Tahoka Board Of Education Holds Regular Meeting

The Tahoka I.S.D. Board of Education worked through a relatively short agenda at its regular monthly meeting which was held on Thursday evening, September 9, at the Board Room in Tahoka High School.

A representative of the firm of Pritchard and Abbott, of Odessa, met with the Board to review the school district's contract with that firm. The firm of Pritchard and Abbott appraises oil and gas properties plus utilities, gins, elevators, and cotton compresses for tax purposes. A new two-year contract was negotiated.

In other action the Board approved renewal of a three year term plant insurance policy based on 80 percent of replacement costs, for a premium of \$21,546.

Also receiving the Board's action was a policy statement on determining kindergarten eligibility and an amendment of the policy pertaining to bus service for students who live less than two miles from school. The amendment became effective Monday, September 13, and it is as follows:

POLICY STATEMENT PERTAINING TO STUDENTS ELIGIBLE FOR BUS SERVICE;

Board of Education Policy pertaining to students who are eligible for bus services has been as follows:

Bus service is provided for eligible riders only. In order to be eligible a student must live as much as two miles from school by the nearest route.

STOCK JUDGING Judges Give Lamesans Top Honors

TAHOKA (Special)—Two Lamesa High School FFA teams took top honors in stock judging here Saturday at the 4th Annual Field Day meet sponsored by the Southwestern Angus Association.

About 175 area residents participated in the competition and day long meet at the Ray Adams Angus farm southeast of here. R. L. Warren of Tahoka was co-host of the event.

Top winner among the 70 individual entrants was James Taylor with 197 points out of a possible 200. Second place went to Welch Flippen of Tahoka with 189 points.

Lynn County Agent Bill Griffin was in charge of judging and was assisted by Taylor Knight, vocational agriculture teacher at Tahoka.

Entered in the contest were 13 Future Farmers of America and 4-H clubs. Points were awarded in four categories of steers, heifers, cows and bulls.

During the afternoon session Bill Bradley, Angus breeder from Memphis, Tex., spoke on the value of performance testing. And Raymon Ashley of the American Angus Association in Fort Worth, discussed the merits of artificial insemination.

A. E. Richmond, president of the Texas Angus Association, and Stanley Anderson of the American Angus Association at St. Joseph, Mo., were also on hand for the meet.

Election of officers was postponed due to lack of a quorum.

SPAG Hears Solons, Elects New Officers

SOME 90 members of the South Plains Association of Governments (SPAG) met Monday night at the Holiday Inn Parkway for the third annual general assembly meeting of the governing organization that marked the close of another fiscal year.

A banquet following the meeting featured discussions by Sen. H. J. "Doc" Blanchard of Lubbock and Reps. Bill Clayton of Springlake, Delwin Jones and R. B. McAlister of Lubbock, E. L. Short of Tahoka and Renal B. Rosson of Snyder.

The Texas lawmakers aired local effects of 25 bills passed in this year's session of the state legislature.

Tahoka Mayor Meldon Leslie, the 1970-71 SPAG president, presided over both the banquet and general assembly meeting which included next year's work program and budget, the president's report and the election of new SPAG officers and representatives.

H. Alden Deyo, executive director of the organization, presented the new year's work program and budget that comprises anticipated expenditures of \$250,226 — almost twice that of this year's total.

Lubbock City Councilman Morris Turner was unanimously elected SPAG president for 1971-72 year. The four vice presidents elected, respectively, were Arch Lamb, Lubbock County commissioner, Plainview Mayor Louis Thomas, Post Mayor Giles McCrary and W. T. McKinney, Terry County judge.

Alex Williams, mayor pro tem of Muleshoe, will serve as secretary and Lubbock County Judge Rod Shaw will hold the treasurer's post.

At a meeting of the City Council Tuesday night an ordinance was passed changing the parking regulations of the city. Heretofore the ordinances have required that cars be parked in the middle of the street on some of the business streets. This ordinance was amended so as to require cars to be parked at the curb on all streets at an angle of 45 degrees, and prohibiting the parking of cars in the middle of the street.

