WHEREAS, the Texas agricultural industry, in all of its phases, continues to be our most important industry, and WHEREAS, agriculture continues to have great growth potential in our country with the rewards from such growth accruing to the benefit of all citizens, and WHEREAS, there is an urgent need for an active crusade to increase the public's knowledge, acceptance, and appreciation for the highly significant contribution which agriculture makes to the economy of our country and to the level of living enjoyed by its citizens, and

WHEREAS, it is recognized that all citizens of this country have a vital stake and legitimate self-interest in the general well-being of the farmers and ranchers who provide the great abundance and variety of food and fiber of highest quality which we all enjoy, and

WHEREAS, "3.76 in '76" is a well conceived program designed by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, with the endorsement and active support of agricultural agencies,

organizations, and individual leaders, to help the agricultural industry achieve its full potential through an intensification of efforts by producers; agribusinesses, and professional agriculturists to bring about an increase in income to Texas farmers and ranchers of \$1 billion by the end of crop year 1976, and

WHEREAS, "3.76 in '76" will narrow the gap between knowledge and practice through the coordinated application of improved production and marketing practices that have been proven to be sound and profitable, and

Several speakers paid tribute to the honorees, and in a good natured humorous vein "got even" with him for his numerous practical jokes of earlier years by telling many jokes on him.

## "TWO BITS WORTH"

The Country Editor says that current developments in troubled spots around the globe indicate that everybody is smoking the pipe of peace, but nobody is inhaling.

TBW While discussing our whims concerning improvement of our community, we realize that this town has a decided need for additional housing. Several families we can name would be our neighbors today had suitable housing been available.

We talk of the need for more employment, recreation, water and scores of other matters. All of these items are vital if our community is to grow and improve. But, desirable housing must be available if new families are to move here.

With the growing number of senior citizens - many of them retire seeking the serenity of a small town - why not make Tahoka more inviting by offering adequate housing here? The idea of moderate to middle income apartment complexes - complete with space for gardening and an attractive yard - for older individuals or couples seem appealing.

In addition, family housing also is badly needed. With the implementation of low-interest government programs virtually every family can own its own house. Future Home Administration is among governmental agencies which are striving to assist families in securing a house of their own.

TBW For years the greatest fear in a man's life was to be poor. It was about the worst thing that could happen. But gradually that's changing. In fact, nowadays you can get subsidized housing, health and dental care, university scholarships and various other welfare benefits, provided you're poor enough. All you need to enjoy many of the advantages of life is proof that you are disadvantaged.

Nobody can complain about that. It's human and kind. However, in curing poverty, society has created another problem group. And that's the middle class. Nobody wants to be middle class anymore

because the middle class has an awkward amount of money too much to be eligible to live as well as the poor, to little to live as well as the rich. The middle class wage earner is caught in between.

TBW In Africa, some of the native tribes practice the strange custom of beating the ground with clubs and uttering wild, bloodcurdling screams. Anthropologists call this a form of primitive expression. In America, it is called golf.

TBW Our congratulations goes to W. T. Kidwell and Bryan Wright on being elected directors of the First National Bank in Tahoka. The move was announced by Dr. C.M. Phillips, chairman of the board. Dr. Phillips also informed the news that Garland Thornton had been promoted to Executive Vice-President and Warren Embree promoted to Senior Vice President.

TBW When are the writers on your paper going to learn to spell? This was the inevitable question during the annual Newspaper-in-the-Classroom Workshop given by the Record of Hackensack, N. J. ## Income For Farmers And Ranchers Should Increase

Cash income to farmers and ranchers in Lynn County should be more than \$26,460,000 by the end of 1976, according to W.B. Griffin, County Agricultural Agent.

This will be an increase of more than \$1,000,000 from 1968-69 figures, with cotton contributing a large part of the gain. The projections are based on Studies of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and are part of the "3.76 in '76" program, a state-wide project to increase Texas agricultural cash receipts by more than one billion dollars.

Total cash receipts from all County in 1970 was \$18,518,300, says Griffin. The most important ones are cotton, grain sorghum, and cattle. They are expected to account for about 79 percent of the projected 1976 totals.

The county will be aided in its production efforts by the

South Plains Development. Extensions specialists will hold conferences in the area twice a year to discuss improved production of cotton, grain sorghum and swine.

The projections are based on estimated from the County Program Building Committee; after separate predictions were made by Extension district and economic area in Texas.

