Hear Congressman Mahon Speak

LYNN COUNTIANS OUT IN MASS FOR CHAMBER BANQUET

Lynn Countians turned out in mass last Friday night to hear Congressman George Mahon speak at the annual Farmer-Businessman Banquet held at the school cafeteria. An estimated crowd of 276 turned out for the event with a special effort made by State Representative E. L. Short, when he and his wife made a quick drive from the State Capitol for the event.

U. S. Rep. George Mahon had an applauding Tahoka audience here Friday night that "faith is the most important ingredient in a successful society." The popular congressman, talking in a down-to-earth tone at the Tahoka Chamber of Commerce's Farmer-Businessman Banquet, in the town where his wife was teaching school when they married had carefully approached the "faith" statement by stating "if we fail to look at life in the proper perspective, we could lose faith. We have got to find a way to be prouder of our country," Mahon said. "We must remember America was greatest when we had the least. We have risen, by the grace of God, to a nation of Eminence that dangles other countries of the world."

"But," warned the speaker, "overindulgence threatens all levels of government." Mahon paid a tribute to residents of America's smaller communities: "You come nearer finding responsibility in smaller communities and that is the best hope of our land. We tend to lose appreciation of what we had when we had less. The tempo of recent weeks and months has been to

deplete everything. It has become fashionable to deplore. We have made dazzling progress and so we forget where we are," Mahon said. "For example," the speaker pointed out, "with all its problems, real and imagined, the U. S. economy is the best in the world. The USSR and the Euro-

Several Persons File For City Council Posts

A lot of interest is being shown in City Council posts for the coming election with five persons already having filed for posts on the council and another informing the News that he will file.

The City Council in regular session last week set the city election for April 3, 1971 and anyone wishing to run for positions on the board have until March 3, 1971 to file.

Three positions on the board will be up for election being the Mayor of Tahoka, Mel Leslie, Councilman H. B. McCord, Jr. and Councilman Ike Carter. Mel Leslie has filed for another term as mayor and H. B. McCord, Jr. has filed for councilman again. Ike Carter has not signed up for another term as councilman as of press time Wednesday, but expressed to the News that he would seek another term.

E. T. (Tom) Cloe will also seek the Mayor's position and Ed Hamilton and L. A. Forsythe have filed for positions on the board as councilmen.

pean Common Market are both operating at a much lower scale. "The quality that will pick this nation up is the quality of restraint. We must find the way to not be indulgent. A rebirth of faith and patriotism will keep our flag flying," Mahon stated. "Next week, we start exploring the president's budget proposals. Here we are talking about the spending of \$249 billion - a cool one-fourth trillion dollars, if you please - and therefore this must be carefully screened. This budget has a \$23 billion planned deficit that I do not like. So you

see what we are up against. The budget recommends that we spend money as if we had full employment and we do not have full employment," said Mahon. "It's a whopping deficit," Mahon continued. "It may not be disaster at the moment but I am afraid we are getting close to that point. Revenue sharing as proposed in the budget is not good. The plan to channel money to the state and cities is unrealistic as proposed. "And welfare, well, I have always thought the more we spend, the less progress we make toward solving the prob-

They informed their teacher that they did not live on a plantation but on a West Texas farm. She asked to continue the project and was sent information on location, climate, farming practices, etc.

The geography book contains pictures, maps and graphs of the area. A map of the U.S. showing cotton-growing sections, has Lynn County and Houston in blocks, designating the "800 kilometer drive" as the way to reach Lynn County from Houston. The churches

E. L. Short Informs News Of Grant

E. L. Short having been in contact with Congressman George Mahon in Washington, informed the Lynn County News that last month the Office of Economic Opportunity announced a grant of \$85,351.00 to the Lynn County Development Committee in Tahoka. This money will provide a day care program for children ages four (4) to five (5) from migrant and seasonal farm worker families.

Rep. Short contacted the State Office of Economic Opportunity, and

Captain George Taylor informed me that this type grant, being a Title III Grant, is administered in its entirety from Washington through the Office of Research and Institutional Development and that the Office of Economic Opportunity of Texas, which works under the Governor's Office, is not involved

in Title III grants in any way. It seems as though when the applications from the counties to the state office were made a few years ago that Lynn County was left out. Therefore, the late Father John J. Dillon was able to get their Research and Institutional Development Department of Washington to recognize a need for this type program in Lynn County, and by periodic inspections and report filing by the Lynn County Day Care people at the Center has been able to continue to receive these federal grants.