This will provide more parking space but will leave less space in the street for traffic. Hereafter cars will be compelled to back out as heretofore. It is believed by the council that this will be a more satisfactory arrangement, especially after people become accustomed to the new order.

Selective Service Deferment Change

The Selective Service System today clarified expected policy changes on undergraduate student deferments.

College students who were enrolled full-time in the 1970-71 academic year will be eligible for student deferments in the 1971-72 school year if they continue to make satisfactory progress in their programs of study, Selective Service officials said. However, young men who entered school for the first time this summer and those who enroll as freshmen this fall will not qualify for student deferments if the pending changes to the Selective Service Act are passed by Congress. The House has completed action of the bill and final Senate action is expected in September.

Dr. Curtis W. Tarr, Selective Service Director, said: "Few incoming freshmen students are likely to be inducted in the near future because of the student deferment phase-out. Of the 1,034,000 incoming freshmen males estimated by the Office of Education, approximately 80 percent are 18 years old and only 20 percent are 19 years of age or older. The 18 year olds will receive their lottery numbers in 1972, and they will not be subject to induction until 1973, when draft calls should be low. The 19 year old freshmen received their lottery numbers August 5 of this year and will be subject to induction next year; at least 1/2 should have high enough lottery numbers to preclude their induction. Of those remaining, approximately 50 percent will be dis-

qualified on mental, moral or physical grounds. This means that a maximum of 50,000 men will be directly affected in 1972 by the student deferment phaseout and one-half of these, or 25,000, will probably not be inducted because of enlistments in Regular, Reserve or National Guard units, participating in commissioning programs or because of procedural delays.

Dr. Tarr said that college students will not be drafted in the middle of a semester or term. "If called while enrolled, they will be allowed to postpone their induction until the end of the semester, or term. If in their last academic year, they will be able to postpone their induction until after graduation."

Dr. Tarr advised incoming freshmen and students who started their program of study in the summer of 1971 or later not to file applications for student deferments even though the current law authorizes granting deferments to students in full-time programs of study.

"If the pending Selective Service legislation does not pass," Tarr said, "it would not be in a registrant's best interest to obtain a student deferment which would extend his liability until age 35. Should Congress change the legislation to provide for deferments for new incoming freshmen, which is most unlikely, applications for deferments will not be jeopardized by delaying their submission until after passage of the new law."

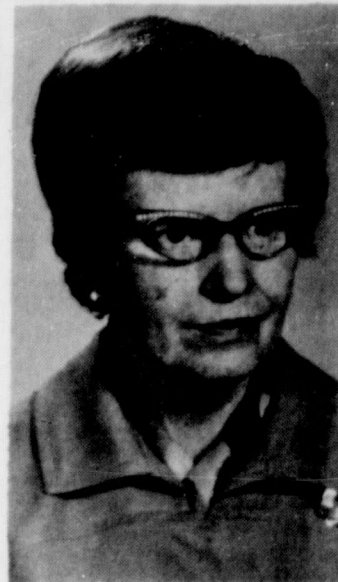


FRANCES SALDANA

The next Phebe K. Warner Study Club meeting will be September 28.

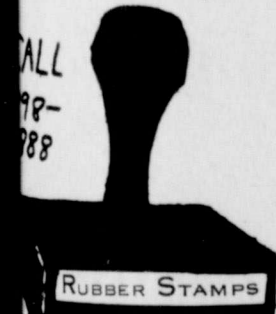

The Bulldogs in an easy victory took the opening kickoff and marched 64 yards for a score with Ladd Roberts getting the honors. He took the pigskin around right end for the touchdown. End Louis Zedlitz booted the PAT to give the Bulldogs an early 7-0 lead.

In the second stanza Eugene Brown blocked a Stanton punt and the ball rolled into the end zone for a safety. The ball was then moved out to the 20 yard line where Stanton punted setting up the second scoring drive for the Bulldogs. John Thomas was chalked up with the six-pointer going the last 10 yards for the score and then running for a two-point conversion giving the Bulldogs a 17-0 lead.

