Dogs Will Play At Slaton Friday

the Post Antelopes last Friday night 32-14. The Bulldogs played good hardnose football and pushed the larger Post eleven around at ease to spoil the Post Homecoming.

On the second play after the kick-off, Tahoka's Robert Mon. temayor covered a Post fumble on the Post 27. Tahoka moved to the Post 5 yard line but bogged down on a pass play that was called a touchdown and then nullified by the referee Post moved to one first down from that point and the got off short punt that covered only 20 yards. Safety Jeff Atwell called for a fair catch and was hit by Post defenders to get a 15 yard penalty that put the Tahoka 11 on the Post 29 yard line. Then, on the first play from scrimmage quarterback Cliff Gardner passed to end Gene Walker, all alone on the 8 yard line and trotted in for the first Tahoka score with 5:57 left in the 1st quarter Durham kicked the PAT to end the scoring in the first quarter and give the Bulldogs a 7.0 first quarter lead.

Neit sistently in the seound quarter until the Bulldog gridders recovered a Post Antelope fum-

ble on the Post 27 yard line. Two plays later Cliff Gardner passed to sophomore John Thomas for 23 yards and another Tahoka score with 5:55 left in the first half. Durham kicked to give the Dogs a 14.0 lead.

After the Bulldog kickoff Post moved out to their own 40 vard line but fumbled at that point and Robert Montemayor covered the second of his three fumble recoveries on the Post 39 yard line. Then on a razzle-dazzle play in which Gardner handed off to Durham, back to Gardner from Durham, then Gardner threw a pass to Gene Walker who scored his second touchdown of the night and the third touchdown for the Tahoka Bulldogs which covered 39 yards with 4:08 left in the half. The conversion failed to give the Bulldogs a 20-0 lead.

Post then launched a desperation passing attack and in 11 plays and passes good for 9-24-18-33 yards moved the ball to the Tahoka 6 yard line and with 6 seconds left, big FB Larry Bilberry went around right end for the first Antelope score fo the night and then ran the conversion up the middle for the PAT. The halftime activities began with the Bulldogs 20 and the Antelopes 8.

The Bulldogs received the kickoff in the start of the second half and Larry Durham brought Post Soph. John Minor's (son of former Tahoka player James Minor) kick-of to Tahokas' 37 yard line, and Tahoka moved 63 yards in 4 plays to score again, with Robert Montemayor break ing loose behind good blocking for a 37 yard jaunt. Then the Bulldogs ended up on the 12 when pass interference was called on the Antelopes. Tahoka Bulldog quarterback Cliff Gardner then circled left end for 12 yards and Tahoka's fourth touchdown of the night with 10:57 left in the third stanza. Pass attempt for conversion failed. The Bulldogs led at that point with a 26-8 score.

Tahoka then covered a Post fumble (one of many) at the Post 32 and moved to the 15 on a penalty, but 2 plays lost 10 yards, and Robert Pace inter-

26. Three plays later Gardner returned the favor by intercepting quarterback Robert Bullock's long pass on the Post 37 yard line and was injured on the play. Jeff Atwell replaced Gardner and had his first pass attempt intercepted by Post's David Woods on the Post 45 and Woods ran the ball to the Tahoka 39.

Post's Antelopes could not move the ball from that point and the Bulldogs took over on their own 35 yard line. On third down from that point Tahoka's Robert Montemayor bulled through the line, broke two tackles, cut to right and followed tremendous blocks from John Thomas and Roger Miller and out ran two Post defenders 58 vards for Tahoka's final score of the grid contest with 4:09 left in the third quarter. The pass attempt again failed for the PAT giving the Bull-

dogs a 32-8 lead. In the closing minutes of the third period Jeff Atwell stopped a potential Post drive with an interception on the Post 40 vard line.

In the fourth period the Tahoka gridders were unable to score with their second team in and held the Antelopes to only one score.

Post quarterback Bullock's pass to end Kim Owen was good for 40 yards and he then passed to halfback Rickey Haire for 15 yards and finally passed to Owens for 10 yards and Post's second touchdown with 11:28 left in the final period of play. Run-

ning conversion failed. Neither team could gain consistently the rest of the fourth quarter which was marred by penalties, players being removed from the field of play, and a pass interception by Cliff Gardner (his second of the night) and a 44 yard Tahoka quick kick by Larry Durham.