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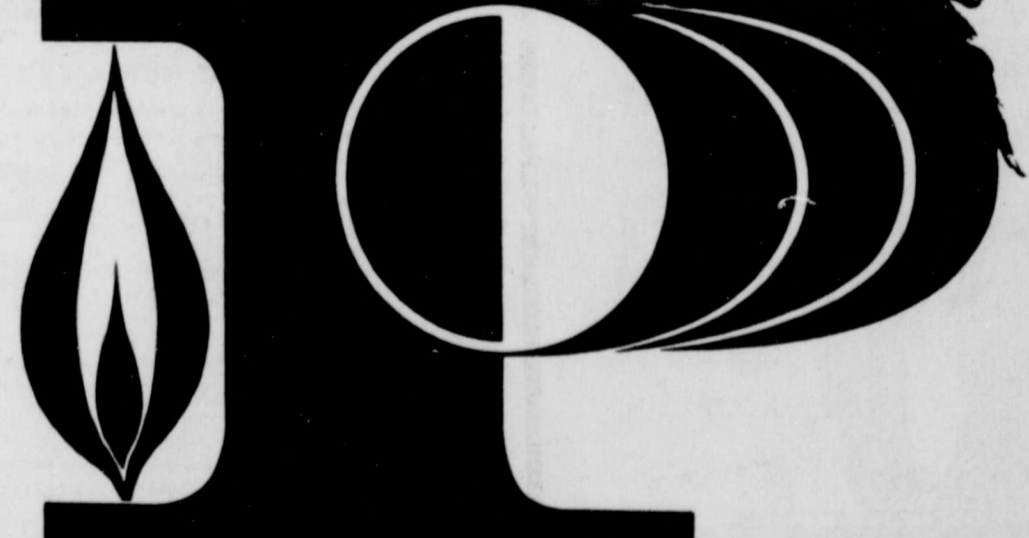

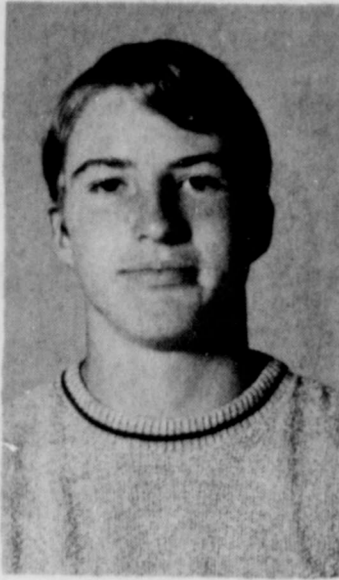

Indonesia is comprised of 3,000 islands covering an area about the size of the United States, and is considered one of the "emerging nations." People is its No. 1 problem, the population explosion the past few years being fantastic. For example, Java, one of the is-

lands about the size of Ohio, now has a population of 80 million.

There are two classes in Indonesia, the very rich and the very poor -- no middle class. Average annual income is \$30. Clint Walker was in charge of the program.

Voter Registration Extended To Feb 28

Voter Registration has been extended by the Texas State Legislature until mid-night February 28, 1971.

Persons who are 18 years old and above and have not registered previously will have an opportunity to do so during this extension period.

All person 18 and over must have a certificate in order to vote in the elections for 1971. Eighteen to twenty-one olds will be restricted to participate in

Federal Elections only. Persons who are 17 and will be 18 on or before February 28, 1972 may register at this time.