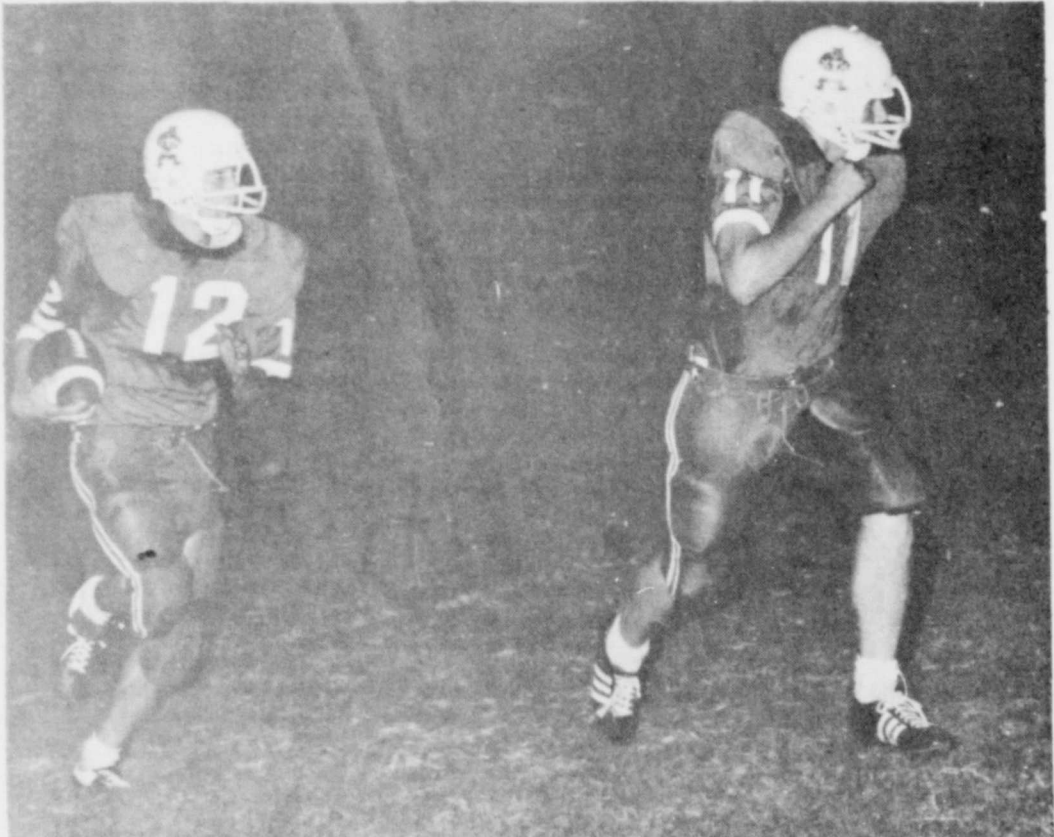
As split end on the Ram team, he caught 37 passes for a total of 281 yards.

