evangelism and Bible Conferences, Mission endeavors and other varied religious programs. Though a native of California he makes his home and headquarters in Greenville, South Carolina, is married and the father of four lovely children. He is married to the former Gloria Norton of Chattanooga, Tennessee.

Through the years he has practiced scheduling meetings as they come to him through the mails and via telephone. ### Water Inc To Meet Saturday

Lubbock--Water leaders from throughout West Texas, Eastern New Mexico and the Oklahoma Panhandle will converge on Lubbock Saturday (October 24) to launch a n area-wide membership drive for Water, Inc. The kickoff meeting is slated at the

In Town Inn and will be concluded with a luncheon.

Chairman of the membership Committee of Water, Inc., is Gaston Wells, Dumas, the organization's first vice president. Wells said that officers of the organization's county un-

its and county membership committee chairmen will attend the Lubbock meeting along with the organization's officers and directors.

There are currently about 2,200 active members in Water, Inc., and directors have set a goal of 3,000 by the annual meeting in mid-February.

The special emphasis on membership will extend through November with solicitation teams working in virtually every community served by Water, Inc.

Water, Inc., activities are financed through membership dues, each member pledging an annual contribution to the work. In addition to financing, each individual member is encouraged to become a leader in the educational drive for water resource development.

Water, Inc., is a "grass-roots" organization working toward adequate future water for all. It layed a lead role in development of the Texas Water Plan and is currently working toward implementation of the plan which calls for importation of water into areas of scarcity.

### 9 Accidents In Lynn Co. In Sept.

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated nine accidents on rural highways in Lynn County during the month of September, according to Sergeant Hal

Pirtle, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in two persons killed, six persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$7,075.00.

The rural accident summary for this county during the first nine months of 1970 shows a total of 63 accidents resulting in five persons killed, 40 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$52,235.00.

Total traffic accidents in Texas during the last twenty years have increased from 200,000 in 1950 to approximately one million in 1969. Total number of persons injured in traffic accidents has increased from 69,000 in 1959 to 223,000 in 1969. Total number of persons killed in traffic accidents has increased from 2,410 in 1950 to 3,551 in 1969.

The Sergeant reminded all Texas motorists that vehicles bearing red motor vehicle inspection stickers with the large black numeral "10" in the lower left-hand corner of the windshield must be reinspected before midnight, October 31.

### Community Action Volunteers

The Lynn County Community Action Committee is calling upon the people of Lynn County to assist in its program of helping the underprivileged people of our County to help themselves in an up-grading program that applies to many of our citizens in Lynn County.

The Lynn County Community Action Committee, through money made available by the Office of Economic Opportunity, is the local committee which has been officially recognized by the Commissioners Court of Lynn County. The local committee is a branch of the area-wide, eight county, Community Action Agency.

The goals and purposes of the Community Action Agency, as developed by the office of O.E.O., have been designated as follows:

1. Strengthening of community capacity for planning and coordinating poverty related programs.

2. Better organization of a range of services related to the needs of the poor.

3. Greater use of innovative approaches in attacking the causes of poverty.

4. Increased and more effective participation by the poor in planning and conducting of programs which affect their lives.

5. Broadening the base of human material resources invested by the non-poor community in anti-poverty programs. The local Committee believes that numbers four and five would be the most practical choices in applying these goals to Lynn County -- that is -- the non-poor community people (No. 5) assisting in teaching and helping the poverty area people, (no. 4).

In order to fulfill these goals it is necessary that the Local Committee be assisted by voluntary means by the people of Lynn County who are willing and able to help others less fortunate than themselves. Volunteers are needed to assist in the following areas, at least to begin with:

(a) First aid (b) Home re-

pairs, plumbing, electric, carpentry, (c) Drivers education, (d) Buying, cooking, serving good, (e) Sewing for the family, (f) Auto mechanics, welding, radio and T.V. repairs, (g) Typing, shorthand, business machines, (h) Community clean up and improvement.

The Lynn County Community Action Agency has its headquarters at the Neighborhood Center, 1517 South Second St., Tahoka, Texas. Telephone 998-5094.

