## LCCDC Has Food Available For Migrant Workers

This October, the Migrant and Seasonal Farm Work Program has increased the emergency food and medical funds available to the migrants of this territory to \$87,000.

These funds are immediately available to meet the nutritional needs of migrants and seasonal farm workers in emergency situations. Emergency situations may include the following: an act of God (weather, illness), strike, lock-out, mechanization, delayed crops which make employment difficult to locate, undue hardship because of employment conditions, and critical when in transit to and from employment.

Emergency food monies can only be used when no assistance from other sources is available to meet the immediate needs. Consequently, the contracting agencies are expected to work with the Welfare Department in obtaining certification of prospective recipients in the federal food program in the county, if available. Emergency food monies can be used to purchase food stamps.

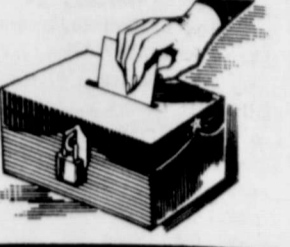
Prospective recipients must meet the following:

1. Must be a migrant or seasonal farm worker who earns half (1/2) or more of his annual income from agricultural work and who works for more than two employers during the year.
2. Families recently settled out of the stream will be considered eligible.
3. Recipients must also fall

below the poverty line established by OEO or face a dire emergency.

Private non-profit organizations wishing to act as outreach workers to contact the migrant and seasonal farm workers to set up a food voucher system with the local grocery store so the poor may get food should write or call:

