The Gold Star Awards were presented to Mark Flippin, Tahoka 4-H Club member and Carla Wilke, Wilson 4-H Club member.

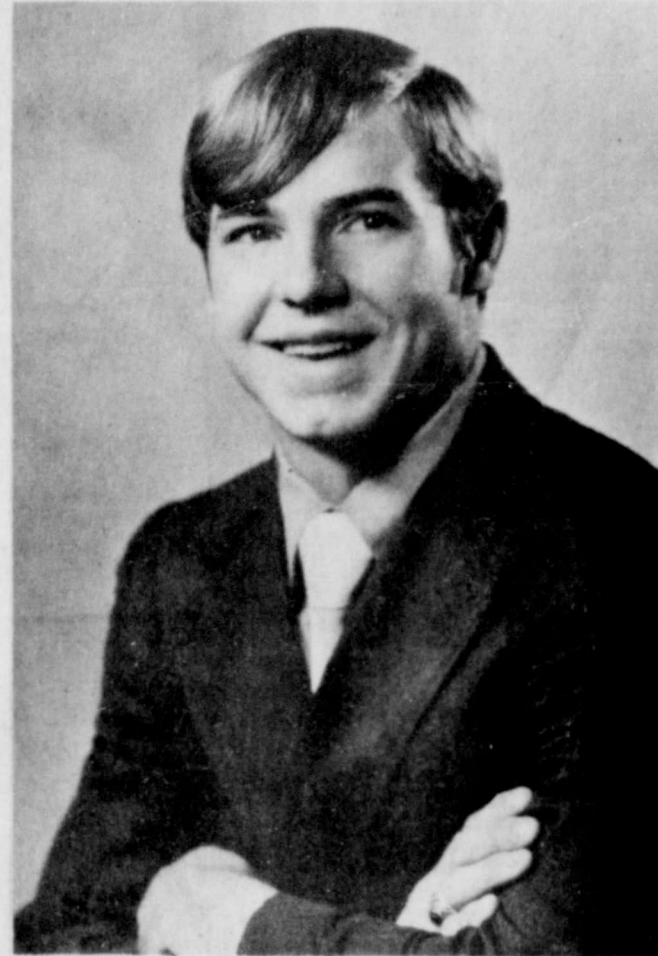

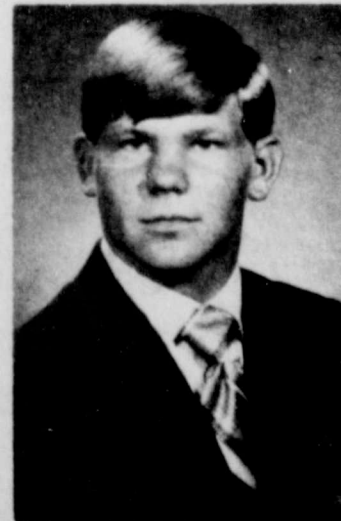

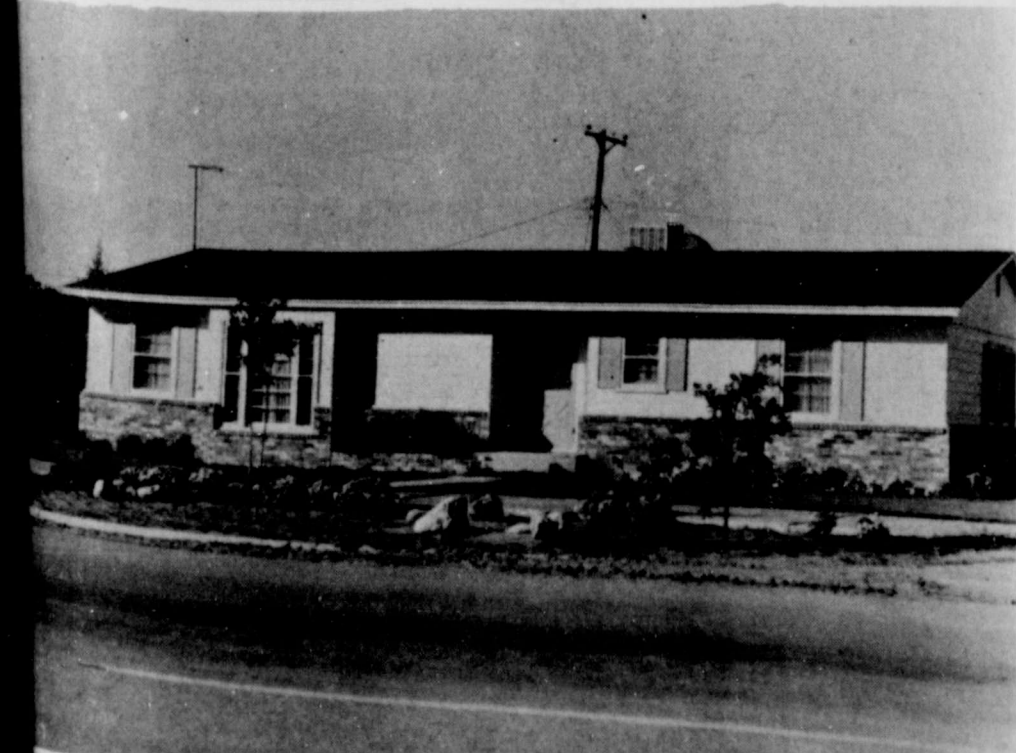
He told of the new game laws, open seasons, and progress of wild game and fowl production in this area.


Quail and small game were wiped out over a large area of the county by the terrific fall this fall.

Even though the cost of installing underground high voltage cable is now approximately twice the cost of overhead lines, new manufacturing tech-

niques and volume are reducing this cost differential all the time. Therefore, it does seem that eventually many power lines will be underground. Thereby reducing the exposure to ice storms and high winds and improving electric service.