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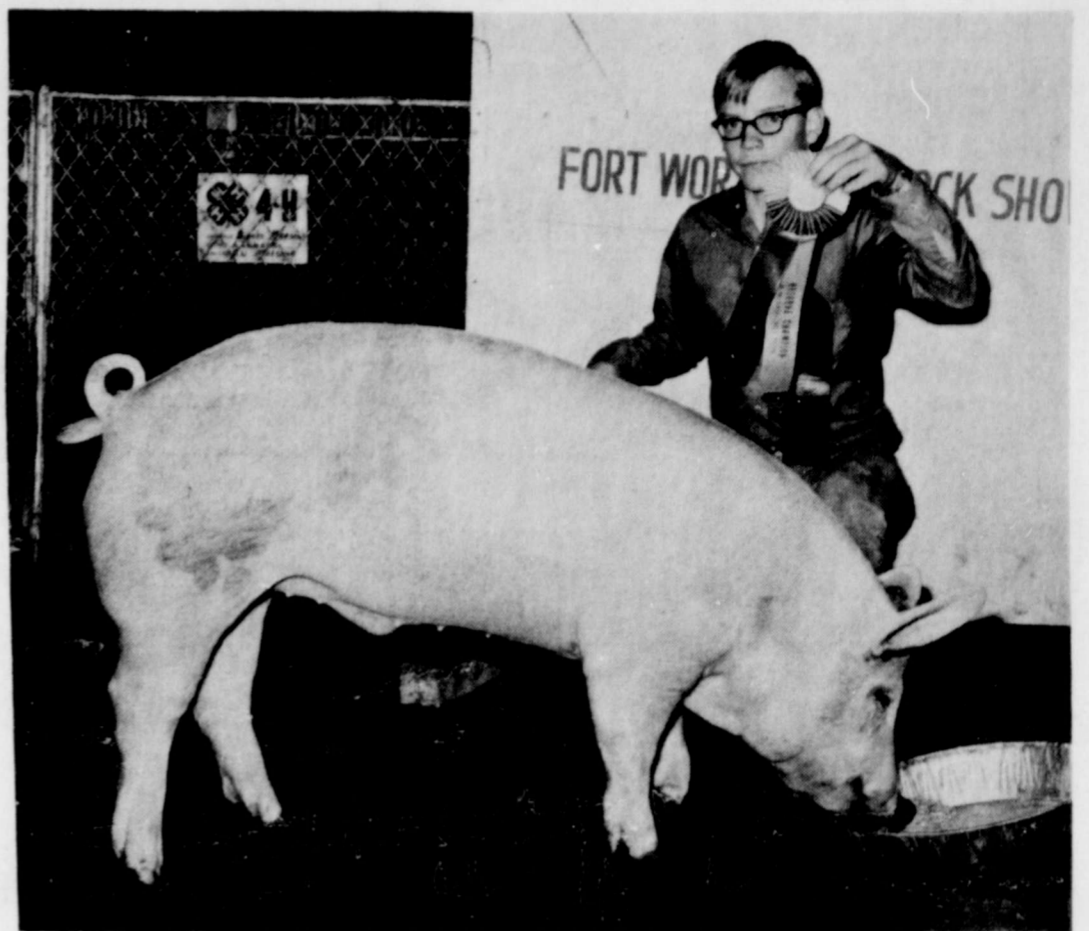

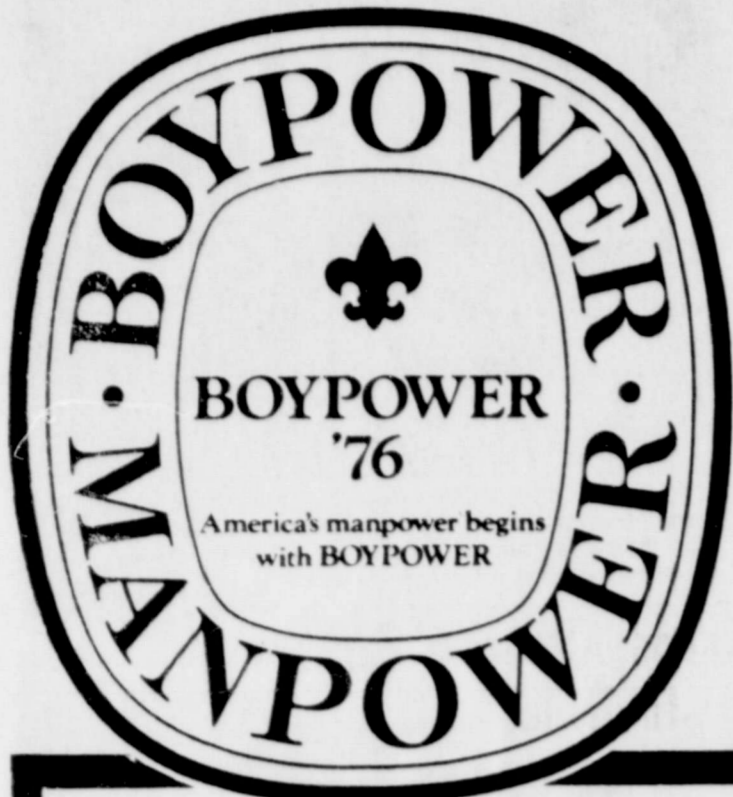

SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

By Thomas W. Caldwell

The directors of the Lynn County SWCD selected as the Outstanding Conservationist for 1970 Mr. D. M. Lockaby. This was an excellent selection because through the years Danny, as everyone calls him, has demonstrated sound conservation practices and has done an excellent job of telling his fellow farmers how conservation pays.

