For those who don't like getting out of bed in the darkness... Daylight Savings Time will phase out October 30. You have made it for almost six months—one more week should be a snap.

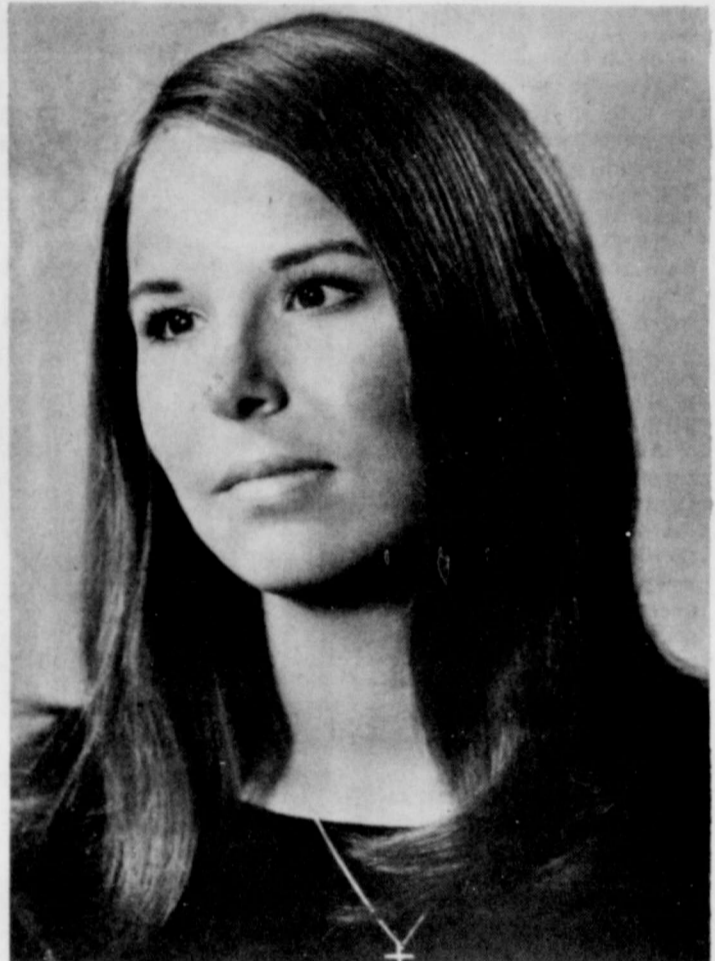

Workers in private industry today not only have themselves and their families to support, they must also earn enough to support one other person. According to the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, an average job holder in the private sector through his taxes supports almost one fourth of a government employee, one fourth of a welfare recipient, and one half of a person on social security.

The way enterprise has managed to keep ahead of tax demands, to the benefit of everyone, is well illustrated in a release from Harrisburg, Pennsylvania marking the Golden Anniversary of Pennsylvania's first gasoline tax. Fifty year ago, when the tax was first imposed, it contributed a mere \$3.1 million during its first year of operation. Tax rates today add up to 32 cents a gallon and yield the state some \$588 million a year.

An oil industry representative observes, "An interesting point often overlooked under the weight of this 48 percent tax on motor fuel is the remarkable fact that gasoline prices, excluding the tax, are lower today than they were 50 years ago, notwithstanding all the improvements achieved in gasoline quality, and the spiraling costs of almost everything else." In other words, private enterprise in the oil industry has managed to achieve the impossible. Through product improvement, sheer efficiency and breakthroughs in technology, it has accomplished the equivalent of absorbing, in the state of Pennsylvania alone, gasoline taxes totaling some \$8.5 billion over the past half century.

