Crowd Attends Grassland Marker Dedication Sunday

A capacity crowd attended the dedication program for the Grassland community historical marker held Sunday afternoon in Central Baptist Church. The marker has been installed by Texas Highway Department adjacent to the church on highway 380, two miles north of Grassland, and a caliche to the church on Highway 380, two miles north of Grassland, and a caliche driveway has been laid to the marker from the pavement for convenience of the traveling public. Later, "Historical Marker Ahead" signs will be erected each direction from the site. State Representative E.L. Short, a Grassland native, presided at the meeting and paid tribute to the early settlers of the community who weathered drought, sandstorms, depression, crop failures, and other adversities to make this one of the finest farming areas anywhere.

Frank Hill told of the early ranch, postoffice and trading post established by Enos L. Seeds, later a wealthy Philadelphia bridge builder, who came to the Plains in 1888 and left in 1900. This postoffice even preceded Lubbock, and was a crossing of Plains trails dating back to Indian times. J. H. "Mut" Huddleston, who came with his parents in 1916, told of the Post colonization project, and recounted many interesting facts in development of the area since then. He gave detail of establishment of the school, churches, and individual businesses, and also listed most of the first settlers.

County Judge V.F. Jones read the marker wording, and he and Mrs. Ben Moore Sr. of O'Donnell, Lynn County Historical Committee chairman, unveiled the marker.

Following the program, Mrs. Mittie Walker and a committee of Grassland Ladies served cake, sandwiches and coffee to the crowd. Visitors were present from Tahoka, Post, O'Donnell, and possibly other places.

Honor Society Plans Narcotics Awareness Day

The National Honor Society of Tahoka High School is sponsoring a Narcotics Awareness Day for the entire student body on December 2. The day will be spent with the students divided into five groups and each group spending about 40 minutes in each of six sessions. There will also be a group for teachers and adults of the system.

We have arranged for experts in the different areas of concern to conduct the sessions. Those coming to help are: Dr. Roy Powers a psychologist with the South Plains Guidance Center in Lubbock, a panel of student users from a nearby high school, Captain Bill Cox of the Lub-

bock Police Department, Mr. W.W. Black from Hereford who is a former user of hard drugs who has written pamphlets on different aspects of drug usage, Mr. Gerald Rial of First Baptist Church, Lubbock, Mr. Douglas Rhoads of the Crescent Hill Church of Christ of Brownfield and Rev. Lee Crouch of First United Methodist Church, Crosbyton will compose a ministerial panel, and a druggist will conduct a session showing the different drugs, explaining the names they are called and the chemical reaction to the body of the user.

After all groups have attended a session of all six divisions and have had time for questions and answers, the High School and Junior High School student bodies will gather for the key note address. This part of the day's activities is being sponsored jointly by the Tahoka P. T. A. and the National Honor Society.

The keynote address will be given by Mr. Wayne Butcher from Tulla. Mr. Butcher is an ex-member of the Hell's Angels and narcotic user. The story of his life will be the theme of his address. The few students who have heard Mr. Butcher speak before have heartily recommended him to the N. H. S. as a climax to the Narcotics Awareness Day.

Postmaster Suggests Christmas Mailing Hints

Even though it does not seem possible, states Postmaster Charles Townes, another Christmas season is just a few days away and he offers the following suggestions to make sure that your cards and gifts are delivered promptly and safely.

1. USE ZIP CODES - in your return address and in the address to which mail is being sent. ZIP Code directories are in the lobby of the post office and are available for loan to those who wish to ZIP Code their entire mailing lists.
2. SEPARATE CARDS AND LETTERS TO LOCAL AND OUT OF TOWN BUNDLES Labels for that purpose will be placed in each rural and post office box during the first week in December, and extra labels are available at the post office.

Tie bundles with twine or heavy rubber bands. Remember, now, Tahoka rural routes are considered "Local."

