AT ASSEMBLY HERE SPAG Hears Solons, **Elects New Officers**

SOME 90 members of the South Plains Association of Governments (SPAG) met Monday night at the Holiday Inn-Parkway for the third annual general assembly meeting of the governing organization that

marked the close of another fiscal year. A banquet following the meeting featured discussions by Sen. H. J. "Doc" Blanchard of Lubbock and Reps. Bill Clayton of Springlake, Delwin Jones and

H. Alden Deyo, executive director of the organization, presented the new year's work program and budget that comprises anticipated expenditures of \$250,226 - almost twice that

Tahoka Board Of **Education Holds Regular Meeting**

The Tahoka I.S.D. Board of Education worked through a relatively short agenda at its regular monthly meeting which was held on Thursday evening, September 9, at the Board Room in Tahoka High School.

A representative of the firm of Pritchard and Abbott, of Odessa, met with the Board to review the school district's contract with that firm. The firm of Pritchard and Abbott appraises oil and gas properties plus utilities, gins, elevators, and cotton compresses for tax purposes. A new twoyear contract was negotiated. In other action the Board

approved renewal of a three year term plant insurance policy based on 80 percent of replacement costs, for a premium of \$21,546.

Also receiving the Board's action was a policy statement on determining kindergarten eligibility and an amendment of the policy pertaining to bus service for students who live less than two miles from school. The amendment became effective Monday, September 13, and it is as follows: POLICY STATEMENT PER-

TAINING TO STUDENTS ELIgible for bus service; Board of Education Policy

pertaining to students who are eligible for bus serices has been as follows:

Bus service is provided for eligible riders only. In order to be eligible a student must live as much as two miles from school by the nearest route.

The only exception to this involves those who live under two miles from school but beyond the city limits, and such students may be eligible for bus service if a bus runs near their residences and has space abailable for them.

In regular session on September 9, 1971, the Tahoka I.S.D. Board of Education amended the policy pertaining to students who are eligible for bus service as follows: Students who live less than two miles from school may avail themsleves of bus service by meeting buses, on regular routes at the city limits point where the regular bus route penetrates the city limits boundary. (Such policy is to become effective Septem-

ber 13, 1971.) The Board approved the resignation of Miss Martha Martin who began the year as a sixth grade teacher, while approving the employment of Mrs. Janet McWhirter as a replacement. Mrs. McWhirter is a native of Dumas, Texas and a graduate of McMurry College where she received a B.S. Degree in Elementary Education.

TAHOKA (Special)-Two La mesa High School FFA teams took top honors in stock judg-ing here Saturday at the 4th Annual Field Day meet sponsored by the Southwestern Angus Association.

About 175 area residents participated in the competition and day long meet at the Ray Adams Angus farm southeast of here, R. L. Warren of Tahoka was co-host of the event.

Top winner among the 70 in dividual entrants was James Taylor with 197 points out of a possible 200. Second place went to Welch Flippen of Tahoka with 189 points.

Lynn County Agent Bill Griffin was in charge of judging and was assisted by Taylor Knight, vocational agriculture teacher at Tahoka.

Entered in the contest were 13 Future Farmers of America and 4-H clubs. Points were awarded in four categories of steers, heifers, cows and bulls.

During the afternoon session Bill Bradley, Angus breeder from Memphis, Tex., spoke on the value of performance testing. And Raymon Ashley of the American Angus Association in Fort Worth, discussed the merits of artificial insemination.



Copied from Sept. 16, 1926 At a meeting of the City Council Tuesday night an ordinance was passed changing the parking regulations of the city. Heretofore the ordinances have required that cars be parked in the middle of the street on some of the business streets. This ordinance was amended so as to require cars to be parked at the curb on all streets at an angle of 45 degrees, and prohibiting the parking of cars in the middle of the street.

This will provide more parking space but will leave less space in the street for traffic. Hereafter cars will be compelled to back out as heretofore. It is believed by the council that this will be a more satisfactory arrangement, especially after people become accustomed to the new order.