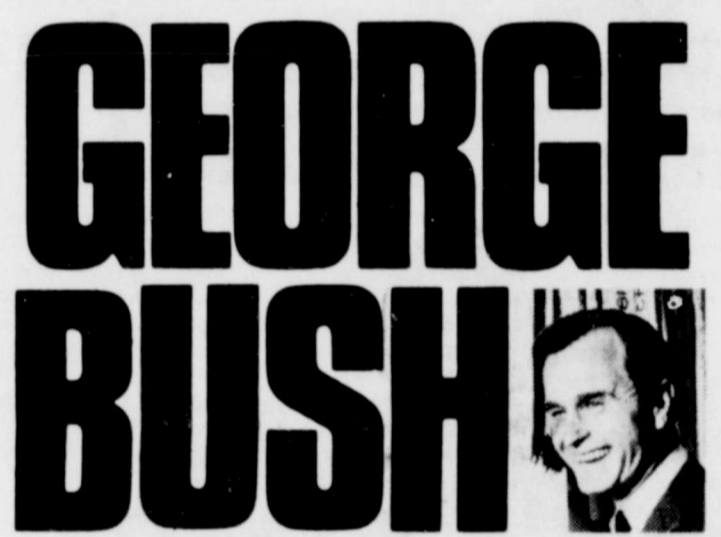
## New Home Bows To Sundown

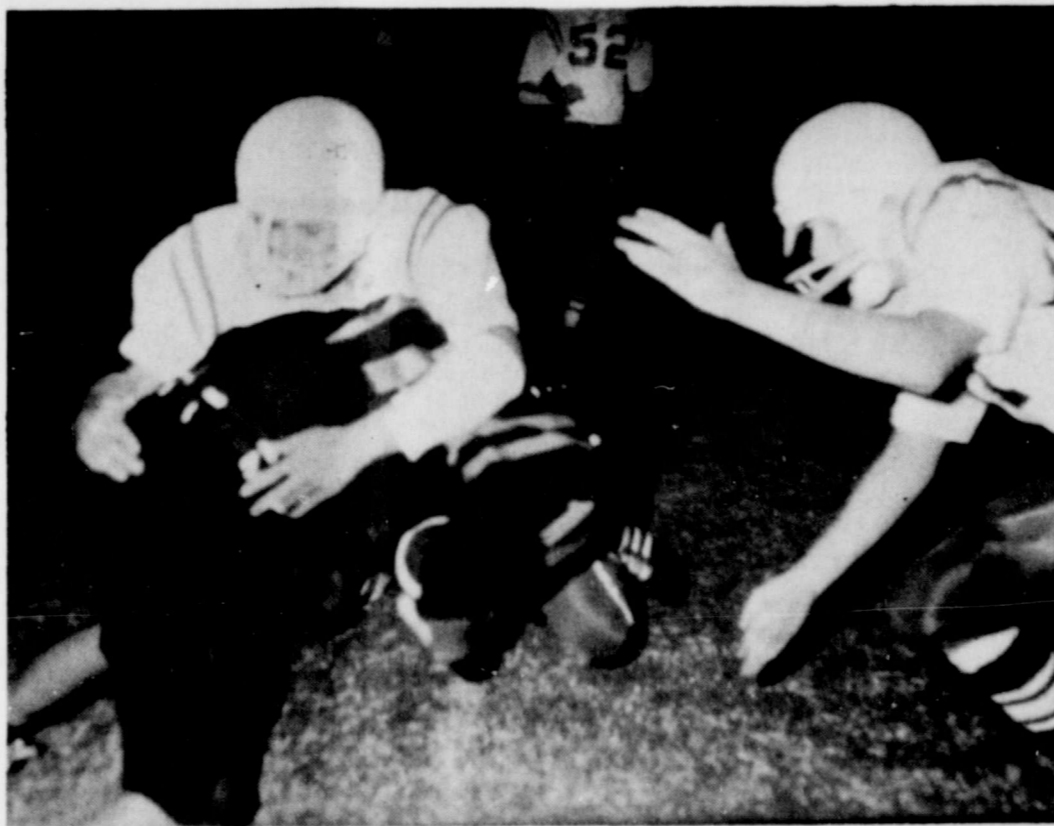

## Wilson School Board Meets

The Wilson School Board met in regular session on Tuesday, October 20. Items of business included the approval of the 1969-70 school audit, a change in the fee for drivers' education, and enrollment and attendance reports and comparisons.

Mr. Robert Abbe, C.P.A. from Tahoka presented the audit which showed 99 percent collection of school taxes for 1969-70.

The board approved changing the fee for students from \$20.00 to \$25.00 for drivers education. The classroom work will be done during the spring semester with the driving being taught in the summer.

Enrollment reports indicate a substantial increase over the past several years with 426 enrolled at this time. The elementary school has 255 enrolled and the Jr. and Sr. High has 171. Average daily attendance for the first six weeks was 393.61 as compared to 357.15 at the end of the first six weeks last year.

In called meetings during the month Mrs. Rose Rameriz and Mrs. Virginia Swope were employed as teacher aides. The board also accepted a bid of \$550.00 from Slaton Roofing Company to replace the roof on the Homemaking cottage and approved additional walks for the school grounds.

## Lehman Elected To USO Council

## A.S.C.S. NEWS

"Domestic utilization of wheat in human nutrition and industry can be encouraged by the recently enacted Wheat Research and Promotion Act," Secretary of Agriculture Clifford M. Hardin declared.

"The prospect is quite promising that research can develop new products and greater utilization of wheat," Secretary Hardin stated. "Many other farm commodities are seeing the fruits of an effective research and promotion program, and this self-help effort by the wheat industry is in that same spirit."

The Congressional measure (HR 13543) could provide more than \$4 million for research on new uses for wheat and market development.

It authorizes the Secretary to enter into agreements with farm organizations representing a cooperative effort among wheat producer groups to increase domestic wheat usage. The Institute incorporates the requirements outlined by the U.S. Department of Agriculture for eligibility to receive contracts under the program.

Financing of the Program will come from proceeds of the 1968 wheat export certificate pool not claimed by eligible farmers. The \$4.2 million pool is the result of legislation passed several years ago that provides for excess collections of export certificates to be distributed pro rata among wheat producers.

Wheat exporters are required to buy export certificates for any lot of wheat exported whenever the U.S. price is less than the world price. Whenever the U.S. price exceeds the world price, an export subsidy is paid to the exporter to make the wheat competitive in world markets. The world market price for the 1968 crop of wheat was at times higher than the U.S. price and an export certificate pool of slightly over \$4.2 million was accumulated.

County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service offices will notify eligible wheat producers of their pro rata share of the pool. Producers may elect to receive their share or leave it to finance the research and promotion program. The will have until Dec. 24, 1970, to notify their county ASCS office whether they elect to receive the payment.

Tahoka Girl Scouts belong to a central unit of operation called the Caprock Council with offices in Lubbock.

The central unit includes many area towns, each of which is represented on the Council Board by one or more members. This Board meets regularly to determine policies, programs and finances and to

discuss needs of individual units. In turn, a field director in the Lubbock office is assigned to several towns, and she makes periodic, often weekly, visits to each town to check on needs and pro-

vide assistance to leaders. Each town is represented by a Service Unit Chairman, who is a liaison person from her town to the Council office. She is in charge of scheduling needed local training courses which are not planned by the Council office, as well as being a resource person for information and assistance to local leaders.

Leaders and their assistants organize their own troops and map out their own programs, including as many varied activities as possible. Types of activities depend on size and interests of each troop. Many leaders depend on resource people in the community to provide programs or teach skills in special fields.