It is proposed, with citizens of Lynn County providing the necessary skills and assistance that classes of any or all of the above classifications will be held at the center. However, it is anticipated that only two classes, or three at the most, would be held at the same time. This program would involve about eight or ten hours of voluntary work per week. Classes would be scheduled for the convenience of the most people

### Will Travel To Post Friday

The Bulldogs overpowered the Idalou Wildcats in the final period of play last Friday night by scoring two touchdowns and breaking a 6-6 score to win 18-6. The Bulldogs on a rain soaked field scored in the first period with the Wildcats only score coming in the second period of play. The Bulldogs won the homecoming grid contest to give them a 3-3 season so far.

Tahoka scored in the first period of play with 1:32 left on the scoreboard clock. Robert Montemayor covered a Wildcat fumble on the 47 yard line and then carried the ball six out of 8 times to score on a 18 yard run. Duham's place kick went wide.

In the second quarter neither team could move the ball consistently until late in the period when Lan covered a Tahoka fumble on Tahoka's 27 yard line. Quarterback Ben Isom passed 37 yards and 35 yards to end Larry Petree to set up the lone Idalou touchdown from 1 yard out. With 1:53 showing in the first half Ben Isom went the 1 yard and Mojca's place kick was blocked by End Gene Walker. The half ended in a 6-6 deadlock.

Neither team could move in the 3rd quarter and Roger Miller made a beautiful interception near the end of the quarter to stop an Idalou drive. Fullback Larry Durham got the Bulldogs out of a hole on 16 yard line to start a 84 yard touchdown drive for the Bulldogs.

Tahoka moved down the field on carries by Montemayor, Larry Durham, and a sophomore who is playing good football both offensively and defensively this year, John Thomas, a 19-yard pass from quarterback Cliff Gardner to Wingback Reggie Stark, and Montemayor went the last 11 yards around right end for the score. The attempted pass conversion failed with 7:59 left in the game giving the Bulldogs a 12-6 lead.

On the kickoff the Idalou Wildcats fumble on their own 40 yard line and Joe Calvillo covered to set up the last TD. After being set back by a 15 yard holding penalty Montemayor went off right tackle, and in determined desperation ran for 28 yards and a score. Jeff Atwell ran over for the conversion, but a motion penalty called on the Bulldogs, and then Atwell's pass for conversion failed with 4:25 left in the game.

In the fading moments, Idalou completed 2 passes for 38 yards, but the drive stopped when Charles McAuley intercepted a n Idalou pass and Tahoka ran out the clock.

The Bulldogs will travel to Post this coming Friday night to meet the Post Antelopes in another 4-AA district contest. The Bulldogs are 3-3 for the season and the Antelopes have won 1 and lost 4.

The Wilson Mustangs had an open date last Friday and will play Ropes at 2:30 p.m. in Wilson, Friday, Oct. 23.

A gunman, thought to have been assisted by an accomplice who waited in a car outside, robbed an attendant at Ince Oil Co. here of \$326 at 6:40 a.m. Monday.

Jack Ausburn, the attendant, reported the gunman approached him while he was opening the station that morning and took the station bank bag and Ausburn's billfold.

"Gimme your money bag," Ausburn quoted the man, Ausburn complied, seeing the man's gun and arm, with a dark coat sleeve.

"Billfold," the suspect demanded.

"I reached back with my right hand and lifted it out of my hip pocket and handed it to him backwards, without turning around," Ausburn said.

"I was scared. If a man's got a gun he's right," Ausburn said.

The man darted out of the station and Ausburn said he could hear someone running up the concrete outside, and peered out from a side door and saw a man's dark form disappear into the heavy fog that hung over the ground early today. "You couldn't see much past 15-20 feet," Ausburn said.

The station is located just north of Tahoka City limits on U.S. 87.

The bank bag was recovered later about 40 feet north of the service station near Starlight. Ausburn's billfold was on the ground near the bank bag, according to Joe Ince of Lubbock, company supervisor. Checks and credit tickets were left.

Ince said \$290 was taken from the station bank bag and \$36 was taken from Ausburn's billfold.

Lynn County Sheriff Norvell Redwine said his office, the Department of Public Safety and Texas Rangers were conducting an investigation.

Ince said only one man went into the station and that the other was reported to have been waiting in the car nearby. Ausburn reported seeing two Mexican-American men cruising around the station in a brown 1968 Pontiac prior to the holdup, Ince said.

A new time has been set for next week's meeting. It will be at 7:00 p.m., Monday night, October 26 in the School Cafeteria.