His outstanding traits include his relentless pursuit of knowledge and his willingness to apply new methods to his farming operations. He is continually asking questions on how someone else's farming operation might fit into his own. His acceptance of new ideas has paid off a number of times. For example, he has found that planting narrow row grain sorghum on terraces has increased his yield while maintaining the terraces. He now plans on planting cotton in narrow rows and is changing his equipment to meet this adaptation.

He makes it a point to attend field day tours at experiment stations and accompany all the field trips he can in the quest of knowledge.

Although his immediate goals are new and better farming methods, his ultimate ambition is to "leave this land in better shape than we got it."

Lockaby was born in Lubbock, Texas, Oct. 10, 1933. His father, T.M. Lockaby, now living in Clinton, Oklahoma, was also a farmer. Danny was a Lone Star Farmer in the Future Farmers of America in 1950 his junior year in high school and upon graduation enrolled at North Texas State University to study Industrial Arts. After two years of college, he entered the military service and was honorably discharged in 1956. He then returned to the farm.

Danny is an excellent metal worker and possibly has the best equipped work shop in Lynn County.

He is active in community and religious affairs being a member of the Church of Christ and part time Sunday School teacher. He has been a member of the Masonic Lodge of Tahoka since 1967.

His many hobbies include

fishing, boating, and motorcycling, but his main hobby is flying. He has a private pilot's license and is working toward a commercial license.

He is married to the former Eddie Carpenter. They have two children, Todd, 5, and Jacque, 2. Danny would be proud to have his son go into farming, when he gets old enough, but says this is a decision that only Todd can make.

Lockaby learned the value of conservation early in life, when his father constructed terraces on their family farm. This practice influenced Danny to take care of the land. He signed a Great Plains Conservation Program contract in April of 1967 on his 190 acre farm. He rents a 254 acre farm which is also under a Great Plains contract. He carries out a cropping system totaling 442 acres on both farms and leaves enough residue on the ground to prevent wind erosion. To date there have been about 70,000 feet of parallel terraces constructed and another 20,000 feet will be completed this year. There is also a 7 acre water way which he has recently seeded to grass.

Danny says he would rather farm than do anything else. "I enjoy it to the fullest." This love of farm life evidently has been conveyed to his family for when his son, Todd, was asked what his daddy did he proudly proclaimed "My daddy is a farmer."

Farmers Study Catfish Farming

The O'Donnell Young Farmers met Monday. James Henson, of San Angelo brought the program

on Catfish farming. He pointed out that Mississippi was leading in Catfish farming with 10,790 acres which produce 13 million pounds. Texas ranks 4th with 2,500 acres which produce 3 million pounds. An irrigation well which produces 250 gallons of water will maintain a ten acre fish pond.

The top 4-H horsemen in Texas will gather for the 9th annual 4-H Horse Show July 29, 30, and 31 at Will Rogers Coliseum in Fort Worth.

The Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service are joining in the production of this year's show. Billy Bob Watt Jr., assistant manager of the Fort Worth Stock Show, is serving as local show chairman.

The three-day show is expected to attract between 350-400 entries and bring 1,500 people into the Fort Worth area, says B. F. Yeates, Extension horse specialist, who will serve as general manager of the show.

Tom Davison, assistant state 4-H Club leader, will assist Yeates in managing the show. Local support is being generated by Extension personnel and the 4-H youth subcommittee in Tarrant County.

Committee work has started to obtain class sponsors, plan a barbecue for the contestants, and prepare for additional activities connected with the show, notes the specialist.

The state show has grown in both quantity and quality each year and the 1971 show will be no exception, according to Yeates. Originally, contestants could compete in classes consisting of halter, showmanship, western pleasure, reining, barrel racing, and pole bending.

Yeates indicated that within the last three years events in drill competition, cutting, jumping, and English pleasure have been added to give the show a new dimension.

Prior to the state show, contestants must compete in county shows leading to district competition. Twelve district shows are then held to qualify the top twenty in each for competition in the state show in Fort Worth. These 240 boys and girls make up the regular show.