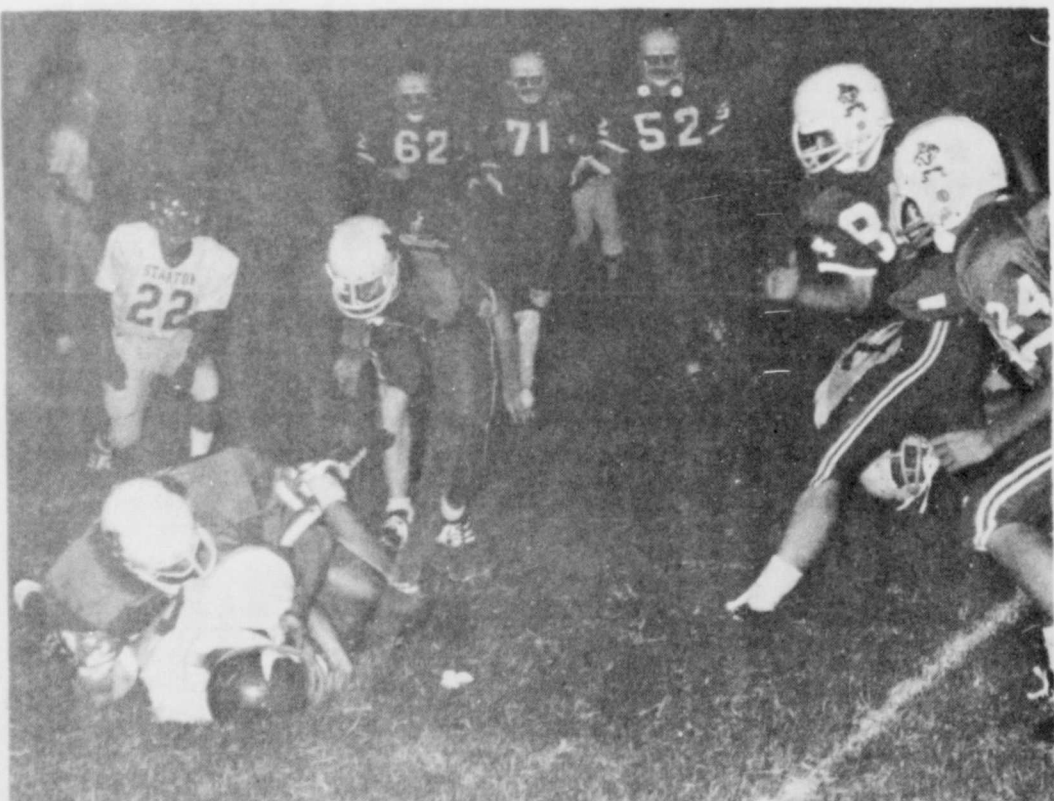

Angelo State won six and lost four games last season.

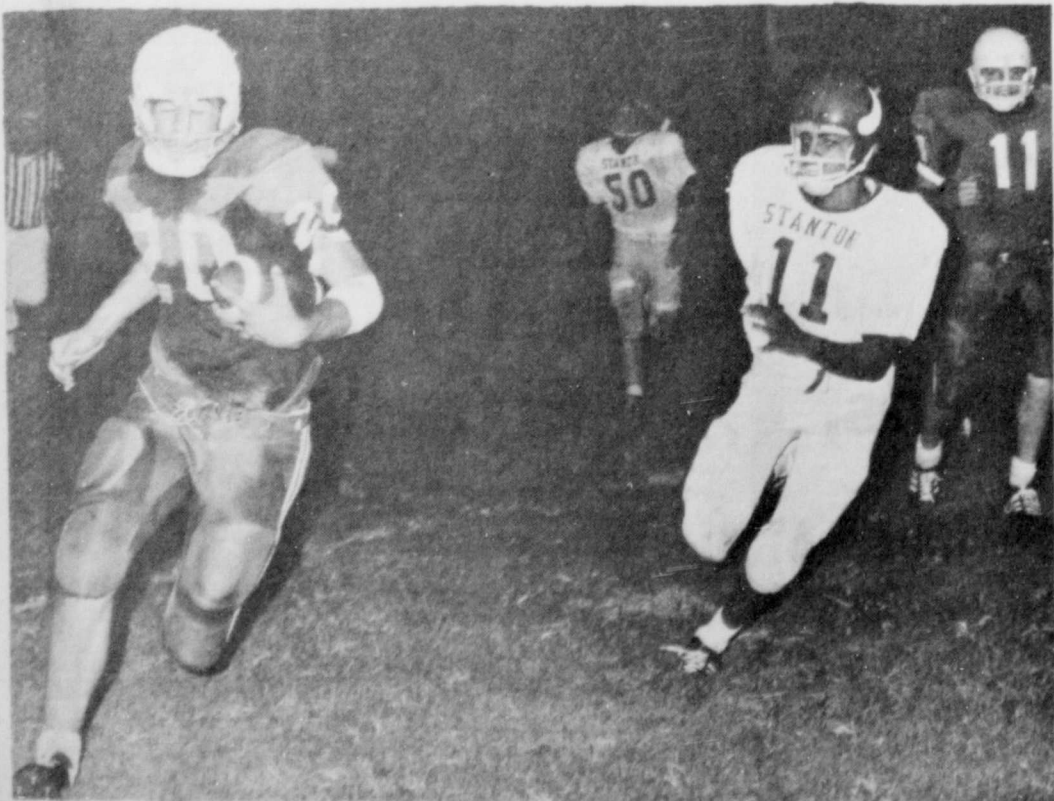
Tyler, a senior at Angelo, was a gritty quarterback while in high school here and also was outstanding in basketball and other sports, as well as in the classroom.