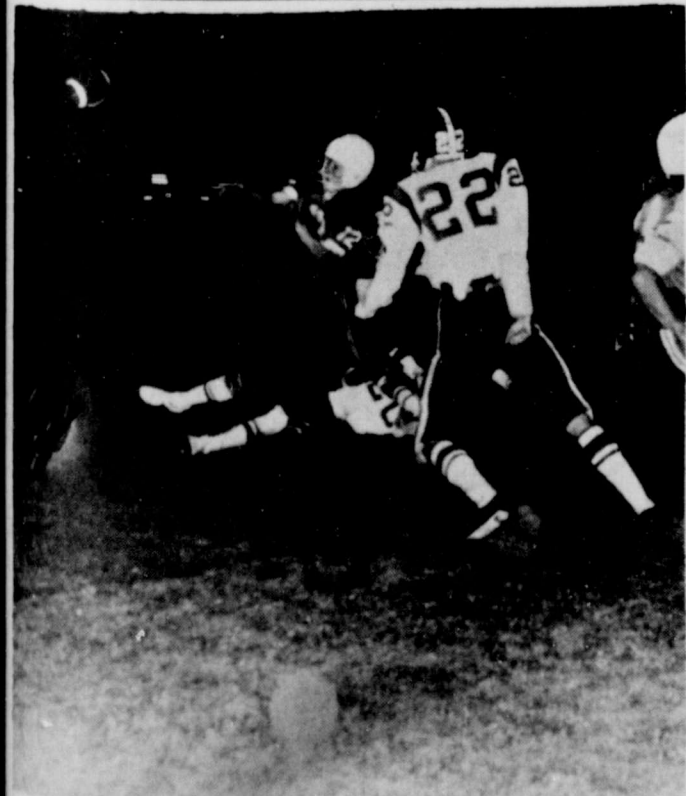

### Teachers To Meet Thursday Night

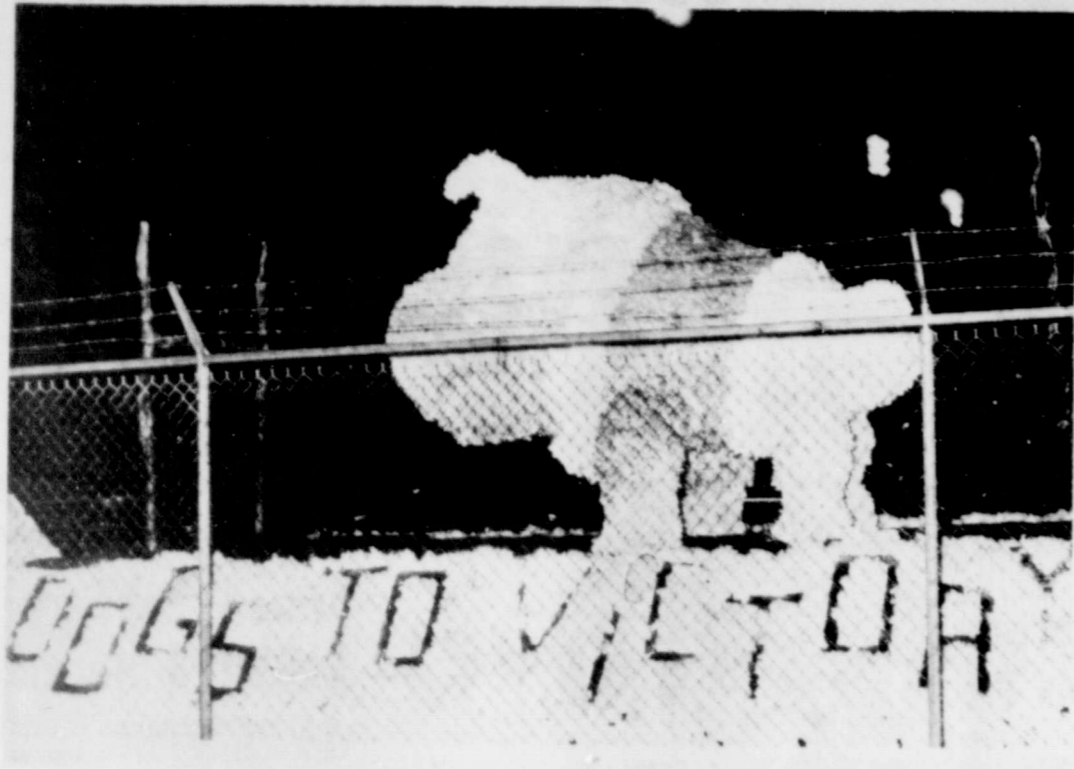

Actually, the new wallpaper isn't necessarily paper at all. It may be vinyl fabric, or if it is paper, it is commonly treated with a vinyl coating. The vinyl fabrics and coating convert a once humongous chore into a quick and easy task of wiping off most any type of soil -- from fingerprints to kitchen grease splatters.