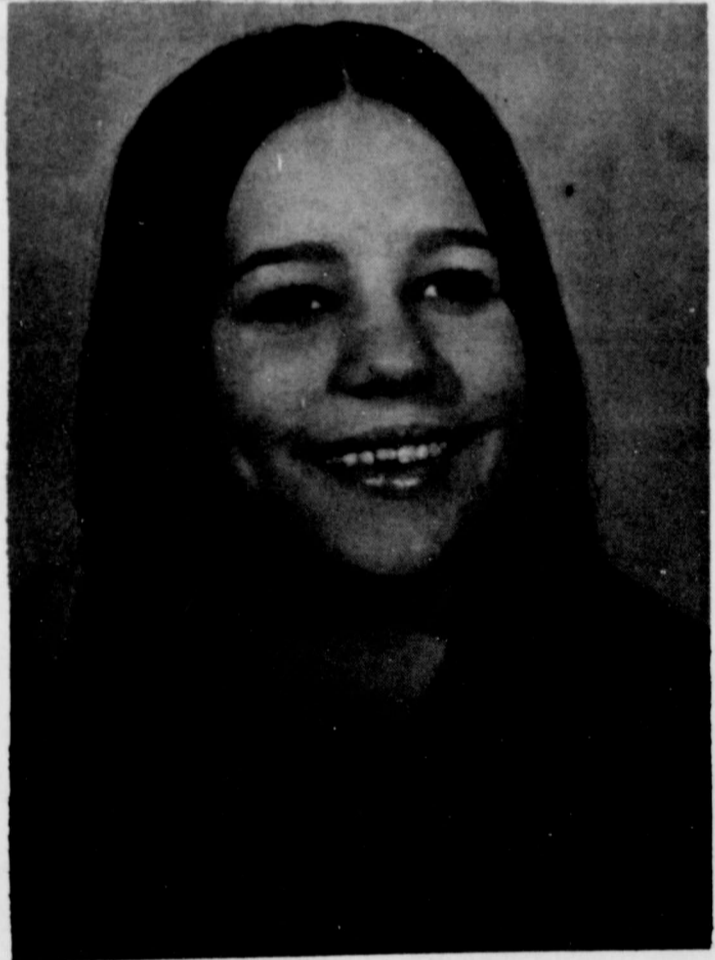

The Tahoka High School Football Queen will be crowned at 7:10 Friday night prior to the Tahoka - Post football game. To be sure that everyone is able to get in and be seated in time to enjoy the festivities, the gates to the

football field will open at 5:20 Friday night.

Queen candidates are Senior Dale Rogers, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Turner Rogers; Junior, Becky Franklin, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harold G. Franklin; Sophomore, Georgia Thomas, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Reble Thomas; and Freshman, Lisa Atwell, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Atwell.

Each queen candidate will be escorted by a member of the Tahoka Bulldog Football Team. The queen will be crowned by the 1970 Queen, Mrs. Tony (Leverett) Rogers, while background music will be provided by the Tahoka High School Band.

### Four Accidents In Lynn County

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated four accidents on rural highways in Lynn County during the month of September, according to Sergeant H. E. Pirtle, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in one person killed and nine persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first nine months of 1971 shows a total of 56 accidents resulting in one person killed and 58 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for September, 1971, shows a total of 499 accidents resulting in 33 persons killed and 268 persons injured. This was 82 less accidents, eight more fatalities, and 132 more injured than during August.

The 33 traffic deaths for the month of September, 1971, occurred in the following counties: Potter, seven; Lubbock, four; Parker and Childress, two each; Archer, Clay, Garza, Kent, Lynn, Montague, Palo Pinto, Wise, Yoakum, Carson, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Gray, Hansford, Moore, Farmer, Swisher, and Wilbarger, one each.

### Baseball Field Prospect Bright

Mayor Meldon Leslie has revealed that prospects are bright that funds will be made available by the Federal Government, through the State Parks and Wildlife Department for building of a standard size baseball field for Lynn County teams and for other possible improvements at Tahoka City Park.

Idea for a centrally located park in Tahoka was advanced by O'Donnell several months ago, and New Home and Wilson joined O'Donnell in promoting the idea.

Just recently, both Tahoka Chamber of Commerce and Tahoka Rotary Club have endorsed the proposal.

Planning engineers of the South Plains Association of Governments, recently surveyed the local site and have come up with a tentative plan they think will work, which would require addition of a

few lots on the south to the present Tahoka City Park.

SPAG, for which Mayor Leslie is the out-going president, was set up largely as a 15-county planning region as this area's unit in a state-wide system to pass on worthy projects to receive Federal funds being distributed to the states.

Mayor Leslie says such funds are allocated to local projects on a 60 - 40 basis, the Government furnishing 60 percent of the cost. Local, the 40 percent of the project cost, would include "in-kind" contributions.