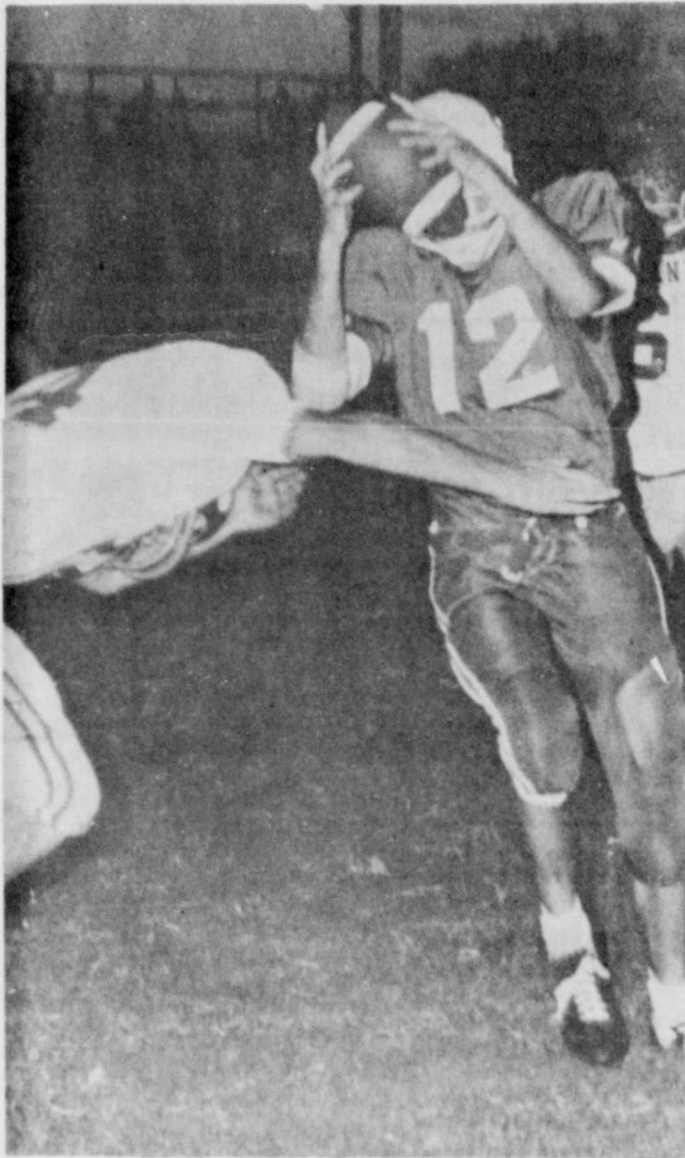

SPAG To Continue Law Enforcement Training

South Plains Association of Governments, Lubbock, will continue operation of its regional law enforcement training program with a grant approved today by Governor Preston Smith.

The award \$32,326, comes from the Criminal Justice Council. This body oversees statewide law enforcement training and administrators from the U. S. Department of Justice for crime control projects in Texas.

Bill Griffin, County Agent, Says.....

Quarantines for hog cholera have been placed on portions of Lubbock, Hockley and Lamb counties by federal and state animal health agencies, according to Dr. Gilbert R. Hollis, area swine specialist.