## Taxes, Registration Deadline Jan. 30

Saturday, Jan. 30, is the last day for payment of 1970 taxes without penalty and the last day for registering for a vote during 1971, warns George McCracken, county tax assessor and collector.

McCracken states 1,759 potential Lynn county voters had registered Tuesday.

However, he states tax payments sent by mail and post-marked Sunday, Jan. 31, will be honored.

Under the new Federal Voting Rights Act of 1970, young citizens 18, 19 and 20 years old, may vote in 1971 elections for Federal offices. Unless some different rule is approved later, voters must register this month.

Secretary of State Martin Dies, Jr. has written McCracken:

"The United States Supreme Court has held that 18, 19, and 20 year olds may vote in federal elections only. Although there are no scheduled federal elections in the voting year 1971, there always exists the possibility of a special election to fill a vacancy in a federal

office. Therefore, registration certificates should be issued to all applicants 18, 19, and 20 years of age, and to those persons who are not yet 18, but will be 18 before March 1, 1972.

"The birthdate is now a necessity since a person becomes eligible to vote in federal elections on one date and state and local elections on another date. The present space on the certificate "not entitled to vote until..." should be filled with the 18th birthday of the applicant if he is not already 18 years of age. Otherwise the space should be left blank. Do not fill the space with the 21st birthday as this will cause confusion at the polling places."

Veterans who served between Feb. 1, 1955, and March 3, 1966, (as well as Vietnam Era veterans) are eligible for GI Bill educational benefits. Contact the VA.

## Junior High To Have Health Careers Program

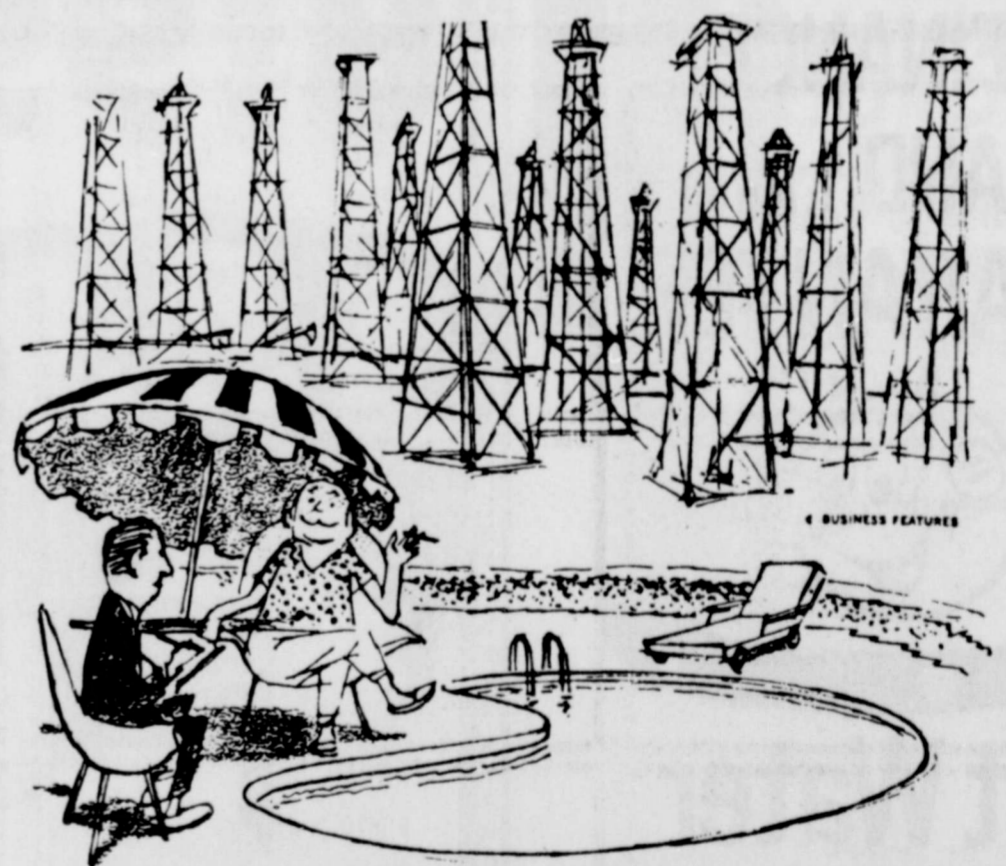