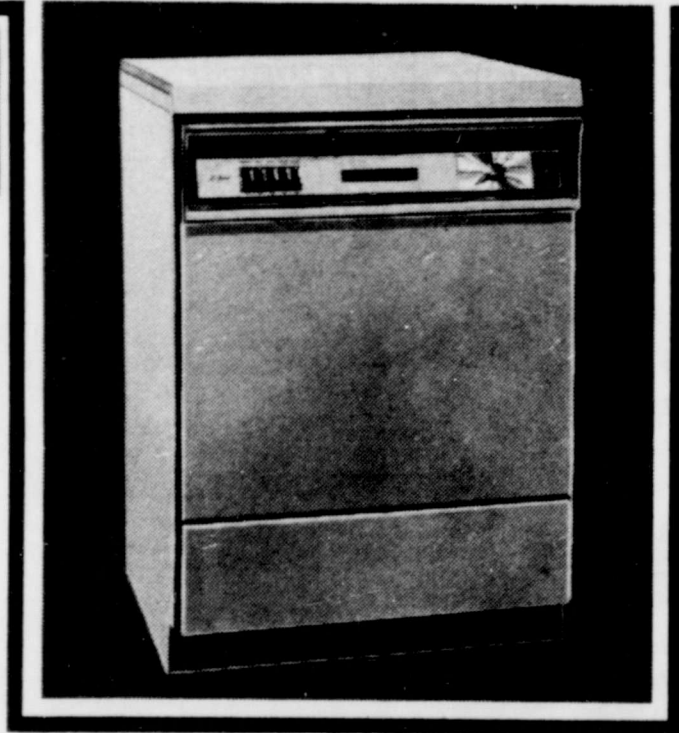

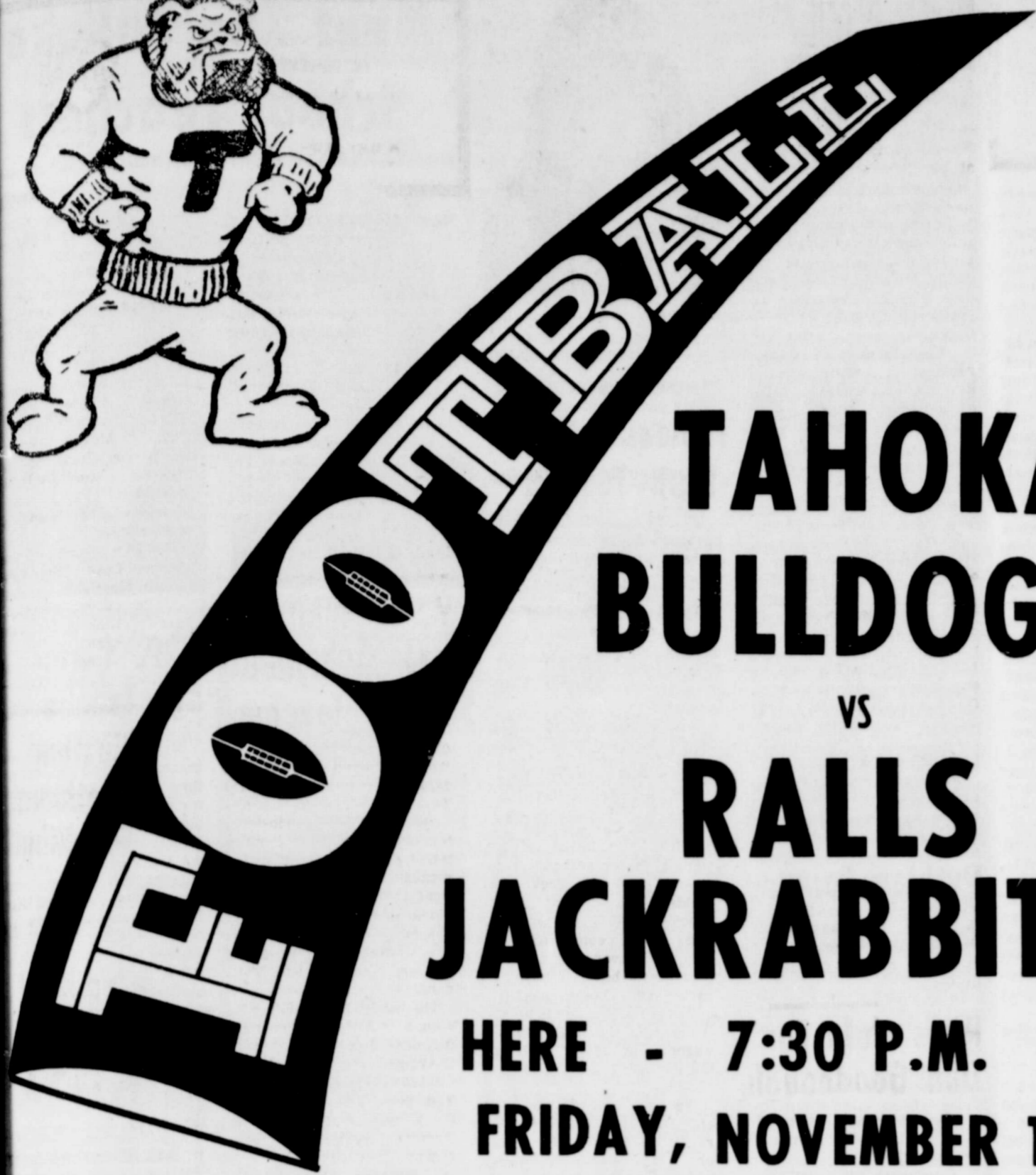

## Linda Huffaker, CHD Agent, Says.....

Make your own coat to keep you warm this winter. "If you select just the right pattern and fabric, sewing a coat should not be difficult." Avoid collars, lapels, bound buttonholes and extra bulky fabrics--these are trouble makers.

Winter '71 looks feature capes, and hooded and wrapped coats. Capes are a great fashion item, yet are easy to make. Selection of a hooded style will eliminate collar and buttonhole construction. And even though the wrap coat has a collar and lapels, you can forget about buttonholes.

In addition to construction details, the fabric you choose can also create sewing problems. Select material with an interesting look, such as a tweed or tapestry. "A flannel or gaberdine material can make an easy coat pattern hard to construct. These very plain fabrics will show every stitching or pressing mistake.

Bonded fabrics also deserve consideration if you make a cape. However, avoid using them to mold and shape a coat.

Look for closely-woven fabric it's more stable and easier to handle than soft stretchy fabrics. Many fabrics sold for coats are thick and spongy, thus difficult to sew and press.