The quarantines were enacted because of two confirmed outbreaks of hog cholera, one each in Lubbock and Hockley counties. The action is part of a stepped-up campaign to wipe out this costly swine disease, Hollis adds. The quarantine will be removed when the threat of disease spread has been eliminated.

The area in Lubbock is bounded by a line extending from the northeast corner of the Lubbock County line, west along the county line to the intersection of Highway 87, then south along Highway 87 to the north bank of Yellow House Canyon. Then east along the north bank of Yellow House Canyon to the Lubbock County line, then north along the county line to the point of origin.

The quarantine area for Hockley and Lamb counties is bounded by a line from Smyer, north along Farm Road 54, then west along Farm Road 54 to the intersection of Farm Road 303. From there, south along Farm Road 303 to the intersection of State Highway 116, then east along State Highway 116, then east along State Highway 116 to Smyer.

The specialist explains that no swine in the quarantined areas can be moved without health certification from an accredited state or federal veterinarian. Any producer within the area who wants to take hogs to slaughter may call the Ramada Inn at 763-9343, and ask for any member of the Hog Cholera team. The producer can then obtain farm inspection and a certificate for movement.

"All swine farms within the federally quarantined areas will be inspected by the state animal health officials for signs of sickness," Hollis says, "and this inspection will be completed as quickly as possible."

Swine producers within the quarantined areas who wish to exhibit at the Panhandle-South Plains Fair may do so as long as the hogs are accompanied by a certificate of inspection. After the fair, these hogs must be taken directly home and isolated for 30 days. The specialist urges any producer who has sickness in swine to notify a veterinarian, county agent or the animal health officials. Hollis will also receive reports at 763-9451.

Combine mix, sour cream, sugar, oil and flour in a large mixing bowl. Add eggs one at a time and mix well.

Filling: 3 tablespoons brown sugar
2 teaspoons cinnamon
1/2 cup chopped nuts

Pour 1/2 batter in a prepared tube pan, sprinkle with 1/2 of the filling. Add the rest of the batter and top with the rest of the filling. Bake at 325 degrees for 1 hour and 5 minutes. While cake is still warm, combine 1 cup powdered sugar 2 tablespoons milk and 1 teaspoon vanilla, and pour over cake.

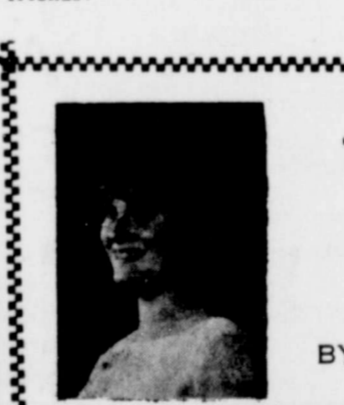

Screwworm Cases Continue To Spread

Livestock producers over the state are urged to be on the alert for screwworms as numerous cases continue to spread over the Hill Country, Edwards Plateau, Big Bend and South Texas areas.

Officials of the Mission Screwworm Program report that 19 cases were confirmed during the week ending Sept. 3, making this the worst week since the last week in December, 1968. Furthermore, 16 cases were confirmed during the past Labor Day weekend. Texas thus far has recorded 138 cases with the U. S. count at 161.

And the situation could worsen, according to officials. Screwworm outbreaks traditionally occur in late summer and fall, so producers should check their animals periodically. A spray of herds is also recommended and opera-

COTTON TALKS
FROM PLAINS COTTON GROWERS, INC.

The National Cotton Advisory Committee meeting in Washington September 15 and 16 is to discuss three major aspects of the 1972 cotton program, according to Donald Johnson, Executive Vice President of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., a recently appointed member of the Advisory Committee.

The principal topics under discussion Johnson said are (1) the level of the 1972 cotton loan, (2) the size of the 1972 base acreage allotment and (3) set-aside provisions, including both the amount of acreage required to be set aside and the permissible uses of such acreage.

Johnson was appointed to the Cotton Advisory Committee by Agriculture Secretary Clifford Hardin on September 3, along with W. A. Fulford of Brownfield and six others in the Texas cotton industry. The committee has no decision-making powers, but is called in "to advise the Secretary and other officials on matters such as domestic and export requirements, and production adjustment and stabilization programs." Appointments are for the period ending April 28, 1973.