In addition, each troop is served by a committee of mothers, usually three, who may provide transportation, refreshments or help in ways designated by the leader or her assistant.

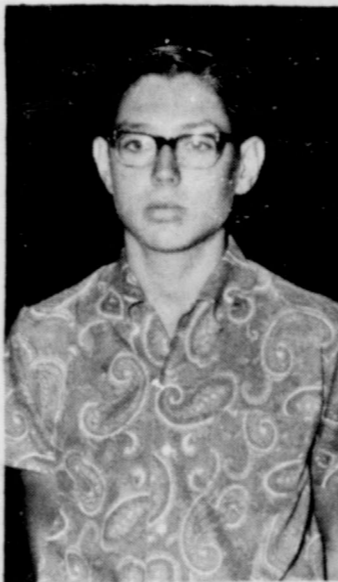

### Deadline For Yule Mail Announced

The season for mailing of holiday parcels, cards and letters has arrived, and Tahoka Postmaster Charles Townes announces dates for posting items to overseas armed forces and for domestic delivery.

Mailing dates and other requirements were announced for the benefit of those who wish their packages and other special mail to arrive at its destination before Christmas.

Townes lists the following periods for mailing Christmas parcels to Armed Forces personnel overseas: Oct. 16 - Nov. 6, surface transportation; Oct. 21 - Nov. 20, space available (SAM); Nov. 1 - Nov. 27, parcel airlift (PAL) and Dec. 1 - Dec. 11, airmail.

The term "Armed Forces Overseas" includes personnel of the armed forces, members of their families and U.S. civilians employed overseas who received their mail through an APO or FOP, New York, San Francisco or Seattle.

All articles should be packed in boxes of wood, metal, solid fiberboard or strong double-faced corrugated fiberboard. All fiberboard boxes should be securely wrapped in heavy paper and tied with strong cord. Sufficient cushioning material should be used to prevent rattling or loosening of articles within the package. A slip list of contents, name and showing address of sender and addressee should be enclosed in the parcel. Forms 2966 or 2976-A Customs Declaration, completed by senders are required on parcels to many destinations.

In addition to articles normally prohibited in the mail, matches of all kinds and lighter fluid may not be mailed overseas to military addresses. Cigarettes, other tobacco products, coffee and various other items are prohibited in parcels addressed to some military post offices.

The domestic rates of postage are applicable and postage must be fully prepaid. When fourth-class or air parcel post rates are applicable, the zone rate from the post office where mailed to the post office through which the parcel is addressed will be charged. Air mail articles weighing not in excess

of 8 ounces are chargeable at the rate of 8 cents per ounce. Addresses must be legible and complete, and should be prepared by typewriter or pen and ink. All APO numbers have been changed to five digits which are identical to the ZIP code.

Gift parcels weighing not more than five pounds and measuring not more than 60 inches in length and girth combined and addressed to members of the Armed Forces in Vietnam will be provided Air-Lift service on "space available basis" from the West Coast, even though prepaid at the surface rate.

In regard to domestic mail, Townes advises mailers to send gift parcels for distant states before Dec. 1 to insure delivery before Christmas. Gift parcels for local and nearby areas should be mailed not later than Dec. 10. The name and address of both the sender and addressee should be enclosed in each gift

parcel to permit identity in case of damage or loss of the outside address label. The outside address label should be placed on only one side of each parcel. Greeting cards for distant states should be mailed not later than Dec. 1, and those for local delivery not later than Dec. 15. Customers are to be reminded that there will be no delivery on Christmas cards and letters other than Special Delivery, on Christmas Day.

Surface mail for Alaska and Hawaii should be mailed not later than Nov. 30, and Air Mail not later than Dec. 14 to insure delivery before Christmas.

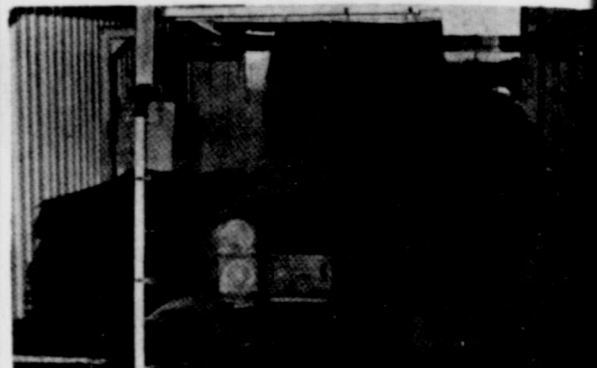