The Selective Service System today clarified expected po icy changes on undergraduate student deferments. Col lege students who were

enrolled ful .time in the 1970. 71 academic year will be eligible for student deferments in the 1971.72 school year if they continue to make satisfactory progress in their programs of study, Selective Service officials said. However, young men who entered school for the first time this summer and those who enroll as freshmen this fall will not qualify for student deferments if the pending changes to the Selective Service Act are passed by Congress. The House has completed action of the bill and final Senate action is expected in September. Dr. Curtis W. Tarr, Selective Service Director, said: "Few incoming freshmen students are likely to be inducted in the near future because of the student deferment phase.

Bill Griffin, County Agent, Says.....

Quarantines for hog cholera have been placed on portions of Lubbock, Hockley and Lamb counties by federal and state animal health agencies, ac. cording to Dr. Gilbert R. Hollis, area swine specialist.

The quarantines were enact. ed because of two confirmed outbreaks of hog cholera, one each in Lubbock and Hockley counties. The action is part of a stepped-up campaign to wipe out this costly swine disease, Hollis adds. The quarantine will be removed when the threat of disease spread has been eliminated.

The area in Lubbock is bounded by a line extending from the northeast corner of the Lubbock County line, west along the county line to the intersection of Highway 87, then south along Highway 87 to the north bank of Yellow House Canyon. Then east along the north bank of Yellow House Canyon to the Lubbock County line, then north along the county line to the point of origin.

The quarantine area for Hockley and Lamb counties is bounded by a line from Smy. er, north along Farm Road 54, then west along Farm Road 54 to the intersection of Farm Road 303. From there, south along Farm Road 303 to the intersection of State Highway 116, then east along State Highway 116, then east along State High way 116 to Smyer. 



It's either acid, or the lack of acid, that causes most vegetables to lose their natural color when cooked The color of green vegetables is destroyed by acid while acid

is needed to 'set' the color of red vegetables and prevent the yellowing of white vegetables. Yellow vegetables are not affected by acids or alkali.

Green vegetables contain some acid. The green color is not soluble in water, but heat during cooking causes it to become slightly soluble. The color is then destroyed

by acid. This is the reason for cooking quickly before the acid has time to fade the vegetables. Overcooking causes the acid to change the bright green color

to a faded olive green. Soda should not be used to save the green color under any circumstances. Soda destroys vitamins and gives a disagreeable flavor and texture. Also, a void adding either lemon

juice or vinegar to green vegetables while they are cooking; they are both acids. Red vegetables, such as beets and red cabbage, lose their color readily in water. Here acid helps to 'set' the color. It is recommended to add a tablespoon of lemon juice or vinegar to each quart of water. Cooling beets with their skin and stem ends left on also helps to prevent loss of color.

The pigment of white vegetables turns yellow with long cooking or if the water used is very hard or alkaline. To correct this, one-half teaspoon of lemon juice or vinegar can be added to each cup of cooking liquid. Overcooking white vegetables

Officials of the Mission Screwworm Program report that 19 cases were confirmed during the week ending Sept. 3, making this the worst week since the last week in December, 1968. Furthermore, 16 cases were confirmed during the past Labor Day weekend. Texas thus far has recorded 138 cases with the U.S. count at 161.

The National Cotton Advisory Committee meeting in Washington September 15 and 16 is to discuss three major aspects of the 1972 cotton program, according to Donald Johnson, Executive Vice President of Plains Cottong Growers, Inc., a recently appointed member of the Advisory Committee.

The principal topics under discussion Johnson said are (1) the level of the 1972 cot. ton loan, (2) the size of the 1972 base acreage allotment and (3) set-aside provisions, including both the amount of acreage required to be set anoted. side and the permissible uses

of such acreage. Johnson was appointed to the Cotton AdvisoryCommittee by Agriculture Secretary Clifford Hardin on September 3, along with W. A. Fulford of Brownfield and six others in the Texas cotton industry. The committee has no decisionmaking powers, but is called in "to advise the Secretary and other officials on matters such as domestic and export requirements, and production ad justment and stabilization procase under previous programs grams." Appointments are for the period ending April 28, 1973. ed allotments.



Mrs. Reba Mathis, 50, died at her home west of Post about 5:30 p.m. Monday.