Other 4-H'ers who are interested in participating in the state show may enter four additional events that have been added over the years. Statewide competition for these events begins July 29, the first day of the show, with the finals that night.

Regular show contestants will compete on Friday and Saturday, July 30 and 31, with their finals, the highlight of the show, scheduled for Saturday night. "Since the 1968 show was held in Fort Worth, we can call on the valuable experience of many who worked then to make this year's show the best ever," Yeates noted.

for approximately 3 years and 10 months, 13 cars will be purchased. If these items are bought on time payments, the total cost of principle and interest will be about \$39,000. But if these same monthly payments are invested in a savings account for a similar length of time as the installment payment period, the family will be able to purchase the same nine items during the 45-year period and have almost \$33,000 left over. This is due to 45 years of interest compounded quarterly at 4 percent. If \$8,000 in interest charges not paid are considered, the total savings would equal \$41,000.

Linda Huffaker, CHD Agent, Says....
What's the difference in paying cash and buying on credit over a long period of time? The comparison results are somewhat shocking. A study conducted at the University of Minnesota in 1968 illustrates the side effects of credit buying over a period of 45 years. Based on the service life expectancy of nine commonly purchased consumer items, the study estimated that a family will buy three refrigerators, ranges, toasters, rugs; two electric sewing machines, and four television sets. In addition, if they are a one-car family and a car is kept paying later, and in saving then buying, is equal to about one-third of the purchase price of the items. Even the "wise use of credit" is expensive and creates considerable erosion of purchasing power over the life span of families.