The designs of the vinyl wallpapers come in many styles. Some of the papers have flocked patterns, giving a velvet appearance. Some have the new "wet look" that resembles patent leather.

The patterns, which range from formal French to the very informal contemporary, include stripes, stylized flowers, pais-

leys or even murals that look like hand painted walls.

The new wallpapers are pre-pasted, so decorating with them doesn't require professional help. Simply wet the paper and stick it to the wall. It's particularly easy if doing only a small area or one wall.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK  
Tri-Color Cassarole

1 pkg. frozen chopped broccoli  
1 can Cream of Mushroom Soup  
1 1/2 cups water  
1 1/3 cups minute rice  
1 tsp. garlic salt  
1 1/2 tsp. lemon juice  
4 hard-cooked eggs, sliced  
1 cup shredded sharp cheddar cheese  
1 cup French fried onions

Prepare broccoli as directed on package; drain. Combine broccoli, soup, water, rice, garlic salt and lemon juice in 1 1/2 qt. casserole. Cover, bake at 400 degrees for 25 minutes. Stir. Top with layers of eggs and cheese. Place onions around edge of casserole. Bake 5 minutes more, or until onions are lightly browned and cheese is melting. 4 servings.

"I believe in the United States of America, as a government of the people, for the people; whose just powers are derived from the consent of the governed; a democracy in a republic; a sovereign nation of many sovereign states; a perfect union, one and inseparable; established upon those principles of freedom, equality, justice and humanity for which American patriots sacrificed their lives and fortunes.

I, therefore, believe it is my duty to my country to love it, to support its constitution, to obey its laws, to respect its flag, and to defend it against all enemies."

The American's Creed by William Tyler Page was adopted by an Act of Congress, April 6, 1918.

## Pledge Of Allegiance To The Flag

"I pledge allegiance to the

flag of the United States of America and to the Republic for which it stands, one Nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all."

This wording of the pledge varies slightly from the original, which was drawn up in 1892 in the office of The Youth's Companion magazine in Boston. It was first used in the public school in celebration of Columbus Day, October 12, 1892.

The pledge received official recognition by Congress in an Act approved June 22, 1942.

Copied from Oct. 7, 1926  
Uncle Ike reports that Dan Cupid has been unusually busy late. Last week four pairs of victims of Mr. Cupid's arrows came to the Judge for relief, which he promptly granted by requesting them to join hands and promise to love, honor and obey each other forever. One of these couples came from Lamesa and the Judge was unable to recall their names. The other three couples are bona fide citizens of Lynn County and gave their names as follows: W.H. 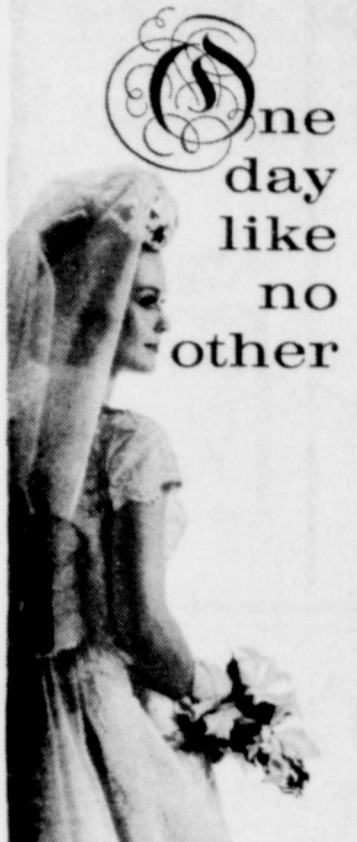

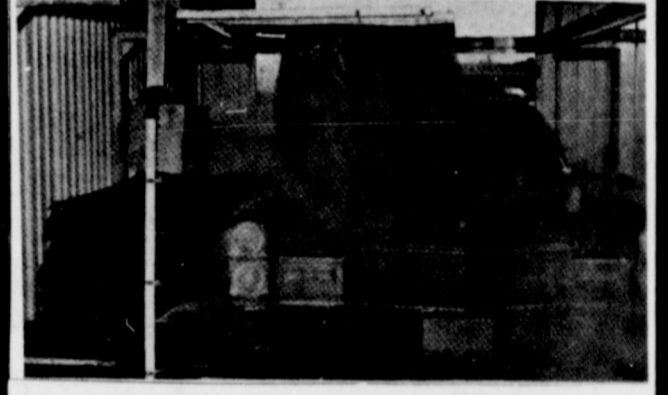

O'Donnell now stands 4-2 for the season.