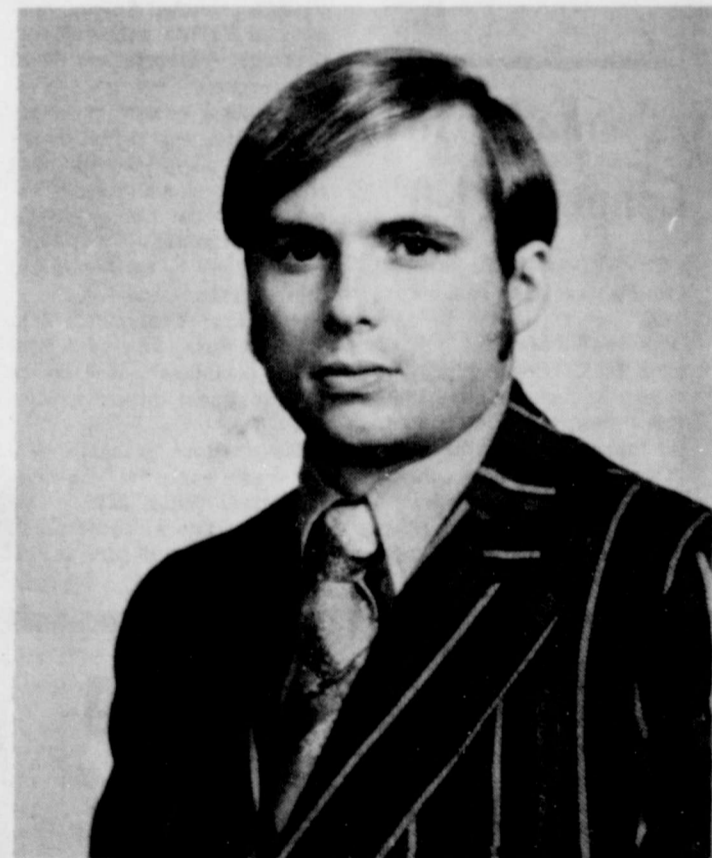
On such a park project here, he says, local 40 percent would be taken up by the land furnished, most of which is already owned by the City, and labor which would be furnished by the City workers and Lynn County commissioners.

Thus, on a \$100,000 project, for instance, the Federal Government would furnish \$60,000 and the City and County and possibly other county organizations would furnish the \$40,000 in land, labor, and materials.

Leslie says interested citizens at O'Donnell, backed by some at Wilson and New Home, are the credit for the idea of a centrally located baseball field here where this type of recreation could be made available for young men of the county.

Levels of instruction will be the same as last year. Miss Jacquelyn Durham, a teacher in Tahoka South Elementary School, will teach the Level I Class which will be for people who need to learn to read, write, and speak English. Mrs. Gay Patterson will teach Level

II which is for people who wish to improve reading, writing, and mathematical skills. Mrs. Maudie Woltman will teach Level III which is for those who have some proficiency but want to improve and also for those who wish to prepare to pass the General Educational Development Test and secure their High School Equivalency Certificate. Last year we had eighteen students who received their High School Equivalency Certificates and we hope for more than that number this year.

Mrs. Woltman is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fred McGinty and is living here while her husband is with the Army in Viet Nam. She is a graduate of Abilene Christian College. # Bulldogs Lose To Idalou, 14-7

## Homecoming Game Against Post

The Tahoka Bulldogs, unable to generate any offense against the Idalou Wildcats last Friday night lost 14-7. This is their second loss of the season and also their second district loss. Idalou is probably the toughest team the Bulldogs have faced this season.

Neither team could put any points on the board in the first period but Tahoka's first threat came in the first quarter when they moved the ball to the Idalou 16 only to fumble and lose the ball.

In the second period Idalou got on the board when runs by John Mojica and Jerry Franklia set up a TD with Mojica going the last yard for the score over left guard. Mojica also kicked the PAT with 9:32 left on the clock to give the Wildcats a 7-0 lead.

The lead didn't last long as Bulldog John Thomas received the ball at about the 20 yard line, ran into a wave of green, cut to the West sideline and dashed north for the Bulldogs only touchdown of the night. With 9:12 showing on the clock the game was tied 7-7.

The Bulldogs held the Wildcats after the kick off and forced them to punt. Bouncing off a Bulldog players back the punt was covered by the Wildcats on the Tahoka 20. Two plays later little brother Rosenda Mojica picked up ball fumbled in Idalou backfield and raced around left end 13 yards to paydirt. John Mojica kicked the point after to

give the Wildcats a 14-7 lead and end the scoring for the contest.