3. WRAP AND TIE PARCELS - so strongly that even the roughest handling will not affect them. It is advisable not to mail anything breakable, because - let's face it - the Christmas mails take a heckuva beating, and nobody likes to receive a gift damaged in transit. If you must mail something breakable, however, cushion it and pack it well enough that it will be impossible to damage.
4. MAIL CARDS AND PARCELS EARLY - Cards to distant states by Dec. 10th and to local areas by Dec. 15th - Parcels to distant states by Dec. 1st and to local areas by Dec. 11th. The earlier the better.
5. HOW MUCH POSTAGE? Same as for the past two years, that is, 6c per ounce on sealed (first-class) greetings and 6c for the first two ounces on unsealed cards which contain no written messages. Cards containing written messages are first-class whether sealed or unsealed. A word of caution-many heavy greeting cards mailed last year weighed over one ounce, and when mailed sealed, required extra postage. If heavy cards are being mailed, check with the post office for correct postage.

Bill Griffin, County Agent, Says.....

A topic getting much attention these days in Lynn County as well as the entire state has to do with a new program initiated by the Agricultural Extension Service. It is the "3.76 in '76" program designed to help Texas' great agricultural industry achieve its full potential.

Specifically, it will intensify Extension educational activities to bring about an increase in cash income, excluding government payments, to Texas farmers and ranchers by \$1 billion by the year 1976. The program is designed to increase both the gross and net income of producers.

Too, a principal object is to reduce the gap existing between knowledge and practice through the coordinated application of improved production and marketing practices available from research and proven demonstrations.

Another objective, is to utilize more appropriately and completely resource potentials of each agricultural production area of the state. Also to improve the power and performance of Texas agricultural products in the market place and bring greater confidence in the future to the state's farmers and ranchers.

Other agencies and organizations working to improve Texas agricultural have endorsed and are lending their full support to the effort.

Annual production goals from each economically important agricultural enterprise in each county are being established. Guidelines for the use of producers, out-lining the practices which can bring the projected production to reality, are now becoming available.

It will take a great deal of teamwork and considerable changing or production and management practices to achieve the desired goal. Texans and especially farm and ranch families stand to greatly benefit from the program.

WALNUT ROLL

Brush a jelly-roll pan, 10 x 15 inches, with oil, line it with wax paper, and oil the paper.
Separate 7 eggs. Beat the yolks with 3/4 cup sugar until the mixture is pale in color and thick enough to "ribbon." Beat in 1 1/2 cups ground walnuts and 1 teaspoon baking powder. Fold in egg whites, stiffly beaten. Spread the batter in the prepared pan and bake the cake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) 15 or 20 minutes or until it is golden. Cool the cake in the pan, cover it with a damp towel and chill it.
Dust the cold cake generously with sifted confectioner sugar and turn it out on a board covered with two overlapping sheets of wax paper. Carefully strip the paper from bottom of cake. Spread cake with 1 cup heavy cream, whipped and flavored to taste with sugar and vanilla. Roll up the cake, using the paper as an aid, slide the roll onto a flat serving platter. Sprinkle with more confectioner sugar. (Rum or almond flavoring is also good.)

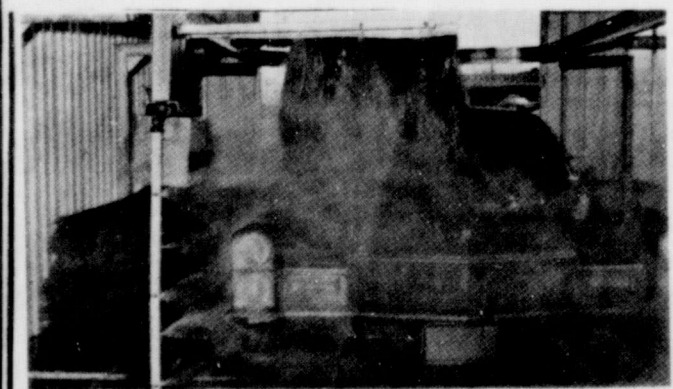
