Meat Yield To Eclipse **Top Volume**

Farmers may produce a recordbreaking volume of meat and other livestock products during the coming year, although the picture is clouded somewhat by the after effects of 1970 corn blight attacks, Agriculture

Department economists say. The forecast came in a publication updating earlier government reports on livestock numbers and the relationship between livestock and supplies of animal feeds.

The data showed that the number of "grain-consuming animal units" - a statistical method of summing up such varied species as cattle, sheep and chickens into standard units consuming fixed volumes of grain -rose 3 per cent in the year ending Sept. 30, 1970, to a new all-time record of 117.5 million units.

The year which began Oct. 1, experts added, could show a further increase in animal units

Cattle, Hog Sales Dip

Receipts were below a year earlier for cattle and calves, and hogs but above for sheep and goats at the livestock auction markets inspected by the Texas Animal Health Commis-Crop and Livestock Reporting

Service. Cattle and calves marketed through auctions during November numbered 623,000 head, 2 percent below a year ago and

12 percent below October. Sheep receipts at livestock auctions during November at 81,000 head were 17 percent above a year ago but 32 percent below a month ago.

Hog receipts during November at 42,000 were 2 percent below a year ago and 16 percent below a month ago.



NEW PLANT More electric power for 1971 and 1974 is portrayed by this combination construction picture-artist's rendering of Southwestern Public Service Company's Jones Station, southeast of Lubbock. The left half of the picture shows recent construction of the 1971 addition which will add 256,000 kilowatts to Southwestern's generating capability in midyear. That means we'll have 14 percent more electric power available next year than we had this year, when the region had a more than adequate supply. The 1974 addition, sketched in on the right, will double the capability of Jones Station and make it the largest of the company's 11 power plants. The 1971 plant addition is part of the electric company's Golden Anniversary Year construction program which calls for an investment of nearly \$20,000,000 for new plant and equipment throughout the company's 45,000 square mile service area.

Soil testing is an important part of today's production agriculture. Maximum yields produced at the lowest per unit cost are a must to keep fertilization practices at a profitable level.

Now is the time to have soil tested to determine its capacity to supply the needed plant nutrients for top yields. It is also a good time to make arrangements for the fertilizer which will be needed when the test results are known.

If the soil test shows the soil is low in a given nutrient, fertilizer containing this element will be recommended to meet the expected yield require-

ment for the crop to be grown. Low production means a higher per unit cost of production and a loss of potential profit while high yields have the opposite effect on production and

Fertilizers for next year's crops can be applied when the land is being prepared; thus when planting time rolls around next spring, there'll be no delays and planting can proceed on schedule.



Copyrights And Copycats

To the would-be writer, few things are as precious as the words and ideas he has put together into a manuscript. Disquieting thoughts of literary copycats may cross his mind. Wouldn't it be wise to rush his manuscript off to Washington and have it

copyrighted? The trouble is, most kinds of literary material cannot be copyrighted in that manner. The only way to copyright a book or an article or a story is to actually publish it and to include, with that first publication, a "notice of copyright" (the kind of notice



title page of a book).

Only after publication will the Copyright Office accept the material for registration. The registration, although not a copyright in itself, is useful in establishing the writer's rights in case of dispute.

Then what does protect his manuscript before it is published? It is protected, very effectively, by an ancient rule of law often called "common law copyright." Under this rule, the writer owns

his work automatically-just as the man who builds a bookcase owns it automatically. He need not go through any particular formalities in order to establish

Nor must he keep the manuscript secret to protect his "common law copyright." He may let friends read it. He may submit it to editors for possible sale. By doing so, he no more gives up his ownership than a person gives up ownership of a watch by submitting it to a jeweler for ap-

Furthermore, his ownership has no time limit. While an ordinary copyright cannot last more than 56 years, a "common law copyright" may last indefinitely-so long as the work remains un-