Both teams threatened in the second half but mistakes always halted the drives.

The Bulldogs go against the Post Antelopes this Friday night at Kelley Field. Homecoming activities will take place at half time with the homecoming queen being crowned and other various activities being performed.

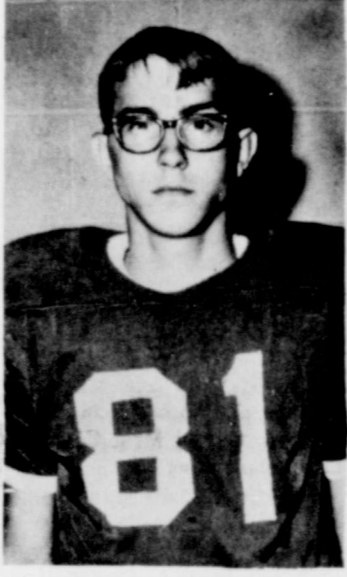

## Past Days In Lynn County

Last Friday afternoon the Tahoka Bulldogs, champions of district 6-A bowed to the strong Lobos of Levelland, 5-A district champs, for the bi-district title 38-0.

The stubborn Bulldog defense held the Lobos to only 12 points in the first half, but could not keep the Lobo offense stopped in the second half.

The Bulldogs offense was stopped by the strong Lobo defense and the Bulldogs lost a couple or three chances to score when they lost the ball deep in Lobo territory on fumbles. Joe Don Minor, steller Bulldog back was also suffering from an injury received earlier in the week and was unable to perform in top form.

The Bulldogs are not making any excuses though . . . when a good little team meets a good big team the result is usually just what happened last Friday afternoon on Lobo field in Levelland.

Although Bobby Hart, W. A. Wise and E. C. Seifert, all Lobo backs presented the fans with plenty of action in scoring runs and long gains, the star of the afternoon was Bill Kelley Bulldog guard, who actually played the biggest part of the game in the Lobo backfield on defense and threw them for tremendous losses at times. Kelley was undoubtedly the most outstanding player on field when the Bulldogs and Lobos met last Friday afternoon.

The Bulldogs have had a very successful season this year and for the second, possibly the third time in Tahoka's history they have won the district championship, losing only 2 games and winning 9 for the season.

One complete team and one extra man played their last game last Friday afternoon for the Tahoka Bulldogs. They are as follows:

## Mayor Leslie Tells Of SPAG Set-Up

Mayor Meldon Leslie last Thursday spoke before Tahoka Rotary Club on the set-up of the South Plains Association Governments, of which he was until recently the president.

SPAG was set up at suggestion of the Federal government as part of a state-wide system of similar groups to sponsor regional planning and approve or turn down projects seeking Federal grants under the under the relatively new program of Federal aide to towns

and county projects. It is part of a system to bring some order on the local level, and cut out piece-meal proposals, in applications for these Federal grants.

Lynn County and all four towns in the county belong to SPAG. This regional planning

group, centered at Lubbock includes 11 of the 15 counties in 15-county area and 40 of the 44 incorporated towns as members, Leslie said.

People frequently ask, Leslie said, "What has SPAG done for us?"

So far, much of the organization's results are a bit intangible to describe.

He thinks one of the most important results is in the Criminal Justice Department, where progress is being made in crime prevention and detection.

Law enforcement men are now being required to take a minimum of 140 hours of police instruction to become certified as qualified peace officer, and teletype systems such as City of Tahoka now has, are being installed over the area to co-ordinated crime detection and prevention.

These units are being installed on a 60 - 40 basis, the 60 per cent financed by SPAG through Federal Government funds and 40 percent by the local unit of government.

The Review and Comment Department studies and passes on or turns down proposals for Community projects.

A Health Planning Program has been initiated which should prove of benefit to the entire area.

SPAG helps now and will become more important, Leslie thinks, in better application at the "grass-roots" of Federal aide programs to prevent waste of funds and energy, and in a better co-ordinated program of area improvement.

Frank Hill was in charge of the program and introduced the speaker.

President Dwaun Lusk announced there would be no regular club meeting this week on account of the Rotary - Teacher banquet which was held Monday night of this week.