Even if you are not the most experienced seamstress, your coat-making can be a success if you select the proper pattern and fabric.

### RECIPE OF THE WEEK:

Pecan Gems  
Time: 15-20 minutes  
Temperature: 375 degrees F.  
Crust:

1/2 lb. butter or margarine  
2 cups sifted all-purpose flour  
1/2 teaspoon salt

1 8 oz. pkg. cream cheese.  
With a pastry blender or two knives cut butter into dry ingredients until dough is full of fine lumps, like pie crust. Add room temperature cream cheese. Blend. (Dough may be refrigerated until ready to use.) Roll out dough on floured pastry cloth as for pie crust. Cut into 3 inch circles. Press pastry circles into cups of 1 1/4" diam., 1/2" deep.

Filling:  
1 egg  
3/4 cup brown sugar  
1 tablespoon melted butter or margarine  
Dash of Salt

1 teaspoon vanilla  
1 cup chopped pecans  
Beat egg, brown sugar, butter, salt and vanilla until smooth. Put 1 teaspoon chopped pecans in each pastry lined cup. Put 1 teaspoon filling into each. Bake. Cool before removing from pans.

Yields: About three dozen tiny tarts.

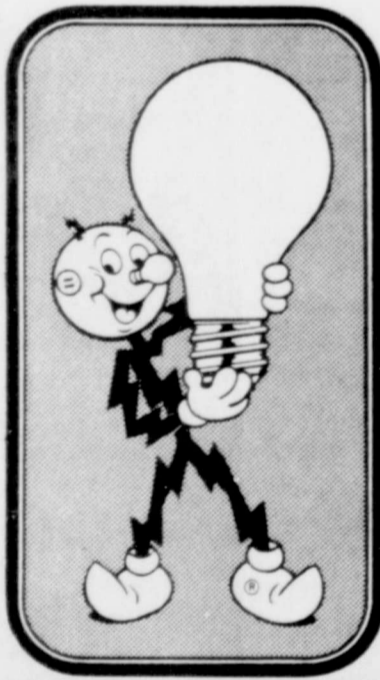

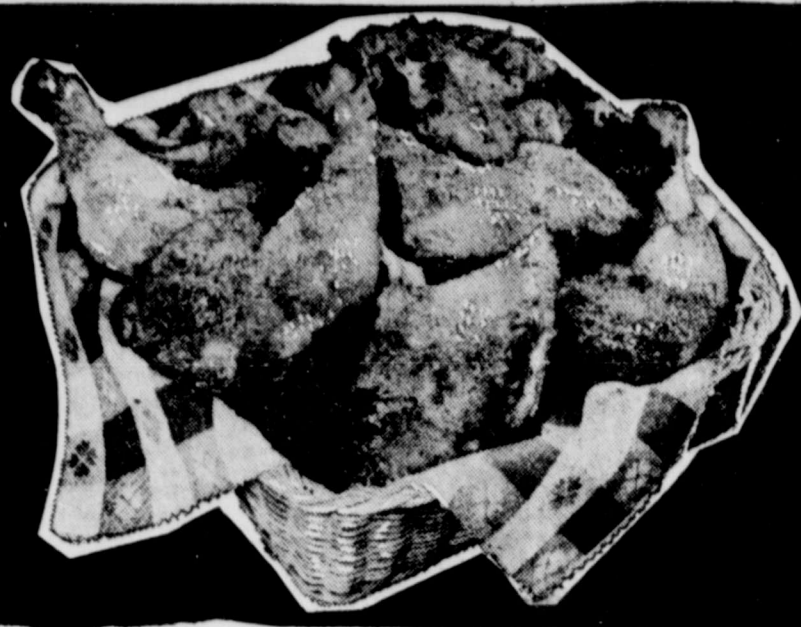

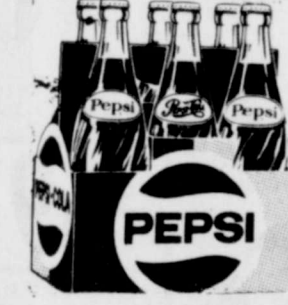
