Of the nine case studies in the book, only one other is from the U.S. and that is the Los Angeles freeway. Others are from Canada, India, South China, Japan, Israeli and Ma-

Eight pages of the book are devoted to the Smith farm, and the description of cotton farming on the Plains is remark. ably accurate and would be interesting reading to both children and adults even right here on the South Plains.