Preston Lee was also closely identified with Levelland, having served as mayor there, president of the Rotary Club, and was active in the Chamber of Commerce, Masonry, and Eastern Star. Mrs. Lee is well known by many Wilson and Tahoka People.

# Board Of Education Approves Insurance

The Tahoka ISD Board of Education met for its regular monthly meeting on Thursday, October 14, and recinded action taken at the September meeting in regard to plant insurance coverage while approving insurance coverage for all buildings, auxiliary facilities, and furnishing, for a new three year term, in the amount of \$1,358,000. Total premium for such coverage is \$22,680 which is to be paid over the three year period. The Clint Walker Agency does the underwriting and servicing for the plant insurance.

In other action the Board approved the administration's proposal for an Adult Basic Education Program to be offered during the fall and spring. All cash expense involved in the program will be paid by the Division of Occupational Education of the Texas Education Agency with facilities and consultant services provided by the School District. Classes will meet twice each week, in the evenings, at the Tahoka High School Building beginning the last week in October and continuing through March, with 100 hours of instruction being offered at three levels. The program, which has been funded for \$3,200 will employ three teachers, two teacher aides, and a part-time director. Melvin Burks, Director of Guidance and Special Services for the Tahoka Schools, will direct the program.

The Board also approved changes in the Athletic Award policies of the High School. Texas Interscholastic League policies provide that an athlete may receive only one major award, of \$20.00 value, while in High School. Additional symbolic awards of \$3.00 each may be awarded for each additional interschool activity each year. As of the current year, Tahoka Public Schools' Award Policy provides that players on the varsity teams, except as hereinafter provided, shall receive a \$20.00 award. Players on the junior varsity and "B" teams shall receive, each year, a plaque with sports engraved thereon. If a junior, sophomore, or freshman playing on a varsity team should choose

to wait until later during his high school career to receive a major award, his wish may be granted.

All those making a team and remaining on the team for the complete season, unless prohibited by injury or illness, shall receive jackets or plaques.

A record of awards shall be on file in the principal's office and the athletic director's office.

It is further provided by this policy that:

1. Only participants in the major sports of football, basketball, golf, and track shall be eligible for the \$20.00 award jacket.
2. A plaque of \$20.00 award will be presented intrack only if participant scores at least one point in the district meet.
3. A plaque of \$20.00 award will be presented in golf to the individual or team qualifying for the regional meet.
4. A plaque is to be given in volleyball and tennis when placing first or second in district meet.
5. A maximum of one plaque

per student per year will be awarded with the accomplishments for that year engraved on the plaque.

6. Exceptions may be made at the discretion of the Athletic Director and principal in cases of unusual circumstances.

In other business action was taken approving the sharing of substitute teacher costs for teachers who are called for jury service.

Various reports concerning the operation of the schools were presented. The current enrollment report indicated a gain of 43 students since September 9, and a gain of 10 students over the enrollment figure of one year ago. Current enrollment figures showed 1,119 enrolled in all Tahoka Schools as of October 13.