Under the terms of the Agriculture Act of 1970 the loan for 1972 is to be set at 90 percent of the previous two year average world market price, except that the Secretary may adjust the loan level as he deems necessary to "keep the U. S. cotton competitive and to retain an adequate share of the world market for such cotton."

World cotton prices for the past two years have been such that, if the Secretary uses the same formula he used in 1971, the loan for 1972 would come to about 21 cents per pound, basis middling - inch, 3.5 to 4.9 micronaire, net weight. Whether this same formula is to be used, or whether the Secretary is to exercise his options to "adjust" the loan level, will be throughly discussed in the Advisory Committee. The 1972 loan must be announced on or before November 1 of this year.

There is a widely held belief in the U. S. cotton industry that additional cotton production will be needed in 1972, and some are urging USDA to raise the 1972 base allotment next year as an inducement to increased acreage. "This too will be discussed," Johnson said, "but in preliminary talks USDA officials indicate they may not be so inclined." Under the "open end" planting provisions of current

law, USDA feels an increase in the paying base acreage would secure increased plantings only on the less efficient farms which in 1971 planted only the minimum acreage required to qualify for full price support payments. Farmers who overplanted allotments in 1971, USDA reasons, would probably plant about the same acreage in 1972 whether the paying base is raised or not. Thus increased plantings would not be in proportion to increased cost of the program. Whether this view will hold remains to be seen, Johnson noted.

Set aside requirements is another problem. Current projections say there will be an oversupply of feed grains and wheat at the end of this year, which brings about a need for reduced acreage of these crops in 1972. And how to assure such a reduction is no less puzzling than how to increase cotton acreage. The set - aside approach embodied in the present farm program makes production control far less exact science than the case under previous programs when there were stiff penalties for planting above assigned allotments.

USDA fears that if, for example, they raise the percentage of base allotments required as set-aside for feed grains, too many producers would drop out of the program, bringing about increased feed grain plantings instead of the reverse. This could be overcome in two ways. Price support payments to cooperating growers could be increased to discourage "drop-outs," or a mandatory set-aside could be set at a lower level with producers given the opportunity for additional voluntary set-aside, with appropriate compensation. At the moment, the first solution appears most likely.

On cotton, if this year's 20 percent set-aside requirement is lowered to encourage additional cotton production, farmers might well plant the newly available acreage in feed grains or wheat instead of cotton. Another possibility that will be talked, if USDA in fact does feel the need for measures to encourage additional 1972 cotton production, would be to increase the cotton set-aside requirement to the 25 percent legal maximum, then permit planting of cotton and cotton only on the affected acreage.

Following the National Cotton Advisory Committee meetings it is understood USDA will call a meeting or meetings of State ASCS Committee Chairmen before finalizing decisions.

AN ACT relating to the recording and rerecording of livestock brands and marks; and declaring an emergency. BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. (a) This Act shall apply to every county in this State. In all the counties each owner of any livestock mentioned in Chapter 1 Title 121 of the Revised Civil Statutes of 1925 shall within six months after this Act takes effect, have his mark and brand for such stock recorded in the office of the county clerk of the county. These owners shall record the marks and brands whether the brands and marks have been previously recorded or not. (b) The owner shall have the right to have his mark and brand recorded in his name who according to the present records of the county first recorded the brand and mark in the county, or in event it can not be ascertained from the records who first recorded the brand and mark in the county, then the person who has been using such mark and brand the longest shall have the right to have the brand and mark recorded in his name. (c) After the expiration of six months from the taking effect of this Act, all records of marks and brands now in existence in the county shall no longer have any force or effect and after the expiration of six months, only the records made after this Act takes effect shall be examined or considered in recording marks and brands in the county. (d) Immediately upon the taking effect of this Act, the county clerk of the county shall have this Act published in some newspaper of general circulation in the county for a period of thirty days.