The game statistics were about even except for fumbles and the big scoring plays Tahoka came up with. The Bulldogs were outweighed nearly 15 lbs. per man, but had harder hitting on both offense and defense which made the big difference in the outcome of the grid contest.

The Bulldogs will travel to Slaton this Friday night for another 4-AA tilt with the Slaton Tigers.

LCCDC Has Food Available For Migrant Workers

This October, the Migrant and Seasonal Farm Work. Program has increaded the emergency food and medical funds available to the migrants of

this territory to \$87,000. These funds are immediately available to meet the nutritional needs of migrants and seasonal farm workers in emergency situations. Emergency situations may include the following: an act of God (weather, illness), strike, lock-out, mechanization, delayed crops which make employment difficult to locate, undue hardship because of employment conditions, and critical when in transit to and from employment.

Emergency food monies can only be used when no assistance from other sources is available to meet the immediate needs. Consequently, the contracting agencies are expected to work with the Welfare Department in pective recipients in the federal food program in the county, if available. 

"Domestic utilization of wheat in human nutrition and industry can be encouraged by the recently enacted Wheat Research and Promotion Act." Secretary of Agriculture Clifford M. Hardin declared.

"The prospect is quite promising that research can develop new products and greater utilization of wheat," Secretary Hardin stated. "Many other farm commodities are seeing the fruits of an effective research and promotion pro. gram, and this self-help effort by the wheat industry is in that same spirit."

The Congressional measure (HR 13543) could provide more than \$4 million for research on new uses for wheat and market development.

It authorizes the Secretary to enter into agreements with farm organizations representing a cooperative effort among wheat producer groups to increase domestic wheat usage. The Institute incorporates the requirements outlined by the U.S. Department of Agriculture for eligibility to receive contracts under the program.

Financing of the Program 1968 wheat export certificate pool not claimed by eligible farmers. The \$4.2 million he has received. pool is the result of legislation passed several years ago that provides for excess collections of export certificates to be dis. tives in Tahoka last weekend.

Wheat exporters are required to buy export certificates for any lot of wheat exported when. ever the U.S. price is less than the world price. Whenever the U.S. price exceeds the world price, an export subsidy is paid to the exporter to make the wheat competitive in world markets. The world market price for the 1968 crop of wheat was at times higher than the U.S. price and an export certificate pool of slightly over \$4.2 million was accumulated.

County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service offices will notify eligible wheat producers of their pro rata share of the pool. Producers may elect to receive their share or leave it to finance the research and promotion program. The will have until Dec. 24, 1970, to notify their county ASCS office whether they elect to receive the payment.





All articles should be packed in boxes of wood, metal, solid fiberboard or strong double faced corrigated fiberboard. All fiberboard boxes should be securely wrapped in heavy paper and tied with strong cord. Sufficient cushioning material should be used to prevent rattling or loosening of articles within the package. A slip list of contents, name and showing address of sender and addressee should be enclosed in the parcel. Forms 2966 or 2976-A Customs Declaration. completed by senders are required on parcels to many destinations.

In addition to articiles normally prohibited in the mail, matches of all kinds and light. er fluid may not be mailed overseas to military addresses. Cigarettes, other tobacco products, coffee and various other itmes are prohibited in parcels addressed to some military post offices.

The domestic rates of postage are applicable and postage must be fully prepaid. When fourth-class or air parcel post rates are applicable, the zone rate from the post office where mailed to the post office through which the parcel is addressed will be charged . Air mail larticles weighing not in excess

parcel to permit identity in case of damage or loss of the outside address label. The outside address label should be placed on only one side of each parcel.

Greeting cards for distant states should be mailed not later than Dec. 1, and those for local delivery not later than Dec. 15. Customers are to be reminded that there will be no delivery on Christmas cards and letters other than Special Delivery, on Christmas Day.

Surface mail for Alaska and Hawaii should be mailed not later than Nov. 30, and Air Mail not later than Dec. 14 to in. sure delivery before Christ-