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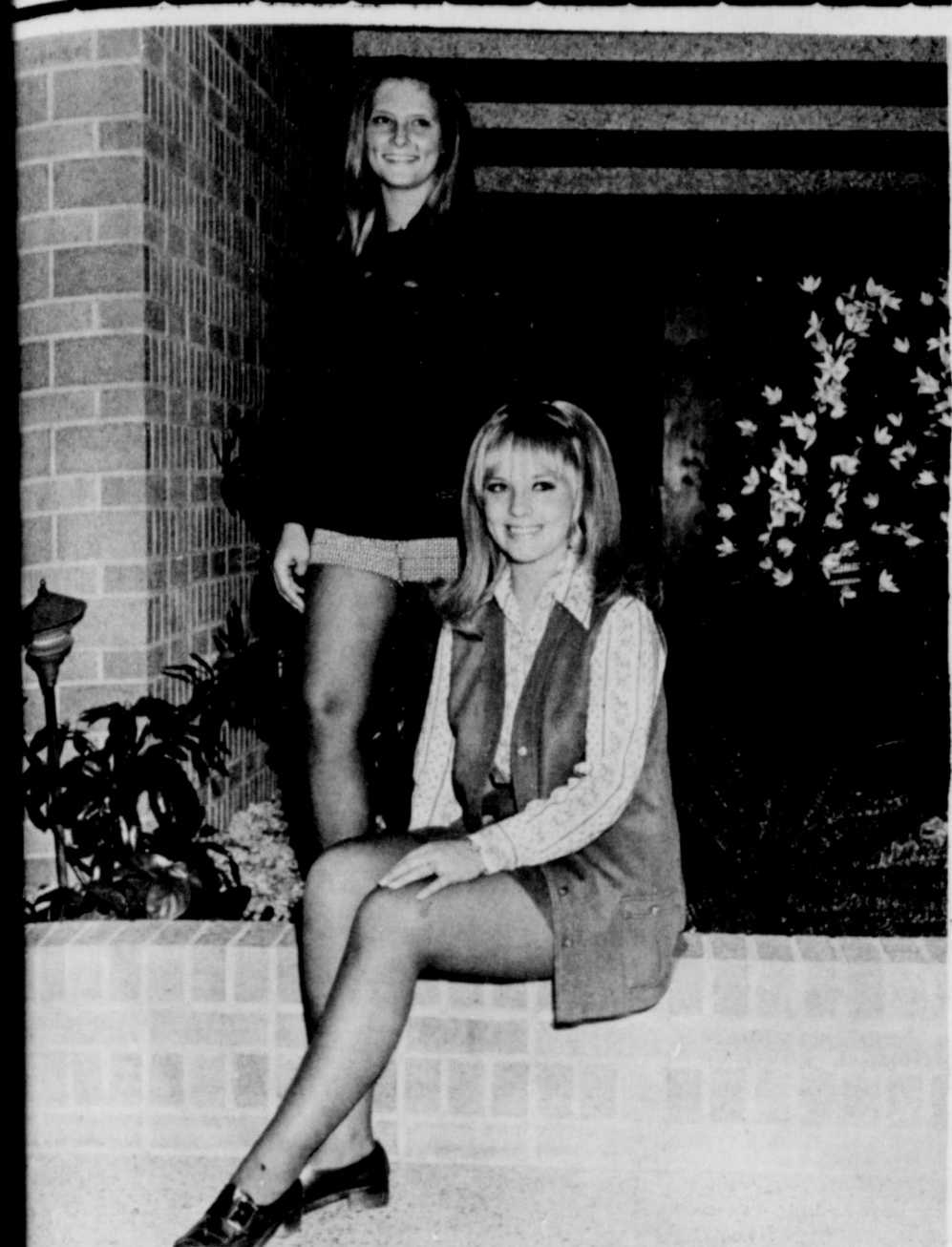