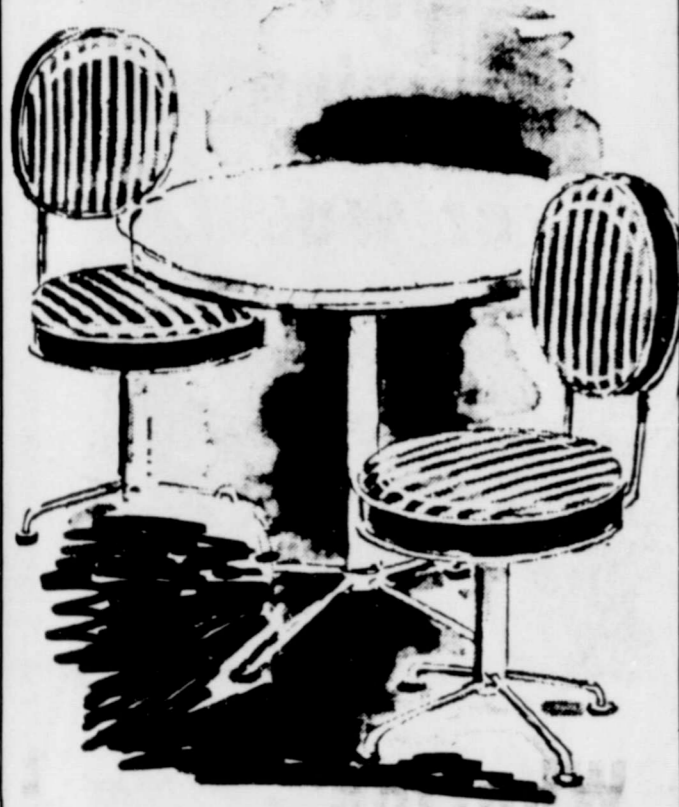

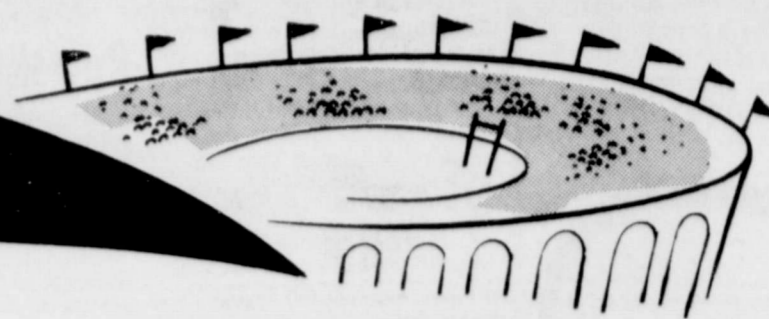

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## Bill Griffin, County Agent, Says.....

Don't overlook the empty or nearly empty agricultural containers which have accumulated around the farm since last spring when the fall clean-up begins.

These containers in some instances can be even more dangerous than those which may still be nearly full because of careless handling and the fact that they are empty. Most containers, regardless of the type, will still contain enough residue to cause poisoning of pigs, livestock or even people, reminds the county agent.

All herbicides and defoliant containers should be destroyed by burying them at least 18 inches deep in soil where water cannot be polluted or else wrapped in newspaper for the trash collector. Metal and glass containers should be crushed or broken before disposal so that they can never be used again.

All containers which are to be held over should be checked closely for leaks. A small hole in a paper container can become the source of contamination for feed and water.

It's best not to burn paper bags that have contained pesticides. The smoke, may be toxic and will pollute the air. Never throw an empty aerosol type container into a fire. They will explode. They should be depressurized before placing them in the trash for pickup.

If at all possible, store pesticides in Agri-Chemicals original containers. Containers should be sealed from air and moisture with the label intact.