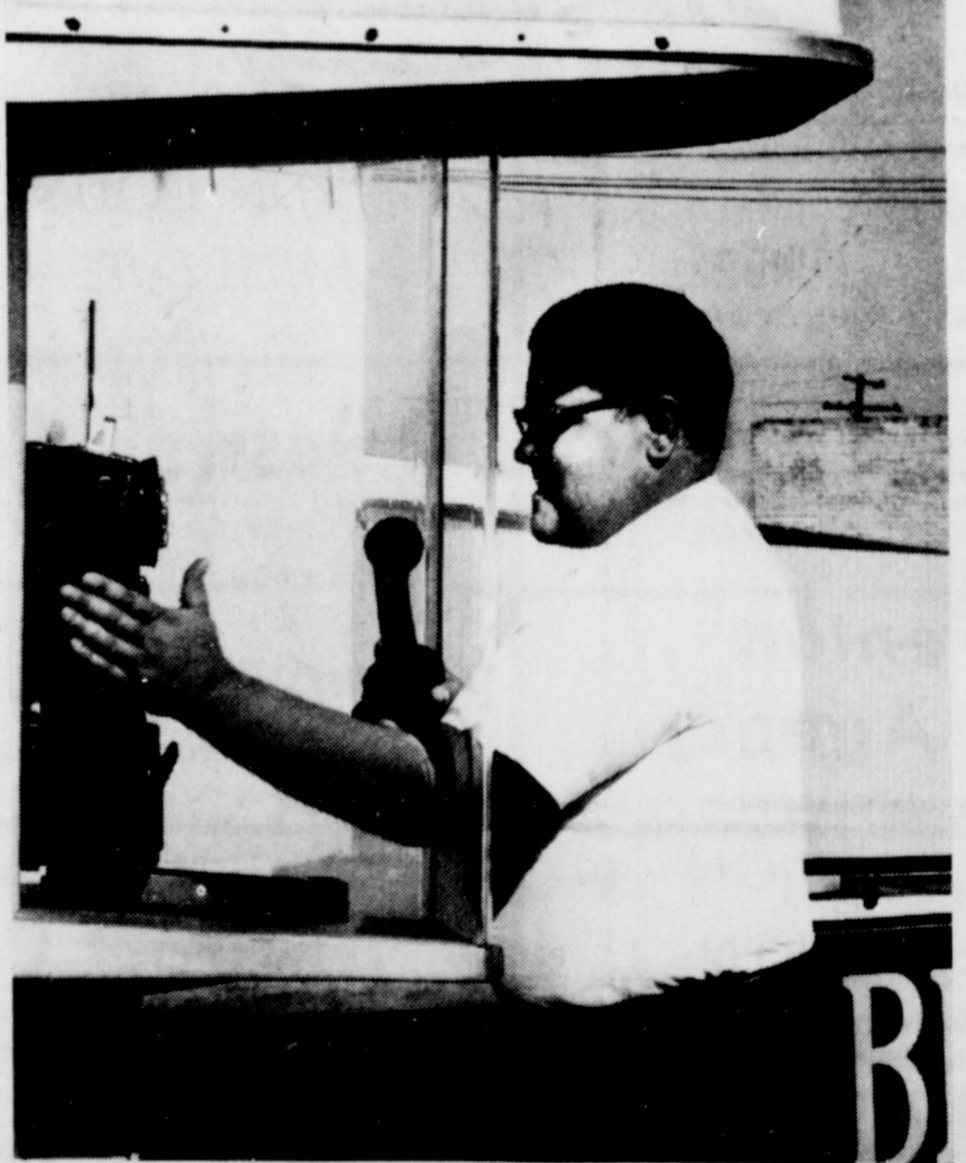

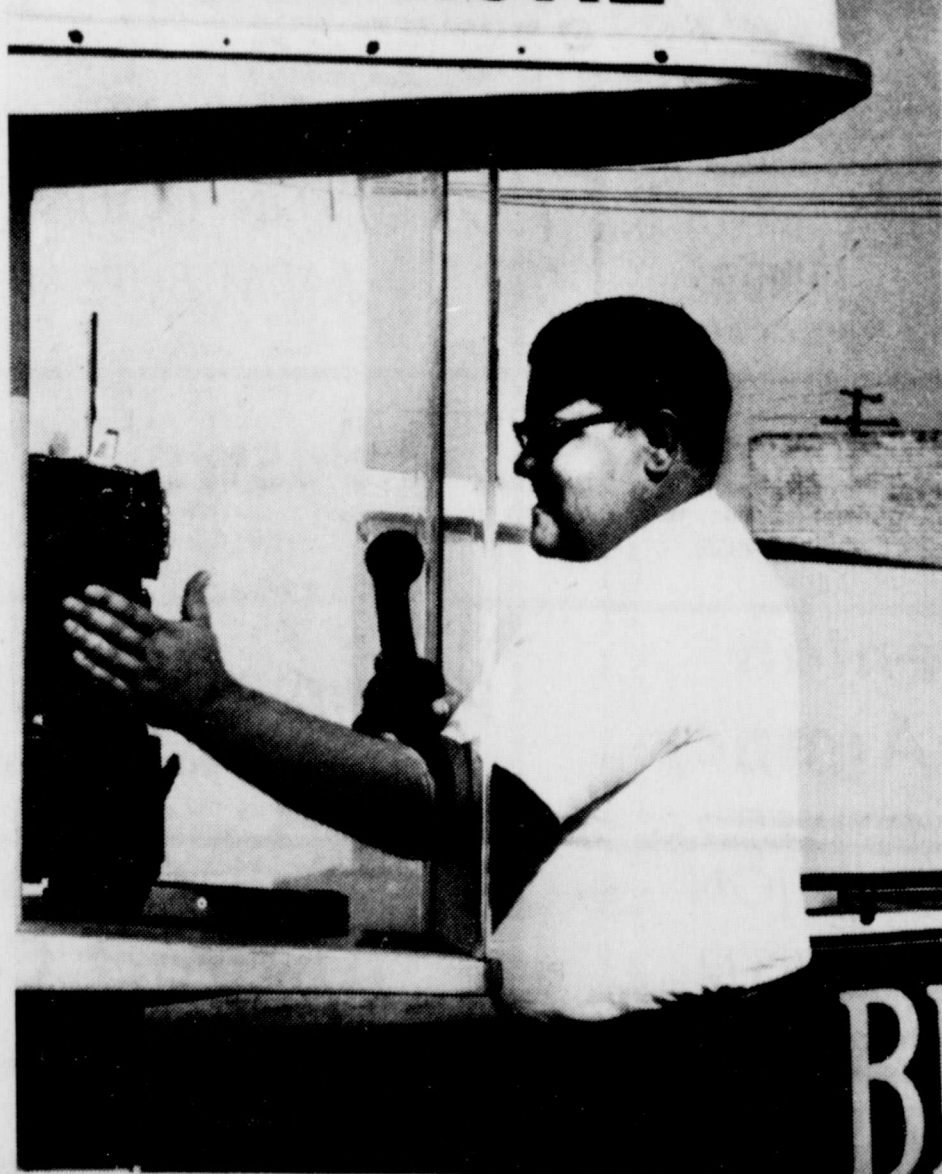