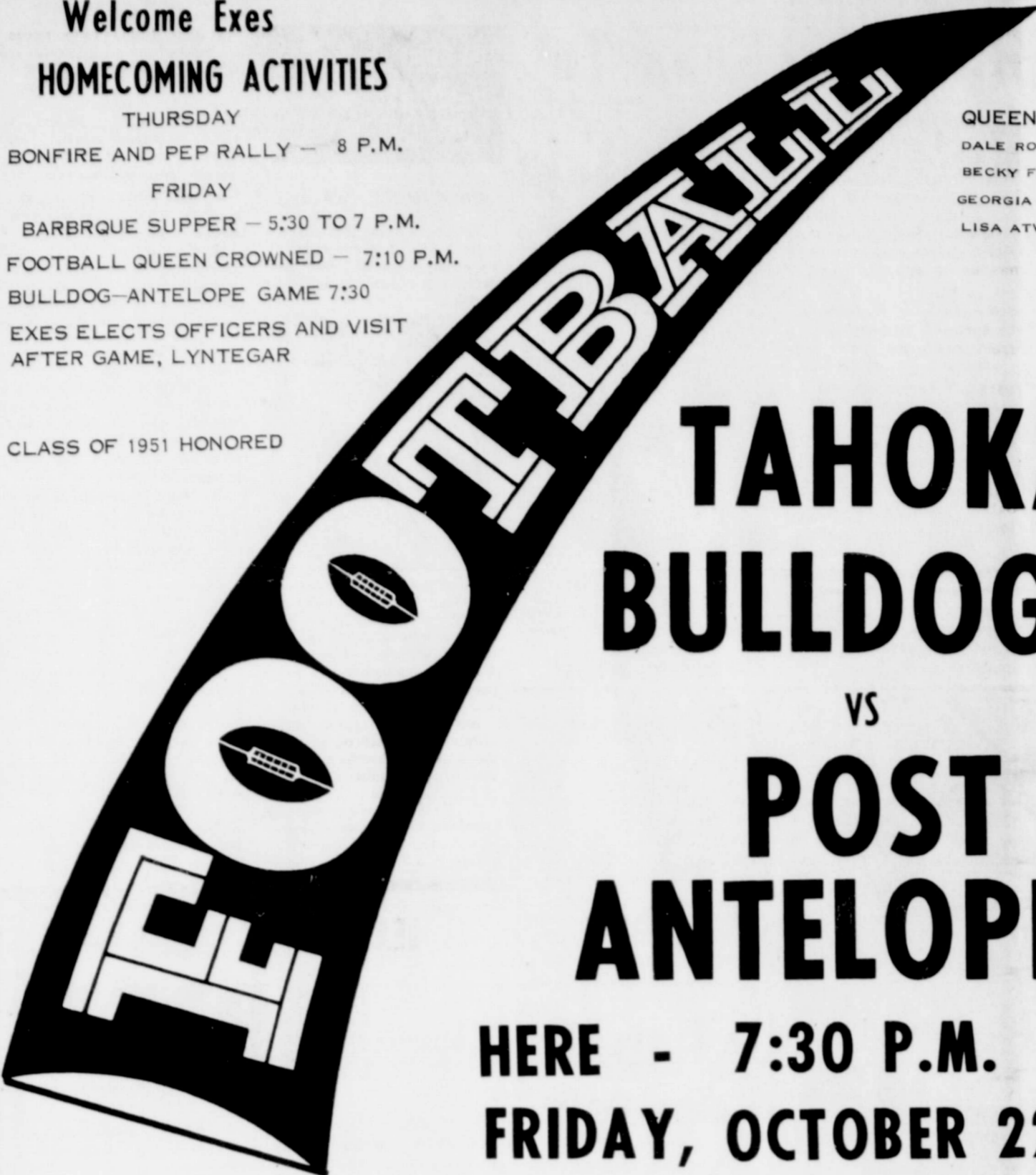

Today's civilized feminine look puts an increased spotlight on legs. Hosiery pulls this classic look together for a total fashion picture.

A limitless variety of hosiery lengths, including knee-highs, over-the-knees, and pantyhose, can be matched with roaming hem lengths and fashion moods. Brilliant colors and interesting textures and patterns are also plentiful.

A new look this season is the layered look, in which contrasting knee-highs are worn over pantyhose.

Another look is knit bodysuits or jumpshirts, color matches with opaque pantyhose, to coordinate arms and legs. And bodyboots, which are pantyhose attached to a soft, opaque kneecap worn with shoes, are also a popular fashion item.

But regardless of the type of hosiery, all are victims of perspiration and soiling. Dirt will deteriorate fibers, weakening stretch and shape retention qualities. To avoid this problem, launder soon after wearing.

Nylon hosiery may be machine laundered and dried. Place hosiery in a mesh bag or pillowcase before laundering and drying. Then, adjust machine to the most delicate or gentle cycle, selecting a warm temperature. Avoid harsh detergents since they contain chemicals which damage nylon fibers.

If laundering by hand, shake hosiery in a jar of mild suds and warm water. Rinse in the same way. This procedure lessens the possibility of snagging by roughened hands or nails.

Porper and routine care procedures help lengthen the life-

time of hosiery, thus stretching the clothing dollar. Accumulate a hosiery wardrobe to mix and match with fall and winter fashions for a total look -- then step out with confidence.

### RECIPE OF THE WEEK:

**Pumpkin Ring Cake**  
 1/2 cup liquid shortening  
 1 cup sugar  
 3 eggs  
 1 cup mashed pumpkin (canned or fresh cooked)  
 1 3/4 cups flour  
 1 tsp. soda  
 1 1/2 tsp. cinnamon  
 1 tsp. allspice  
 1/4 tsp. ground cloves  
 1 tsp. nutmeg  
 1/2 tsp. salt

Combine shortening with sugar. Beat in eggs until well blended. Stir in pumpkin. Sift all dry ingredients together and mix in gradually. Beat until smooth. Grease and flour ring mold or standard loaf pan. Pour mixture into pan and bake at 350 degrees for 60 minutes, or until toothpick in center comes out clean. Unmold and sprinkle with powdered sugar while warm.

### U. S. FARM POPULATION DOWN

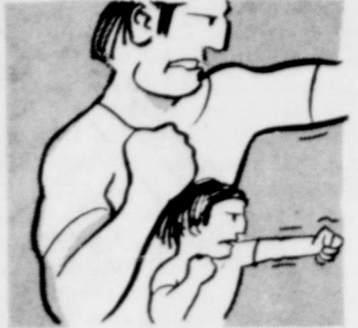
The U. S. farm population declined 5.8 percent in 1970 to a low of 9,712,000 reports the U. S. Department of Agriculture. As a result, farm population accounts for only 4.8 percent of the national total compared to 8.7 percent in 1960.

### Father to the Rescue

Suppose a man sees his son being beaten up by the neighborhood bully. Does he have a legal right to use force in his son's defense?



He does indeed. Parallel to the right of self defense is the right to defend the members of one's family, with force if need be. This doctrine goes all the way back to the days of feudalism, when the master of the household was legally entitled to protect his family from attack.

But in such situations, there is always the chance of escalating the violence. Therefore, the law places careful limits on this right of family defense.

1) The force used must not be excessive. For example:

A father found his son involved in a fracas with the man

next door. Rushing to the rescue, he knocked the man unconscious with a mighty blow on the head. Then he followed up with a swift kick in the abdomen.

For the resulting internal injuries, the father was duly held liable in court. The right to defend his son, said the court, did not include the right to kick someone who was lying on the ground unconscious.

2) The force must be used only to defend, not to "get even." In another case, a father found out that a certain teacher had slapped his son in class. Days later, meeting the teacher on the sidewalk, he punched him in the nose.

Could the father be held liable? Again, yes. The court said that since the boy was in no danger at the time of the punch, the father's action could not fairly be called defensive.

3) Many courts add that the father's right to use force is no greater than the child's. Thus:

A belligerent teen-ager deliberately picked a fight with another youth. But by the time his father came along, he was already getting the worst of it. The father promptly slugged the other boy with a rock.

Sued later for damages, the father claimed he had acted to protect his son. But the court held him liable anyhow. The court said that, in terms of the right to use force, he "stood in his son's shoes"—that is, in the shoes of the aggressor.

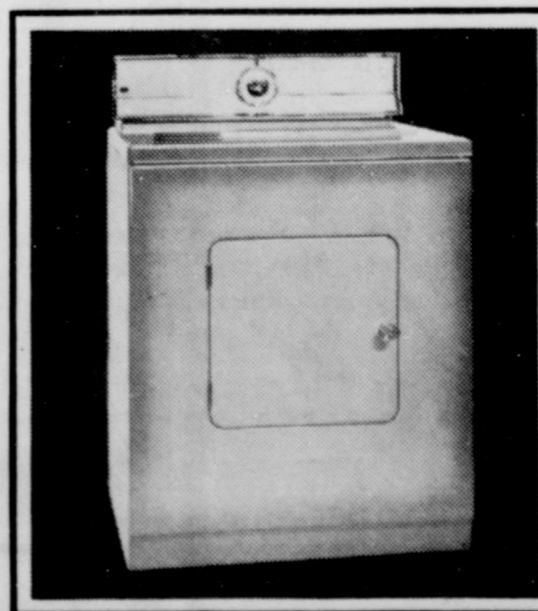

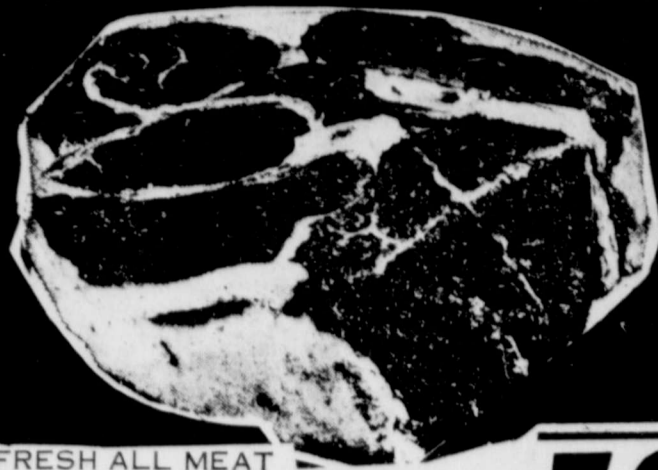
